A REPORT FROM WYOMING D-C-I SHOWS REPORTED CRIMES WERE UP TEN PERCENT FOR THE FIRST QUARTER OF 2016 COMPARED TO LAST YEAR. HOWEVER PERCENTAGES IN WYOMING ARE DIFFICULT TO ASSES IN WYOMING BECAUSE SOME NUMBERS ARE SO SMALL, PERCENTAGES CAN SKEW THE FACTS.

IN NATRONA COUNTY REPORTED CRIME WAS UP A TOTAL OF EIGHT PERCENT. BY INDIVIDUAL DEPARTMENT, THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE HAD A 40 PERCENT DECREASE BUT EVANSVILLE AND CASPER DEPARTMENTS BOTH HAD INCREASES. NATRONA COUNTY SHERIFF'S SERGEANT AARON SHATTO SAYS IT'S VERY DIFFICULT TO PINPOINT WHY CRIME GOES UP.

SGT. SHATTO "There are many factors that may contribute to the increase in our crime rate. It could be as simple as climate change and also as big as the economy at this time."

FREMONT COUNTY WAS DOWN 30 PERCENT. ALL THE DEPARTMENTS IN THE COUNTY HAD A DECREASE IN REPORTED CRIME.

TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE EXCITED UW'S NEW PRESIDENT IS TAKING TIME TO PERSONALLY ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF DIVERSITY.

Sergio Maldonado Northern Arapahoe Tribal Liaison: "It's important that she's been out here, she's heard what we've got to say, but secondly she's willing to come out again and work with us."

Fernando Roman Tribal Educator: "Laurie Nichols presence here on the wind river Indian reservation is real critical to develop those bridges and those structures for the University of Wyoming to be present here on the reservation as well as the reservation to be present down at the University of Wyoming in Laramie."

ONE TOPIC TRIBAL MEMBERS WANT TO SEE ADDRESSED IS HOW MANY TEACHERS AND FACULTY THEMSELVES ARE NATIVE AMERICAN.

"The University of Wyoming can show a greater presence here on the wind river Indian reservation, as well as we need more role models from the reservation s teachers and administrators so the students can see that they can be successful."

Dr. Laurie Nichols University of Wyoming President: "Faculty and staff that are themselves native Americans is huge for students from, that are coming from the reservation because they need to see those role models and they need to meet people that they feel like A like them and B understand them."

PRESIDENT NICHOLS HAS EXPERIENCE WORKING WITH TRIBES IN SOUTH DAKOTA WHERE SHE HELPED IMPLEMENT A TWO PLUS TWO PLUS TWO PLAN AIMED AT GETTING HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS READY FOR COLLEGE.

"It started in two years in high school so we worked especially hard with students that were juniors and seniors, creating awareness, getting them ready to go to school, we did a lot of college prep kinds of work with them and we brought them to campus and did a lot of campus exposure."

"Crook and Weston County are primary disaster areas"

Gregor Goertz: "That helps producers where they had drought and their grasses failed or reduced production and having to move their livestock somewhere else, or else buy additional feed to keep their livestock on the place and these are payments to help them do that"

FOR TWO YEARS FREMONT COUNTY MUSEUM CURATORS HAVE BEEN HOLDING EVENTS TO TRY AND GIVE KIDS EDUCATIONAL AND FUN THINGS TO DO. NEWS 13'S LANDON HARRAR SHOWS US HOW THEY WANT TO SEE THE PROGRAMS GROW, AND WHAT STRUGGLES THEY'VE BEEN HAVING.

THE KIDS ADVENTURE TREK SERIES ARE HANDS-ON EVENTS GEARED TOWARDS CHILDREN.

Randy Wise Lander Museum Curator: "The adventure trek series are a really cool event the museums are sponsoring and it's aimed at kids. It's a neat way to get them involved in our local history, gives them something fun to do but also a way to let them learn about some of the history that is around them."

Felicity Boeple Riverton Visitor Services Coordinator: "What we're trying to accomplish is not only bring young people back into the museum, but kind of revitalize the life of the museum, museums are no longer just old thing sitting on a shelf, they are living and breathing organism that invests something into the community."

THE RIVERTON AND DUBOIS MUSEUMS HAVE HAD A HARD TIME ATTRACTING PARTICIPANTS.

Karline Stetler Riverton Museum Curator: "Our first year was a little rough I think a lot of people don't hear about us or we need to advertise a little bit differently."

"We didn't have any kids last time unfortunately which is kind of a bummer, but we have had in the past up to 40 kids come to a program

"The kids got to learn where wool came from and how it's processed into yarn that we can make into clothing, blankets as well as crafts."

"The museums are all doing a lot of outreach to the community, we have programs for adults, we have programs for kids, all of that's designed to get people engaged with the museums, learning about their history and involved with the community. I think its valuable, even if only a handful of people show up its worth doing."

YELLOWSTONE VISITATION NUMBERS ARE UP AGAIN, EVEN HIGHER THAN LAST YEAR'S RECORD NUMBERS. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS MORE AND MORE BIG BUSES ARE TOURING THE PARK, BRINGING CHALLENGES WITH THEM.

If you go to Yellowstone, don't be surprised if you find yourself behind a big bus. There are more of them in the Park now than ever. Bus numbers are growing by double digits every month.

"The big story that we're watching and puzzled by a little bit is the increase in buses. Last month it was a 48% increase. This month it was a 25% increase."

Park spokeswoman Charissa Reid was referring to May and June, respectively.

A park press release says overall visitation was up every month except March, in 2016.

"Yellowstone's visitation topped four million for the first time ever last summer. This year's numbers are on pace to beat last year's visitation by a long shot."

Could Yellowstone see as many as 5 million recreational visits in 2016?

"I don't think our increases have been that big."

But, they're big enough. Popular attractions like Canyon Falls, Mammoth, and Old Faithful are drawing crushing crowds, particularly when buses bring in a lot of visitors at one time. Does increased bus traffic decrease the visitor experience?

"It's kind of a double edged sword because in some ways they're having perhaps less environmental impact, by driving all in one vehicle than they would by driving in single cars."

Early this summer, Park Superintendent Dan Wenke talked about possibly bringing more buses into Yellowstone, to reduce the number of cars on the roads.

"One of the things we may have to look at is mass transportation in the Park. I'm not suggesting that's exclusively mass transportation."

Reid says a social scientist will be doing surveys in August, to find out how buses and the bigger crowds is affecting the visitor experience. Reid says the park will have to do something if the visitation increases continue.

We asked if Yellowstone might limit the number of visitors someday. She says no decisions have been made, but...

"Dan Wenk, our superintendent says all options are on the table."

Emma: "You wash them clip them whatever you need to do to get them ready"

IT'S THE KIDS THEMSELVES WHO ARE THE CARETAKERS

Rebekah: "If they are bloated you just walk them around and then they should get smaller and smaller"

Kiley: "We go out there and walk them, make sure their muscles and things don't get stuck"

BUT

Wyatt: "If they are weirdly, if they're not walking around not drinking or eating hay or the grain"

THE KIDS FIND THEIR DESIGNATED SUPERINTENDENT

Devonie: "When they come to fair week it's a change for them they don't like to eat they don't like to drink it's a new environment so you kind of have to watch that"

Johanna Thompson Dubois Museum Visitors Coordinator: "The idea was to basically give kids the basic understanding of direction and navigation skills."

**PARTICIPANTS GET A COMPASS AND A MAP AROUND THE PARK THEY HAD TO NAVIGATE.**

"From the kids that we've seen I don't know as though they're getting taught that elsewhere and so we just thought that we would make an effort to try and teach them that so hopefully if they are lost they can try and figure out where they need to go for help."

Maren Baker Navigation Program Participant: "Everything that I learn today will make it so I don't get lost because one time I was out with my dad and I got lost. So now I know I won't get lost at least and I'll be able to call for help with the whistle that I got."

NEWS 13'S JACKIE WETZLER SPOKE WITH MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS, TO UNDERSTAND WHY THERE ARE SO MANY "TITLE 25 PATIENTS" IN OUR COMMUNITY AND WHAT THEY THINK SHOULD BE DONE ABOUT THE PROBLEM.

**POLICE ARE USUALLY THE ONES CALLED TO A SCENE WHEN A PERSON HAS BEEN LABELED A "TITLE 25 PATIENT"**

Brandon: "A lot of times law enforcement will try to take folks to the ER or to our facility or WBI or other resources in the community voluntarily"

**Tourists come from around the world to Yellowstone, many hoping for a glimpse of a grizzly. But grizzlies are the subject of roadside controversy in Cody. A drive down any of the major thoroughfares will reveal the arguments for and against taking the grizzly off the endangered species list, and handing over management to Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho.**

**The three states are including hunting in their grizzly management plans. This pro- delisting billboard is on the Powell highway. It was paid for by one man: Scott Weber.**

**Scott Weber: "And I went to all the grizzly hearings, and I knew that May 30th was the last time that there could be public input."**

**Weber says he wanted to help generate public comments.**

**"I'm gonna time that billboard so it comes out in like April. And then the biggest uproar will be May, June."**

**Two anti-delisting billboards were put up more recently. We found the authors of this sign, GOAL, or Guardians of our Ancestors Legacy. The Native American Coalition stands against trophy hunting of Grizzlies.**

**David Bearshield: "This coalition's efforts in putting up this billboard up here in Wyoming is to bring light and education and most of all an awareness on the effect of trophy hunting.**

**David Bearshield says the government is required by treaty to listen to the tribes concerns.**

**"And there's no exception for the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the state of Wyoming, or any other state to bypass these particular processes."**

**"Most of the Yellowstone area bears live in Northwest Wyoming, and when hunting is allowed, this is where the greatest number of bears will be taken. But the head of the Yellowstone Bear Hunters' Association says it's too early to talk about hunting grizzlies, even if they are delisted."**

**Joe: "Each state has to have a management plan prior to delist. And that management plan has to coincide with that management strategy that will not allow for the eradication of grizzly bears. And that's what we support."**

“On July 17th at approximately I think 2:30Pm the fire was called in and it is lightning caused from a storm that came through the area.”

“There is actual fire in granite creek proper itself, its slowly backing into granite creek. It’s approximately maybe a mile away from the closest structure but it’s still the threat is very near to those structures.”

DEMASTERS DID SAY BECAUSE THEY HAVE CONTAINED THE FIRE NEAR BONDURANT THEY HOPE TO ANNOUNCE 10 PERCENT CONTAINMENT SOON, INSTEAD OF THE ZERO PERCENT IT WAS LAST NIGHT.

