Section II. Responsive Programs

The station had broadcast programming dealing with each of the above referenced issues. Programming dealing with each issue is set out below:

A. Health Issues:

1. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/7/19, 6a-7a, 12:47 minutes. Kathleen Glover, Director of Development & Programs from Jupiter Lighthouse, discussed the importance of Autism-friendly events for children. Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. According to the Centers for Disease Control, autism affects an estimated 1 in 59 children in the United States today. The Families and caretakers with children on the autism spectrum are invited to participate in Autism Family Night at the Light, an autism-friendly event. Activities will include: MINI LIGHTHOUSE CLIMBS, THE KEEPERS WORKSHOP, TINDALL PIONEER HOMESTEAD, VISIT A NATIVE GARDEN, FUN BUILDING BLOCKS, ART MURAL PAINTING, Meet “MRS. LIGHTHOUSE”
2. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/28/19, 6a-7a, 15:00 minutes. David Perez, MBA, Assistant Director of Development & Pat Murphy, Executive Director for United Community Options (formerly United Cerebral Palsy), discussed United Community Options-raising awareness and funds for research & programs for individuals living with cerebral palsy. United Community Options serves children and adults with a wide range of needs and abilities including physical, intellectual, and neurological disabilities, as well as developmental delays and developmental disabilities, such as cerebral palsy, Downs syndrome, autism spectrum disorder, Prader-Willi syndrome, epilepsy, traumatic brain injury (TBI), and those who are technology dependent or medically fragile. United Community Options’ supports, services, and programs include a wide variety of settings and options including schools, adult training residential options, supported living coaching and in home supports, therapy, transportation as well advocacy and respite services. The Annual UCO Corporate Volleyball Challenge, an annual event & fundraiser, raises approximately \$200K.
3. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/12/19, 6a-7a, 7:57 minutes. Tim Stergiou-Allen discussed the Cycle Nation initiative with American Stroke Association/American Heart Association. CycleNation empowers people across the country to use road and stationary bikes to get brain and heart healthy — all while raising funds for community programs that will prevent stroke and heart disease. This initiative takes place across the country, and locally in Palm Beach Gardens (5/23) & Boca Raton (6/5). Stroke kills about 140,000 Americans each year—that’s 1 out of every 20 deaths. Someone in the United States has a stroke every 40 seconds. Every 4 minutes, someone dies of stroke. About 610,000 people die of heart disease in the United States every year—that’s 1 in every 4 deaths. Heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women.

B. Community Events:

1. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/07/19, 6a-7a, 13:35 minutes. Owen O'Neill, CEO & Spokesperson, WPEC's Matthew Lincoln represents the Clinics Can Help (CCH) which accepts gently used and new durable medical equipment (DME) and unwrapped medical supplies from individuals and organizations and makes it available to children and adults who may not otherwise be able to afford such equipment and supplies for their physical recovery. It is the only organization of its kind in Florida and one of the largest in the U.S. that provides this critical assistance. The 6th Annual Golf Tournament on 4/26, raises funds and awareness for CCH. CCH provides the following and more: traditional and motorized wheelchairs, home hospital beds, medical air mattresses, walkers, nebulizers, shower chairs, bedside commodes, incontinent briefs and wound care supplies.
2. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/28/19, 6a-7a, 9:48 minutes. Palm Health Foundation is a community foundation for health that is a funder of lifelong health and wellbeing for Palm Beach County residents. Our vision is that all Palm Beach County residents have opportunities to thrive and reach their full health potential. Vanessa Moss, an RN explained that the Foundation knows that the good health of our community depends on skilled nursing care. Palm Health has invested millions of dollars in programs that advance and improve the quality of nursing care in clinical and community-based settings. Allowing the community not only more access to care, but access to better care. Palm Health Foundation provides grants to nursing students & programs in Palm Beach County colleges & high schools. Palm Health Foundation is celebrating Nurses with Thank A Nurse & Nurses Night Out in the month of May.
3. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/5/19, 6am-7am, 14:52 minutes. Mary Flack discussed how Goodwill week was established as a way to encourage local Goodwill organizations to educate their communities about their mission of "helping people with disabilities help themselves." Goodwill week was established in May of 1951. Today, local, community-based Goodwill organizations across the U.S. and Canada offer an array of job fairs, job training and employment services which lead to promising careers. Goodwill has retail thrift stores, where the funds generated go to support their local programs. Goodwill has services for the deaf, blind, homeless, and people with other disabilities, all at no charge to those that need their services.
4. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/5/19, 6a-7a, 14:52 minutes. Mary Pinak, Community Events Manager for the City of West Palm Beach, and Allison Justice, Deputy Director of the West Palm Beach Community Redevelopment Agency, discuss the fifth annual "Summer in Paradise" campaign, which begins with "Clematis By Night" on June 6. New this year is Coney Island, an multi-pronged activity that ties into the ongoing Clematis Street streetscape project which began in summer 2018 on the 300 block and continues this summer on the 100 and 200 blocks. Coney includes an interactive maze with seven areas that allow children and families to take part in various construction projects and make their downtown experience "i-cone-ic." It is free and will be open every day from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., with longer hours during city events. The cone theme continues with Cone Checkers, as well as cone-inspired activities in the city library. Screen on the Green takes places the second Friday of each month,

