CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Many people who become infected with COVID-19 experience a number of health problems months and even years after they test negative again. These include fatigue, brain fog, and difficulty breathing, varying in severity. It's a condition called Long COVID. Often, it affects people who had only a mild case of COVID and in some people is much worse than the initial infection. The CDC estimates one in three people who had COVID-19 suffers from some degree of Long COVID. Therefore, the Department of Health and Human Services is starting an urgent new push to research this mysterious condition and help the millions of Americans who are struggling with it, to include by providing doctors with guidelines for treating Long COVID and maintaining access to insurance coverage. Currently, the causes of Long COVID are not yet well understood and treatment largely focuses on helping patients cope with their symptoms. This new initiative hopes to change that. Dr. Marjorie Roberts has been suffering from Long COVID for nearly two years. She told CBN News during that time her life has gradually diminished from the successful and healthy woman she was before contracting COVID-19. She experiences a number of health problems she never had before becoming infected with COVID. Shelby Body told CBN News her Long COVID made it impossible for her to work. The wife and mother of two says before COVID she was full of energy. Neuroscientist Dr. Henry Mahncke, CEO of Posit Science told CBN News the increased focus on Long COVID is warranted. Mahncke points to research suggesting the brains of Long COVID patients share commonalities with those of people with "chemo brain" and Alzheimer's Disease. Researchers found that people who had COVID-19 were about 40% more likely to develop diabetes within a year after recovering, compared to people who had not been infected with the virus. CDC Director Dr. Rochelle Walensky noted the increased diabetes risk for COVID survivors at a White House COVID Response Team press briefing this month. Diana Berrent founded Survivor Corp an organization that offers support for people with Long COVID. So while for the last two years, much of the focus of the COVID-19 pandemic has been preventing illness, hospitalization, and death, the medical community is now turning its attention to another facet of the pandemic, Long COVID, a mysterious condition that for some people, is worse than their initial infection.

CBN Reporter Gary Lane Reports: Inflation has already hit 40-year highs, stretching pocketbooks and causing hardship for many Americans. Some economists call it inflation shock, accompanied by dreaded predictions of a recession. The Federal Reserve is responding by raising interest rates. Forbes media CEO and former Republican presidential candidate Steve Forbes believes the Fed's efforts to cool down the economy may only make matters worse. In his new book, "Inflation: What It Is, Why It's Bad and How to Fix It," Forbes provides readers with an easy-to-understand primer on inflation. He says skyrocketing price increases are only the symptoms, not the cause of inflation. Forbes blames out-of-control spending as one cause. Americans have seen the national debt triple since President Obama entered office in January 2009 and it now stands at more than \$30 trillion. Forbes points to a concept embraced by Congress and the president called a modern monetary theory. What about non-monetary inflation? A COVID outbreak caused China's communist government to confine Shanghai residents to their homes during the month of April and that led to a slowdown in manufacturing. Shanghai is a manufacturing hub and home to the world's largest port. Similar lockdowns are already underway in parts of Beijing. So, how might that affect the global supply chain and prices here in the United States? Will prices of food and consumer products jump even more due to lack of availability? Forbes believes Americans need to be prepared for worse inflation in the months ahead. Forbes stands by his long-held belief in returning to the gold standard, an action that would restore a strong U.S. economy and keep inflation down. He believes tying the dollar to gold would stabilize the dollar and guarantee that its value wouldn't change. For 180 years, the value of the dollar had been tied to gold until the 1970s when President Richard Nixon ended the policy and implemented a series of wage and price controls. As individuals seek to protect their money and investments, they could be tempted to look to cryptocurrency. Forbes, however, prefers Stablecoins over Bitcoin. But Forbes sees a time coming when Stablecoins could compete with government money like the U.S. dollar, British sterling, Japanese Yen, or the Euro. And what about the flat tax? When Forbes ran for president in both 1996 and 2000, he proposed that the government adopt a simple, single rate of taxation. He said he still believes that would help Americans and stabilize the economy.

CBN Washington Correspondent Jenna Browder Reports: During the pandemic, millions of children spent months learning online. Studies show that American kids spend a huge chunk of the day there, and not just for school. For some, it's become an addiction. That's why Molly DeFrank tells CBN News it's time for a digital detox. Her new book, "Digital Detox: The Two Week Tech Reset for Kids" was inspired by her own family and their experience. The book begins by taking parents step by step through a two-week cold turkey detox for their children. She says it comes down to brain chemistry. Too much screen time creates excessive levels of dopamine in the brain, the kind that can be addicting. For kids, it's a problem that can follow them well into their adult lives. The second half of her book helps parents develop a long-term strategy using their observations from the detox period. So how often should parents do a digital detox? DeFrank says it's different for every family and child. For most families, like hers, it's not about eliminating technology, just making sure it's in its right place. Her own children are a testament to that. In just two weeks, she says they were free from the grip of technology, moods, shifted, creativity exploded, and they learned how to entertain themselves and enjoy life without screens. And it's not just for kids, DeFrank adds. Adults too can benefit from a digital detox.

CBN Washington Correspondent Jenna Browder Reports: The summer travel season is off to a turbulent start. Since Thursday more than 5,000 flights have been canceled, leaving thousands of travelers in limbo. Canceled flights and stranded passengers turned the holiday weekend into a travel nightmare. Airlines cited bad weather, but industry experts point to a deeper problem: a major pilot and crew shortage caused by the pandemic. The question now: why is this happening, and how long could it last? More than two years after the pandemic began, travelers are ready to move and that's despite the cost. Airfare is up 47 percent since January. Industry experts say the problem is multi-pronged, blaming severe weather and a pilot and flight crew shortage that hasn't caught up from COVID layoffs. Those same experts point out that demand has roared back faster than airlines have been able to hire. United's chief executive Scott Kirby lays some of the blame on a staffing shortage at FAA traffic control towers. The FAA has acknowledged personnel gaps at a few locations due to COVID but says there's not a nationwide shortage. Major U.S airlines are now cutting flights in July and August, hoping the situation improves. However, analysts say the July Fourth weekend is "not looking good." The airlines have lost thousands of pilots, many of whom were fired or laid off during the pandemic, and training them takes years. For that reason, experts say these delays and cancellations could go into next year.

In 2017, it began the nationwide initiative known as Second Chance Month, to help celebrate those who have paid their debt to society. For Sammy Perez, life was hard growing up. He spent nearly ten years of his behind bars, starting when he was just a child. During his last time in prison, an encounter with God transformed Perez's life. Despite that change, he faced many hurdles after his release. It is one problem that Prison Fellowship seeks to eliminate with the recognition of second chance month. According to Prison Fellowship, 1 in 3 Americans have some form of criminal record and face about 44,000 legal barriers to success once they are out of prison. By partnering with other faith groups to celebrate second chances, Prison Fellowship hopes to erase some of those barriers. Presidents Joe Biden and Donald Trump have acknowledged the effort, reaffirming the importance of helping formerly incarcerated people to reenter society. It is recognition that Prison Fellowship applauds while admitting that more needs to be done. Grateful for his chance, Perez now serves on staff at Prison Fellowship, recruiting volunteers for the ministry's advocacy work so others can follow his path.

