

KFSN-TV QUARTERLY ISSUES/PROGRAMS REPORT
3rd QUARTER 2015

On its main channel, 30.1, from July 1, 2015, through and including September 30, 2015, **KFSN-TV**, Licensed in Fresno, California broadcast **38.5** hours of regularly scheduled Digital/HD Local News Programs a week focused on issues of importance relevant to the local communities served by the station. In addition, KFSN broadcasts a monthly half-hour Public Affairs program entitled “Valley Focus.” This program, hosted by Action News anchor Margot Kim, is a local talk/interview program dealing exclusively with Issues and Local Affairs. KFSN also produces a monthly half-hour program entitled “Latino Life,” hosted by Action News anchor Graciela Moreno, a talk/interview program that focuses on issues affecting the Latino community. “Latino Life” also highlights positive contributions Latinos are making in the valley. KFSN also airs a weekly public affairs program, “Maddy Reports” which focuses on the intersection of national, state, and local politics and the impact of current issues on the San Joaquin Valley. KFSN-TV also airs syndicated programming on its main channel that includes Children’s Core Programming as described in the Children’s 398 Report, which is filed separately in the Public Inspection file. Additionally, the ABC Television Network supplies the station with News and Public Interest Programming, as described in the Quarterly Report entitled: ABC Television Network News and Public Affairs Programming, which is also filed separately in the Public Inspection File.

On 30.2, KFSN-TV’s sub-channel, KFSN broadcasts the Live Well Network, which consists of programs aimed at helping viewers improve their daily lives. The network consists of numerous half-hour programs covering a variety of lifestyle topics including *Mirror, Mirror* - beauty and fashion tips; *Steven and Chris* – design, lifestyle, and healthy cooking ideas; *Mexico: One Plate at a Time* – recipe tips; *Deals* – money-saving tips; and *My Family Recipe Rocks!* – recipe ideas from homegrown cooks; and numerous other shows. KFSN-TV’s D2/Live Well Network HD signal also carries Public Service Announcements and Children’s Core Programming as described in the Children’s 398 Report.

KFSN-TV’s D3 30.3 began broadcasting the LAFF Network on April 15, 2015. This SD Signal carries vintage television comedy reruns, classic comedy movies, and Children’s Core Programming as described in the Children’s 398 Report.

The program is moderated by the Maddy Institute's Executive Director, Mark Keppler.

ACTION NEWS 6PM 7/09/2015, :45 SEC., LOCAL

Two valley police departments are growing, as eighteen people were added to the ranks of the Fresno Police Department. Police Chief Jerry Dyer swore in all of the new recruits at City Hall. The newest members of the Fresno Police Department include dispatchers, police cadets and 13 officers. Four of the 13 sworn officers have relatives already serving in law enforcement and Clovis either added or promoted 20 officers. The promotions include two recruits now promoted to full-fledged officers and four officers who have moved up in rank to Lieutenant.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/15/2015, :26 SEC., LOCAL

State officials will be at City Hall in downtown Fresno in just a few hours to hold a meeting on the drought. They are set to talk about new rebate programs for people who have bought new, water-saving appliances and toilets during the drought. There will also be information for homeowners who could get money to replace their lawns with synthetic grass or drought-tolerant landscape.

California Congressional officials are hosting a Town Hall Meeting on immigration reform in Fresno. Democratic Congressman Jim Costa will discuss how to improve the immigration system with several advocates. The meeting will be held at the old administration building at Fresno State from 10 am to 2 pm today. It's being presented by the Fresno Immigration Coalition.

AM LIVE SATURDAY, 8/22/2015, :56 SEC, LOCAL

The dirt lot in the El Dorado neighborhood near Fresno State doesn't look like much now, but it will soon be home to a safe haven for children. As part of Fresno Mayor Ashley Swearengin's push to encourage community involvement, the City, along with the non-profit "Stone Soup Fresno," is set to build this playground.