while Sunday on the Waterfront continues on the third Sunday of the month. Additionally, city staff dressed as "Clematis Cone heads" will distribute prizes on Fridays to anyone wearing orange along the street. Event and streetscape project information is available at wpb.org/events. On Thursday, June 27th, community partner United Way will have a 90th birthday party during "Clematis By Night", featuring free t-shirts and sno-cones. Pinak adds that the goal with Coney Island is to allow the public and merchants to continue meeting and enjoying downtown through the summer and through the construction.

5. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/14/19, 6a-7a, 9:38 minutes Kelly Kollar-Dye, Director of Parks & Recreation for the City of West Palm Beach & Mario Arguelles, Asst. Director discussed the two most important aspects of the Fit Kids Triathlon; promoting a healthy lifestyle at an early age & teaching volunteerism. The Fit Kids Triathlon promotes a healthy lifestyle through fitness which has a number of proven physical and mental health benefits such as reducing the risk of obesity and diabetes, it boosts self-esteem and strengthens their bones and muscles. It offers kids the opportunity to experience a multi-sport endurance event in a safe and positive environment. Furthermore, the event itself promotes volunteerism and community engagement. Although the Main focus of the event is for the kids, their families and the community to come together and have FUN while participating in healthy activities. Volunteerism is another aspect of this event that is so important for the kids and this is because when you volunteer you connect with others in your community, it gives you purpose, and when doing so at a young age you breed a culture of giving back that continues through adulthood. It also provides young people with a variety of work experience they otherwise wouldn't have which prepares them for the workforce. Those that volunteer are known to be happier people live longer, and volunteering is great for your community and society as a whole.

C. Social Issues:

1. South Florida Sunday Show, 4/07/19, 6a-7a, 14:08 minutes. Geanine Wester, Executive Director of the EmpowerHER conference. An annual conference bringing together top women leaders from the economic, health & wellness, tech and political sectors for a day of empowerment, connection and collaboration. The conference will offer 5 general sessions and 30 training tracks throughout the day. Attendees can choose to participate in the informational forums that best serves their need.
2. South Florida Sunday Show, 4/21/19 6a-7a, 12:45 minutes. Bob Bertisch, the Executive Director of the Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County & their GAP program. Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County's Guardian Advocacy Project (GAP) provides services for disabled youth aging out of foster care and individuals who have a developmental disability and are without family or friends to care for them. GAP impacts the community by minimizing clients' risks and plays a role in preventing clients with disabilities from becoming victims of exploitation, abuse, and other criminal activity. Many of them have been exploited as children and are even more vulnerable as adults. GAP offers a continuum of care, providing a comprehensive set of services that include assistance with finances and help with decisions related to

their living environment, social situation, education, and medical care. In addition, we help to access resources for our clients in the community and work closely to make sure they are aligned with the proper services. GAP also strives to maintain clients in the least restrictive environment while maximizing their independence whenever possible. We are continually working to restore rights to clients who are able to demonstrate competency in certain areas while maintaining supervision over other areas.

3. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/28/19, 6a-7a, 15:40 minutes. The Urban League of Palm Beach County has been at the forefront of youth education, affordable housing, jobs, community and health empowerment for the past 45 years. As the leading provider of comprehensive family services ULPBC serves over 18,000 clients annually. The majority of the families and children they see on a daily basis live in West Palm Beach. However, we have expanded our services to 5 locations including, (2) offices in West Palm Beach, (1) office in Delray Beach, (1) in Broward County and (1) in Miami Dade County. 95% of our clients live at or below the federal poverty line and in underserved and live in challenged areas in our community. They live in neighborhoods with low high school graduation rates, high unemployment and underemployment, high crime rates and one-parent households. This Urban League interview was conducted with Patrick Franklin, President, and CEO of ULPBC, Deborah Caplan, E.V.P. of Human Resources and Corporate Services, NextEra Energy, Inc and Alex Price, National Director, Community Relations, Office Depot Inc. In this interview, we discussed how the Urban League serve the community, the importance of volunteering, sustaining funding for programs and events coordinated for the community by ULPBC.
4. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/5/19, 6a-7a, 15:48 minutes. Michelle Gonzalez, Executive Director of Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies says that the organization is dedicated to improving birth outcomes and promoting healthy families by providing access to care, education and support to those facing the physical, emotional, economic and social challenges of pregnancy and infant care. Gabrielle Finely-Hazel CEO of St. Mary's Medical Center & Palm Beach Children's Hospital stresses the importance of the programs offered by HMHB as they give women who would otherwise not have access to proper pre-natal healthcare the services and care that they need before & after the birth of their babies. Approximately 25 percent of pregnant women in our county receive little, late or no prenatal care. The Moments Luncheon is an annual fundraiser for HMHB & is on Friday May 10th.
5. South Florida Sunday Show, 4/14/19 6a-7a, 16:41 minutes. Debra Tendrich, Executive Director informed us that according to the USDA, only 2% of children eating healthy and that the health of our youth is on a steady decline. She further stated that bullying, anxiety, depression, ADHD, early on-set puberty, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, student drop-out rates, crime rates, skin disease, increased healthcare costs, cancer, decreased life expectancy and several other problems are all symptoms of poor nutrition and childhood obesity. The programs at Eat Better Live Better Foundation take a hands on approach that will provide families with several skills and tools that are needed to create and maintain a nutritional diet plan while staying within their family's budget. The Mission of Eat Better Live Better is to help prevent, reduce and reverse childhood obesity and provide families with nutritional plans and

healthy foods. The reality is that 1 in 3 children are obese (CDC statistics). Childhood obesity is the leading cause of preventable death. Bullying is directly related to the obesity epidemic as 60% of all bullying is triggered from body image. By combating obesity, we will also decrease the amount of bullying. Additionally, the youth are being diagnosed with more health problems at a younger age. That means that health care costs are going up and the quality of lives are going down. Lack of time, money, knowledge and resources are preventing families from making the shift in their lifestyles. EBLB is inclusive of every necessary aspect to make the transition into a healthy lifestyle possible. The EBLB annual 5K fundraiser is on Sunday, 5/5/19.

D. Senior Health & Issues:

1. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/21/19, 6a-7a, 17:57 minutes. Dr. Tom Minas, Orthopedic Surgeon at the Paley Orthopedic & Spine Institute at St. Mary's Medical Center spoke of the invasiveness of standard knee replacement surgery and the extreme pain and long recovery time. With the aging population in South Florida, the Paley Orthopedic & Spine Institute is beginning to treat their aging patients needed knee replacement surgery with a procedure that is less invasive. They are the only provider of an alternative; a cartilage transplant. Cartilage transplants are being done successfully on former athletes and the elderly. Most knee cartilage replacement surgeries are called OATs surgeries—either osteochondral auto graft transplantation or osteochondral allograft transplantation surgeries. A third option is called autologous chondrocyte implantation. Osteochondral auto graft transplantation uses cartilage from the patient.
2. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/19/19 6a-7a, 11:29 minutes. Dr. Nils Mueller, Neurointerventionalist on staff at Delray Medical Center spoke about May being Stroke Awareness Month. He explained the signs of someone having a stroke. He discussed where to go and what treatments to seek if you feel you are having or have had a stroke. Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States. More than 140,000 people die each year from stroke in the United States. Stroke is the leading cause of serious, long-term disability in the United States. Each year, approximately 795,000 people suffer a stroke. About 600,000 of these are first attacks, and 185,000 are recurrent attacks. Nearly three-quarters of all strokes occur in people over the age of 65. The risk of having a stroke more than doubles each decade after the age of 55. Strokes can and do occur at ANY age. Nearly one fourth of strokes occur in people under the age of 65. Stroke death rates are higher for African-Americans than for whites, even at younger ages. The risk of ischemic stroke in current smokers is about double that of nonsmokers after adjustment for other risk factors. Atrial fibrillation (AF) is an independent risk factor for stroke, increasing risk about five-fold. High blood pressure is the most important risk factor for stroke.
3. South Florida Sunday: 6/9/19, 6a-7a, 15:56 minutes. Rudy Morgan, Executive Director of Georgia Prostate Cancer Coalition, says that his organization is partnered with the National Prostrate Cancer Registry at Clark Atlanta University for the past few years. Their mission is to create awareness and prevention of end-stage prostate cancer through a registry where survivors can provide information anonymously, particularly in June, which is Men's Health Month. As a prostate cancer survivor, Morgan says it is important for men to get screened early, as one in nine men will be diagnosed with