A desperate Putin may escalate this crisis drastically. In America, gas and food prices have skyrocketed. Inflation continues to soar. Household budgets are under stress. The economic ripple effect of the senseless actions of Vladimir Putin has the world on edge. Since the invasion of Ukraine, oil prices have risen steeply. If Russia were to halt exports in retaliation to western sanctions, they could significantly rise even further. The sharp rise in the prices of things from oil, and metals, to wheat, has increased the cost of many everyday items, from food, to heating, to gas. Grocery prices have gone up. Americans are feeling pain at the gas pumps. US inflation could hit double digits in the coming months putting further pressure on household budgets to combat the country's highest inflation in four decades. The federal reserves raised interest rates for the first time since 2018, with inflation likely to stay elevated in part because of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The Fed is planning for multiple interest rate hikes. The American dream of home ownership could become even more elusive. As Christians, how are we to react to these economic challenges? Does the Bible offer solutions to the hardships plaguing society today? Join Bobby Schuller and Shawn Bolz, as they discuss the pressing matters of our day from a Christian worldview. CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: President Joe Biden is tapping into the U.S. strategic oil reserve in hopes of bringing down gas prices. At 1 million barrels a day, it's the largest withdrawal in history. Critics say the move is risky and won't do much at the pump. They point to the administration's energy policies as the real culprit. The move comes as gas prices have already been skyrocketing for weeks. The national average for a gallon of gas now sits at a staggering \$4.22. Whether there will be relief or more pressure on consumers already suffering from high inflation remains uncertain. President Biden is trying to blame the high prices mainly on Russia. While the pandemic and the war in Ukraine do play a role, some point to the president's domestic policies for the drop in U.S. oil production. They say that's why gas prices had already risen substantially long before the Russian invasion. Biden is also trying to blame U.S. oil and gas companies, suggesting the country should penalize them for not producing enough. The former senior policy advisor to the Secretary of Energy for the Trump administration, Victoria Coates, contends the issues started as soon as Biden took office. Coates is now with the American Foreign Policy Council and says Biden's plan will punish the infrastructure desperately needed for national security. There are also concerns that Biden's plan will reduce oil reserves to the lowest level since 1984, leaving the U.S. vulnerable to further shortages in the case of future emergencies. Meanwhile, lawmakers debate other short-term relief efforts. Congress is considering suspending the federal gas tax while states like Georgia and Maryland have already put a temporary halt to theirs. But some lawmakers compare the move to putting a small band-aid on an open wound. And say it could take months before we see prices begin to level out. On the street, driver's just want the problem fixed. In California and Chicago, gas giveaways had people line up for hours just to feel some relief.

The gambling ads seem to come from all directions, and legalized sports betting opened the floodgates. The industry is booming with more than \$52 billion wagered last year alone, according to the data intelligence agency, Morning Consult. Thirty states, D.C., and Puerto Rico have given the okay, providing access to numerous available betting platforms. As many as 10 million Americans live with a gambling addiction. Paul Batura with Focus on the Family says all the marketing and promotion of gambling leads to increased problems for individuals, families, and society. This year's March Madness will generate the most betting in tournament history: 45 million Americans are expected to wager more than \$3 billion, according to Axios Sports. Still, Christians aren't universally against it. Not even 40% think sports betting is morally wrong, according to Lifeway Research. So Christian leaders hope to uncover gambling's ugly truth and teach God-honoring ways to protect your money and family. Reports show apps like Sky Bet, one of the industry's most popular, have adopted invasive tracking and profiling techniques to identify problem gamblers. The result? Gamblers dive deeper into the gambling rabbit hole. Ally says that to break the chains of gambling addiction, we first need to learn the biblical approach to handling money. That can lead to growing wealth in healthy ways. To help, he's giving away a resource and a 9-hour course on his Timothy Plan website. Art says the church's approach to stewardship, in general, is giving, which is why he teaches about spending, saving, and investing with integrity – to hopefully transforms lives.

CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: The cost of new and used cars are already sky-high due to COVID shortages, and they're expected to climb even higher as the war in Ukraine creates new limits on materials, straining the supply chain. For more than a year, the global auto industry has struggled with COVID-related production and supply issues, ranging from a shortage in micro-chips to delayed delivery. The war now threatens to magnify the problem and prices. So, while your current ride is likely worth more, you could be in for a rude awakening when you need a new one. For instance, electric wiring made in Ukraine, critical to the car industry, is now much more difficult to get. Essential Russian exports could also be cut off due to sanctions. That's led to production stoppages and slowdowns at factories in Europe, and analysts say it could be headed our way next year. They're estimating global car production will be down by two to three million cars in 2022 and 2023. For the consumer, it means higher prices not just for new cars, but used as well. Sticker shock is spreading among used car buyers, hoping for a bargain. Three-year-old vehicles took the biggest jump at almost 40%. Edmunds researchers point out the Dodge Caravan and Porsche Cayenne are leading the pack. Families are paying nearly double the listed price from last year. Dan Banister, President of Banister Automotive in Maryland and Virginia, says while now is a good time to sell your car, you'll pay more to replace it. On the bright side, you're likely to get a higher trade-in value to help with the price difference. More than 80% of car buyers paid more than the sticker price for new vehicles in January (Edmunds). Compare that to 3% last year. That's already happening. The Federal Reserve raised interest rates for the first time since 2018, with more hikes ahead in the coming months to cool inflation. This all leaves the future of car prices a bit uncertain. Other considerations include record-breaking gas prices and insurance, depending on where you live. More than a dozen states have approved rate increases since November 2021, according to S&P Global Market Intelligence.

