SUBJECT: Cumberland Historical Cemetery Organization

Discussion: Today Ed Taylor joins us in the studios from the Cumberland Historic Cemetery Organization. On July 4th at 10am they will be having a memorial for the Revolutionary War deceased members from Cumberland, specifically Captain David Linn. He owned, at one point in time, the entire west side of Cumberland and had an estate called Rose Hill. The estate was built in 1801 and was torn down in 1968. The four brown stone columns that were the entry way to the estate now sit in front of the Cumberland historical Cemetery Organizations headquarters at 400 South Allegany Street. On one the pillars there is a plaque honoring Captain Linn of 250 years of heritage. On July 4th elected officials will gather around the plaque and read the history to the people and then travel over to Rose Hill Cemetery. The Linn's donated that land to be used as a cemetery in the 1800s and named it after the estate. At the cemetery they have a three-gun salute at Linn's monument, lay wreaths on revolution graves, and visit other historical monuments. The event is open to the public and it's a chance to learn about our area's history.

Parents can come and fill out applications through the Department of Health and Human Resources in Keyser starting the first of July all the way through August. Once the Family Resource Network has all the applications in, they verify that all the families with the children exist, and that it is first come first serve. They will then train volunteer shoppers to get them ready to start shopping with these families. If you want to become a volunteer call the FRN office line. To return the application you go to the CHH office. Once everything is ready the families will be called to meet with their volunteer at the local Walmart. The families get to do the shopping and the volunteers are there to help with guidance and to check out. To apply they can call the FRN office at (304) 788-9099 or go to the local CHH office in Keyser at 1 Tornado Way. They have been doing this for almost 30 years and have yet to have to turn down a child. They help with any child from birth to graduation. Their goal is to give children warm clothes or whatever the child would need to help get them through the winter months. Due to inflation their largest fundraiser, the crab feast, will not be happening this year. So, they need help from the community this year more than ever. SUBJECT: Healing Allegany

Discussion: We welcome Healing Allegany's celerity speaker for Purple Fest, Brandon Novak. He is here to tell us his story about dealing with addiction. He was born and raised in Baltimore Maryland, 22 years of addiction, 13 impatient treatment centers, 7 days of life support, medevacked to 4 different hospitals from overdoses, and he is now seven years sober. He is now proud to work in the field of recovery helping people realize there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Being an addict is not a death sentence. He will be at Purple Fest Aug 28th from 11am – 5pm and he has traveled all over the nation. Throughout his journey his mom was his biggest supporter through all those years and whenever he travels, he always comes across other moms out there trying to help their kids. The stigma for overdose is lifting because the death tolls are rising. It's becoming more common to see and it is no longer the homeless man under the bridge, it is now the neighbor's kid, a husband, and a wife. Addiction doesn't discriminate and roughly 1/3rd of people will be affected directly or indirectly from opioids. Whenever he was having issues, he never knew there was help out there for him, people miss out on opportunities they don't know exist. He wants to be the difference for other people that are going through the same thing he was. Your past doesn't dictate your future, it only guided it. He wants to share the promise of hope and freedom from drugs and alcohol; recovery is possible.