prostate cancer. Morgan adds that the number is one in five for African-American men, and one in three for men in the same family, reflecting a hereditary link. Thus, he suggests having both a blood test of 8 to 10 CC's, and a prostate-specific antigen test, at age 40. He recommends that men undergo a digital rectal exam, and says they should remember the result number in order to compare accurately from year to year. Morgan adds that if caught early, the cancer has a remission rate of over 90 percent. There are three million survivors nationwide, while 300,000 men are affected each year. The registration process takes 20 to 30 minutes. It may be completed at pcregistry.cau.edu.

E. Education & STEAM:

1. South Florida Sunday Show, 4/21/19, 6a-7a, 10:29 minutes. Judi Asselta, President of the National Society of Arts and Letters Florida East Coast Chapter discussed the history of the organization & its endeavor to discover, mentor and give financial support to exceptional young artists. The Florida East Coast Chapter has been in effect since the 1990s and covers the area from the Keys to Jacksonville. Their base is in Boca Raton and they consist of an all-volunteer board that raises funds for scholarships, mentors local emerging artists and works with the national program for the main competitions and scholarships. Locally the biggest discovery has been Nadine Sierra from Fort Lauderdale who was selected to compete in the classical voice competitions. She has gone on to become one of the world's most acclaimed opera stars receiving standing ovations at La Scala and The Met! Many of the local NSAL winners have gone on to great careers as well and the NSAL mentors are often called fairy god mothers by their students. At The Star Maker Awards on 4/28/19, the NSAL scholarship and competition winners will be honored. This is an annual fundraiser that supports the scholarships granted by NSAL Florida East Coast Chapter.
2. South Florida Sunday Show, 6/09/19, 6a-7a, 17:08 minutes. Literacy Coalition CEO Kristen Calder and Literacy AmeriCorps volunteer Erik Stroup say that one in seven adults function at lowest level of literacy; they lack basic literacy skills for bus schedules, medicine bottles or report cards, due to lack of education or lack of work. Media, business and community leaders founded the coalition 30 years ago to help those trying to complete job applications. The goal is to raise awareness and improve quality of life through literacy. They also bring people together with other non-profits that offer similar or complementary programs or services. The Literacy Coalition coordinates a dozen programs; Literacy AmeriCore is one of those. It partners with the School District, Library System and other agencies, and includes up to 40 members who serve 68,000 hours a year as graduation coaches and reading tutors. It is a labor of love, with a stipend. The volunteers try to get students on grade-reading level. The organization also offers two family literacy programs, in Delray Beach and Belle Glade, respectively. In relation to that and that the programs, they donate 110,000 books a year. The next volunteer program starts in August. It is also full-time, one-year commitment that is offered mostly to recent college graduates. Training is provided. Individuals may also donate money and books online. Full information at Literacyabc.org or (561) 279-9103.

