Kentucky lawmakers end their odd-year, so call short-session with a flurry rather than a shout.

After overriding all of Governor Andy Beshear's vetoes--most notably that to a bill that bans gender-change surgery, puberty blockers, hormone supplements and lessons in sexual orientation for transgender children and teenagers--House and Senate leaders made history with measures they knew the Governor would sign: legalizing medical marijuana--rather than simply decriminalizing having it, and allowing betting on sports other than horse racing.

The number of new infections deemed few enough -- the risks for its speed of spreading determined low enough -- that the Centers for Disease Control and Kentucky's Department of Public Health no longer will track them daily --or even weekly.

That also means: the vaccinations, the boosters--that have been free--won't be, once the stockpiles are exhausted.

And many of those who found health coverage through Medicaid--280-thousand in the Commonwealth alone -- no longer will qualify; income too high.