PINEDALE’S MAYOR SAYS THE TOWN IS SUPPOSED TO HAVE A BIG EVENT WITH OVER SEVENTY VENDORS COMING THIS WEEKEND. WITH MOST OF THE HIGHWAY TO JACKSON STILL CLOSED, HE’S NOT SURE EXACTLY HOW MANY VENDORS WILL ACTUALLY MAKE IT. THE HIGHWAY MAY BE OPEN TOMORROW.

WYOMING DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION OFFICIALS WILL ANNOUNCE THAT DECISION LATER TONIGHT OR IN THE MORNING. PINEDALE’S MAYOR DID SAY THE SCHEDULED EVENT WILL STILL CONTINUE AS ALL ROADS SOUTH TO PINEDALE REMAIN OPEN.

PINEDALE’S AIRPORT IS GETTING MORE USE THAN NORMAL BECAUSE OF THE CLIFF CREEK FIRE. NEWS 13’S LONDON HARRAR SHOWS US WHAT SOME ORIGINAL CONCERNS WERE ABOUT EXTRA AIRCRAFT AT THE TERMINAL, AND HOW THOSE AIRCRAFT ARE USED TO FIGHT THE FLAMES.

PINEDALE DOES NOT HAVE A COMMERCIAL AIRPORT, SO AIRPORT PERSONNEL WEREN’T IMMEDIATELY READY TO SUPPORT FIREFIGHTING AIRCRAFT.

BOB JONES: “Our biggest concern right now is getting the proper amount of fuel because they’re sucking down a lot of jet A and so we normally don’t stock that much and so getting fuel is our biggest challenge but we’re on top of that and we’re going to be able to support them fine.”

JIM PARKER: “Presents a challenge because of the amount of space they take and the amount of space needed for the other aircraft for the ranch owners that own those airplanes that come in here typically in the summer.”

THE CLIFF CREEK FIRE IS HIGH PRIORITY FOR AIRCRAFT.

DOUG: “Assigned to this fire right now we have two water scoopers and we have currently eight helicopters, they’re not all in the air at the same time.”

“With so many aircraft dropping water and retardant on the fires it’s important that ground crews remain in constant communication with what’s called an air attack plane. Now that air attack plane has up to five different radios in it so everybody can know where the next drop is coming and where they need to stand to stay safe.”



“The scoopers are bringing in just over 1600 gallons at eight pounds per gallon that’s a lot of weight coming down so we have to make sure that anybody on the ground is clear of the drop zone and that we’re not going to smush anybody into the ground.”

AIR SUPPORT IS HELPFUL, BUT GROUND CREWS ARE STILL THE MOST IMPORTANT.

“Without forces on the ground the resources in the air are just buying time, if you don’t have folks on the ground to follow up with the water drops or retardant drops. Really it doesn’t put the fire out it just slows it down and gives people a chance to get there.”

**YELLOWSTONE FIRE MANAGERS ARE GETTING READY FOR THE WORST PART OF THE SEASON. HOT WEATHER AND DRYING WINDS ARE CREATING DANGEROUS CONDITIONS. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS TECHNICIANS ARE TESTING THE AIR, THE SKIES, AND THE WOOD TO BE READY.**

**Yellowstone wildfires often start in the height of the tourist season: July and August. And, they are often sparked by lightning... as was the 2003 Cub Creek fire, inside the Park’s East Entrance.**

**Penny Preston: “This is where lightning started the blaze one late August night. I was driving back from Jackson, and I stopped to see trees exploding in front of me.**

**A change in wind direction pushed the blaze toward Fishing Bridge 17 miles of forest along the roadway were blackened.**

**Todd Opperman: “Normally, this would be kind of the fire season in Yellowstone National Park, typically for larger fire growth.”**

**Yellowstone’s Deputy Fire Management Officer, Todd Opperman, says by this time of year, the Park usually moves its fire danger index to high...because the millions of acres of trees and grass are drying out..**

**“Larger fuels are very dry now.”**

**How does Opperman know? He has a team of fire managers monitoring conditions across the Park. One is Jessica Hadley, at Yellowstone’s East Entrance. She starts by recording electronic weather readings...and testing the wind for speed and direction.**

**“So our highest is currently about 9.5.”**

**But, then, she actually weighs the wood.**



**Jessica Hadley:** “I’d say that’s probably seven. It was eight yesterday. Is that dry? Yes. After it rains, they’re higher up, more like 25.”

**“We’re doing fuel samplings, as far as fuel moisture at nine sites around the park. Typically they’re done every week, to two weeks.”**

**Opperman says the fuel and weather reports help fire managers set the fire danger level. On this day: High, no restrictions yet, but visitors are encouraged to be careful with campfires and smoking. Opperman says restrictions may be just around the corner.**

**“If the weather stays like this, in the upper eighties, close to nineties, clear weather, we’ll be pushing into very high fire danger at that point.”**

BIG HORN COUNTY SHERIFFS AND BASIN FIREFIGHTERS ARE ASSISTING WITH A FIRE IN THE BIG HORN MOUNTAINS AREA. THE FIRE HAS COVERED AROUND 3000 ACRES AND IS AT ZERO PERCENT CONTAINMENT. MULTIPLE STRUCTURES ARE THREATENED. POLICE HAVE CREATED A NEED FOR MANDATORY EVACUATION FROM WEST TEN SLEEP LAKE, DEER HAVEN, AND CAMPS AND CABINS IN THE SURROUNDING AREAS. PEOPLE ARE EVACUATING TO BUFFALO.

U.S. HIGHWAY 16 IS CLOSED NEAR TEN SLEEP AND BUFFALO. AT THIS TIME, NO INJURIES HAVE BEEN REPORTED. THE UNITED STATES FOREST SERVICE ALSO ISSUED A FIRE WARNING IN FREEMONT COUNTY FOR THE LAVA MOUNTAIN FIRE.

THE FOLLOWING SUBDIVISIONS ARE BEING ELEVATED TO THE SET PRE-EVACUATION STAGE: HAT BUTTE, UNION PASS, WARM SPRINGS, AND PORQUINE

## **REGINA**

A LARGE FIRE NEAR TEN SLEEP WYOMING IS CAUSED BY OVERHEATED BRAKES. FIRE INVESTIGATORS SAY DRY ROADSIDE GRASSES IGNITED IN THE TEN SLEEP CANYON AFTER SOMEONE WITH OVERHEATED BRAKES PULLED OVER TO LET THEM COOL. PENNY PRESTON FOUND THE SPOT WHERE THE FIRE BEGAN, AND BRINGS US THIS REPORT ON THE 27 HUNDRED ACRE BLAZE.

**The Hatchery fire started around noon Friday, along U-S Highway 16 between Ten Sleep and Buffalo. It was in a steep canyon near the Ten Sleep Hatchery. Sandy Slater manages a Christian Retreat Camp just down the road.**

**Sandy:** “There was a couple of cars that drove in really fast. They were yelling and asking us to call the fire department.”



Slater says soon after she called 911, she saw huge plumes of smoke, and,

**“Helicopters started flying overhead, right over the ranch. And they were going down and dipping, I guess trying to get water from the Ten Sleep Creek.”**

Slater says the heavy smoke continued throughout the weekend, while firefighters protected her guest ranch. By Monday morning, the smoke was gone here, but the non-profit camp lost thousands of dollars of income.

**“We have a large camp that was to arrive this week. And they had to cancel. It was a huge loss.”**

Brett: **“It’s impacted a good amount of acreage. This fire has 301 people on the fire working.”**

Incident Command spokesman Brett Haberstick says 70 of those people are at the incident command post in Ten Sleep. Friday Highway 16 was blocked off to traffic between Ten Sleep and Buffalo, and tourists going to and from Yellowstone to the West could not make it through. But, Sunday night, the highway was reopened.

Penny: **“Traffic is moving through Ten Sleep again, but in the area where the fire started investigators are encouraging motorists to move on.”**

We found Worland’s District Fire Chief, with county and federal officers combing the spot where the fire started. Haberstick says investigators determined an unknown car, RV, or truck pulled over to let their overheated brakes cool, and the hot brakes caught the dry grass on fire. From near Ten Sleep, Penny Preston, News 13.

ONTO ANOTHER FIRE BURNING IN WYOMING, THE CLIFF CREEK FIRE NOW COVERS MORE THAN 14-THOUSAND ACRES WITH OVER 600 FIREFIGHTERS ON SCENE. A GROUP OF TEENAGERS FROM UTAH ARE WORKING WITH THE FIREFIGHTERS TO KEEP THE INCIDENT COMMAND CAMP CLEAN.

THE TEENAGERS RE-STOCK WATER COOLERS WITH DRINKS AND ICE. THEY ALSO COLLECT AND DISCARD TRASH SO FIREFIGHTERS HAVE A CLEAN CAMP TO COME HOME TOO. THE TEENAGERS ALSO WAKE UP AT 5:30 IN THE MORNING TO PREPARE THE FIREFIGHTERS FOR THE DAY AHEAD.

Abigail: “waking up early in the morning is when we hand out water to the fire fighters and we hand out their lunches and the ice and what gets them through the day, it’s worth waking up in the morning.”

EACH TEEN SIGNED UP FOR THE CREWS AND REMAINED ON CALL TO GO ANYWHERE THEY ARE NEEDED IN THE WESTERN STATES. SOME TEENS SAY THEY HAVE BEEN DOING THIS AS A SUMMER JOB FOR YEARS....AND CAN VISIT MULTIPLE FIRE CAMPS EVERY SUMMER.



THE CREWS STAY AT EACH CAMP FOR UP TO FOURTEEN DAYS..... THEY TOLD LANDON EVEN THOUGH THE HOURS ARE LONG AND THE WORK MENIAL.....THE FRIENDSHIPS MADE ALONG THE WAY MAKE IT ALL WORTH IT.

FIREFIGHTERS MAY BE OUT ON THE FRONT LINES....BUT WITHOUT THESE HARDWORKING TEENS THEIR JOB WOULD BE EVEN MORE CHALLENGING.THE CREW HAS ALSO BUILT POSTER BOARDS FOR FIRE FIGHTING MAPS AND CLEARED THE CAMP AREA OF LARGE ROCKS SO NOBODY TRIPS AND HURTS THEMSELVES EARLY IN MORNING.

EIGHT HELICOPTERS ARE DROPPING WATER ANYWHERE IT'S NEEDED....WITH MORE COMING SOON.

Tom: "There's another helicopter that's coming to join us a Chinook, a heavy lift helicopter in order to help us protect the houses and also I understand that the National Guard has assigned a black hawk helicopter to come help us with any medical evacuations that are needed."