CBN Reporter Heather Sells Reports: On a 1,000-acre parcel of rural land near Columbus lies the beginning of a technology investment that could begin to reverse America's semi-conductor chip storage. It's also expected to create an enormous opportunity for tech workers in the Midwest, potentially turning the region into what advocates are calling a "Silicon Heartland." The semiconductor giant Intel announced the \$20 billion investment earlier this year. It will begin construction on two chip factories in late 2022 with the promise of 3,000 Intel jobs, 7,000 construction jobs, and tens of thousands of extra long-term jobs in the region. Gov. Mike DeWine calls the project a "great victory" and recently told CBN News it demonstrates that the heartland is capable of attracting top tech investment and talent. The Intel investment is a bold departure from a growing concentration of tech companies in major coastal cities. A 2019 Brookings Institution report found that from 2005 to 2017, five urban areas dominated the nation's innovation sector employment growth: Seattle, Boston, San Francisco, San Diego, and San Jose. The report detailed the economic disparity among regions. Mark Muro, one of the report's authors, told CBN News there's concern about the regional imbalance. The Intel investment, he said, begins to change that trajectory. Kenny McDonald, president of the Columbus Partnership, helped lead the economic development team that worked to bring Intel to the region. Laura Tussing is a regional president at Park National Bank in Newark, Ohio, right near the Intel site. She's already using the catchphrase "Silicon heartland," and has begun to zero in on the new businesses that Intel will bring, along with new families and a new culture where high-tech jobs can be found at home. The Intel project is also expected to bring critical momentum to America's fragile semiconductor industry, which has moved overseas in large part. A Brookings analysis shows the U.S. share of worldwide semiconductor manufacturing has steadily declined from 37 percent in 1990 to 12 percent in 2020. Many economic and political analysts believe that's eroded U.S. manufacturing innovation and national security. For now, McDonald and his economic development team are focused on paving the way for Intel to move in. The "new game" includes building the chip factories, sourcing and training the workforce, and creating communities around them that maintain a high quality of life.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: Experts are warning that the world faces a historic famine. The war in Ukraine is only one of many problems plaguing the global distribution of food. In Yemen, Ghalib al-Najjar skips meals so that his children have enough food. In the months ahead, experts warn food is going to be harder to find in many more nations. A perfect storm of several problems is decimating the world food supply. It's been called the biggest food crisis since World War Two. The World Food Program estimates that 285 million people face starvation. The head of the World Food Program, former South Carolina Governor David Beasley, says the world food supply already faced a catastrophe before the war in Ukraine. In the U.S., Americans have seen food costs rise 10 percent over last year, the steepest increase in 40 years, which experts say will lead to an increase in malnutrition among America's poor. In the developing world, however, it's become a matter of life and death. Russia and Ukraine together produce almost one-third of the world's wheat. But Ukrainian farmers have been sidelined and Russian exports have been sanctioned. And the war in Ukraine is only the latest of many problems to hit the world food supply. Food costs were already high from soaring inflation and fuel costs. Fertilizer prices were 40 percent higher than before the invasion of Ukraine, which, along with high fuel prices, make it too expensive for some farmers to plant crops this year. Add to that a drought that damaged this spring's U.S. winter wheat harvest. In China, severe flooding late last year wrecked the wheat harvest and has the communist government trying to buy up as much of the world supply as possible. And now a growing list of nations, including Argentina, Russia, Ukraine, Moldova, Hungary, and Serbia, have banned agricultural exports to other nations. Rev. Eugene Cho, president and CEO of Bread For the World says the U.S. needs to do more to fight global hunger, asking Congress to approve \$3.8 billion in supplemental emergency funding. Even Africa's wealthiest nation faces a food crisis, according to Nigerian Agri-investor Imal Silva, who told us a majority of Nigerians are facing malnutrition. Beasley warns that the world's food crisis could spiral into a political crisis.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: Soaring inflation is hitting Americans hard as energy costs rose 11% in March, and groceries jumped another 1.5%. Most of us don't remember inflation this bad, and for good reason. It's not been this severe since the 1980s. On Tuesday, the Labor Department announced consumer prices jumped by 8.5% last month, the fastest clip since 1981. Then on Wednesday, it reported that wholesale prices – the Producer Price Index – climbed 11.2% last month from a year earlier. Economist Dr. Steven Skancke has worked for multiple administrations. He says rising energy prices and Russia's war on Ukraine have literally fueled our inflation. Energy prices are up 36 percent, compared to a year ago. That, plus pandemic-induced supply shortages, have whiplashed the U.S. economy and left many families in the lurch. Skancke says there's some bright spots. Core prices show supply chain issues are beginning to improve and business investment is growing. Worldwide, however, there's no encouragement around these issues. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen says 275 million people face acute food insecurity. In Washington next week, the World Bank and IMF will focus on these food shortages, rising inflation, and how they could worsen global political unrest.

CBN Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: As inflation rises, the cost of living is getting out of reach. Monthly rent is skyrocketing, causing many to scramble for an affordable place to live. According to Realtor.com, rent prices recently hit a national average of \$1,792 in the country's 50 largest metropolitan areas. That is a 17 percent increase over 2021. It's an issue that poses a big problem for many renters. For the past few years, Antonio and Shakia Matthews of Newport News, Virginia, have dreamed of buying a new home for their growing family. The cost of housing, however, put that dream on hold, causing the couple to continue renting. It is a move they discovered would also increase more than they expected, especially for the living space they need. Finding an apartment within their budget proved to be a challenge for the Matthews. It is an issue renters are facing nationwide. According to Rent.com, 48 states have seen a significant spike in average rent prices. Zillow reports that from February of last year, Miami-Fort Lauderdale saw a 32% spike in rent from \$2,173 to \$2,871. Phoenix, Arizona saw rent prices jump from \$1,507 to \$1,884. And in Austin, Texas, the average rent skyrocketed from \$1,467 to nearly \$1,800 a month. Brian Carberry, the senior managing editor at Rent.com, pointed to several reasons for the increased rates, such as supply and demand. Carberry said another key factor is rising inflation. It is an expense Carberry said renters should expect for some time. Meanwhile, the Matthews eventually found an apartment, still \$400 over their original budget. Even so, they are grateful for a place to call home.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Before the COVID-19 pandemic even began, America began experiencing a health care worker shortage that's only grown in the last two years. This supply and demand imbalance is expected to get worse unless something changes. A major reason for this crisis is the record number of elderly people in America. This huge geriatric generation is experiencing ever-increasing medical needs. To make matters worse, the large number of health care workers in this age group are retiring in large numbers. Becky Sawyer, executive vice president for Sentara Healthcare, which employs 28,000 health care professionals in Virginia, North Carolina, and Ohio, told CBN News the health care worker shortage is built-in to the country's changing demographics. However, the health care worker shortage isn't just about aging baby boomers. Even before the pandemic, many people left the industry before retirement age due to high burnout rates. The pandemic only deepened this trend. Nearly 20 percent of health care professionals left their jobs in the last two years. Caitlin Krouse, DNP, an Indiana nurse practitioner, and health policy advocate, told CBN News that the pandemic created unprecedented stress levels for all health care workers, the relentless siege of COVID-19 patients has been particularly difficult for nurses, especially when their peers left the field because it caused those who remained to pick up the slack. The shortages run the gamut: lab technicians, aides, respiratory therapists, and more. The Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Subcommittee on Employment and Workplace Safety held a hearing on the growing shortage of health care workers at which time lawmakers were told the U.S. needs 200,000 nurses per year to meet the increased need and America is facing a shortage of up to 124,000 doctors by 2034. In one effort to get more doctors into the field, medical schools are accepting more applicants. However, that's only part of the solution, as there's also a need to increase the number of physician residency positions. Residency is the period of required training after medical school but before doctors get their medical license and can practice on their own. Resident physicians train for three to seven years, depending on their chosen field of medicine. The federal government covers the cost of training resident doctors for the most part. That allocation had remained largely frozen since 1997, which meant doctors were still not able to serve the public in high enough numbers. The bottleneck began to ease somewhat in December 2020 when bipartisan congressional leaders added 1,000 new resident positions. Congress is now considering adding 14,000 more, some specifically targeted for rural areas because, after residency, doctors often remain in the same location. Other incentives may alleviate the shortage of physicians and other health care professionals in rural areas. Telehealth, one silver lining from the pandemic, allows people in rural areas to get the care they need from doctors and other health professionals in distant locations. The nursing shortage might ease if restrictions regarding training were eased. Despite a national nursing shortage in the United States, over 80,000 qualified applications were not accepted at U.S. nursing schools in 2020, according to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing. The reasons include enrollment caps, not enough full-time faculty, and a lack of clinical sites. To fix this and get more nurses into the field, some states are raising those caps, allowing part-time faculty to fill the gaps, and letting nursing students substitute clinical training with simulation hours. Meanwhile, hospitals are doing all they can to keep the nurses and other health care professionals they currently employ.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: As prices continue to rise on everything from gas to groceries, experts warn that food is going to be harder to come by in the months ahead, including in America. Some say that the church can lead the way in helping people through the tough times. Globally more than 276 million people experience extreme food insecurity – pushing closer and closer to famine. According to Bread for the World, over 13.8 million people in the U.S. already suffer from food insecurity. Right now, about 65% of the 200 food banks in the Feeding America Network are seeing a greater demand for food assistance. Heather Taylor of Bread for the World said the problem is likely to affect vulnerable populations even more. Pastor Joshua Giles of Kingdom Embassy Church in Minneapolis has been warning of a coming food shortage for several years. He writes about it in his book, Prophetic Forecast: Insights for Navigating the Future to Align with Heaven's Agenda. He pointed to the biblical story of Joseph as an example of how the church should respond to the crisis while preparing to help others. John LeBlanc of Cedarville University offers advice on practical ways to prepare. And if the power goes out, he suggested investing in a generator and extra gasoline. Giles said that spiritual preparation is also vital. It is a sentiment that LeBlanc shares.

CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Sky-high inflation and economic uncertainty have some worried about their future and livelihood, and financial mentors say now is the time to learn how to invest and save wisely. Economists and financial experts recommend going back to basics if you're struggling to balance your checkbook. Inflation is at a 40-year-high due to pandemic relief spending, supply chain problems, and energy supply disruptions, partly from Russia's war against Ukraine and partly from other factors. In March, energy rose 11% and food prices are up about 5.8% from last year. Dr. Skancke, chief economic advisor at Keel Point, says almost 70-percent of those receiving unemployment are receiving more than when they were working. In turn, the nation has developed some poor spending habits. All of that happy clicking led to a record \$204-billion spent online last Christmas. Given historic job growth, wage gains, and supplemental government spending – status show real wages have still declined. Danny Kofke, motivational speaker for Menturo Financial Education, taught school for 18 years. Now, he's an author and mentor teaching families how to make financial ends meet. He recommends tracking your spending for one month. Then at the end of that month, you'll have a better idea of how much you spent on expensive coffee (per example). That will help you cut out unnecessary spending. A popular economic principle is that poor people spend all their money while the middle class saves, and the rich invest. Given current economic uncertainties, Kofke and Skancke suggest investing in wise areas like a 401K and trimming the daily spending. He says you can cut down on spending and build your rainy-day fund without sacrificing fun altogether, although you need to practice. If you begin tracking your spending now, you may be able to save money as early as next month or so.