ACTION NEWS 4PM, 9/08/2015, :45 SEC., LOCAL

The City of Selma says storefront ads for alcohol, cigarettes and sugary drinks take up too much space. A new ordinance limits ad space to just 15% of plate glass windows and doors. Selma Mayor Scott Robertson says the intent is two-fold. Selma is the first city in Fresno County to adopt a 15% sign ordinance. Health educator Leila Gholamrezaei-eha says there is a correlation between the size of these ads and product sales.

Governor Jerry Brown's drought task force is on the move after meeting with Fresno County water leaders. A closed door meeting in Mendota took place last night, where local officials voiced their concerns over the lack of water. The mayor of Mendota says he brought up issues like surface water allocations and ground water pumping. All the problems were listed on a letter that was handed over to the task force and addressed to the governor.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 9/24/2015, :30 SEC. , LOCAL

The long talked-about deal to revive Granite Park won approval today. The Fresno City Council approved leasing the City-owned property to the Central Valley Sports Foundation. The nonprofit group is pledging to spend nearly three million dollars to restore the ball parks and build soccer fields and volleyball courts. The deal will cost the City about \$150,000 a year, but Mayor Ashley Swearengin assured the City Council it's a good deal.

The Mayor of Madera made a big political announcement. Rob Poythress spoke to a crowd of supporters at the Freedom Industrial Park, which is currently under construction. Poythress says he has enjoyed his four years as Mayor and six years as a City Councilmember. But he believes he can make a broader impact as a county supervisor. He listed water, jobs, and public safety as three top priorities. Poythress is seeking the seat currently held by Supervisor Rick Facinelli, who is running for re-election.

HEALTH ISSUES AFFECTING THE CENTRAL VALLEY

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 7/27/2015, :30 SEC., LOCAL

Air quality could be a concern over the next few days as temperatures heat up and the fires continue to burn. The Valley Air District says so far the pollution hasn't been at an extremely dangerous level, but there are some advisories for people today. Remember, you can get the very latest on the fires burning across the state and the conditions firefighters are facing anytime using our news and weather apps. Just search abc30 in your device's app store.

ACTION NEWS 6PM 7/28/2015, 1:00 MIN., LOCAL

In the foothills of Fresno County, the view is little hazy as smoke drifts across the valley away from the Willow Fire. Jamie Holt is with the Valley Air District and says the air quality is starting to take a hit. It will get worse as the fire continues to burn and people will be feeling it. Linda Kyle lives in Harlan Ranch which is near the hazy foothills in the neighborhood, though he sky looks pretty clear. Doctor A.M. Aminian is with the Allergy Institute and he says there is soot and ash in the air. It sticks to our clothes and our hair, and we are breathing it in. The best way to protect our lungs is a shower at the end of the day. Doctor Aminian says people who have trouble breathing or serious health problems, should stay inside if possible, especially between noon and 6 pm, which is the hottest part of the day and the worst time to be outside.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/14/2015, :17 SEC.,LOCAL

The smoke from the Rough Fire is impacting the air quality. This video was shot in the morning and was visible from Shepherd and Highway 168 in Clovis. The Valley Air District says smoke impacts are concentrated in foothill communities right now, but have the potential to reach the valley floor.

ACTION NEWS 4PM, 8/18/2015 :36 SEC., LOCAL

Take a look at the air at noon today in downtown Fresno. The Valley Air District is calling it "unhealthy for sensitive groups." It warns that smoke from fires produces fine particulate matter, which can cause health problems including lung disease, asthma attacks and increased risk of heart attacks and stroke. The Rough Fire has burned more than 23,000 acres. The Cabin Fire has burned more than 6,800 acres.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 8/24/2015, :22 SEC., LOCAL

Fresno has made it to the top of a very bad list. The Fresno-Madera area has been named the most polluted metro area in the United States. That's according to a new report by the American Lung Association. Officials say the conditions have worsened the last few months because of the drought, high heat and all the recent wildfires. The first seven cities on the new list are all here in California.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 8/24/2015, :33 SEC., LOCAL

