"The Ranger and the Serial Killer" – an interview with Texas Ranger James Holland. Over the last year and a half, Holland coaxed serial killer Samuel Little to confess to ninety-three murders. Undetected for nearly half a century, Little was a drifter from Ohio who the FBI are now calling the most prolific serial killer in U.S. history. Little preyed on those at the fringes of society, allowing him to go unnoticed. After a suspicious cold case prompted his further inquiry into Little, Holland enabled judges and prosecutors across the country to close long-standing cases by speaking to Little over the course of seven hundred hours of interviews. By making Little comfortable, Holland was rewarded with detailed stories and drawings of the victims, all of whom Little says he still remembers vividly. Includes interviews with Damien, victim Denise Brother's son; Christie Palazzolo of the FBI and Angela Williamson of Department of Justice, violent crimes analysts; District Attorney Bobby Bland; and a phone interview with Little. 48 HOURS: "Dead Ringer" - a report about former pro boxer Ramon Sosa, the potential victim in a murder-for-hire scheme, who with the help of law enforcement agents, managed to survive -- all the while setting up a sting operation to catch those responsible. Sosa owned the popular Woodlands Boxing and Fitness in Montgomery County, Texas. He had a family and a beautiful second wife who helped him run their booming business. After six years together, things began to sour between Sosa and his wife -- he learned of a divorce attorney and missing money from the business. And then someone wanted him dead. A friend of Sosa's named Mundo, who worked out at the gym, overheard Sosa's wife Lulu and was sure she had murder on her mind. They came up with a sting operation to protect the boxer, in which Mundo posed as a hit man. When they had evidence, they contacted the police, who then took over the case. Mundo still played along, agreeing to kill Sosa, and provided photographic proof of the death. Police staged the death scene, with Sosa's "dead body" photographed in a ditch with a bullet hole in the head. Lulu Sosa was arrested, and claimed she was innocent. She was charged with solicitation of capital murder. After 15 months, she gave up the fight and agreed to a plea deal to reduced charges and twenty years in prison. 48 HOURS SUSPICION: "The Tiger King Mystery" (10:00 – 11:00p) – a report on the disappearance of Don Lewis, whose body has never been found. A self-made millionaire, he was married to Carole Lewis. Together they ran "Wildlife on Easy Street" in Tampa, Florida -- billed as an exhibit space for big cats. In August 1997, Don vanished while supposedly traveling to Costa Rica. Though Carole was not an official suspect, his ex-wife, daughters, and other friends and associates were suspicious and claimed that Carole and Don's marriage was troubled. Carole had Don declared legally dead in 2002. In 2004, Carole Lewis became Carole Baskin when she married attorney and businessman Howard Baskin. With his help, Carole changed the name and mission of the animal exhibit; now called "Big Cat Rescue", it is a sanctuary focusing on animal rights. Interest was renewed in Don's disappearance due to the Netflix series "Tiger King", which chronicles an Oklahoma-based, eccentric big-cat owner named Joseph Schreibvogel, better known as Joe Exotic, and his battle with Carole who sought to shut him down. Throughout the series and on his own YouTube channel, Joe, the self-proclaimed Tiger King, alleged Carole had murdered Don in 1997 and fed him to their tigers. In 2019, Joe was convicted and sent to prison for, among other things, hiring a hitman to kill Carole. Currently, there are no suspects in the disappearance of Don Lewis. **On-screen text graphic:** If you have any information, please call the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office at (813) 247-8200. 48 HOURS: "Home Renovation Homicide" - a report on the murder of Shanti Cooper in Orlando, FL, for which her husband Dave Tronnes is suspected, allegedly over the ownership of a house undergoing years of renovations. In 2013, Shanti Cooper began an online relationship with Dave Tronnes that quickly blossomed. After just a few months, Dave moved from Minneapolis, MN to Orlando, FL to be with her. In 2015 the pair would move to a new home and begin renovations, which Shanti paid for. Keith Ori, host of a house-flipping television show, had difficulty getting the two to appear on camera together. According to prosecutor Ryan Vescio, the animosity came from Dave's refusal to make Shanti a beneficiary to the trust that owned that house, effectively making him the sole owner. On April 24th, Dave called 911 after returning home in the afternoon and finding Shanti dead in the bathtub. In the lengthy police interview that followed, detectives questioned inconsistencies in his story: Shanti had numerous injuries on her person inconsistent with falling; there was no water on her or around the tub; and there was blood on the bed, which Dave dismissed as being from Shanti's period. An autopsy would later find strangulation as the cause of death. Dave agreed to a polygraph, but due to the late hours, police could not find anyone to administer one and released him. Searching for a motive, police received a tip that Dave was a member at a local bathhouse and interviewed an employee who claimed to have seen Dave having sex with another patron. Dave maintained that Shanti was killed in a robbery and cited her missing diamond engagement ring as proof. In August 2018, Dave was arrested for Shanti's murder. A search of the home he was staying at produced the missing ring. In November 2018, police interviewed Dave's ex-wife, Carole, about her health conditions, which her loved one suspected was from Dave poisoning her. Carole denied this. A surveillance camera that police had set up at the couple's property captured footage of investigators hired by Dave's original defense team. Those lawyers eventually revealed to Vescio that they had two pieces of evidence that had been removed from the house: bedsheets with Shanti's blood on them and a green cord. Tests could not determine if the cord was used to strangle Shanti. Police would also interview Edward Gismondi, who met Dave in a jail housing unit. Gismondi stated that Dave told him how certain hallucinogens could be used to poison a person's food. He also told police Dave confessed to killing Shanti after she found messages on his phone pointing to an affair. However, police were unable to corroborate Gismondi's claims. In 2019 Ryan Vescio left his position as a prosecutor and became counsel for Shanti's estate in order to make sure her assets went to her son. Dave is awaiting trial. 