CBN Reporter Wendy Griffith Reports: With American struggling to pay their bills due to skyrocketing inflation, the Federal Reserve is attempting to bring prices down. The Fed issued a historic hike on Wednesday, approving the largest interest rate increase in nearly 30 years. The move is intended to slow down the economy, but it also means Americans will pay more to borrow money. The increase affects credit cards, car loans, and mortgage rates. So as the Fed pursues ongoing rate hikes to bring down record-high inflation, it'll deliver a new type of blow to consumers who need to borrow money. Credit card average APR is up over 20 percent for the first time; mortgage loans, which were around 3% percent at the beginning of the year, are now above 6%, pushing monthly payments hundreds of dollars higher for some homeowners. The number one issue for most Americans remains the ever-increasing prices at the pump. President Biden is blaming the war in Russia and accusing U.S. oil companies of causing high gas prices. He sent a letter to seven oil executives, threatening to invoke emergency powers if they don't increase production. The American Petroleum Institute (API) says high gas prices are largely due to the Biden administration's efforts to oppose fossil fuel production. Claudio Galimberti, senior vice president at Rystad Energy, said China has contributed to fuel shortages by limiting exports of oil, and it's all happened while many refineries have also been forced to close for maintenance. Republicans also say Biden has done everything he can to limit oil production in pursuit of his agenda to convert America to green energy. And Sen. James Lankford (R-OK) took the local news media to school when an anchor tried to blame oil companies like President Biden has done, saying they won't ramp up production because of global concerns. Lankford said oil producers in Texas, New Mexico, and the Bakken in North Dakota are already ramping up. He said there's also been a labor shortage in the industry due to a lack of workers, like many sectors of the economy have experienced. Meanwhile, the Fed is expected to raise interest rates again in July, causing concern of tipping the economy into recession. While economists say a recession is not for certain, many believe it's becoming more likely.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: With inflation now at 8.6% and food prices rising the fastest in 40 years, Americans are trying to find ways to get by, and that means less spending. Credit card debt, which dropped during the pandemic as Americans used government stimulus checks to pay down balances, has rebounded to all-time highs. As Americans tighten their belts and close their pocketbooks, it puts even more downward pressure on the economy, pushing it toward recession. Almost half of the economists surveyed by "The Wall Street Journal" say a recession is likely in the next 12 months. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen still insists a recession is not evitable. But retail sales slowed last month for the first time this year, including a 4 percent drop in car sales. Americans have begun pulling back on spending, especially on services rather than goods. Former Treasury Secretary Larry Summers says all signs point to a recession. Record fuel prices are another major inflationary pressure that is reverberating through the economy. While Yellen says the administration would consider suspending the federal gas tax – about 18 cents a gallon – that wouldn't make a huge difference. But the biggest reason by far for inflation, according to analyst Joel Griffith at the Heritage Foundation, has been runaway government spending. One thing economists seem to agree on is that there will be no easy way out of this economic mess.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: The supply chain used to be something few people thought about. They think about it now as they gaze upon empty store shelves. Because the empty shelves phenomenon began during COVID, many people assumed that after COVID things would return to normal. But they haven't, and that's because of problems in the supply chain that will not be fixed soon. The really bad news is that some of the problems might never be fixed. One of the most efficient supply chains in history, the one that helped you score those sweet deals from overseas and kept the shelves stocked at your favorite store; that supply chain is probably never coming back, both because of how the world has changed, and how corporations have changed. Craig Fuller, the CEO of Freightwaves, which monitors and analyzes the supply chain, says the well-running supply chain that many of us took for granted; that gave us an economy of superabundance, is basically a memory. And it's more than just bottlenecks or a shortage of workers. There are new problems in the pipeline like US-China trade friction and rising manufacturing costs that have one-third of supply chain leaders saying they plan to move manufacturing out of China by next year. Another big drag on the supply chain is a decision that American companies have made: adopting a new standard called ESG, which stands for environmental, social, and governance. Under ESG business practices – US companies agree to only get their product from so-called socially and environmentally responsible companies. If a manufacturer in China or India is not deemed to be socially or environmentally responsible, the American company must find another source for its product or risk a bad ESG score with real economic consequences, like losing investors and capital. In other words, the traditional bottom line. . . profits. . . is no longer the only bottom line. Now there is also ESG, and that's made the supply chain more complicated. ESG is a big burden on a supply chain struggling to return to normal. Experts say the supply chain will face continuing challenges for decades. At least one of those challenges – ESG – is self-inflicted. And it is consumers who are paying for it.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Many people don't realize African American women have a much greater risk of severe health complications and even death for themselves and their baby in the earliest stages of motherhood than white women. The same holds true for all females who are BIPOC, which stands for black, indigenous, and people of color. Even these women themselves are too often unaware of the threats they face during pregnancy, delivery, and the year following giving birth. Danielle Bryant said her near-death experience came as a complete surprise. Danielle was rushed to the hospital when she was just six and half months into her pregnancy, about to give birth. Danielle's mother, Theresa Pittman, stayed by her daughter's side. Dr. Wanda Barfield, M.D., the Centers for Disease Control's director of Reproductive Health told CBN News that for many reasons, black women face unusual hardships when it comes to having a baby, regardless of their income or education. Too often black women have fibroids, which are benign uterine tumors that can cause severe bleeding, and preeclampsia, which involves high blood pressure that can be fatal. Dr. Barfield said black women also can suffer from a premature deterioration of their overall health due to chronic, race-based stress. Studies show black infants are more likely than white babies to be stillborn, premature, have low birth weight, and see greater numbers of death before their first birthday. Additionally, black infants born before 32 weeks are more likely than white babies born before 32 weeks to experience more brain issues. Not all hospitals offer the same level of service. Seventy-five percent of black women give birth at hospitals that serve predominantly black populations. As it turns out, these hospitals generally provide lower-quality maternal care. Patient studies and personal testimonies, such as Heather Wilson's, point to racism among some health care workers. Wilson's loss prompted her to start a non-profit organization called Kennedy's Angel Gowns which started with her making burial gowns for babies lost during pregnancy out of wedding dresses. It has since grown to include providing cooling units for mothers who lose a child in the hospital, prayer, bereavement advocates, and more. Wilson started reaching out to other BIPOC women online and elsewhere. Prejudice Wilson felt from health care workers while she was pregnant caused her to reach out to social media and elsewhere to see if other women shared similar experiences. Wilson was overwhelmed with responses from women who told similar stories that all pointed toward racism. A 2016 study published in "Proceedings of the National Academics of Science" revealed half of the medical students and resident physicians held false beliefs such as black people's nerve endings are less sensitive, skin is thicker, and blood coagulates more than white people's. In 2021, Wilson joined a black maternal health roundtable discussion led by Vice President Kamala Harris, in which Wilson said the number one pregnancy-related source of anger and sadness among black women is not being heard by health care professionals, adding, "oftentimes it's too late." The Biden administration proposed increased spending to improve black maternal health, such as providing Medicaid coverage for up to a year after a woman gives birth, and paying personal advocacy workers called doulas. However, since that proposal was part of the defeated Build Back Better bill, its future remains uncertain. Meanwhile, medical schools now incorporate anti-bias training into their curriculum and many health care agencies require their workers to take anti-bias training courses. The Health and Human Services Department offers one such course online, and free of charge. Additionally, the CDC instituted a campaign called Hear Her which offers pregnancy-related information for BIPOC women, such as how to recognize warning signs and guidelines for choosing the right hospital and doctor, something Bryant has experienced firsthand. The CDC cites the importance of women seeking doctors they trust and with whom they can identify. Dr. Barfield says it goes beyond doctors, adding medical offices and hospitals should hire staff that can relate to all patients. So while various issues facing BIPOC women can lead to devastating consequences during pregnancy, birth, and post-partum, increasing attention is being given to these problems to affect change for the better.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Doug Olson may be 75 years old, but he feels great. He's still cancer-free 11 years after he potentially faced death from a blood cancer called chronic lymphocytic leukemia. At that time, his doctors informed him that the treatments he had been trying were not working. Feeling he had nothing to lose, Doug agreed to an experimental treatment developed at the University of Pennsylvania called CAR-T therapy. It uses the patient's own immune system, specifically the T-cells. Olson said the process of gathering those cells took about three hours. Scientists then take the cells they removed and add receptors to them that allow the cells to bind to invading cancer cells and kill them. These modified T-cells are then multiplied in a lab and then infused into the patient. Indeed it did. Just five weeks after receiving the treatment, Doug's doctor announced good news. His success paved the way for thousands to be treated with CAR-T therapy. Now, more than a decade after being one of the first patients to try the therapy, Olson is still cancer-free, a remission so remarkable it was highlighted in the medical journal "Nature." The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved CAR-T therapies to treat blood cancers like lymphomas and leukemias as well as multiple myeloma. Ahmed Galal, MD, FRACP, MSc, is a cellular therapy specialist, hematologic oncologist, and hematologist at Duke Blood Cancer Center in Durham, North Carolina, who treats patients with CAR-T therapy. Dr. Galal said CAR-T therapy is usually administered at academic medical centers, like Duke, after other treatments failed. He said patient results are pleasing. While CAR-T therapy has proven successful for certain types of blood cancers, it has not shown to be effective against other more common cancers, but that could change. Cancer researchers are currently conducting trials to treat some of the deadliest forms of the disease including pancreatic and lung cancers as well as brain tumors. So while cancer is America's second leading cause of death behind heart disease, cancer deaths have actually fallen by more than 30 percent since 1991. Health experts say the decreased death rate is due to better prevention, such as not smoking, increased screenings, like mammograms, and treatments, such as CAR-T therapy.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Record numbers of young people are being diagnosed with colon or rectal cancer. Over the past few decades, more than ten percent of all colorectal cancers occurred in people under age 50, which is up more than five percent in that age group over previous years. Doctors say the increase is likely due to lifestyle factors such as an unhealthy diet, which is described as one lacking enough fiber-rich foods like fruits and vegetables, an unhealthy diet also consists of one that is high in processed foods, particularly processed meats, and high in animal fat, especially red meat. Other risk factors for colorectal cancer include being overweight or obese, heavy alcohol consumption, lack of physical exercise, and tobacco use. The increase in younger cancer diagnoses prompted the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force an independent, volunteer panel of national experts in disease prevention and evidence-based medicine, as well as the American Cancer Society to recommend people at average risk for the disease to begin getting their colonoscopy screenings at age 45 instead of age 50, which was the previous recommendation. While colorectal cancer affects all groups, African Americans are as much as forty percent more likely to die from the disease than others. However, that could be changing. For example, at Trinity Baptist Church, a predominantly black congregation in Columbus, Ohio, parishioners learn how to prevent early death from colon cancer so they can serve the Lord on this side of eternity as long as possible. Assistant Pastor Janet Sheppard's family has worshipped at this church for five generations, which can be common. What may be considerably less common at her church is a person's decision to get a colonoscopy, a screening procedure that can detect actual cancer or precancerous polyps. Reverend Sheppard followed her doctor's advice to get one, and is now telling others at church she's glad she did it. She says sometimes people tell her why they prefer to avoid a colonoscopy, and how she responds to them. Pastor Sheppard's colonoscopy revealed three pre-cancerous polyps, which were removed during the same colonoscopy. Without that screening and discovery, the polyps could likely have grown into cancer, possibly taking her life. During worship, Pastor Sheppard passes out blue colorectal cancer awareness ribbons and she shares her testimony, hoping others will get a colonoscopy as a result of hearing her success story. Senior Pastor Victor Davis believes it's totally appropriate for spiritual leaders to give medical advice at church. Pastor Davis adds that leaders of African American churches in particular, carry a responsibility to protect their congregation's health. Unfortunately, convincing people of their need for a colonoscopy isn't enough to motivate them to get one in some cases. For many, particularly those in the African American community, there can be other roadblocks, such as the procedure cost, especially if the patient does not have insurance, no transportation to the doctor's office where the colonoscopy is performed, not having someone to accompany them to the colonoscopy which is usually required because of the sedation involved, and an inability or willingness to take time off work. As a potential solution, The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer-Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute and Center for Cancer Health Equity started a program using home test kits, known as FIT kits not to take the place of a colonoscopy, but to cheaply and easily identify those who should make it a priority to get a colonoscopy, and those who can wait. The home test is being mailed to members of Trinity Baptist Church and other African American populations in the Columbus area. The home test kit involves collecting a small stool sample in the privacy of the patient's home bathroom and sending the same to a lab, which tests the sample for microscopic traces of blood, too small to see with the naked eye, but a red flag for colorectal cancer. If the home test comes back positive, a colonoscopy is strongly recommended. If negative, a colonoscopy is likely to unnecessary for now. Pastor Davis says the home test is a great tool for people who are hesitant to get a colonoscopy. Subhankar Chakraborty, M.D., PhD, a gastroenterologist at OSUCCC-James, and a developer of the outreach program, told CBN News a primary goal of the program is to motivate those in the earliest stages of colorectal cancer to get a colonoscopy, pointing out that these same people might wait to get one until they begin experiencing symptoms of colorectal cancer. Some of the most common symptoms of colorectal cancer include: rectal bleeding or blood in the stool, diarrhea or constipation, change in the consistency of the stool, abdominal cramps or pain, gas, a feeling that the bowel doesn't empty completely, weakness or fatigue, and unexplained weight loss. Dr. Chakraborty said people who are not involved in the program can order home tests online, but recommends talking to your doctor about it first, adding that people at high risk of colon cancer should skip the home test and go straight to a colonoscopy. High risk individuals include: people who have a family member diagnosed with colorectal cancer, especially a first degree relative (parent or sibling), people with multiple secondary relatives, such as grandparents or uncles, diagnosed with the disease, people with a family history or precancerous polyps, those with inflammatory bowel disease, Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, and patients who have ever received radiation to the pelvic area such treatment for cervical cancer or endometrial cancer. Dr. Chakraborty recognizes colonoscopies can be unpleasant, but says certain aspects of the screening have improved in recent years. Dr. Chakraborty says patients also sometimes needlessly worry about the procedure causing pain. While colonoscopies are still not anyone's idea of a good time, doctors say the screening is definitely worth the effort, because it could save your life, or the life of someone you love.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Before the pandemic, the number of Americans struggling with mental health issues including suicide was already high. Now, two years later, the number of people suffering from depression, anxiety, substance abuse, domestic violence and suicide is even greater than it was pre-pandemic. Mental health experts and Christians alike are taking a closer look at how to help people in the church address difficulties they may be experiencing with mental health issues. Dr. Thema Bryant, an ordained minister and clinical psychologist knows firsthand how Christians can spiral into despair. In her book, "Homecoming: Overcome Fear and Trauma to Reclaim Your Whole Authentic Self," Dr. Bryant describes overcoming her trauma from sexual assault while keeping her faith by using therapeutic approaches which she now shares with her own clients, including one of her favorites, dance therapy, which is similar to praise dance. As President-Elect of the American Psychological Association, Dr. Bryant says the church needs to create a culture where people can admit they're struggling and seek help. The tide is starting to change. While more churches are signaling to their members that it's OK to struggle with mental health issues, some are taking it a step further by developing ministries to help people with these types of problems. One example is at New Life Church in Virginia Beach. Cyrus Williams III, Ph.D., is a member of the church and also serves as a counselor at Rapha Counseling Services, a faith-based Christian Counseling practice. Rapha Counseling entered into a partnership with the church whereby Dr. Williams and his team treat people in the comfort of their own church building. Demand is high, given the growing number of those struggling with depression and anxiety. While the counseling is affordable for many, the goal, Williams said, is to make it available for all who need it. Pastor Tina Davis told CBN News after years of trying to normalize mental health struggles from the pulpit and erasing the shame often associated with these issues, the pastoral team wanted to do even more. New Life also hosts mental health forums and seminars. So while mental health problems within the church can still be considered taboo, more Christian leaders are trying to do away with the stigma so people can get the help they need.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: The Biden administration has launched what they unveiled as an “action plan” in response to the Supreme Court’s decision overturning Roe versus Wade last week. At the top of the list: increase access to “the abortion pill” in states where abortion is outlawed. But the dangerous side effects of the abortion pill are rarely reported, and the risks are very real. One move is to order federal health agencies to provide the pill if the mother’s life is in danger or in cases of rape or incest, even in states outlawing it. But Toni McFadden told CBN News a gripping account of her emotional and physical devastation after ending her pregnancy with the abortion pill. She now dedicates her time to pro-life causes, specifically warning others not to use the abortion pill or undergo any other methods of abortion. Toni took the abortion pill, which actually involves two separate drugs. The first is mifepristone, which kills the baby by blocking progesterone, a hormone necessary to keep the child alive, followed by misoprostol, a couple of days later, which causes the uterus to contract, forcing the baby out of the mother. The woman is often alone when this happens and is forced to dispose of the baby’s body herself. She immediately felt regret. In addition to the emotional toll, terrible physical pain began two months later. Two years later, a routine medical exam revealed more damage. Complications like Toni’s are often never reported. Tessa Longbons, a senior research associate with the Charlotte Lozier Institute, told CBN News many pro-life advocates refer to the abortion pill, medical abortion, or RU-486 as chemical abortions, and says her organization has discovered the practice is more dangerous than surgical abortions, despite the FDA’s pronouncement that it’s safe – a claim largely based on incomplete reporting data. The FDA approved the abortion pill regimen in 2000 for women who are no more than 11 weeks pregnant. Just last year the FDA dropped the requirement that doctors see patients in person before prescribing it, opening the door to a vast telemedicine abortion expansion in which women can receive the pills in the mail. Adding to the incomplete data picture surrounding complications from abortion pills, women who are suffering from complications after taking the abortion pill and seek medical attention from places like a hospital emergency department, don’t reveal they attempted an abortion, and instead tell doctors they are having a miscarriage. In fact, many abortion advocates advise women who take the abortion pill and later require medical attention from a complication, to do just that. Carolyn McDonnell, J.D., who serves as staff counsel at Americans United for Life, told CBN News the abortion pill is particularly dangerous using telemedicine for a number of reasons, including the inability to determine how many weeks a woman has been pregnant and the inability to determine a woman’s blood type. Pro-life attorneys like McDonnell hope to stop providers in states where abortion is legal from prescribing and mailing pills to people in states where it’s not. Instead, they would pursue action against the doctors. However, that still doesn’t prevent foreign doctors, like Dutch physician Rebecca Gomperts, from prescribing the abortion pill online to women in the U.S. The FDA has asked foreign doctors to stop this practice and advises Americans to avoid taking abortion pills from other countries. In addition to the health risks of telemedicine abortions, potential social perils accompany the practice. Despite Toni McFadden’s devastating experience with medical abortion, she says God redeemed her. She details her testimony in the book, “Redeemed: My Journey After Abortion.”