THE FIRE STARTED FROM A LIGHTNING STRIKE BACK ON JULY 11TH. NATIONAL FOREST SUPERVISORS SAW THE LIGHTNING BUT COULDN'T FIND THE FIRE BECAUSE IT WAS WHATS KNOWN AS A SLEEPER.

THAT MEANS THE FIRE SMOLDERS WITHOUT GIVING UP ANY SMOKE MAKING IT ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO FIND. ONCE THE WEATHER WARMED UP THE FIRE BURST TO LIFE AND IS NOW COVERING MORE THAN 8-THOUSAND ACRES. SO FAR NO STRUCTURES HAVE BEEN LOST. A STAGE ONE NATIONAL FIRE CREW WILL BE ARRIVING TO TAKE OVER FIREFIGHTING OPERATIONS.

SEVERAL WILDFIRES ARE BURNING IN WYOMING. THE LARGEST WILDFIRE IS THE CLIFF CREEK FIRE, SO FAR IT'S BURNED MORE THAN 16,800 ACRES. IT IS 10 PERCENT CONTAINED. THE LAVA MOUNTAIN FIRE IS ABOUT 20 MILES NORTHWEST OF DUBOIS. IT HAS CONSUMED A LITTLE MORE THAN 8,000 ACRES.

Alex Razzolini Camp Facilities Director: "We had about 135 kids here and then about a hundred so about 235 folk total and we started our evacuation in the afternoon on Friday."

**FIREFIGHTERS STAYED ON THE CAMP GROUNDS AND SUCCESSFULLY SAVED EVERY BUILDING FROM THE FLAMES.**

"To have 125 firefighters camped out on your green space is a really re-assuring fact and can't thank them enough for everything they've done in putting their lives at stake and protecting just a couple of buildings."

**THERE IS NOW A BLACKHAWK HELICOPTER WITH A NATIONAL GUARD CREW ON STAND BY FOR MEDICAL EMERGENCIES FIREFIGHTERS OR CIVILIANS COULD FACE.**

Greg Leffler National Guard Medic: "We're the National Guard we're here to help everybody, this is a state mission, we're here to help the state I mean the four of us we're excited about being here."

Tom Berglund Fire Information Officer: "Our firefighters put it all on the line and a lot of the area that they've been in has roads and easy access and that kind of thing but as the fire moves up into those hills, those steep rocky terrains it would be really hard to get one of them out if there was a bad fall, if something fell and hit them a falling tree a falling rock something like that."

A GRASS FIRE IN CASPER QUICKLY SPREAD TO NEARBY STRUCTURES THIS AFTERNOON (WEDNESDAY). THE FIRE STARTED IN A BACK YARD BETWEEN TWO HOUSES ON THE 2100 BLOCK OF LILAC. BY THE TIME CASPER FIRE-EMS ARRIVED, THE FIRE HAD ALREADY STARTED BURNING INTO TWO HOUSES. FIREFIGHTERS PUT OUT THE FIRE QUICKLY.

SPEAKING OF FIRES, AROUND 9:30 LAST NIGHT (TUESDAY), NATRONA COUNTY, MILLS AND BLM FIREFIGHTERS RESPONDED TO COUNTY ROAD 125 FOR REPORTS OF A WILDFIRE. THERE WERE THREE SEPARATE FIRES BURNING, AND THEY EVENTUALLY BURNED TOGETHER TO MAKE ONE BIGGER FIRE. IT EVENTUALLY BURNED ABOUT 140 ACRES. ALL THE FIRES WERE STARTED BY LIGHTNING.

**Bill: "We're basically here to support the community, help the community recover in any manner that they need so right now because we' don't have a lot of people actually staying at the shelter, we're actually providing mass care, we're expecting to feed approximately two hundred people tonight."**

**THEY WILL BE OFFERING DINNERS COOKED BY LOCAL VOLUNTEERS EVERY EVENING.**

**Troy: "Gotta give them a good experience, they're having a hard time in life right now so kick out some good food and that might put a bit of a smile on their face."**

**"Having food, very good food, we'll have things tonight like homemade meatballs and spaghetti, roasted chicken, we'll have really great food here."**

**VOLUNTEERS GIVE WHATEVER TIME THEY CAN SPARE TO HELP HOWEVER THEY CAN.**

**"I'm a new father, I've got an eight day old daughter, so I got to be at home, I got to make some money and all that but if I can donate five or six hours a day here I'll sleep when I die."**

**RED CROSS WORKERS SAY A LOT OF PEOPLE ARE STAYING WITH FAMILY NOW, AS THE FIRE CONTINUES TO RAGE THEY EXPECT MORE PEOPLE TO USE THE FACILITIES.**





**“Their family may get tired of them sleeping on the couch and ask them to come to the shelter so we’re here for those people too so that does happen. Sometimes we’ll see no one in a shelter for a week and then they’ll start trickling back in.”**

**Landon: “Red cross personnel say the best way you can donate now is simply to give your time and energy. Because the shelter is open twenty four hours a day, anybody who would be willing to come and relieve the night shift workers so they can get some rest would be a major help. **EVERYONES HEARD OF STUPID CRIMINALS. BUT THERE ARE ALSO PEOPLE WHO VERY INNOCENTLY DO STUPID THINGS THAT RESULT IN A FIRE.**

**Ray Bogan: “So this is true. I got the idea to do this story when I was driving home Friday night and saw someone using a charcoal grill in their garage. Captain Smith says most people do that because they want to get the grill out of the wind. Bad Idea.”**

**Ray: “Captain Smith, what is the right way to get your grill out of the wind.”**

**Captain Smith: “You want to look for the natural wind blocks that might be in your yard. Sometimes the fence or the shed or other structures will provide a natural wind block. And because wind’s such a chronic problem around here and outdoor kitchens becoming more popular, it’s not uncommon for people to build a wind break to be out of the wind. And typically we do that out of noncombustible materials. Certainly the surface needs to be tile or steel. Something that won’t easily ignite.”**

**Ray: “Another no-no, putting cigarettes in potted plants. I’ve covered multiple fires that have started that way, including one that burned the entire back of the house off.”**

**Smith: “When we’re talking about potted plants, we’re talking about pine bark, and other organic materials that once they dry out they ignite very easily.”**

**OUR FINAL NO, NO, LEAVING OPEN GASOLINE CANS IN YOUR GARAGE. THE FLASHPOINT OF GASOLINE IS 45 DEGREES BELOW ZERO, WHICH MEANS VOLATILE VAPORS ARE ALWAYS COMING OUT OF OPEN CANS.**

**Smith: “Because gasoline vapors are always going to be escaping as long as it’s warmer than 45 degrees below zero, it’s important that you buy the gas cans that have a safety mechanism that make it normally closed. That you actually have to open it to pour the gas.”**

**"We don't know for sure that it's going to happen tomorrow, that's the hope, it might be the next day. We need to wait and see today is a red flag day we've got low humidity, strong winds and a lot of atmospheric instability which can lead to a high potential for fire growth,"**

**PEOPLE WHO LIVE ON THE MOUNTAIN SAY ANTICIPATING EVACUATIONS WAS THE WORST PART.**

**"It's the not knowing, I think for folks that were evacuated as well as those who were on SET, it was just not knowing exactly what's happening and not feeling like you have much control."**

**"Dubois residents say they're happy evacuees can get ready to go home but they're also happy that all the thick smoke is finally disappearing. That smoke was deterring drive thru business for the town and has also been making it hard to breathe for the elderly."**

**"The greatest excitement is not dealing with the smoke it does affect people's sinuses, breathing, especially the older people, people with respiratory problems so it will be wonderful to have the smoke clear out."**

**SOME FIREFIGHTERS WILL TRANSFER TO OTHER WILDFIRES IN THE NEAR FUTURE.**

**"We've had other fires calling and saying we need resources is there any chance you could help and that's the same way it was here about a week ago. They were asking for resources and other fires were giving up their people to come here and now we're at a point where we can say yes we'll send our firefighters elsewhere."**

NEAR BOTH SUBDIVISIONS THERE ARE BURNED-OUT AREAS SURROUNDING OR NEAR HOMES. ONE HOMEOWNER SAYS SHE SAW THE SMOKE BEFORE BEING TOLD A FIRE WAS RAGING CLOSE TO HOME.

**Alice Irwin Has a Home on Union Pass: "I first saw the smoke and there were two fires at that time, there was one over in the Bondurant and there was one here and we would get both of the smokes coming across and kind of crossing directions at the end of the day."**

FIREFIGHTERS MANAGED TO SAVE EVERY STRUCTURE IN THE EVACUATED AREA EVEN THOUGH SOME HOMES HAVE BURNED TREES LESS THAN FIVE FEET AWAY.

ONE HOME'S WINDOWS CRACKED BECAUSE OF THE HEAT AND THE WOODEN WALLS ARE SINGED. FIREFIGHTERS SAY IT'S A MIRACLE THEY WERE ABLE TO SAVE EVERY STRUCTURE AS NEAR THE FIRES ACTUALLY GOT TO THEM. FIRE OFFICIALS AND THE FREMONT COUNTY SHERIFF HAVE ONLY OPENED THE ROAD TO RESIDENTS ON THE MOUNTAIN BECAUSE THERE ARE STILL ACTIVE FIRE CREWS ON DUTY.

HUGE CLOUDS OF SMOKE HANG OVER CODY TONIGHT AS HIGH WINDS WHIP A FIRE TOWARD THE CITY. IT STARTED TUESDAY IN WAPITI VALLEY, BETWEEN CODY AND YELLOWSTONE.

#### **BRADY**

THE FIRE IS STILL MILES AWAY FROM CODY, AND THE BUFFALO BILL RESERVOIR STANDS IN THE PATH OF THE BLAZE. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS EVACUATIONS STARTED LAST NIGHT, AS HOUSES BURNED.

**As huge clouds of smoke billow over the mountains south of the Yellowstone highway, helicopters and an air tanker dropped water and retardant over what the B-L-M calls the Whit Fire. Cody Field Office Manager Delissa Minnick says the 3000 acre blaze started on private land in the Whit Creek area, but when asked about the cause, would only say it is under investigation. We found the property where it apparently started, and the foundation of a burned home nearby.**



**PENNY:** “This is the property next door to where the fire started Tuesday. The man who lives here says he didn’t have time to do anything but watch the fire go by.”

**PATRICK:** “I smelled smoke and turned around and there it was coming right at me. I grabbed my shovel and tried to put it out but it got so hot, so fast.

Patrick Perotti ran to his house...

“And before I could get the water hose turned on, it was already past the house.”

