Representative Moore says life would be tough without these men and women. He adds that too often people want to bash the police; but then expect them to come running when there's trouble.

Description: With excessive heat hitting the area, Dr. Jarod Ebert, Southeast Health, gives some advice to avoid becoming overheated. While drinking water while outdoor is important, it is also helpful to hydrate before going outside. For people who are active, sports drinks can help replenish lost electrolytes. He also says to pay attention to any signs of becoming dehydrated: light-headedness and dizziness; later signs are if you stop sweating and feeling chills. Dr. Ebert adds that it's good to avoid alcohol as it can cause you to dehydrate quicker.

Description: Interview with Miki Gudermuth, outgoing Executive Director of SADI (SEMO Alliance for Disability Independence). As a polio survivor, she discusses how SADI began in the mid-1980's as a support group for people with disabilities. The group developed into an independent living organization, while working with other local groups to better educate the area about the issues disabled people have concerning housing and employment. In 1993, the group began receiving state grant funding. Ms. Gudermuth also discusses the other big issue that the group faced, public transportation that was accessible to handicapped people.

They provide classes to teach people how to respond to basic emergencies such as accidents or fires; as well as larger events, such as an earthquake. The organization also makes itself available if they are asked to help provide wellness assistance to residents who are affected by a large-scale disaster.

Description: As the flood waters along the Mississippi River begin to drop, clean-up crews go to Work in Ste. Genevieve, Mo. They've found that mud is the biggest problem as they opened the north gate, which has been closed for two months. Public Works Director Gary Roth estimates that nearly a ton of mud has been deposited near the flood gate, which will have to be cleared from the roadway. For anyone who has plans to clear or handle the mud, he suggests to first get a tetanus shot, because you don't know what is mixed in with the mud. Roth adds that they are bringing in snowplows and other heavy equipment, with the goal to have the area cleared by the end of the week.

The girl suffered minor injuries; but there have been other similar incidents in the same area. Perryville resident, Joe Castor, says it simply comes down to people paying attention. Police Department Corporal Jeri Cain reminds us that motorists need to look in all directions at intersections, and remind cyclists that its important to wear safety gear. The police are looking for a small maroon SUV, driving by a man. Viewers are asked to contact the Perryville Police Department if they have any information.

Description: The West Lane Elementary School in Jackson, Mo., held an open house to show off its new tornado-safe building, including new classrooms, a library and gym, all of which double as a storm shelter. Dr. John Link, superintendent for the Jackson R-2 school district, says not only is the building a safe place for the kids; but if there's time, students from the junior high school can also be brought over. Plus, the building would be available to local residents in case of emergency. The building is the final project after passage of Proposition J a couple of years ago, and was funded with 3-million dollars from FEMA.

Description: With recreational marijuana becoming legal in Illinois next year, business and city leaders are working on how to comply with the new law, such as how to keep the workplace safe and how to train police. Marion, II., city leaders say some issues could be easy to work out; but others will be more complicated. Much of the difficulties are expected with businesses that utilize federal grants, which often have zero-tolerance policies towards the use of marijuana. Marion, II., Chief of Staff, Cody Hoake, says that they typically drug test their employees; but not those who are independently contracted. While marijuana will be legal in Illinois, it is still considered illegal by the federal government. Mr. Hoake says the Marion city government expects to work out these issues by October.

Currently, young girls in kindergarten through fifth grades can now join the Cub Scouts, and starting in February, girls above fifth grade can begin joining the Boy Scouts. Ms. Metelski also discusses the Adventuring program, for coed scouts fourteen to twenty, and the Exploring program, a mentoring program which allows scouts to learn more about various careers.

Description: Interview with Julie Hopkins, Assistive Technology Development Specialist at SADI, to discuss how the organization helps provide medical support equipment to people, including their "loan closet" which provides donated items, at no charge, such as wheelchairs and lift chairs to people who may not be financially able to get it elsewhere. Ms. Hopkins also demonstrates some new technological items that are useful to people with a disability, such as a reading pen that can scan and read out loud printed material, and a Bluetooth TV audio amplifier headphones for people with hearing difficulties. Also, her office works with Rehab Services for the Blind and Low Vision Center, where they can do an assessment of a person's need to determine what services or equipment can help them overcome their vision difficulties.