About 100 residents of Hume Lake Christian camps are being allowed to return to their homes today as the Rough Fire continues to burn nearby. The blaze has grown to more than 51,000 acres. Containment is still just at 17 percent. Camp staff says they do have some smoke damage to their buildings, so they're in the process of buying air purifiers and masks for those returning. The cost of fighting this fire has topped 24 million dollars. But today Fresno County supervisors passed a Rough Fire emergency declaration to help with some of those costs.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 9/08/2015, 2:29 MIN., LOCAL

The Rough Fire, burning for several weeks up in the foothills, is now sending smoke down to the valley floor. The unsafe air prompted the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District to extend a health caution through this week. And it could get worse. With triple digit temperatures expected tomorrow and throughout the week the combination might make for an unhealthy few weeks. Air officials say this morning levels looked good for the City of Clovis. Despite the smoky smell and hazy skies, students were outside playing but by 11am, the readings spiked to unhealthy levels, prompting administrators to mandate all recess and outdoor activities be brought indoors. Spokesperson Kelly Avants says coaches will make a determination in the afternoon if practice should still go on. Fresno Unified officials also brought their children inside because of the bad air. Kaiser Permanente Physician-In-Chief Smite Rouillard says exerting yourself outside during unhealthy air conditions can be damaging to your health.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 9/10/2015, 40 SEC., LOCAL

The Rough Fire is now having a direct impact on schools, forcing the closure of Dunlap school and the Dunlap Leadership Academy. After consulting with fire officials tonight, the Kings Canyon Unified School District made the decision to transport students daily from the mountain areas to schools in Reedley and Orange Cove. Dunlap students stayed in the classroom today instead of being outside where smoke from the wildfire is covering the mountain communities. Educators told students not to over-exert themselves because of bad air quality. Teachers are trying to keep young minds busy, while many of their families are on evacuation warnings. Just yesterday, a new fire sparked-up in Squaw Valley and hit too close to home.

SAFETY CONCERNS IN THE CENTRAL VALLEY

AM LIVE SUNDAY, 7/19/2015, :50 SEC., LOCAL

Lightning rippled across the sky as a heavy storm moved through the Fresno area. Fires sparked by lightning were the first to impact first responders. In Auberry, more than 100 firefighters battled a 75-acre wildfire. Cal Fire says they had a hard time containing the blaze because of storm. Cal Fire says lightning strikes could start fires instantaneously. An apartment fire in Parlier was likely started by a strike. Flames sparked on the roof while six people were inside. No one was hurt, but the family is now displaced. In Laton, ABC30insider Austin W. Minter says lightning also caused this fire that burned what appears to be brush at Laton-Kingston Park. Fresno Fire says they responded to multiple power pole fires. At one point, PGE reported 72,000 people without power.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 7/25/2015, 1:00 MIN., LOCAL

A large wildfire is forcing evacuations near Bass Lake right now. It started this afternoon near Willow Canyon Drive and Road 274 and has now grown to 150 acres. Fire officials aren't sure how this started, but immediately got at least 200 crews out here. Now we're told that there's at least 1,000 more firefighters from across the state are on their way. Just on the other side of this ridge, the helicopters are filling up at Bass Lake next to the dam. The proximity to the lake is one good part of this fire that's really helping their efforts. At this point fire crews say there is not a threat to homes near Bass Lake. The American Red Cross of the Central Valley is opening an evacuation center for those affected by the Willow Fire. It's located at the Oakhurst Community Center on Road 425B. Volunteers will be there to provide shelter, snacks, water, and information. The small animal evacuation shelter is also there, while large animals can go to the Coarsegold Rodeo Grounds.

