The guests are generally state residents, or may be visiting the state, or their work in some way relates to the state or region. The program is repeated from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m.

Behind the Headlines is a one-hour weekly news roundup featuring a panel of reporters from the Salt Lake Tribune, and hosted by UPR's Tom Williams. UPR broadcasts Behind the Headlines on Fridays at 9:00 a.m. with a repeat broadcast Fridays at 7:00 p.m.

- **Both Sides of the Aisle** is a half-hour weekly debate over politics, policy and current issues facing the state of Utah, featuring voices representing the Right, the Center, and the Left. The program features State Auditor John Dougall, Former Salt Lake County Councilwoman Shireen Ghorbani (D), and Natalie Gochnour, an associate dean in the David Eccles School of Business and director of the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute at the University of Utah. The show is produced by Anthony Scoma. UPR broadcasts Both Sides of the Aisle on Thursdays from 10:00 to 10:30 a.m.
- **4. Undisciplined** is a weekly half-hour science program, hosted by USU Journalism Professor Matthew LaPlante. Each week LaPlante introduces two scientists from disparate fields of research to each other and initiates a fascinating cross-disciplinary conversation. UPR broadcasts
- research to each other and initiates a fascinating cross-disciplinary conversation. UPR broadcasts Undisciplined on Thursdays at 10:30 a.m.
- **Community Calendar** is broadcast an average of ten times per day throughout the week. It is a one-minute compilation of upcoming non-profit community events, meetings and other information provided by local and statewide organizations and agencies. Listeners are invited to call the station or check the station's web site for phone numbers and other information related to the activity. Community Calendar is usually 1-minute in length.
- **6. Utah News** During the two daily National Public Radio network programs of news and public affairs (Morning Edition & All Things Considered), and other programs, Utah Public Radio inserts news reports of two to four minutes in length. These segments air hourly and total a half hour of program content each weekday.
- 7. UPR News in Spanish is a six-minute newscast in Spanish produced by UPR News. The newscast is broadcast on some Mondays and Wednesdays from 9:00 p.m. to 9:06 p.m.

UPR Feature Reports – Four to five-minute, highly-produced segments focusing on topics of timely interest and is broadcast periodically during NPR's Morning Edition & All Things Considered.

Wild About Utah is a weekly three-minute look at our natural world. It airs several times during the week.

Beehive Archive is a weekly three-minute segment featuring engaging stories that illuminate Utah's rich past and explore the diverse stories—religious, ethnic, regional, social, and cultural—that make up our state's history.

The Five-thirty Utah News is a newscast broadcast daily Monday through Friday during All Things Considered, which features news reports covering news from all over Utah, produced by the UPR News staff. This newscast is from 2 to 5 minutes in length.

The program is produced by National Public Radio, and originates from Washington D.C. and Los Angeles.

- **All Things Considered** is a daily (seven days a week) 1 to 3.5 hour program which airs from 3:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. weekdays and from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekends. This program also features national and international news reports, features and analysis and is produced by National Public Radio
- BBC World Service provides a variety of programs, including "Newshour," "Outlook," "Assignment," "The Inquiry," "The Conversation," "More or Less," "Business Daily," "Witness," "The Arts Hour," "People Fixing the World," "Weekend Documentary," and "World Book Club" and these programs are broadcast Mondays through Fridays from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., Saturdays from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., and Sundays from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. BBC's "Topline" is broadcast during Morning Edition. BBC World Service news and current affairs programs set the agenda for the day and provide the latest news, interviews, and on-the-spot features on a wide range of subjects for audiences around the world. These programs are 9 minute, half-hour, and one-hour programs.

As It Happens is broadcast weekdays from 8:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and is a survey of the day's international and Canadian news produced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The program features interviews with news and policy makers and provides a different perspective on events and issues of the day. The program is one-hour in length.

Latino USA is a weekly one-hour program from Futuro Media and PRX. Latino USA chronicles how Latinos are living, shaping and changing America, with in-depth reporting and candid conversations. Hosted by Maria Hinojosa. Latino USA is broadcast on Tuesdays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

- **Living on Earth** is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Wednesday mornings from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and Sunday mornings from 5:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. and focuses on environmental, science and public policy issues. Stakeholders with various perspectives and views on environmental issues are interviewed. The program is produced by National Public Radio.