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: America is in a race against time to protect our most carefully guarded secrets against a growing threat. It's called quantum computing and it involves supercomputers that can quickly break through secure encryption codes. Encryption algorithms allow us to keep sensitive information secure when taking care of business or shopping online. Breaking these codes is nearly impossible, allowing governments and private citizens alike to depend on them. But the emergence of quantum computers could put an end to that security. Rep. Ro Khanna (D-CA), along with a bi-partisan group of lawmakers, recently introduced legislation that would require a strategy be put in place to provide federal systems with quantum-resistant encryption. It's also supported by several big tech companies, including Google and IBM. Although experts admit this technology is far from operational, evidence shows American adversaries are already stealing data in order to decrypt it once quantum computers are online. National Institute for Standards and Technology (NIST) has the responsibility of creating quantum-resistant encryption. One additional challenge will be that successful prevention can't really be determined until it's tested by a functioning quantum computer. Still, after a decade of research, NIST teams believe they've cracked the code. They then evaluated each submission, choosing several considered to be the most promising. Dustin Moody, who works in the computer security division at NIST, says in just a matter of weeks, those algorithms will be standardized and rolled out. The hope is that in a decade or so when these super computers come along, the new encryption algorithms hold. Allowing sensitive data to stay secure and out of the hands of our enemies.

