### **Section I. Issues**

The stations have identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- A. **Food Insecurity:** A lack of nutritious, accessible food continues to be a challenge to many in New Hampshire and Maine. Organizations such as Full Plates, Full Potential, Rise Against Hunger and the South Portland Food Cupboard are working to provide nutrition to those in need.
- B. **Mental Health Issues:** There is a great need for affordable mental health services for people of all ages in our listening area. Non-profits such as: The Yellow Tulip Project, Jammin' for Mental Health and the Salvation Army offer programs to residents of Maine and New Hampshire.
- C. **Foster Care/Adoption:** There is a huge need in both Maine and New Hampshire for foster parents and permanent families for children. The opioid crisis has resulted in unsafe homes and incarcerated parents; leading to children being removed from their homes. Organizations such as Adoptive and Foster Families of Me. Inc. and the Maine Kinship Program provide training and support.
- D. **LGBTQ Issues:** The LGBTQ communities in Maine and New Hampshire are gearing up to celebrate Pride Month, and non-profits such as Portland Outright and the Yellow Tulip Project provide support year round. Some issues affecting this community include: homelessness, health care and discrimination.
- E. **Education:** Our students in Maine and New Hampshire are benefitting from programs provided by non-profit organizations and events such as STEM Expo, Valley Food Fight and Sandcastle Clinical and Educational Services.