Climate One is a one-hour weekly program about energy, economy and the environment from Climate One at the Commonwealth Club of California and PRX. Each week listeners get a candid discussion among climate scientists, policy makers, activists and concerned citizens. Hosted by Climate One founder Greg Dalton. Climate One is broadcast on Wednesdays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

Reveal is the Peabody Award-winning investigative journalism program for public radio from The Center for Investigative Reporting and PRX. It is broadcast on Mondays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. The program is one-hour in length

Marketplace is a half-hour daily program from APM, which covers the day's business news and general news from an economic perspective. Marketplace airs weeknights from 6:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Radiolab explores big ideas in science (and beyond) through conversation, storytelling and sound. Radiolab is an investigation. Each episode is a patchwork of people, sounds, stories and experiences centered around One Big Idea. On Radiolab, science bumps into culture ... information sounds like music. Radiolab is a weekly program produced by WNYC and broadcast on UPR on Tuesdays from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and Saturdays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The program is one-hour in length.

The TED Radio Hour is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Monday mornings from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and Sunday afternoons from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. Produced by NPR and

To The Best of Our Knowledge is a weekly, two-hour program broadcast Sundays from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. The program is produced by Wisconsin Public Radio and features a wide variety of guests discussing topics ranging from health and science to the arts, science, public policy and popular culture. The program's hosts conduct in depth interviews in a thoughtful

Zorba Paster On Your Health is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Sundays from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. and featuring Dr. Zorba Paster, a general practitioner from Madison, Wisconsin. Dr. Paster discusses medical and personal health issues and research, and answers medical questions from listeners.

7.

The Splendid Table is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Sunday afternoons from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. The Splendid Table is a culinary, culture, and lifestyle one-hour program that celebrates food and its ability to touch the lives and feed the souls of everyone. Each week, award-winning host Francis Lam leads listeners on a journey of the senses and hosts discussions with a variety of writers and personalities who share their passion for the culinary delights.

8.

The New Yorker Radio Hour is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Sunday mornings from 11:00 a.m. to noon. The program features David Remnick, the editor of The New Yorker magazine, joined by the magazine's writers in a program featuring a mix of profiles, storytelling, and insightful conversations about the issues that matter, plus an occasional blast of comic genius from the magazine's legendary Shouts and Murmurs page.

INTEREST AND CONCERN FOR CULTURAL PROGRAMMING AND THE FINE ARTS.

A. Broadcast of Classical Music Programming

1.

Performance Today is broadcast from 9:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays and features classical music recorded before live audiences in venues across the United States. In addition to music performances, there are interview with musicians, reviews recordings and concerts, explanations of classical music terminology and reports on the arts. The program is produced by American Public Media and hosted by Fred Child. The program is one-hour in length.

2.

Classical Music is broadcast Mondays through Saturdays from 11:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. featuring music from the WFMT Fine Arts Radio Network ("Beethoven Satellite Network") hosted by Peter van de Graaff. The program is 5 hours in length.

B. Broadcast of Jazz, Folk, Acoustic and World Music

1.

Thistle & Shamrock is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Fridays from 9:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and features contemporary and traditional Celtic music from Ireland and Scotland. A broad range of musical styles are featured along with occasional interview with musicians by host Fiona Ritchie.

- **Putumayo World Music** is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Friday evenings from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., and highlights contemporary "world music" from all parts of the globe.
- **3. The Brazilian Hour** is one of the longest running international radio shows in the U.S. its mission being to provide audiences worldwide with a rich and deep taste of Brazilian culture. The Brazilian Hour Radio presents music along with guest interviews. Created and hosted by Sergio Mielniczenko, the program is presented by The Cultural Sector of the Brazilian Consulate-General in Los Angeles and radio station KXLU in Los Angeles. The Brazilian Hour is broadcast on UPR on Sundays from 10:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. The program is one-hour in length.

4.

Alt.Latino regularly introduces listeners to new alternative Latin music, including diverse genres such as cumbia, Mexican garage rock, Panamanian rap, heavy metal mariachi and many more boundary-blurring sounds from around the world. In addition to music, Alt.Latino features interviews and insightful conversation about Latin events and culture. Host Felix Contreras' discussion of music and culture reflects his experiences as a Latino immigrant, and is informed by his long career covering Latin music and culture for NPR, NBC and Univision. Alt.Latino is a weekly half-hour program from NPR and is broadcast on UPR on Saturdays at 11:00 p.m.

5.