“Legally we’re not allowed to do a mandatory evacuation in the state of Wyoming.”

But, Park County’s Homeland Security office issued a Code Red evacuation recommendation to people who lived in the area Tuesday night.

**MART:** “It was an evacuation recommendation, for the area of the Whit Creek drainage east to Gibbs Bridge.”

Some homeowners did leave. Some, like David Woods, decided to wait and see...

“You pays your money, takes your chances out here in this part of the country. It’s what it is.”

Woods filled up his water tanks, packed up his valuables so they’re ready to go, and put out sprinklers. He says people tell him...

**DAVID:** “If you need help, call. And then there’s the few that want me to come help them do something. Hey, I’m sorry what you’ve got going on is not as important as what I have today.”

Woods watches the smoke billowing over Wapiti valley, as do the tourists heading to and from Yellowstone. High winds on this day are pushing the fire toward Buffalo Bill Reservoir, and the smoke toward Cody. From Wapiti Valley, West of Cody, I’m Penny Preston, News 13.

PENNY PRESTON REPORTS THE GOVERNMENT'S MOST SKILLED AND ADVANCED TEAM WILL FACE A FIRE THAT HAS COVERED TEN THOUSAND ACRES...AND IS STILL GROWING.

As the big trucks pulled in to the Buffalo Bill Campground, Planes and water dipping helicopters flew overhead, dropping water and retardant onto the Whit Fire, As they did Wednesday, near where the fire started on private land fifteen miles west of Cody the day before. Although winds from the west pushed the fire over onto the South Fork...and tripled its size to ten thousand acres...only two homes and a few outbuildings were lost.

But, winds from the East pushed the fire back toward Wapiti Valley overnight. And, homeowners put up their sprinklers, and carried out their keepsakes. They weren’t the only ones.

PENNY: “This is our family cabin at the end of Green Creek Road in the Shoshone National Forest. The fire is on the back side of Table Mountain and the wind is blowing in this direction. So, I came home to pack up the pictures and the family memorabilia.”



Meanwhile, the management team that included BLM, Shoshone National Forest, Park County, the Wyoming State Forestry Division, and a Type 3 Incident Management team, welcomed a new crew to the Whit Fire.

KRISTIE: “When the fire came up over the mountain and came down into the South Fork area, that brought a lot more structures into our fire perimeter area, and increased the complexity of the Whit fire. So, we decided that it was time to bring in our most skilled and advanced team which is Type I Incident Management Team.”

That team commander, Todd Pechota, met Cody and Park County residents Thursday night. He told them there may be as many as 750 firefighters working to control the Whit fire, which is now threatening homes on two fronts. We asked him how people can help his firefighters...

TODD: “So when the 911 system and law enforcement recommends an evacuation, to heed those warnings.”

Residents of Wapiti’s east end and portions of the South Fork were advised to evacuate Tuesday night. Will people on the west end of the valley be asked to evacuate soon?

“I’m not suggesting that I’m anticipating more. Could they happen yes. But, I’m talking generally.

AN ARMY OF FIREFIGHTERS IS ATTACKING THE WHIT FIRE NEAR CODY, USING CHINOOK HELICOPTERS, NEW WATER SCOOPING AIRCRAFT FROM CANADA. AND PEOPLE ON THE GROUND CLEARING FUEL AHEAD OF THE FIRE. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS THE FIRE MOVED A LITTLE TO THE WEST THURSDAY NIGHT, BUT IS EXPECTED TO HEAD BACK EAST TOWARD CODY THIS WEEKEND.

Boats are not allowed on the Buffalo Bill Reservoir now, because Super scoopers skim the water surface for ten to fifteen seconds, then lift up into the air at full speed. The four fixed wing aircraft from Canada are joined by nine helicopters...

PENNY: "And several crews clearing out fuel ahead of the fire. This group is getting rid of lower limbs, high grasses, and brush to protect Green Creek cabins on the western end of Wapiti Valley. Several housing developments are adjacent to the Shoshone National Forest...where the fire is burning now."

But, Operations chief Rob Powell says the blaze moved toward Green Creek just a little Thursday night...when the winds were pushing to the east.

ROB POWELL: "It's not well established up in there. We've got to work indirect with some hot shot crews up in there. When the aircraft is flying over constantly, so we're keeping that in check."

Powell says the winds will be pushing the fire back to the East Saturday and Sunday. So crews on the south and east flanks of the fire hand crews are constructing fire lines... to help protect homes on the south fork, and nearer to Cody.

But, they're also working to stay ahead of the fire in Wapiti...hoping it won't come over Table Mountain to the west side...but getting ready in case it does.

"That's one of our biggest values at risk right now is the private property and homes in that area. That's why we're getting after it before it gets there."



Since the firefighters came to Cody from all over the country, they're having to take lessons on working and camping in bear country...grizzly bear country. Everyone, including team commander Todd Pechota took the course. And everyone has to keep bear spray close.

The official press release says the Whit fire has grown to more than 10 thousand acres; it also says the fire that was probably human caused is 15 percent contained. From Cody, Penny Preston, News 13.

FEDERAL LANDS IN NORTHWEST WYOMING WILL SOON BE UNDER BURNING RESTRICTIONS. A WEEK AFTER THE WILDFIRE BETWEEN CODY AND YELLOWSTONE SCORCHED 12-THOUSAND ACRES...YELLOWSTONE, THE U-S FOREST SERVICE, AND THE BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT ARE RESTRICTING OPEN FIRES.

PENNY PRESTON REPORTS BACKCOUNTRY FIRES MAY, OR MAY NOT BE ALLOWED, DEPENDING ON WHERE YOU ARE.

**This is what happened when dry grass was set on fire last Tuesday. The Whit Fire destroyed two homes, several outbuildings, and scorched more than twelve thousand acres west of Cody. It is 70% contained, but ground crews are still fighting high winds, and very dry conditions.**

**Those conditions prompted Shoshone National Forest Supervisor Joe Alexander, and Cody BLM Field Office Manager Delissa Minnick to inform Park County Commissioners about impending restrictions.**

**“Extreme conditions on the south end of the forest.”**

**Alexander says both the Forest Service, and the BLM are recommending stage one fire restrictions, which means:**

**Joe Alexander, Shoshone National Forest Supervisor: “Allow people to have campfires in designated sites. Campgrounds with fire grates. Those kinds of things, places that we have a little bit of control.**

**Alexander says open campfires won’t be allowed in the Forest outside of those campgrounds...except in the wilderness areas where there will be no burning restrictions.**

**“We would restrict smoking in designated areas, and also require spark arresters on chain saws.”**

**Penny Preston, Reporting: “Yellowstone is at a higher elevation, and therefore usually not as dry as the National Forests and B-L-M lands surrounding it. But, they imposed restrictions Monday.”**

**Mike Johnson, Yellowstone, NPS Fire Information Officer: “So we’re in stage one restrictions here in Yellowstone National Park. What that means is now backcountry fires have been prohibited.”**

**Fire Information Officer Mike Johnson says campfires will still be allowed in fire rings in designated campgrounds.**

**“People using backcountry campsites or accessing the trails in the backcountry can currently only use their portable stoves.”**

**Wyoming’s Park County’s Commissioners say they’ll consider countywide burning restrictions next week. From Yellowstone and Cody, Penny Preston, News 13.**

CASPER CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS APPROVED CHANGES TO THE CITY'S EMPLOYEE HEALTH PLAN TONIGHT (TUESDAY), WHICH COULD SAVE THE CITY 600 THOUSAND DOLLARS A YEAR. NEWS 13'S RAY BOGAN HAS THE STORY.

CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS WERE THUMBS UP, IN SUPPORTING CHANGES TO HELP THE CITY SAVE AN ESTIMATED 600 THOUSAND A YEAR, OR ABOUT 10 PERCENT OF THE CITY'S HEALTH PLAN COSTS. THE CITY'S HEALTH PLAN DESIGN COMMITTEE CHOSE TO RAISE DEDUCTIBLES, OUT OF POCKET COSTS AND MAKE SOME OTHER CHANGES; INSTEAD OF RAISING PREMIUMS. THE CURRENT PLAN IS RUNNING ON A DEFICIT.

Tracy Belser, Assistant City Manager: "So that's why we're looking at taking some action on the plan design. To try to have the plan on a sustainable fund."

THE DEFICIT FOR THE HEALTH PLAN WAS HIGHEST IN 2014, WAS A LITTLE BETTER IN 2015 AND IS SLOWLY COMING BACK.

Becky Nelson: Casper HR Department: "So it has been declining but we are still running at a deficit."

DEDUCTIBLES WILL INCREASE FOR BOTH IN AND OUT-OF-NETWORK DOCTORS. THESE CHANGES WILL SAVE THE CITY AN ESTIMATED 320 THOUSAND A YEAR.

THERE WILL ALSO BE AN INCREASE FOR OUT OF POCKET MAXIMUMS. THESE CHANGES WILL SAVE THE CITY AN ESTIMATED 256 THOUSAND A YEAR.

THE CHANGES TO DEDUCTIBLES AND OUT OF POCKET COSTS LIKELY WON'T HAVE A BIG IMPACT ON EMPLOYEES, AS 80 PERCENT ON THE PLAN DON'T MEET DEDUCTIBLES AND LESS THAN 20 PERCENT REACH OUT OF POCKET MAXIMUMS. HOWEVER COUNCILMAN HEILI WAS CONCERNED ABOUT THOSE FEW.

Wayne Heili: "For 80 percent of the members that's great but for the ones who are using the insurance the most this is going to have the hardest impact."

THE NEW PLAN ALSO INTRODUCES PRESCRIPTION STEP THERAPY WHICH REQUIRES PROVEN LESS EXPENSIVE DRUGS BE TRIED BEFORE BUYING MORE EXPENSIVE DRUGS. DOCTORS CAN OVERRIDE THIS REQUIREMENT. IT WILL HAVE AN ESTIMATED SAVINGS OF ABOUT 38 TO 50 THOUSAND A YEAR.

DESPITE THESE CHANGES COUNCILMAN POWELL GAVE THE CITY CREDIT FOR A WELL RUN HEALTH PLAN.

Because we haven't had to make changes to the plan in about 5 years or so.

THERE ARE SOME MORE CHANGES BUT THEY HAVE SIGNIFICANTLY LESS IMPACT ON SAVINGS. RAY BOGAN NEWS 13 CASPER

Smoke was reported on Hunter Peak near Crandall Tuesday night. By Wednesday afternoon, it was threatening cabins and homes there.