3. South Florida Sunday, 6/30/19, 6a-7a, 14:44 minutes, Geri Emmett, Chairwoman of the Duffy's Foundation, discusses the mission, in conjunction with the Girl Scouts, represented by Sam White. Geri launched the foundation in 2016, following her husband, Paul's death, from cancer. She had previously partnered with the Girl Scouts in her community-driven career. To that end, the foundation allowed Geri and her staff to combine community efforts from 34 locations under one corporate banner. They pour their time and hearts into working with other charities, including Meals on Wheels, Special Olympics, and Forgotten Soldiers. In addition, the other charities reciprocate by volunteering with Duffy's. For example, the chain will be relying heavily on volunteers around Thanksgiving to help make pies. The foundation offers Duffy's Cooking Classes for the Girl Scouts. The sessions are held at Duffy's' culinary studio. Emmett says the goal is to teach children the entire process of creating healthy, one-pan meals, from preparation to final product, as well as educating them regarding the items and ingredients, and the importance of sharing. Participants arrive wearing their Girl Scouts' vests, and are then provided with a Duffy's apron and measuring cup, a set of teaspoons and tablespoons, and chef's hat. They are also informed about the importance of hygiene and using gloves in the kitchen, as well as temperature control. A Suggestion Board allows those in the class to inform staff about what they would like to learn to cook, and what they want to see on the Duffy's menu. More information: www.duffysfoundation.com.
4. South Florida Sunday, 6/16/19, 6a-7a, 17:43 minutes. Daryl Houston, Community Impact Officer, and Eric Aquino, Community Impact Coordinator at the Community Foundation, discuss the organizations grant and sponsorship opportunities. Current and future areas of focus for the Community Foundation are: community revitalization, education, and positive youth development. The organization, which has served Palm Beach and Martin counties for 45 years, provides grants to 501(c)(3) non-profits, as well as scholarships to college students. Grants may be offered through donor-advised or competitive processes. The latter is typically a three-to four-month scenario that begins with a letter of inquiry, followed by a proposal, meetings/site visits, and approval by board of directors). Last year, Community Foundation provided \$11 million in grants to some of the 7,000 non-profits in its service area. It is suggested that anyone interested in requesting a grant first become familiar with their grant-making organization or foundation. Mini-grants are also available, and anyone interested in applying for a grant may join a listserv in order to be notified when new opportunities are available. The scholarship window opens in November and runs through January. Last year, they awarded \$1 million from over 100 different funds, with the average being \$10,000 per student.
5. South Florida Sunday Show, 4/21/19, 6a-7a, 13:31 minutes. Ray Coleman, Executive Director Pine Jog Environmental Education Center spoke about conservation and an Earth Week event benefiting the Green Schools Recognition Program (130 schools are involved in the program for a total of ~110,000 students). All 7 of The Jamba Juice Palm Beach County stores will be participating in the Earth Week campaign and a portion of all sales will go towards the FAU Pine Jog Green Schools program. The GSRP recognizes public and private schools in Palm Beach and Martin counties that use ongoing "green" programs, projects and practices to instill a culture of sustainability on their school campus, in the minds of their students, and in their community. Our

Earth Week campaign will have a sustainability focus: compostable straws, reusable cups, recycling, etc.

F. Children's Health & Safety:

1. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/14/19, 6a-7a, 13:34 minute. Keri Morrison, Executive Director & mother of Jake, who died due to drowning discussed the importance of learning to swim at a young age. She also discussed the importance of knowing how to swim & learn proper water safety for both children & adults, especially in the state of Florida, since we are surrounded by water, have many lakes & pools. Each year, about 4,000 people drown in the United States; drowning kills more children 1-4 years of age than anything else except birth defects. Among children 1-14, drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury death (after motor vehicle crashes). More than half of those who are treated in an emergency department for drowning require hospitalization or transfer for further care (compared with about 6% of all unintentional injuries). A person who survives drowning may suffer lasting consequences like brain damage. The Live Like Jake Foundation was created to raise awareness for drowning prevention and provide swim lesson scholarships to those who cannot afford them as well as provide financial and emotional support to families who have lost a loved one or have a child with critical care needs.
2. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/19/19, 6a-7a, 14:18 minutes. Liz Schmidt the Director of Water Safety at the YMCA of South Palm Beach County's Water Smart Program discussed that May is National Drowning Prevention Month and the perfect time to discuss water safety in South Florida. In 2017, Florida led the nation in child drownings and continues to rank highest in the nation. Liz provided pool safety tips, boating safety tips, tips on protecting pools properly, and tips on rip current safety while at the beach. She strongly recommends that all children & adults in South Florida learn to swim. The YMCA offers free swim lessons for children 3-11 years old for 1 week in May.
3. South Florida Sunday Show: 6/9/19, 6a-7a, 15:39 minutes. Nicole Grossmayer, Executive Director of Little Smiles, says her organization uses funding from local sources to "help kids be kids" through difficult times from Orlando to Miami, but primarily in its home base of Palm Beach County. To that end, the organization partners with hospitals, nurses, social workers, police, group and foster homes, and the Drug Abuse Foundation to help children cope with challenges and to forget about those issues for a while. They offer events and activities such as pizza and movie nights to "bring the fun" to children and their families in hospitals. The organization is volunteer-driven, with help from corporations, the Junior League, and other entities that support a staff of two and a Board of 13 people. Their keynote event, the Eighth Annual Bamboozle takes place on August 24 from 6-8pm on Clematis Street. It includes six bars and restaurants that will have an adventure-style scavenger hunt with various challenges and a "Party like its 1999" theme for Little Smiles' for 20th anniversary. Grossmayer says Kyle Pacheco, a member of what the organization calls "Our Kids Upstairs" who have succumbed to their illness,

inspired the event with his energy and positive attitude upon being diagnosed with cancer in 2002. Additional information is available at littlesmilesfl.org or (561) 899-4700.