48 HOURS: "The Final Hours of Cayley Mandadi" - a report on the murder of a Trinity College student Cayley Mandadi, allegedly by one of the two men she was involved with. In October 2017, Cayley Mandadi was rushed to the emergency room by Mark Howerton, a man she had been having a relationship with. After leaving a music festival and having sex, Mark claimed she stopped breathing. Medical staff were unable to revive Cayley. Three months later, an autopsy concluded she had died from blunt force trauma to the face and head, leading to Mark's arrest for murder and sexual assault. At trial, the prosecution presented witnesses from the night at the emergency room that noted bruises on Cayley's legs and redness on Mark's hands, and cited the fact that Mark had changed his story about where he and Cayley had sex. Friends of Cayley and a Trinity College security officer testified about Mark's violent outbursts, including an incident that led to him being barred from campus. Jett Birchum, the other man Cayley had been involved with, testified that Cayley had agreed to break up with Mark at the music festival and that he witnessed Mark forcing her to leave with him. Mark's attorney, John Hunter, questioned Jett's credibility as he had given different testimony in court than he had to police and the grand jury. He also pressed Jett on the immunity deal he made with prosecutors over Jett's alleged involvement in dealing drugs. Defense witnesses rebuked the autopsy: a forensic pathologist stated a skull fracture was consistent with a fall and a pharmacology expert testified that the large amount of MDMA in Cayley's system could have led to hemorrhages and bruising. After 10 hours of deliberation over two days, a mistrial was declared. However, the prosecution plans to retry the case. 48 HOURS SUSPICION: "The Case Against Mary Katherine Higdon" (10:00 – 11:00p) – a report on the case against Mary Katherine Higdon, who killed her boyfriend Steven Freeman at their home in Griffin, Georgia. On August 1, 2018, Mary Katherine called 911 and told first responders she shot Steven by accident – saying that when she handed him the gun, it went off. At the police station, Mary Katherine allegedly changed her story and confessed to murder. However, there were problems with the police investigation: the audio on the tape was impossible to hear due to a feedback hum and first responders moved the gun found next to Steven. Nevertheless, the prosecution believed they had a strong case based on the forensic evidence. The trial began in June 2019; both the prosecution and defense claimed abuse. Ultimately, the jury sided with the defense and Mary Katherine was found not guilty on all charges. On-screen text graphic: Mary Katherine Higdon has moved to another state. 48 HOURS: "The Corn Rake Murder" - a report on the death of Amy Mullis from a farming accident for which her husband is suspected, though he maintains it was a freak accident. In November 2018, Amy Mullis was found dead by her son, Trysten, in a shed on the family farm. She had apparently been killed by a corn rake used on the farm. After an investigation her husband, Todd Mullis, was arrested for Amy's murder. The autopsy showed a pattern of puncture wounds that indicated Amy had been struck with the corn rake multiple times. Other injuries she had also indicated she had been in a struggle. Police investigations turned up an affair that Amy had in the past. The couple reconciled, but Amy agree to leave her job and work on the farm, allegedly so Todd could keep an eye on her. Friends testified that Amy was unhappy. Eventually she would begin another affair with the farm's manager, Jerry Frasher, which Todd found out about. Todd's alibi was that he had been working in a barn with Trysten before his son found Amy's body. However, Trysten would amend his story, adding that he went to the office at the front of the barn a few times. At trial, the prosecution maintained this allowed opportunity for Todd to commit the murder. They also cited that surveillance cameras around the property were not working the day of Amy's death and suspicious internet searches related to infidelity and murder. Todd countered that there had been no surveillance footage for weeks before the murder, possible due to animals damaging it, and that the device the searches were made on was accessible to the entire family. After jury deliberations, Todd was found guilty. He filed a motion for a new trial based on the fact that his original attorneys did not focus on presenting Amy's death as an accident as he pushed for. He was 21-years-old. Six years after Kevin's murder, local police brought in the FBI to work the case. Detectives eventually ruled out the possibility of mistaken identity and are now convinced Kevin was the intended target. They have narrowed down the list of suspects and believe that Desmond Carter, an aspiring rapper and jealous rival who was supposed to meet Kevin at the studio that night, may be connected to the murder. Arrested in 2017, he was never charged and denies any involvement. Detectives feel that they are very close, but need information and -- along with Kevin's family -- remain convinced Kevin's murder will be solved. **On-screen text graphic:** The FBI is asking for information from the public.