Kristie Salzmann, Shoshone Public Information Officer: "We've actually with the help of the Park County Sheriff's office been able to evacuate the Squaw Creek area."

Two sisters drove up from Powell to check on the cabin that had been in their family for 40 years. They were stopped at a roadblock.

Kristie Franklin, Cabin Owner: "Well, they aren't letting us go up to the cabin. They are again evacuating everybody, and that it had jumped the road at 125, which is a mile marker and so that would be very close to where our cabin is."

The owner of the store where the sisters grabbed a snack used a garden hose to wet down her deck as she watched the smoke from the Hunter Peak Fire.

Firefighters streamed up the road to try to save Kristie Franklin's family cabin, and other homes nearby. Some cabins were burned here in 1988, when the Yellowstone wildfires also hit the Shoshone National Forest. Shoshone spokeswoman Kristie Salzmann says the scars may help.

"We were talking about that this morning with our fire management staff. And they said there is the potential that that already burned area"

Homeowners may have gotten another break; firefighters and equipment from the highly experienced Type One team that fought the Whit Fire last week were sent to the Hunter Peak Fire.

That includes the super scoopers which helped bring the containment up to 80 percent on the fire west of Cody. The Hunter Peak Fire was estimated at more than six hundred acres, before it grew closer to the cabins.

"We have real barriers, they are not perceived barriers, having a physical address is a barrier in many places in Indian country. Having a birth certificate is still a barrier."

JACQUELINE PATA WITH THE NATIONAL CONGRESS OF AMERICAN INDIANS SAYS SHE WAS RELIEVED AFTER A NORTH DAKOTA LAW THAT WOULD HAVE TIGHTENED I-D REQUIREMENTS WAS BLOCKED.

Creating such strict rules that you couldn't even use a passport or a military ID to be able to vote definitely becomes a hurdle for native Americans who may not have access to get the appropriate state issued driver's license or alternative ID.

"These are conservative judges that are finding that the state legislature went too far."

PRATT WILEY WITH THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL COMMITTEE SAYS THE LAW WOULD HAVE AMOUNTED TO HAVING PEOPLE PAY TO VOTE.

"The cost of obtaining a photo ID is disproportionately harder on the Native American community, especially in North Dakota than it is for the population as a whole."

"This decision is the latest setback in the courts for Republican led- efforts to enact voter ID laws with the intent of curbing voter fraud. We reached out many times to the Republican National Committee and the North Dakota Republican Party, but our requests for a comment were never even acknowledged."

A DEADLY AMOEBA LIVES IN WARM SPRINGS IN GRAND TETON NATIONAL PARK. PARK SUPERINTENDENT DAVID VELA IS ASKING PARK VISITORS TO AVOID THE POPULAR SOAKING AND SWIMMING AREAS.

PENNY PRESTON REPORTS THE SPRINGS ARE NOT BLOCKED OFF.



That is the call of two bullfrogs in Kelly Warm Spring in Grand Teton National Park. Bullfrogs and tropical fish live here. They are not native, but they are not the deadly one celled organism that can kill. Although it is deadly, *Naegleria fowleri* may naturally occur here.

SUE: "U.S.G.S. researchers have sampled these waters and have discovered some potentially dangerous organisms in the water, including one called *Naegleria fowleri*."

The Park's resource management chief, Sue Consolo-Murphy says there is more than one potential pathogen.

"And we also know we have high levels of E. Coli which can pose a danger to humans."

E. Coli comes from fecal matter, and can cause intestinal sickness. Signs warn people not to get into the warm water. But, there are no regulations against swimming or wading here, so it's up to the visitor to decide.

"There's no one in here today swimming in the water, but it's not uncommon to come out here and see people wading, swimming, splashing around."

Consolo-Murphy says there aren't any reported cases of sickness from this spring, and infection risk is low. But, a park press release says it can destroy brain tissue, cause swelling, and death.

"*Naegleria fowleri*, if it gets into the nasal passages can cause primary amoebic meningitis, which can be fatal."

United States Geological Survey researchers have also found the amoeba in streams and pools near to Kelly Warm Spring.

Consolo-Murphy says Grand Teton officials have another reason to discourage people from going in the warm waters here: the possible destruction of rare and fragile geothermal features.

"It's our mission to protect the resources fundamentally to insure that they last for the enjoyment of present and future generations."

JOODE: "So noisy, and so busy, and so overcrowded, they were closing areas because of overcapacity of the cars."

Although this couple flew over the Atlantic to see Yellowstone, they left because it was too crowded for them.

"And on leaving the Park it was quite late, and we got into yet another traffic jam."

Traffic jams on the parks roads, and people jams at popular spots like Mammoth, Old Faithful, Canyon Falls, and Mud Volcano are common during the summer months. Visitation topped four million for the first time in 2015. A park press release says by the end of July, this year's visitation was up almost seven percent over last year's.

CHERISSA: "We are on track for a record year. Every month this year so far, we've exceeded the year previous."

In May, Superintendent Dan Wenk said...

DAN: "We're studying the visitor experience, the visitor expectations, how we're meeting those expectations."

Park Spokeswoman Cherissa Reid said the park would actually do surveys to ask people:

"What are their expectations, do they think it's crowded?"

The surveyors recently set up shop just inside the Park's entrances. They hand out questionnaires for people to take with them, and fill out after they visit the Park.

While some have suggested a reservation system, Wenk talked early and often about a bus system that would allow some visitors to take tours from the entrances...

"I'm not suggesting exclusively mass transportation, but could mass transportation in some way alleviate the congestion that's in the park?"

This visitor thinks so: "And that cuts down the cars enormously. And maybe they need to think of doing that because the experience just isn't there."

School bus drivers face this kind of situation on a regular basis. An angry parent or student tries to climb on board, as they challenge the driver. But, these days, school bus drivers may also face a threat from within: a student firing a gun...intent on killing as many other people as they can.

More than a hundred Park County Wyoming school bus drivers attended a day long class in Powell, to learn how to properly deal with shooters...and other threats on the school bus. But, the instructors, who





are retired police officers, were most intent on teaching the drivers how to stop the threats from happening, by recognizing the warning signs.

Paul: “We don’t want any more active shooters. We want our people prepared for active shooters. Prevention is the key. So we teach that development. Those behaviors of concern to look for.”

The drivers were also taught how to take a gun away from a shooter....deal a quick crippling blow to the neck. And, how to use the tools at hand. But, this training was not about using a gun to defend against a gunman.

“We do not advocate guns on the bus. We advocate prevention... awareness...observations.”

Lead instructor Paul Pabone says the private company’s course: APEX Safety Curriculum Fundamentals, teaches school employees to be ready...

“When a gun does come on a bus, we want that driver, or that teacher, or that employee to be prepared.”

The class was conducted on campus, and on the bus...a week before classes begin.

When they do, these drivers will have the training to help protect their precious cargo. From Powell, Penny Preston, News 13.

Penny Preston, Reporting: "They gather in Cody or Powell every other weekend, to tie flies for fishing. And, then when they can, they get back to the healing waters."

Larry Smith, Project Healing Waters Leader: "Get that tip up, you see all that slack?"

Larry Smith contacted the national Healing Waters organization. They told him he could take fly tying classes..

"And he's like no, you don't understand. There is nothing like this where I'm at. And I don't understand, because this is one of the biggest fly fishing communities around."

Smith organized a Northwest Wyoming chapter, and now...

About a dozen wounded veterans wash away their pain, and loneliness, in these waters.

"I was very suicidal"

Charlynn Hank says she's not now. She has something to look forward to. Tying flies gives her purpose, and pride...

Charlynn Hank, Retired Marine: "I take pictures of it with my phone and I send them to other veterans."

Hank says every veteran should try fly fishing.

"It's peaceful to be out here. And I think it's peaceful to be with other veterans."

**FIRE OFFICIALS TOLD LANDON FIRES ARE INCONVENIENT WHEN THEY BURN.....BUT WITHOUT THEM THE FOREST WOULD BE MUNDANE AND NOT NEARLY AS HEALTHY FOR WILDLIFE.**

NEXT WEDNESDAY MARKS THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS OF THE NATRONA COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT. THAT ALSO MEANS SCHOOL ZONE DRIVING RULES WILL GO INTO EFFECT. NEWS 13'S RAY BOGAN LOOKED INTO THE RULES OF THE ROAD IN SCHOOL ZONES, AND WHY THE SPEED LIMIT IS 20.

CASPER ROAD CREWS HAVE BEEN REPAINTING CROSSWALKS AND INSTALLING NEW SIGNS IN SCHOOL ZONES THIS PAST WEEK. THE SCHOOL ZONES IN CASPER ARE 20 MILES AN HOUR AND HERE'S WHY.

AT 20 MILES AN HOUR REACTION TIMES ARE SHORTER AND THERE'S ONLY A TEN PERCENT CHANCE OF DEATH. AT THIRTY MILES AN HOUR THE CHANCES OF DEATH TRIPLE, AT FORTY MILES AN HOUR, THE VICTIM DIES ALMOST EVERY TIME.

Detective Hatcher: “It shows right there, by slowing down and driving 20 miles an hour, not only is your reaction time better, but unfortunately if you do hit a pedestrian there's a very good chance the person's just going to have minor injuries.”

THERE TWO TYPES OF SCHOOL ZONE SIGNS, FLASHING AND PRINTED. BUT BE CAREFUL. NOT SCHOOL ZONES ARE ACTIVE AT THE SAME TIME, THERE'S AN ESPECIALLY BIG DIFFERENCE BETWEEN HIGH SCHOOLS AND ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS. FOR INSTANCE THIS SIGN AT NATRONA COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL IS FROM 6 TO 9 AND 11:30 TO FIVE. PARK ELEMENTARY JUST A BLOCK AWAY IS 6 TO NINE AND TWO TO FIVE. SPEEDING FINES IN SCHOOL ZONES ARE DOUBLE THE PRICE.

Hatcher: “The fines are doubled to let people know it is so important to slow down. So we decided to hit the financial, your pocket book to hopefully remind people.”

LAST YEAR, THE AVERAGE SCHOOL ZONE SPEEDING TICKETS IN CASPER WERE 8 TO 12 MILES AN HOUR OVER. THAT RANGES FROM A 180 TO 220 DOLLAR TICKET.

Hatcher: “Which is a pretty steep fine. But again we want that not to make revenue for the city, but to let people realize, slow down when you're going through school zones.”

"Students need to get the immunizations based on their age schools require certain ones."