ACTION NEWS 4PM, 8/17/2015, :30 SEC., LOCAL

One of the big fires close to home is the Rough Fire burning north of Hume Lake. The Forest Service says Wishon Reservoir, a popular recreation area, is being evacuated this afternoon. The lightning-sparked fire has burned more than 20,000 acres since it broke out on July 31. It's burning areas of the Sierra and Sequoia National Forests and Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks. Firefighters say they are working to stop the fire from jumping Highway 180. That road is closed for anyone trying to travel into the area.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/19/2015, :26 SEC., LOCAL

We're tracking developing news from the Fresno County mountains. Mandatory evacuations are now underway at Hume Lake because of a nearby Rough Fire along Highway 180. So far, at least 23,000 acres have burned, with the fire at zero containment. More than 300 people at Hume Lake Christian Camp are affected by the new evacuation orders. Some of the camp's staff members are sticking around to help fire crews until it gets too dangerous to stay.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/20/2015, :27 SEC., LOCAL

A group of hikers trapped by the Rough Fire near Hume Lake will be escorted out by fire crews later this morning. The group didn't get the evacuation notices and got trapped on a mountain yesterday behind the fire lines. They are now safe with officials. The blaze is 3 miles away from Hume Lake, forcing crews to move their command center yesterday to Dunlap. Visitors are being turned away this morning on Highway 180 near Grant Grove.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 8/20/2015, 1:00 MIN., LOCAL

Leaders of one of the largest Christian camps in the country say the rough fire is right at their front doorstep. John Yakligian is a current board member for the camp, and was on staff for the first year of the camp in 1946. Two years later, he began building this cabin on the campgrounds with his own hands, and little help. Now, it's a fully-equipped house, and is one of more than 200 homes as part of a camp subdivision. Now in close proximity to the Rough Fire, which has been burning for a month, Hume Lake Christian Camp leaders have been monitoring the fire since it began. They're getting constant updates from the remaining staff still on site. Some are feeding firefighters, while others are gearing up for an electrical outage. Executive director Dathan Brown was evacuated Wednesday. But he was still posting video updates Thursday from Fresno while receiving a tremendous outpouring of support from Christian churches, schools, and organizations around the world. They're all praying for Hume. But know the camp will carry on, even if it goes up in flames.

AM LIVE SATURDAY 6AM, 8/22/2015, :30 SEC., LOCAL

The massive wildfire burning east of Fresno has destroyed its first structure -- the Kings Canyon Lodge. The lodge has hosted tourists from all over the world for the past 35 years. The Grant Grove and Wilsonia areas at the Kings Canyon National Park are closed to visitors this morning because of the fire. So far nearly 42,000 acres have burned, and the fire is only 3 percent contained right now; but Hume Lake Christian camp is safe for the time being.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/22/2015, 30 SEC., LOCAL

Action News Reporter Veronica Miracle has more on what's next for firefighters. The wildfire is now 70 percent contained after burning for almost two months and scorching more than 142,000 acres. We've learned another firefighter was burned on Sunday while battling the flames. Officials say he's going to be okay, but he was taken to the hospital like the seven others who've been injured fighting this fire.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 7/17/2015, 2:00 MIN., LOCAL

It's estimated one in every 68 kids now fall somewhere within the autism spectrum. A new, early intervention center will serve kids between 18 months and five years. Kids must be referred for the center's services through a pediatrician or through the Central Valley Regional Center. Play-time mixes in naturally with learning time at the autism center on the Fresno state campus. Kids learn letters in a setting that also encourages group interaction. It is a difficult but rewarding job. A partnership with Valley Children's Hospital has resulted in a new Fresno State Autism Center satellite location. The ribbon cutting brought together more than just mascots George and timeout. Two rooms at the therapy center will be used to serve 16 kids on the autism spectrum. Fresno State students will also get hands-on experience here. 35 kids are served on the Fresno State campus. This new facility has recent grads like Camille Williams, excited for the future.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 7/28/2015, 1:00 MIN., LOCAL

A group of North Valley students have wanted to hear. A Catholic school in Gustine will now stay open for the upcoming school year. Action News reported last week Our Lady Of Miracles was closing down because of struggles with enrollment and leadership. The diocese of Fresno announced today the hiring of Chandra Brace as the school's new principal. Brace is a member of the school's parish and is a parent of four children attending the school. She also has a California administrative credential and experience in leading an elementary school.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/29/2015, :22 SEC., LOCAL

All students in Madera Unified will be offered breakfast and lunch at no cost this school year, regardless of income level. The district is taking advantage of a national program allowing schools with a high number of low income students to expand their access to free meals. The program reduces the paperwork involved in serving school meals and streamlines food service.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/05/2015, :28 SEC., LOCAL

Nearly a year after construction began, the Tulare County Office Of Education is almost ready to give students a new way to explore space and science. The county's new planetarium and science center is located on Mooney Boulevard in Visalia. A mural of the solar system is painted on the front of the building. Inside there is a 70-seat planetarium with an automated digital projector. The new science center features a studio and theater where presentations will give students an interactive learning experience.

