absence of ratios create. Furillo says it has been proven in a number of studies that patient care suffers, even to the point of increased mortality rates, when nurses are forced to care for too many patients at one time. She says many hospital C.E.O's don't have a background in medicine and are not really aware of the conditions nurses are working in. Furthermore she says putting more nurses on the job saves money, in part because patients are less likely to be readmitted when they've received better care. In addition, Furillo says in California, formally burned-out nurses returned to the field once ratios were established. The resulting benefit she says, was a more stable work-force and knowledge sharing.