All Songs Considered is NPR's guide to discovering new music below the radar. Every week, host Bob Boilen and producer Robin Hilton go through hundreds of new CDs to find music that's worth getting excited about, whether it's the latest Swedish pop band, a hip hop artist going ambient, or a singer-songwriter with a twisted new take on love. All Songs Considered is a weekly half-hour program broadcast Saturday evenings from 11:30 p.m. to 12:00 a.m.

6.

E-Town is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Saturdays from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and features a mix of contemporary and traditional folk and acoustic music, performed before a live audience in Boulder, Colorado. The program also has an information segment with host Nick Forster interviewing people involved in environmental issues, and the presentation of the weekly "Echievement" award.

7.

Folk Alley is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Saturday evenings from 10:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. Each week host Elena See explores new and classic folk music.

8.

American Routes is a weekly two-hour program broadcast Saturdays from 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. American Routes is a weekly two-hour public radio program produced in New Orleans, presenting a broad range of American music--blues and jazz, gospel and soul, old-time country and rockabilly, Cajun and Zydeco, Tejano and Latin, roots-rock and pop, avant-garde and classical. The program also presents documentary features and artist interviews.

9.

Blues Before Sunrise showcases blues as part of a cultural landscape that includes jump and jive, rhythm and blues, swing, doo wop, gospel, comedy, and recitation, and never is the music presented as kitsch or retro fashion in the way that some music has been exploited and trivialized. For host Steve Cushing, the blues is a living African-American tradition with deep roots. Blues Before Sunrise is produced at WDCB Public Radio in Chicago and is broadcast on UPR on Sundays from 12:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. The program is 5 hours in length.

10.

Jazz Time with Steve Williams is broadcast Sunday evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. The program features long-time Utah radio host Steve Williams and a wide range of jazz styles and

musicians. Steve Williams features mostly recorded music, but also hosts the occasional guest and sometimes features live music. The program is 4 hours in length.

Broadcast of Dramatic Theater, Live Performance, Storytelling, Culture and Comedy Programs

1.

L.A. Theatre Works is the world's leading producer of audio theatre. They stage plays before a live audience in an audio-friendly format, so actors speak directly into microphones while they add sound effects and music to create an immersive audio experience. L.A. Theatre Works presents plays by everyone from Shakespeare to Oscar Wilde to Arthur Miller and recent Tony winners. L.A. Theatre Works is a weekly 2-hour program, which is broadcast on Fridays from 9:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.

2.

The Moth Radio Hour is a weekly one-hour program featuring true stories told live on stage without scripts, notes, props, or accompaniment. Each Moth Radio Hour mixes humorous, heartbreaking, and poignant tales that captivate, surprise, and delight audiences with their honesty, bravery and humor. From PRX and Jay Allison of Atlantic Public Media, The Moth Radio Hour is broadcast on Fridays from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

3.

Live Wire artfully blends unpredictable conversation, live music, and original comedy from all types of cultural talent and creative minds, from emerging artists to established acts. Hosted by Luke Burbank, the show is taped in front of a live audience in Portland, Oregon. Live Wire is from PRX and is broadcast on Saturdays from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. The program is one-hour in length.

4.

Wait, Wait...Don't Tell Me is the weekly one-hour news quiz from NPR. During each fast-paced, irreverent show, host Peter Sagal leads what might be characterized as the news Olympics. Callers, panelists, and guests compete by answering questions about the week's events, identifying impersonations, filling in the blanks at lightning speed, sniffing out fake news items, and deciphering limericks. Listeners vie for a chance to win the most coveted prize in radio: having any of our panelists record the outgoing message on their home answering machine. The show is a co-production of NPR and Chicago Public Media and is broadcast on UPR on Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and Sundays from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m.

5.

It's Been a Minute with Sam Sanders is a weekly one-hour engaging conversation -- a timely and topical look back at the week's news, with pop culture features and interviews. The program is produced by NPR and is broadcast on UPR on Saturdays from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.

6.

Selected Shorts is a weekly one-hour program broadcast Sunday afternoons from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. and features award winning actors reading contemporary and classic short stories before a live audience in New York City.

Utah Public Radio believes there are many public concerns and interests in its service area. No single station can serve every interest that may be found in its listening audience, but it is our goal to be of as much service to the community as possible. We strive to search out issues and news of interest and concern to our community, and provide broadcast services to meet those needs.