DOCTOR RADKE IS THE CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER AT THE COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER OF CENTRAL WYOMING. HE SAYS YOU SHOULD CHECK WITH YOUR SCHOOL AS TO WHICH VACCINES ARE REQUIRED. BUT HE ALSO SAYS THERE IS ONE YOU SHOULD PROBABLY GET NO MATTER WHAT.

Doctor Karl Radke: "The primary one would be the influenza vaccine which first becomes available in September their really no need to delay that anymore."

THE CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION SAYS IF THE FLU VACCINE IS TAKEN IN THE FALL IT SHOULD LAST UNTIL SPRING TIME. SOME ACTORS AND PARENTS HAVE COME OUT AGAINST VACCINATIONS IN THE PAST SAYING THERE IS AN INCREASE CHANCE FOR AUTISM....

"That has absolutely been one hundred percent categorically proven to be false."

DOCTOR RADKE SAYS JUST BECAUSE YOUR CHILD IS HEALTHY DOESN'T MEAN THEY SHOULDN'T GET A VACCINE.

"Immunizations are important and you should not delay those or try to change what the C-D-C has come up with the guidelines and the sooner you can get those through the better your child will be and safer they will be for the future. "

MOST PARENTS WOULD AGREE A SMALL NEEDLE OF PAIN IS BETTER THAN A WEEK IN BED.

ABOUT 15 PEOPLE RALLIED IN A PARK IN FRONT OF ABOUT 30 PROTESTERS WHO STOOD IN SUPPORT OF ISLAM. MEMBERS OF WYOMING AGAINST ISLAM BURNED A QURAN DURING THE RALLY, BUT NEWS 13 WILL NOT SHOW THAT OUT OF RESPECT FOR MUSLIMS. NEWS 13'S RAY BOGAN WAS AT THE RALLY.

MEMBERS OF WYOMING AGAINST ISLAM HELD A RALLY CENTERED AROUND THEIR HATRED OF THE ISLAMIC FAITH AND THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT. THEIR PROPOSED SOLUTION: PEACE, DIALOGUE AND UNDERSTANDING.

Frank Jorge, Rally Organizer and Speaker: "People have got to come to terms with what is being called a religion. But is really something hateful and evil disguised as a religion."

ALTHOUGH MEMBERS OF THE GROUP CALL FOR BANNING MUSLIMS, NOT ALL MEMBERS THINK THE BAN SHOULD BE ABSOLUTE. JON ROAN IS MAINLY CONCERNED ABOUT A REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM.

Jon Roan, Wyoming Against Islam: "No I don't think all Muslims are bad. I think Islam is bad. But I think they should be properly vetted before we bring them in."

ROAN BELIEVES MANY MUSLIMS ARE GOOD AND CAN COME TO WYOMING.

Jon Roan. "If it's a good hard-working person, don't care, properly vetted, don't care. Bring them in. "

MANY GILLETTE RESIDENTS OPPOSED THE RALLY. INCLUDING THE MAYOR WHO'S BEEN VOCAL ABOUT HER OPPOSITION, BUT RESPECTED THEIR RIGHTS OF SPEECH AND ASSEMBLY.

Geno Palazzari, Gillette Spokesman: "This isn't Gillette. We have a very welcoming and inclusive community."

DURING THE RALLY, DIFFERENT SPEAKERS SHARED THEIR POLITICAL BELIEFS AND WHY THEY BELIEVE THE ISLAM IS FLAWED. THEN FRANK JORGE GOT UP TO SPEAK AND ALMOST IMMEDIATELY TURNED AROUND TO ADDRESS PROTESTERS DIRECTLY.

Frank Jorge: "Ladies and gentleman, the biggest problem that the people of the United States have, it isn't illegal immigration, it isn't immigration, it isn't Islam, it's the very government that is supposed to serve us. "

AS JORGE SPOKE PROTESTERS TURNED THEIR BACKS. THEN A MUSLIM MAN PROTESTING THE RALLY WALKED UP TO JORGE AND WAS HANDED THE MICROPHONE.

"So there's no reason to have hate in your heart. Love everybody, enjoy everybody, say hi, say by, don't have hate."

AFTER A BRIEF STATEMENT, JORGE TOOK BACK THE MICROPHONE AND ASKED HIM IF THE PROPHET MUHAMMED WAS A PEDOPHILE.

Jorge: "Did the prophet marry a six year old girl?"

Muslim man: "No, I don't know where you hear this stuff."

WYOMING AGAINST ISLAM MEMBERS CONTINUOUSLY CALLED FOR PEACE AND A DIALOGUE DURING THE RALLY. BUT PROTESTERS DOUBTED IT WOULD HAPPEN.



Tanya Krummreich, Gillette against hate movement coordinator: "They have exhibited only hate. WE are happy to give them a dialogue if they would actually communicate. The thing is, is there idea of dialogue is a lot of vague threats and a lot of name calling."

AFTER THE RALLY, WITH THE HELP OF A POLICE OFFICER, MEMBERS OF BOTH SIDES TO TRIED TO UNDERSTAND EACH OTHER JUST A LITTLE BETTER.

WILSON'S RESIGNATION COMES AS MILLS TOWN TREASURER LISA WHETSTONE FACES CRIMINAL ALLEGATIONS SHE STOLE \$64,000 FROM THE TOWN OF MILLS. WHETSTONE HAS ENTERED A NOT GUILTY PLEA TO THOSE CHARGES. TODAY (TUESDAY) I DUG INTO THE FACTS SURROUNDING WILSON'S DEPARTURE.

IT'S NOT CLEAR RIGHT NOW WHY MARROLYCE WILSON IS STEPPING DOWN AS MAYOR OF THE TOWN OF MILLS.

IN MAY, NEWS 13 REPORTED WILSON MAY OWN A LIQUOR LICENSE. UNDER STATE LAW, IT WOULD BE A CRIME FOR A PUBLIC OFFICIAL, LIKE A TOWN MAYOR, TO DO SO. IT'S UNKNOWN WHETHER WILSON'S RESIGNATION HAS ANYTHING TO DO WITH THE LIQUOR LICENSE.

BUT NATRONA COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY MIKE BLONIGEN CONFIRMED IN MAY HE WAS AWARE OF WILSON AND THE LIQUOR LICENSE IN QUESTION.

Mike: "So, it bears more inquiry before anything is done about it but it is on our radar."

WILSON TOLD NEWS 13 AT THE TIME SHE OWNED THE HIDEAWAY BAR FOR 14 YEARS. SHE SAID HER L-L-C, OR LIMITED LIABILITY COMPANY, OWNS THE LIQUOR LICENSE, NOT HER.

Marrolyce Wilson, TOWN OF MILLS: "From what I'm understanding, as far as holding a position you cannot have a liquor license, by state statute in your name, I do not hold a liquor license."

MEANWHILE, SOME PEOPLE IN MILLS ARE DISAPPOINTED ABOUT HOW THINGS ARE GOING.

Sarah Tooker, town of mills resident: "I would like, you know, to be able to trust our officials, especially when our officials here are, um, community. You know, they come from our community, And that, that's sad."

WHEN REACHED FOR COMMENT, TOWN OF MILLS CITY COUNCILMAN SETH COLEMAN SAID HE WANTS TO RESERVE COMMENT UNTIL AFTER WILSON IS OFFICIALLY OUT OF OFFICE.

WILSON HAS BEEN MAYOR SINCE JANUARY 2012 AND HAD TWO MORE YEARS IN OFFICE. NEWS 13 REACHED OUT TO DISTRICT ATTORNEY MIKE BLONIGEN FOR AN UPDATE INTO HIS INVESTIGATION BUT DIDN'T HEAR BACK TODAY. WILSON COULD NOT BE REACHED FOR COMMENT.

**THE FLASHING 20 MILE PER HOUR SIGN IS ONLY ON DURING TIMES KIDS MIGHT USE THE CROSSWALK.**

Bruce Thoren Superintendent District #24: "The crosswalk on the highway between Riverton and Casper is lit in the morning when kids are coming to school at lunchtime when potentially a kid could go home from school and of course when school gets out at the 3:30 timeframe."

**THERE ARE NEW BUS ROUTES TO THE NEW SCHOOL, THAT DOESN'T MEAN KIDS WON'T BE USING THE CROSSWALKS.**

"There's always that situation, kid gets up late and misses the bus and they've got to get to school and their parents have gone to work or aren't home or whatever the situation may be so there will be those kids that end up walking to school so we just have to ensure their safety."

Crystal Knigge Shoshoni Mother of 3: "My kids use this street all the time to either go to their friend's house or their friends are coming here or they're going to school or coming back from a school activity. I have a fifteen year old, eleven year old and an eight year old."

Landon Harrar: "I spoke to multiple Shoshoni residents who say even though the school has moved the kids homes have not and they need these like flashing lights on the crosswalks so those kids can continue to get home safely especially across this road which has a constant flow of traffic."

**SHOSHONI POLICE WATCH THE CROSSWALKS CLOSELY AND IF YOU'RE SPEEDING YOU WILL GET A TICKET.**

"I sit here in the store and see people all the time coming from out of town, going over the speed limit down this road and I'm thankful that we do have good law enforcement in this town and watch over our kids and make sure people are obeying the speed limit."

**EARL CURTIS NOT ONLY HAS A BRAIN INJURY BUT IS ALSO MISSING A LEG AND IS NEARLY BLIND. HE NOW LIVES IN A TINY HOUSE WITH OUT HEAT, AND WONDERS WHAT HE'LL DO THIS WINTER. HE HOPES TO FIND HIS NEPHEWS IN ARIZONA.**

Earl Curtis: "I was with those two boys for a long time before they became teenagers."

**MANY PEOPLE HAVE TRIED TO HELP EARL, BUT MOST OF THE DAMAGE IS ALREADY DONE AND IRREVERSIBLE.**

Dawn Lacko: "I'm angry that he got taken advantage of. Very angry. And he's one of 11 people in the last year who have walked through our doors who we've picked up payee ship or started working with because someone else is taking advantage of their money."

**LACKO WISHES MORE PEOPLE WOULD BE PROSECUTED FOR WHAT SHE CALLS, STEALING.**

Lacko: "But again it takes an extra effort. It's hard to prosecute. How do you prove that someone didn't willingly give their money away?"

**BUT LACKO BELIEVES REAL CHANGE WILL COME WITH MORE PROSEUTION.**

Lacko: "If we start prosecuting people for doing this, I think there is more of a disincentive to do it."