CBN Reporter Mark Martin Reports: Although COVID-19 cases are down across the country, the need remains for accurate testing, especially in the event of a major resurgence. Leaders of a Virginia company say they have what it takes to test large numbers of people in a short amount of time. They're getting help from man's best friend. At American K-9 Interdiction in Carrsville, Virginia, trainer James Overton plays with Blade, a German Shepherd-Belgian Malinois mix. The three-year-old is one of dozens of dogs the company uses for what it calls, "real-world K-9 solutions." Paul Roushia has led efforts at the company for 18 years. Roushia says the idea to train dogs to detect COVID came after hearing a competitor discuss the concept. After that, the dogs were introduced to the smell of a person's saliva without COVID. Andrew Kasecamp is in charge of training and education. He says he was very skeptical at first that dogs could be trained to detect COVID. One of the primary benefits for using dogs to detect COVID is speed. Staff at American K-9 Interdiction say a dog can screen 30 to 40 people in less than a minute compared to the 15 minutes it takes to get the results back on just one rapid antigen test. Kasecamp and his three-year old Dutch Shepherd, Pashka, demonstrated how it works. The COVID sample is placed behind a small filter in a cone-shaped funnel. The dog sticks his nose into each funnel to sniff the sample, but the filter prevents the dog from being able to put his nose all the way in and grab the sample. What it also does is focuses that odor right inside the edge of the funnel. If it's a positive sample, the dog alerts the handler by sitting in front of that particular funnel. Otherwise, he'll keep on going. For our demonstration, Overton used a neutral odor that was used to train the dogs in the initial training, not an actual virus. Pashka alerts by sitting down in front of the target tube. Overton believes the dogs are a match for searching large groups of people. Roushia says he prays over the dogs constantly and relies on Divine intervention. And he adds that at the end of the day, his work is all for God's glory.

CBN News Correspondent Brody Carter Reports: The FBI and law enforcement agencies are working to stop surging violence against police officers as other violent crimes run rampant nationwide. Last year, 73 police officers were killed on the job. That's a 59 percent jump in officer-related deaths over the previous year. Sgt. Tre Pennie, retired Dallas police sergeant and president of the National Fallen Officer Foundation, says violence aimed at police is unlike anything he's seen before. So why the increase? FBI Director Christopher Wray says some of it's tied to an increase in violent crimes as a whole. In 2020, murder jumped 29 percent in the U.S. with nearly 5,000 more people killed than in 2019. Possible reasons include more juveniles committing violent crimes, increased gun trafficking, and an alarming number of some of the worst criminals getting back on the streets. The FBI is working with task forces and local law enforcement nationwide to mitigate this violent surge, arresting close to 15,000 violent gang members last year. Yet, gun violence is still at an all-time high. Researchers for the New England Journal of Medicine found that gun violence increased during the COVID pandemic. There's no clear correlation. Still, some 45,000 firearm-related deaths took place in 2020. Sgt. Pennie believes social media is a big part of the problem. In the worst cases, Sgt. Pennie believes some opinions lead to tragedy – most recently in a Buffalo grocery store – where the shooter targeted black people, killing 10 and injuring three others. National security experts believe the gunman was motivated by the racist ideology he found online. Pennie filed a lawsuit against Facebook, Twitter, and Google in connection with the 2016 Dallas shooting. The courts let them go. But it's not stopping law enforcement from finding solutions to serve and protect the men and women who have sworn to do the same.