Description: Interview with Mary Lincoln, Employment Development Specialist for SADI, to discuss the Department of Mental Health Employment Program, which targets people with a developmental disability which occurred before the age of 22. She discusses how SADI works with businesses to help them prepare to participate in the program, as well as lend support after hiring someone with a disability. Educational programs are also offered to the disabled persons to help them learn what job careers most interest them, and prepare them to enter the job market.

Mr. Ritter says the first thing people need to do is go through the pre-approval process to get an idea of how much they can afford. Next is to sit down with a realtor to discuss what are the buyers wants and needs in a new home, such as the size of the home, number of bedrooms, and local schools. He also encourages people to look at as many homes as possible in person, not just looking at photos on-line. Mr. Ritter also suggests that people who are thinking of selling their home, to use a realtor, as the realtor may be able to negotiate a price higher than what they may have gotten if they sold the house by themselves.

Description: Interview with Casey Brunke, Assistant Public Works Director for the city of Cape Girardeau, to discuss the recent changes in what is acceptable when it comes to recycling. She says that the city's recyclable materials have been typically sent to China; however, China has recently drastically dropped the amount of non-recyclable materials that are allowed. According to Ms. Brunke, the biggest item that is no longer accepted are garbage bags, plastic shopping bags and other plastic films; largely because they often become entangled with recycling equipment. Other things she asks is that food and liquid containers to be rinsed or cleaned; also, plastic water and soft drink bottles need to be empty.

Description: China announced that it will stop buying American agricultural products, adding to the economic burden of farmers who have already been hit hard by flooding. New Madrid, Mo., soybean farmer Mark Baker says he believes the flooding will hurt more than the trade war. He says the constant spring rains prevented him from planting most of his acreage. The 800 acres that he was able to plant was two months late, and he expects to lose money this year. Although China says it will stop buying soybeans, Baker says he still supports the President's efforts. Baker says that if nothing is done to stop the trade imbalance, that the whole country will feel it sometime in the future. Baker will be receiving some bailout money. New Madrid County farmers will receive \$121 per acre of planted crops, and Baker hopes that will give him a boost for the next planting season.

Description: The West Kentucky Community and Technical College is offering a new program called GED Plus, designed to help students earn their GED, along with college credit. Student earn tuition-free college credentials through the Work Ready Skills Kentucky scholarship, along with certificates in several business and trade fields. Director Tammy Maines says the target age is eighteen to sixty-four. She adds that there are 350,000 people in Kentucky who need their GED, and this program is aimed to help those people return to the work force.

Description: Consolidation plans by Briggs and Stratton will bring both good and bad results to two local towns. The company announced it is closing its plant in Murray, Ky., which will put about 600 people out of work. Real estate agent Cheryl Roberts tells of a married couple, who both worked at the Murray plant and just recently closed on the purchase of a new home, and now the couple is unsure of what will become of their future. Murray city officials says they are already in talks to find someone else to take over the vacant space. On the other side, the consolidation plans will mean the addition of 130 jobs at the plant in Poplar Bluff, Mo. Poplar Bluff resident Mike Kitchens says he sympathizes with the Murray employees because he's been in their situation before. Briggs and Stratton says that after the 130 positions are filled this year, there may be another 140 jobs added the following year.

Blue Sky Community Services, in Cape Girardeau, offers employment programs for disabled people. Blue Sky Director, Kevin Smith, says disabled people have the same goals as everyone else, in that they want to be happy, healthy and productive. He adds that disabled workers are good for business, in that they are very dependable and value having a job. The governor also expects that by expanding job opportunities for disabled people will help the state save money by cutting down on the number of people needing public assistance.

Chief District Engineer, Kyle Poat, says if is all goes well, construction would begin in seven years, taking three years to complete, so optimistically it would be ready in about ten years. Bloomfield, Mo., resident Bill Robison says when it's an expensive project like this, it's important that people become involved. The next public meeting will be held tomorrow at the Cairo High School.

Paul Schnare, owner of Sunny Hills Gardens, says since the pellets are organic, they may be better for someone's garden than an inorganic fertilizer. Mr. Polivich says that if all goes well, they may begin selling the pellets. For now, they are being tested at a local golf course and in a wheat field.