4. South Florida Sunday Show: 6/16/19, 6a-7a, 8:05 minutes. Stephanie Duesing, Director of Marketing and Public Relations for Boys & Girls Club of Palm Beach County discusses the organization's missions and programs. Founded in 1971, BGC of PBC serves youth ages 6-18 with year-round after-school camps and activities, as well as summer camps and supply drives, through 13 neighborhood clubs. The mission is to enable young people to reach their full potential as protective, caring and responsible citizens by offering them a safe place to spend time. The \$30 annual fee covers most programs, including those that encourage academic success, career readiness, character and leadership and healthy lifestyles. The summer camp is open Monday-Friday from 7am-6pm and on school holidays, while it is open Monday-Friday from 2-6pm or 8pm during regular school days. Anyone interested may contact their neighborhood club and apply for membership. More information is available at www.bgcpsc.org. Teens, known as junior staff, help with the younger children, and are comprise a big component in the organization's mission. One example is the Career-bound 2.0 program, a holistic approach geared toward 13-18 year-old career and college-bound teens. It offers help with applying and interviewing, test prep and job readiness. The organization has a network of community and corporate partners that assist with the back-to-school backpack and supply drive for low-income students. They are currently accepting donations of supplies. In addition, volunteer opportunities are available. Anyone interested may serve as a mentor, donate a course, donate to the back-to-school backpack and supply drive, or participate in corporate challenges.

G. Animal Awareness:

1. South Florida Sunday Show: 4/7/19, 6a-7a, 16:19 minute. Barbari Masi & USMC Andrew Laney spoke of the importance of service animals for military veterans. The animals not only provide assistance, but companionship and unconditional love to the vet. Awesome Greyhound Adoptions, Inc. is a 501c3 corporation completely run by volunteers who are dedicated to finding responsible, loving homes for racing greyhounds that no longer qualify to compete at the racetrack. We support the southeast Florida area, including Palm Beach, Martin and St. Lucie Counties. Awesome Greyhound Adoptions offers the Hounds & Heroes program with the Greyhounds in their care. These highly-trainable greyhounds are given the chance to find placement as pets, as therapy dogs or as fully-trained service dogs for veterans with PTSD or who need mobile assistance.
2. South Florida Sunday Show: 5/12/19, 6a-7a, 9:18. Public Service Officer Barbara Masi from the Palm Beach County Sheriff's office spoke about Bark-A-Thon 2019, a PBSO event, in conjunction with Big Dog Ranch Rescue & many other local animal rescue organization at the South Florida Fairgrounds on Saturday, June 1, 2019. She also spoke about the importance of adopting pets and the number of homeless and abandoned pets in Palm Beach County. Many abandoned pets find their way to the Palm Beach County Animal Care & Control unity or one of the many pet rescue

organizations where they hope to place these pets in a new home. Bark-A-Thon features all breed dog adoptions as well as cats, birds, reptiles and other mammals. This one day adoption event is free to the public and there are severely discounted adoption fees.

3. South Florida Sunday Show: 6/2/19, 6a-7a, 14:31 minutes. Lauren Ellis, Development and Marketing Manager for Peggy Adams Animal Rescue League, also known as the Humane Society of the Palm Beaches, discusses the organization's mission as it celebrates its 94th anniversary. They offer dog and cat adoptions, affordable wellness clinic, boutique, spay and neuter, microchipping, vaccinations, and TNVR (trap, neuter, vaccinate and return) procedures of feral and community cats. To support TNVR, the center opened a neonatal kitten nursery in 2016. The center will break ground in spring 2020 on a new pet adoption facility on the existing campus to support local growth. They take in pets through transfers, lost dogs and cats, and owners that need to give up their pets. Peggy Adams also serves as an emergency placement partner for HSUS and ASPCA in disaster areas. Adoption information is available at peggyadams.org. The center relies on grants, since it receives no federal or state funding. Operational costs are covered through programs and services, donors, business partners, and corporations. The center's transparency has earned it the "Charity Navigator Award" for five years. Volunteer and foster opportunities are listed online. Ellis emphasizes the need for a hurricane plan and supplies for pets.