CASPER HUMANE SOCIETY IS TEMPORARILY STOPPING DOG ADOPTIONS AFTER 12 OF THE DOGS HOUSED THEIR CAME DOWN WITH KENNEL COUGH. THE DOGS ARE BEING TREATED AND SHOULD



RECOVER SOON, BUT BECAUSE KENNEL COUGH IS VERY CONTAGIOUS, THE SOCIETY IS STOPPING ADOPTIONS AND PUBLIC VISITS WITH THE DOGS AS A PRECAUTION. NEWS 13'S RAY BOGAN REPORTS.

**SOME DOGS AT THE CASPER HUMANE SOCIETY AREN'T FEELING WELL AND HAVE COME DOWN WITH A STRAIN OF KENNEL COUGH THAT APPEARS TO HAVE SPREAD IN MANY AREAS OF THE COUNTRY BECAUSE IT'S RESISTANT TO THE VACCINE.**

**ONE VETERINARIAN DESCRIBES IT AS THE DOG EQUIVALENT TO WHOOPING COUGH IN CHILDREN, BOTH ARE CAUSED BY BORDATELLA.**

Randy Verink, Veterinarian: "Basically it's a respiratory disorder. Where the animals, just like with whooping cough, have fever, they're sick, they're coughing all the time. You know it's sort of an annoying disease which rarely, if ever, is fatal."

**SO TO HELP GET THEIR DOGS BETTER, THE HUMANE SOCIETY MANAGER IS TREATING INFECTED DOGS WITH MEDICATION AND KEEPING THEM SEPARATED FROM OTHER DOGS.**

Craig Cummings: "I always say the shelter is very similar to preschool. You know you have one kid who gets sick and then passes it to the next kid. SO it's been a process of letting it run its course and trying to contain it as much as possible."

Verink: "Well we'll see in the summer dogs just like with children, and even us older people, they're more likely to congregate and do things outside. And dogs when you get them together they're usually smelling each other front and back end."

**VERINK SAYS DOG OWNERS SHOULDN'T BE TOO WORRIED ABOUT THIS. BUT SYMPTOMS FOR KENNEL COUGH INCLUDE A RUNNY NOSE, A FEVER, AND DEPRESSION.**

Cummings: "That's why we have initially shut down all of the dog areas and advise people not to bring their animals into the shelter either for their own safety."

**MOST DOGS ARE ALREADY VACCINATED, BUT FOR THOSE THAT AREN'T THERE ARE ORAL AND NASAL VACCINATIONS AVAILABLE. RAY BOGAN NEWS 13 CASPER.**

THE DOGS SHOULD BE BETTER AND READY FOR ADOPTION BY NEXT WEEKEND. IN THE MEAN TIME, THE CASPER HUMANE SOCIETY IS STILL OPEN. NONE OF THE DOGS AT METRO ANIMAL SERVICES HAVE KENNEL COUGH AND THEY CAN STILL BE ADOPTED.

MORE GRIZZLY BEARS MEAN MORE CONFLICTS OUTSIDE OF WHAT GAME AND FISH BIOLOGISTS CALL SUITABLE BEAR HABITATS. IN FREMONT COUNTY THERE HAVE BEEN NO CONFLICTS IN LANDER OR RIVERTON, BUT TWO PROBLEM GRIZZLIES \*WERE\* REMOVED NEAR DUBOIS.

LARGE CARNIVORE SPECIALIST DAN THOMPSON SAYS SO FAR THIS YEAR CONFLICT NUMBERS ARE AROUND AVERAGE, BUT 40 PERCENT OF THOSE CONFLICTS OCCURRED OUTSIDE THE GREATER YELLOWSTONE AREA CONSIDERED THEIR SUITABLE HABITAT.

ONE REASON FOR THIS IS CONSERVATION EFFORTS HAVE WORKED SO WELL, MORE GRIZZLIES ARE TRAVELING FARTHER TO DISTANCE THEMSELVES FROM OTHER BEARS.



**Dan Thompson Game and Fish Large Carnivore Supervisor: "As the population has recovered and grown and expanded, it's that it has moved beyond those boundaries and basically as we know those bears are in those less than suitable habitats there's more potential for conflicts."**

THOMPSON SAYS AS THE HUNTING SEASON APPROACHES, MORE CONFLICTS ARE EXPECTED SIMPLY BECAUSE MORE PEOPLE WILL BE OUT IN THE FORESTS. GAME AND FISH BIOLOGISTS HAVE SEEN BEARS STARTING TO VENTURE FARTHER OUT OF THE GREATER YELLOWSTONE AREA THE PAST FIVE YEARS.

PEOPLE FROM AROUND THE WORLD BECAME NEW AMERICAN CITIZENS IN YELLOWSTONE TODAY. MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED PARKS HELD NATURALIZATION CEREMONIES THIS YEAR TO CELEBRATE THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE'S 100TH ANNIVERSARY. THE EVENT IN YELLOWSTONE WAS COVERED BY NEWS CAMERAS FOR THE FIRST TIME, BECAUSE IT WAS HELD OUTSIDE. NEWS 13'S PENNY PRESTON WAS THERE.

**While visitors from around the world saw Yellowstone's wonders for the first time, 37 people from 15 countries around the world waited anxiously to become new U.S. Citizens.**

**Most of these people had waited years to take to become citizens of the United States. They studied the constitution, and passed a stringent test on it. Their reward? Citizenship in the United States of America, and part ownership of the nations' national parks.**

**STEVE: "And now they are yours. America's National Parks belong to every American Citizen."**

**They eagerly pledged allegiance to the flag, then could not resist joining in singing the national anthem. And then, took an oath:**

**"I hereby declare on oath."**

**To abandon allegiance to the countries from which they came, defend the constitution, and bear arms on behalf of the United States. One young man from Ukraine was already in Army uniform.**

**Maksym Gerasymenko signed up for duty in May, 2015.**

**MAKSYM: "It was my dream to become a member, U.S. Force member, of the army."**

**Gerasymenko says his unit will be eligible to ship out to Afghanistan soon.**

**"I feel proud being an American, and it's part of my dream and I feel like my dream was fulfilled."**

**Another immigrant from Peru was moved to tears. She had waited 30 years for citizenship.**

**YSABEL: "I appreciate it give me better life, this country."**

**PENNY: "This is only the third naturalization ceremony to take place in Yellowstone National Park"**

THE CASPER NORTH PLATTE RIVER REVIVAL PROJECT WILL CONTINUE SOON AND WORK WILL KICK OFF WITH A VOLUNTEER DAY THIS MONTH. LAST YEAR CREWS COMPLETED TWO OF THE SEVEN RIVER SITES WHICH CITY LEADERS HOPE TO REVITALIZE. CREWS BUILT A NEW RIVER BANK, INSTALLED ROCK STRUCTURES TO PREVENT EROSION, AND MOVED THE RIVER 80 FEET WEST AT MORAD PARK AND WYOMING BOULEVARD.

THE LIFE SAVING EPI PEN HAS MADE NATIONAL HEADLINES AFTER THE PRICE WAS RAISED FROM UNDER 60 DOLLARS IN 2007 TO 600 TODAY. BUT IN 2013, A MEDICAL SERVICES GROUP IN SEATTLE DEVELOPED A KIT WITH THE SAME LIFESAVING MEDICINE THAT COSTS ABOUT 20 BUCKS.

NEWS 13'S RAY BOGAN REPORTS HOW MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS IN CASPER ALSO TREAT ALLERGIC REACTIONS FOR A FRACTION OF THE PRICE.

IF YOU HAVE AN ALLERGIC REACTION IN NATRONA COUNTY AND WYOMING MEDICAL CENTER EMT'S ARRIVE, YOU WON'T BE TREATED WITH AN EPI PEN. INSTEAD YOU'LL RECEIVE AN EPINEPHRINE SHOT. THE EPINEPHRINE COSTS W-M-C LESS THAN A DOLLAR AND THE WHOLE PACKAGE WITH A SYRINGE, LESS THAN THREE DOLLARS.

ANGELENA POTTER: "Usually they'll start with a little bit of a scratch in the throat. Get hives, little blotchy spots all over their body. It could be isolated to the face, the trunk, the hands."

PARAMEDICS CRACK OPEN THE EPINEPHRINE, PUT IT INTO THE SYRINGE, WIPE DOWN EITHER THE LEG OR UPPER ARM AND INJECT.

"We like to give it in the upper arm in the very meaty tissue. Give it i-m, intermuscular. Sometimes they can get it in their leg which is where a person would usually give themselves an epi pen, where there's a lot of meat. And then the medication gets distributed throughout the body from that muscle."



PARAMEDICS CARRY MANY DRUGS IN THEIR MEDICAL KIT. IN ADDITION TO EPINEPHRINE THEY CARRY ADENOSINE FOR PEOPLE WITH RAPID HEART RATES, NITROGLYCERINE FOR PATIENTS HAVING A HEART ATTACK, BENADRYL, AND SPECIALTY MEDICATIONS FOR PEOPLE WITH CERTAIN DISORDERS. EPINEPHRINE TARGETS RECEPTORS THAT CAUSE THE REACTION.

“So an epinephrine is an H2 receptor. So what it does is it works on the receptors that the allergic reaction is causing the reaction at, it helps shut that down. What it also does is it vaso constricts the vessels and it helps slow that reaction down.”

SCHOOL OFFICIALS SAY THEY HAVE NEVER HAD TO WORRY ABOUT AMBULANCE RESPONSE TIMES BECAUSE THE HOSPITAL IS SO CLOSE TO WHERE THE FOOTBALL TEAMS PLAY.

Terry Snyder Superintendent School District: “We’re right across from the hospital, right across the street from the hospital and every other time that we’ve called it’s been two to three minutes, we had no need to have the ambulance at the field because the service was excellent.”

Reggie Miller Riverton High School Vice principal/Athletic Director: “Our hospital is only about 300 yards from the field and it was a perfect storm that night they had two ambulances in Riverton and they were both on a call and so there wasn’t one for us, there was one in lander that was on its way over but again that’s 30 minutes away.”

ATHLETIC TRAINERS FROM BOTH TEAMS MADE THE DECISION TO WAIT FOR AN AMBULANCE.

“The decision was made to not move the player until the medical attention arrived, not knowing what the circumstances were the player was in considerable pain.”

“Player safety is our number one priority and responsibility and so even though we didn’t have the ambulance there we do have an athletic trainer in place and that young man is very good at providing safety for our athletes.”

BECAUSE OF THIS INCIDENT, SCHOOL OFFICIALS DECIDED TO ALWAYS HAVE AN AMBULANCE AT THE SCENE OF ALL HOME GAMES SO PLAYERS SAFETY IS NEVER AGAIN COMPROMISED.