CBN Reporter Heather Sells Reports: Both sides agree that the next frontier in the abortion fight is the abortion pill, also known as RU-486 or chemical abortion. The pills are becoming less regulated and easier to find. And, more women are using them. They accounted for 54% of all US abortions in 2020, compared to 39% in 2017, according to the Guttmacher Institute. It's why abortion activists are aggressively promoting the pills. A new phrase is "self-managed abortion" which includes encouraging women to take the pills at home. They're also easy to purchase. Last month in Wyoming, Kristan Hawkins, president of Students for Life of America, said she order them online in minutes. That's thanks, in part, to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which recently lifted the requirement for an in-person exam. Today, Toni McFadden, a pro-life activist, said her provider minimized the risks and initially, she didn't experience any symptoms other than spotting. Today, she's sharing her story and warning young women of the risks. FDA reporting shows abortion pills have led to the deaths of 24 women and severe reactions for more than 4,000. Those numbers are likely low because when complications happen, abortion providers urge women to present them as miscarriages in an ER setting. Also, the CDC does not require abortion reporting and so several states do not share numbers. For now, strategists like Sue Liebel, state policy director for the Susan B. Anthony List, are working with states to put restrictions on abortion pills. More than 20 states require a doctor to be present in the room when a woman receives the pills. Legal experts on both sides expect that "rub" will be the new focus of state legislation and litigation. Steven Aden, general counsel for Americans United for Life, says there's precedent for restricting the pills. Both sides are gearing up for a fight that encompasses law, health, and safety regulations, internet commerce, and what our culture says about unborn life.

CBN Reporter John Jessup Reports: Technology has transformed the notion of worship as more churches and ministries carve out spaces in the digital world to respond to the trend of the faithful increasingly flocking to practice their beliefs online. While mobile devices initially were seen as gateways for information, community, and entertainment, apps for religious tools like the Bible, devotionals, and prayer have made them popular among people of faith. Yet the convenience of holding those apps in the palm of your hand comes at a price. Jason Thacker, who oversees research in technology and ethics for the Southern Baptist's Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission, has written extensively about the burgeoning intersection of technology and faith with books like "The Age of AI" and "Following Jesus in a Digital Age," to be released in August. He warns while users enjoy modern conveniences, like reading the Bible on their phones, they often come at an intangible cost: privacy. The demand for your personal details and digital habits mean users have moved from consumer to product. With each download, users potentially give those apps sole discretion of just how much to collect. Glyn Gowing, a cybersecurity expert and computer science professor at LeTourneau University, believes that temptation is too much for app developers to resist. Founded in 2016, Pray.com has grown to become the number one app for daily prayer and biblical audio content. Its offerings include the popular audio Bible read by James Earl Jones and uplifting videos from Christian artists and athletes like Lecrae and Drew Brees. They're designed to fulfill the company's mission, which is to help people "grow faith and cultivate community." But Pray.com made headlines in early 2022 after an online news outlet reported that the company buys information(<http://www.buzzfeednews.com/article/emilybakerwhite/apps-selling-your-prayers>) from data brokers to build user profiles with personal details already recorded through the app, like someone's location. The article also noted that the privacy policy acknowledges it shares user information with third parties, suggesting the company "reserves the right to sell your prayers." Pray.com refuted the claim in an interview with CBN News. The company's original statement pushed back on what it described were "false claims" but saw "little to no effort" to correct the record. Ryan Beck, Pray.com's co-founder and chief technology officer, contends the negative headlines generated about the privacy policy started with the initial report. Beck told CBN News Pray.com's number one priority is prayer, not making money off of its users. However, Pray.com, like other for-profit, faith-based apps, has also drawn attention over big money investors(<http://www.christianitytoday.com/news/2022/january/app-investment-prayer-bible-meditation-glorify-hallow.html>) who see an opportunity to form partnerships. According to Forbes, venture capital funding for faith-based apps in 2021 grew to \$175.3 million, more than three times the total investment in religious apps in 2020. Beck, who has worked for both nonprofit and for-profit ministries, believes venture capital funding provides a way for Pray.com to fulfill its mission, while allowing its financiers to leave a legacy. Still, cybersecurity experts say it's important to be cautious. Most apps use data to facilitate a more personalized user experience, which can still leave the door open for privacy concerns. As a thought-leader in the space, Thacker encourages Christians to view their online engagement through a theological framework and to be mindful that their interactions leave a digital footprint that can affect their perception. Thacker believes beyond gaining an understanding of how technology is being used, people of faith should be engaged in shaping the debate around privacy policy. In the United States, the issue of privacy protection continues to spark debate over best practice on the state and federal levels. While residents of the European Union have the General Data Protection Regulation to serve as guidance on personal data collection, only a handful of states, like California, currently have passed similar laws.

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: From suspected arson to shattered windows, and graffiti – since the leak of a draft opinion suggesting the U.S. Supreme Court would overturn Roe v Wade – more than 40 incidents of violence, vandalism, and intimidation against pro-life pregnancy centers have been reported. After reporting the incident to the FBI as a hate crime, Annabelle Rutledge, the national director of Young Women for America, says her organization now has posted armed security guards on-site and with their staff at the Supreme Court. The Capitol Hill Crisis Pregnancy Center was also targeted with red paint splattered on their door and the word, “revenge,” spray-painted on the side of their building. In spite of that, Executive Director Janet During told CBN News she feels God’s protection. Last week, the FBI opened an official investigation into the growing number of threats and attacks. Now lawmakers are urging the Justice Department to follow suit. More than 100 House Republicans signed a letter to Attorney General Merrick Garland, asking the DOJ to investigate vandalism and attacks at pro-life centers as domestic terrorism. Unfortunately, things are expected to get worse before they get better. In May, the Department of Homeland Security warned of a likely surge in violence once the Supreme Court hands down its ruling. Just this week in D.C., flyers have been posted by Jane’s Revenge, a group advocating for Abortions, promising a “Night of Rage.” Now that Roe has been overturned, pro-lifers are bracing for the expected escalation in violence.