AM LIVE SATURDAY 8AM, 8/15/2015, 1:35 MIN., LOCAL

Teachers at Slater Elementary School spent the day making last-minute preparations for the 2015-16 school year. Teachers' websites are up and running and the desks are organized and ready. This year, some students in Fresno will be sitting in those desks a little longer. After taking a look at how ten schools fared with a longer school day, Fresno Unified officials decided that twenty more elementary schools will have 30 minutes extra of instructional time. Students will instead be dismissed at 2:35pm with Kindergarteners at 1:35pm. Slater Elementary School Principal Kelli Wilkins says they found the additional school time benefitted teachers' instruction. Wilkins says they even had numbers to match the success of a longer day. Parents like Nichols Vargas are thrilled. Her daughter is set to start kindergarten on Monday and she hopes the extra time will help her get more of the school day. Next year, Fresno Unified will implement longer school days at 10 more elementary schools.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/02/2015, 59 SEC., LOCAL

The City of Parlier was the first stop for Fresno State's Nursing Community Health Mobile. Staff and students with the university say small communities like this one have a big need for health services. Any-

one can drop by for free health services that include screenings for blood pressure, diabetes, or cholesterol. An assistant professor with the program believes the need is very high in rural areas of the Central Valley. Nursing students were out in the community handing out flyers informing anyone nearby about the free health services. They noticed right away this is a unique opportunity for them to learn the basics outside the classroom. The professors in charge of the program requested grants that are paying for an on-site physician, driver and various medical supplies. The mobile unit itself is on loan from the Fresno County Office of Education. Inside are two private screening rooms and a private patient restroom. The next stop for the mobile health unit is in Sanger on October 6.

ACTION NEWS 4PM 9/11/2015, :44 SEC. , LOCAL

Not a single child's laugh was heard on the campus of Dunlap Elementary School today. The normally busy school is vacant after being forced to evacuate because of smoke and threat from the Rough Fire. The campus could stay this way for some time as firefighters work tirelessly to contain the fire, which has grown to more than 119,000 acres. The thick smoke surrounds the school. Ash is even seen on the water fountains. Principal Merrithew says this morning they were able to safely bus most of their students away from the danger to Jefferson Elementary in Reedley and L.A. Conner Elementary School in Orange Cove. At Jefferson, Dunlap teachers created as much normalcy as possible for the students to continue their lessons plans with those who did show up in seven classrooms that were being used by Jefferson for parent education classes. Some of the children are being temporarily taught at home or a different school where family members attend. While they get used to their new classroom, school officials say some of the kids are excited and think of it is a fun field trip. While the air is better down in Reedley than it is in Dunlap, administrators have still decided to eliminate outdoor playtime while the air quality is still bad.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 9/14/2015, 1:32 SEC., LOCAL

This Friday, Clovis Unified is expected to release two maps showing two proposals for boundary changes. It's been ten years since the district modified school boundaries. Officials say this time with growing numbers and several schools at capacity, it's time for the adjustments. They are also building a brand new school on the southeast part of the district. After the maps are released, the district will hold several community meetings to get parents' feedback. One area that is seeing an impact includes some of Clovis North High School's feeder schools. Some other parents we talked to are upset that their home school could change, saying they moved into a neighborhood specifically to attend that school. A final decision on the new boundaries will be voted on November 18 and go into effect the next school year.