THE AIR INSIDE MIDWEST SCHOOL CONSTITUTED AN URGENT HEALTH HAZARD IN MAY WHEN OFFICIALS DECIDED TO EVACUATE THE SCHOOL. THIS ACCORDING TO A NEW GOVERNMENT REPORT RELEASED TODAY (MONDAY).

THE AGENCY FOR TOXIC SUBSTANCES AND DISEASE REGISTRY RELEASED A FORMAL REVIEW, WHICH FOUND AIR SAMPLES FROM INSIDE THE SCHOOL CONTAINED CARBON DIOXIDE LEVELS THAT EXCEEDED HEALTH GUIDELINES.

THE REVIEW ALSO SHOWED AREAS OF THE SCHOOL WERE OXYGEN-DEFICIENT. AIR SAMPLING FROM MAY AND JUNE SHOWED ACUTE LEVELS OF BENZENE, 200 TIMES RECOMMENDED LEVELS. EXPOSURE TO BENZENE CAN CAUSE BOTH SHORT-TERM AND LONG-TERM HEALTH PROBLEMS, INCLUDING DEATH AND AN INCREASED RISK OF CANCER.

MIDWEST SCHOOL HAS BEEN CLOSED INDEFINITELY SINCE IT WAS EVACUATED IN MAY. ABOUT 100 STUDENTS ARE BUSED INTO CASPER TO ATTEND CLASSES. SCHOOL DISTRICT EMPLOYEES PLAN TO HIRE AN INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT FOR ENVIRONMENTAL AND INDUSTRIAL HYGIENE BY OCTOBER FIRST TO PROVIDE MITIGATION ADVICE. BUT SOME PARENTS SHOWED UP TO TONIGHT'S (MONDAY) SCHOOL BOARD MEETING TO EXPRESS CONCERNS ABOUT HOW LONG THE PROCESS IS TAKING.

JUSTIN MARKER, PARENT OF DISPLACED STUDENTS: "Just like the School Board says, they're concerned for the safety of the kids, and so am I. I'm putting my kids on the bus as 6 o'clock in the morning, and 11 hours later they come home. We're all familiar with the Wyoming weather and I don't like the idea of having my kids on the road for 100 miles every day."

HAVE YOU EVER WANTED TO TRY BEAR SPRAY, BUT THOUGHT IT WAS TOO EXPENSIVE? PEOPLE CAN GET IT CHEAP OR FREE IN NORTHWEST WYOMING, WHERE GRIZZLY BEARS ARE ACTIVE RIGHT NOW. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS HUNTING ORGANIZATIONS, PRIVATE BUSINESSES, YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, AND WYOMING'S GAME AND FISH DEPARTMENT ARE WORKING TO MAKE SURE EVERYONE IS SAFE IN BEAR COUNTRY.

**In late August, hundreds of people saw a bear eating a buffalo in Yellowstone. This is the time grizzlies are very hungry, fattening up for hibernation.**

**It was in August just one year ago, when a lone hiker was killed by a grizzly about a half mile off the popular Elephant Back Loop Trail. Park officials killed the sow they believed was responsible.**

**This spring, Yellowstone officials announced a new campaign: Posters at park entrances remind visitor's to be vigilant in grizzly bear country, and to carry bear spray. This bear spray rental company opened for business before the Yellowstone hiker died, and got a lot of business right after the attack...but then business dropped off a lot.**



**SALLY:** “We had people that thought we were a gimmick. They just didn’t understand the need for bear spray, or just what it was.”

Sally Vering says the Park’s new bear aware campaign has boosted business, a lot.

“The Park’s message is extremely strong and helpful in getting the word out.”

When the campaign started, park scientists said only 28 percent of the park’s visitors were carrying bear spray in the backcountry.

**PENNY:** “Earlier in the season, when we asked hikers here why they weren’t carrying bear spray. One woman said, ‘I guess I’m just too cheap’. When you think about it, paying \$50 for something you hope you never have to use can be a little bit expensive.”

But, Vering’s company rents the spray for less than ten dollars a can a day. If ten dollars is cheaper than fifty, then free is even cheaper.

Wyoming’s Game and Fish Department, gave 100 cans of bear spray to hunters in less than an hour last September. They’re going to do it again this year, 8 a.m. sharp, September 20th, They’re not just protecting hunters. They’re protecting bears.

“Wyoming Outdoorsmen, Yellowstone Country Bear Hunters’ Association, have really stepped up to reduce human caused bear mortality.”

Builders are still putting up new houses in Cody, but there are a lot of for sale signs around town. Is the market slow in Wyoming? When we put that question to members of the Wyoming Real Estate Commission, they said it depends on where you live. Commission Chair Randall Hall.

Randall Hall, Commission Chair: "I was talking to a broker today in Buffalo. He's closing his business. They had 70 sales there last year, and 44 agents in the market. So, that would be considered pretty damn soft."

While the commissioners mentioned some reasonably stable markets, like Casper...most seemed to think the weak energy market, and pending presidential election are suppressing sales. One commissioner remarked Wyoming has survived boom and bust housing markets before, and

"We just, keep on."

Penny Preston, Reporting: "If you want to sell your own house, what do you do? One of the commission members mentioned that in her market, reasonably priced houses still sell pretty quickly. But, if you own a starter castle, you may be in trouble."

Ray Elser, Retired Chair Wyoming Real Estate Commission: "Residential sales above three million dollars year to date is off about nineteen percent."

Ray Elser has been selling homes in the Jackson area since 1980. He says prices there are back up to the 2005-2006 levels. But, the number of sales are way down in luxury resort markets all over the country,

"Aspen was reporting that their year to date number of sales transactions was off 44 percent."

Elser says similar drops are being reported in the Hamptons and Miami, and no one seems to know the exact cause.

"Is it the presidential election? All we can really say is people are being very cautious."

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A STATE FARM AGENT SAYS WYOMING RANKS 8TH IN THE COUNTRY FOR THE MOST DEER COLLISIONS - UP FOUR POSITIONS FROM THE PREVIOUS YEAR. THIS MEANS WYOMING DRIVERS ARE NEARLY 20 PERCENT MORE LIKELY TO COLLIDE WITH A DEER THAN LAST YEAR.

A GAME AND FISH BIOLOGIST SAYS WHILE THE WYOMING DEER POPULATION IN IS UP SLIGHTLY... DEER COLLISIONS HAVE A LOT TO DO WITH DRIVER'S INATTENTION TO ROADSIDE DEER. THE RAIN IN LATE SUMMER TO EARLY FALL WILL COLLECT IN ROAD DITCHES, WHICH ATTRACTS DEER TO GREENER GRASS NEAR THE HIGHWAY.

**Brian Olsen: "During the fall early winter those deer will migrate down corridors and a lot of times they will be crossing highways in larger numbers so people need to be aware that this time of year you'll see deer and other wildlife closer to highways in the state":15**

FERAL AND STRAY CATS ARE A BIG ISSUE IN WYOMING. JUST LAST YEAR, METRO ANIMAL HOUSED OVER 13-HUNDRED CATS, OVER 250 WERE FERAL. THIS YEAR, METRO HAS TAKEN OVER 900 CATS, SEVEN PERCENT OF THEM HAVE BEEN RETURNED TO THEIR OWNERS. THEY CAN SPREAD RABIES, BE A DANGER TO LITTLE KIDS, AND CAN KILL OTHER ANIMALS LIKE SONG BIRDS AND RABBITS.

**TORY WALSH: "Metro Animal Services encourages people to keep their cats indoor for one it keeps them safe it keeps them healthy they certainly live longer inside an average of 15 years as opposed to 2 or 4 for an outdoor cat"**

WALSH DISCOURAGES ANYONE FROM FEEDING STRAY ANIMALS BECAUSE IT COULD ATTRACT MORE DANGEROUS ANIMALS LIKE BEARS, MOUNTAIN LIONS, OR RACCOONS THAT COULD HAVE RABIES. IF YOU SEE A STRAY CAT, YOU CAN ALSO GET A TRAP ON-LINE OR FROM METRO ANIMAL SERVICES.

**Rick: "We had a school, Sagewood, who got word that there was a potential gas leak."**

**SCHOOL OFFICIALS EVACUATED SAGEWOOD AND BUSSED STUDENTS AND STAFF TO NEARBY ALTA VISTA PARK.**

Angela: "Well, I just got, yeah, I just got actually a text saying come down here, and I didn't know why, just that the students had been evacuated."

**AFTER STUDENTS AND STAFF WAITED IN THE PARK FOR ABOUT 45 MINUTES, SCHOOL AUTHORITIES BUSSED THE STUDENTS TO MANOR HEIGHTS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TO AVOID RAINY, WINDY CONDITIONS. SCHOOL OFFICIALS NOTIFIED PARENTS THEY COULD PICK UP THEIR CHILDREN THERE.**

John: "But we decided to come get him. It's kind of scary; you know, a gas leak, so."

Dirk Gosnell Wind River Science Teacher: "We clean skulls, we take them fresh from the hunters, through a process of using bugs to clean them and cleaning and whitening processes and we come out with a finished product."

Ceatriss Wall Wind River High School Principal: "Alligators from Florida, we've had brown bears from Canada, Alaska, caribou, a few years ago the class did a grizzly bear and a wolf."

THE CLASS IS RUN LIKE A BUSINESS. HUNTERS PAY FOR THE SKULL CLEANING AND STUDENTS TAKE CARE OF THE REST, TO TEACH THEM HOW A SMALL BUSINESS IS RUN.

"We talk about utilities and rental. If this was our business, what would it cost to rent a building like this and what would the utilities be and if we had people coming in to work for us how would we determine what we would pay those people."

Rohnnie Ward Freshmen Skull Cleaner: "It gets me ready for it and then I know, I'm already experienced with what I need to do so it's a good thing for me to have this class because I don't have to go through it the first time I go with my business."

THE MONEY EARNED GOES TO REPLENISHING SUPPLIES; ANY EXTRA IS PUT TOWARDS CHARITIES AND COLLEGE EDUCATION.

"Anybody who is in the bugs and bones class they get 250 dollars per year towards a scholarship and obviously they have to enroll and prove enrollment for in the college and they send that to us."

"They pick a family or an organization to donate to and in the past they've done like the Dubois, the town of Dubois when they had their tragic fire, we've done the Chance Phelps Foundation, we've done our own students who have had medical emergencies in their life."

THE JOB IS A SMELLY ONE. BUT STUDENTS ENJOY ITS REALNESS.

"I love skinning, right now I'm in the middle of skinning an antelope, skinning I think is very fun to me. I get to get down and get dirty you know, there's only two girls in the class so it's kind of cool sometimes when you show up the boys and everything."
