Kentucky's Horse Racing Commission meets tomorrow to start drafting rules for how to do it--trying to be ready before the NFL season opens this Fall.

But amid all that-- the Commonwealth's largest track-- Churchill Downs'--and arguably-racing's most celebrated--and criticized trainer--are at it again.

The track banning Bob Baffert from next year's Derby--extending his suspension another year and a half--through the end of next year.

Kentucky also is eighteen weeks away from deciding whether to give Democrat Andy Beshear a second term as Governor or toreplace him --with its Republican Attorney General--Daniel Cameron.

Lexington's Blue Grass Airport has come a long way from the days when its terminal was little bigger than a tract house; its airlines, little more than connectors to Cincinnati or Atlanta.

But it's been seventeen years since the last expansion. Flight capacities--passenger loads --in some cases--have doubled.

Time for a new master plan. And it means more than building out the terminal. More parking. Even moving the control tower itself.

Blue Grass Airport has a significant General Aviation presence -- but when you talk Air:UPS Worldport tends to dominate the conversation. 'Big Brown''means 25-thousand jobs in Louisville; they're among the more than 340 thousand UPS workers voting on a new five year contract by the end of the month.

But Brown's not the only player: head up to the Greater Cincinnati Airport in Northern Kentucky--rival DHL is going bigger too.

The past four years --Lexington Police have made major strides in pay. At least two significant raises--such that the average officer makes about a third more than prior to the COVID pandemic. Rookie officers--starting pay --about 40 percent higher than 2019.

And yet--the head of the Officers' Union Local --says is down more than 130 officers. This force is hardly alone. Why has law enforcement become a job category so difficult to fill?

This week saw the Commonwealth lose a former Governor -- whose legacy in its signature industry may be even deeper than even his four years in that first -floor office. Brereton Chandler Jones was --by definition --a transplant. Who began his political career in West Virginia--as a Republican.

At 25--the youngest elected to the Mountaineer States' House of Delegates. Marriage--and a move to Midway--would see him switch his affiliation to the then majority--Democratic Party--even as he built his wife Libby's heritage farm: Airdrie-into a premier breeding and racing institution.

As Governor--he would push ethics reforms for the Executive Branch--and insurance reforms--for better health care.

One night in late August, the Catholic Action Center changed the methodology for counting the virtually uncountable: Lexington's homeless population.

The numbers are just shy of tripled:

751 adults in recovery programs.412 unsheltered --be they in camps, cars or squatting in buildings.

406 sheltered 360 couch-surfers --place-to-place/

257 adults and 91 children in hotels or motels.57 in hospitals--76 in jail, or other detention centers.
