MLB RETURN: With more than 100,000 fans packing into Olympic Stadium for two Blue Jays exhibition games, we ask members of ExposNation about the efforts to bring a Major League Baseball team back to Montreal. CROSS-BORDER GAMES: Will Lake Placid consider being part of the first-ever cross-border Winter Olympics? TINY POLLUTANTS MAY BE BIG THREAT TO LAKE CHAMPLAIN: Lake Champlain is the sixth-largest freshwater lake in the United States and while much of the focus in recent years has been on excessive nutrients seeping into the lake, there is growing concern over a new pollutant. Tiny pieces of plastic and synthetic fibers that come from everyday household products, even our clothes, are turning up in the lake. It may not sound like a big deal, but most of these fibers and particles are so small they can't even be seen with the naked eye. Scientists say these bits & pieces of pollution carry toxic chemicals that are being eaten by fish and moving up the food chain. Congress has moved to ban some of these plastics, called microbeads, which are used in many health and beauty products. But will the ban only tackle part of the problem? Could other, even smaller pieces of plastic, in greater numbers, be threatening the Lake's ecosystem? We'll talk with scientists who are investigating the environmental damage tiny pollutants may be causing to the Lake. Our panelists include: Dr. Danielle Garneau, an associate professor from the Center for Earth and Environmental Science at SUNY Plattsburgh; Mark Malchoff, an Aquatic Resources Specialist with Lake Champlain Sea Grant; Mike Winslow, staff scientist with the Lake Champlain Committee in Burlington; Bill Howland, Director of the Lake Champlain Basin Program. We

also look at efforts to tackle other pollutants threatening Lake Champlain including runoff, excessive nutrients, and blue-green algae. We are joined by Plattsburgh City Councilor Mike Kelly who will discuss a resolution passed by the Council that calls on members of Congress to ban the transport of oil by rail along Lake Champlain. City Councilors have voiced safety concerns over trains hauling millions of gallons of crude oil through the city and along the shore of the lake. They warn a derailment or spill could be an environmental disaster for Lake Champlain.

OIL TRAIN BAN: The City Councils in Plattsburgh, New York and Burlington, Vermont have joined several environmental groups in calling on Congress to ban the transport of oil by rail along Lake Champlain. They say the dramatic increase in the amount of oil being moved by rail also increases the risk of a catastrophic accident, or spill, which threatens both residents and the lake's ecosystem. PIPELINE VERSUS RAIL: Canadian Prime Minister Trudeau is moving ahead with plans for a proposed pipeline to carry crude from Western Canada to Quebec and New Brunswick that would reduce the reliance on shipping oil by rail. We talk with McGill University Business Professor Karl Moore about that project and Trudeau's recent visit to Washington. Moore also talks about Canadian political leaders bailing out aerospace and rail manufacturer Bombardier and the closing of Target stores in Canada. VANISHING MONARCHS: A new theory into the mystery of why Monarch butterflies are vanishing. For several years, scientists have theorized the loss of Milkweed plants, which Monarch larvae and caterpillars feed on, have been a major factor in the dwindling population that migrates up to 3,000 miles from Canada and the Northeastern U.S. to mountain forests in Central Mexico. We'll hear from a Cornell University researcher who believes the greatest threats facing the butterflies lie somewhere during the final leg of their amazing yearly migration, through Texas and Mexico, and beyond the stages where the Monarchs rely on sufficient amounts of Milkweed. RECORD CROP: After an early warm-up in March had many predicting an off-year, the maple season had a second run, and for many producers in the Adirondacks a bumper crop. Mike Farrell with the Cornell Maple Research Station in Lake Placid, NY says it turned out to be a record year in the North Country, and between Northeastern U.S. and Canada, Farrell says it will be the biggest crop the world has ever seen. BREAKING NEW GROUND: Clinton Community College has broken ground on its new 11-million dollar Institute for Advanced Manufacturing, which is scheduled to open for the fall semester in 2017. The state-of-the-art tech center will house the college's engineering and tech programs as well as be a training facility for employers looking for local workers with the skills they need for manufacturing and engineering jobs of the future. MANUFACTURING HUBS: U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand tours the Demers Ambulance Assembly Plant in Plattsburgh and talks about legislation she has introduced in Congress that may help grow the North Country's manufacturing industry. Gillibrand's bill would designate areas with clusters of manufacturers as "hubs" that would be given priority for federal money to assist with training or developing sites. ONE ON ONE INTERVIEW: North Country Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Garry Douglas talks about the significance of the new Institute for Advanced Manufacturing, and plans by a Norwegian company, Norsk Titanium, to build a state-of-the-art 3-D printing plant in Plattsburgh that will manufacture aerospace components made from titanium. The company is getting 125-million dollars in funding from the State of New York, and says it should create upwards of 400 jobs. Douglas also discusses efforts to revive a long-delayed project to service jets on the former Air Force Base in Plattsburgh that could create as many as 900 jobs. raise New York's minimum wage to \$15 an hour over the next 5 years. Douglas believes there may be efforts to raise the minimum wage to \$15 even sooner.