DROUGHT IMPACT ON THE VALLEY

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 7/20/2015, :22 SEC., LOCAL

Local, state, and federal officials came together in Fresno today to announce further drought assistance for the Central Valley. Their focus is bringing people back to work, mainly farmworkers who have unsteady hours or lost their jobs. Congressman Jim Costa says these millions of dollars are going to help triage some of the many problems that have come with a fourth consecutive drought year, mainly sky high unemployment in the valley. The funding comes from the federal government, two months after Congressman Costa's meeting with the U.S. Secretary Of Labor, who decided more help was needed to get more people back to work. And from the state's perspective, the millions are much-needed for the Central Valley to help fix what they say is chronic unemployment here.

ACTION NEWS 11PM 7/22/2015, :47 SEC., LOCAL

For years this part of the plumbing aisle has been fairly deserted until now. Manager Kevin Seubert at Fresno Ag Hardware says people are coming in droves to buy locks for their water spigots. City Councilmember Clint Olivier says his office hasn't heard of water theft complaints. But just last month the

City issued more than 1,700 citations for overwatering. In Clovis, nearly five-thousand customers were hit with fines. Back at the hardware store, the demand for this piece of metal is so high, they've turned to other manufacturers to fill their order, a sure sign of a hard hitting drought.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 7/29/2015, :30 SEC., LOCAL

A new Drought Relief Bill was introduced on Capitol Hill today by Senator Dianne Feinstein. The Democrat from San Francisco says it's impossible to make more water available to thirsty California without spending money. Her new bill emphasizes long term investments in desalination recycling and storage and the cost is 1.3 billion dollars over ten years. The House has already passed a drought relief bill sponsored by Hanford republican David Valadao. Valley congressmen say they're ready to work on a compromise agreement.

ACTION NEWS 4PM 7/31/2015, 26 SEC., LOCAL

Governor Jerry Brown declared a state of emergency in California today due to several wildfires burning across the state, including the Willow Fire in Madera County mixed with the extreme drought conditions. The move will help bring additional firefighters and resources from out of state to battle the fires. Governor Brown says the drought and extreme weather has turned much of the state into a tinderbox with fires burning in 15 California counties.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 8/03/2015, :32 SEC., LOCAL

In the North Valley, residents can now apply for temporary help if their wells run dry. Merced County supervisors recently approved an emergency water distribution program, which takes effect this month. It will allow families to receive deliveries of up to 50 gallons of non-potable water a day per person for health and sanitation purposes. They would also get one gallon of bottled water each day per person for drinking and cooking. The non-potable water would be delivered and pumped into a temporary water tank located on the resident's property.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 8/11/2015, :25 SEC., LOCAL

Tulare County Supervisors approved an agreement today to construct new domestic water well to flow to Porterville residents. Nearly 800 wells in that City have gone dry this year. 1,500 wells in Tulare County have dried up, and residents have had to rely on bottled water deliveries and portable tanks. The new well will be drilled at Olive Avenue and the Tule River at a cost of \$809,000. Construction is expected to begin by the end of the month.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/07/2015, :29 SEC., LOCAL

Firefighters in the Madera County mountains are monitoring for flare-ups at the site of the Willow Fire near Bass Lake. Yesterday an area under an acre reignited, forcing a helicopter to make water drops. Officials say dry conditions from the drought are making it tough to put out every hot spot. The Willow Fire burned nearly 6,000 acres and was contained last month. Investigators say a thirteen-year-old boy sparked the blaze and is now facing felony charges.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 9/17/2015, :47 SEC., LOCAL

Researchers believe the groundwater aquifers in the Central Valley could be dangerously close to permanent collapse. And now scientists are trying to show that they can be replenished. Early research out of UC Davis shows flooding certain fields while crops are dormant during the winter allows the water to slowly make its way back into parched aquifers. Some of the early testing has involved vineyards in Fresno County as well as alfalfa fields in Hanford. Researchers saw very few negative effects when they applied up to 14 feet of water on alfalfa in the winter with only a small decrease in the yield during

summer. Scientists continue to test various types of crops to see how they would hold up in flooding conditions in hopes that farmers can tap into the underground resource when they need it.
