ISSUE: EDUCATION

Broadcast Date: April 25/ 9 p.m.

Length: 2:03

Source: Local

Description: An Oklahoma Congressman attaches an amendment to a bill allowing teachers with a training course to carry firearms in school. Teachers would voluntarily carry the firearms under the bill. Oklahoma City Public Schools officials are not happy with the bill and speak out against it. Local gun ranges say they will be happy to add specialized course for school teachers.

Description: Eight students outside Oklahoma City School District who received initial admission to the Classen School for Advanced Studies are denied enrollment. Oklahoma City Public Schools say they can't do anything about the problem because the students are out of district and priority is given to students who live inside Oklahoma City limits. The school district says they will take precautions to fix the problem in the coming year.

The owner of the shop says she would rather have the sex offenders at her shop than at the various strip clubs around town. The issues goes up before city council.

Description: As the City of Moore rebuilds following devastating May tornadoes, public officials are urging residents and volunteers to visit Moore businesses. Officials say that instead of driving by slowly and staring visitors can go inside and grab a bite to eat or purchase some new clothes. Officials note that donations are not needed as much as customers in businesses.

ISSUE: LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Description: A local lawmaker begins pushing a bill to create an Amber Alert style system for runaway teens. The bill is named after a teen that has been missing since October 2012. Wilson's case did not meet the Amber Alert material. The lawmaker is confident about the bill but says it may stall out in Senate committee.

Description: After the vote on Oklahoma's budget, one of the biggest bills of the session, Fox 25 learns that one lawmaker was able to vote without being in the Capitol building. Opposition legislators say the proxy vote questions the legality of the budget vote and opens it up to a constitutional challenge. Some law makers say the proxy vote doesn't matter but others say it opens up a slippery slope of lawmakers breaking the rules.

Description: Nursing home advocates claim a victory as a bill they fought hard to enact in Oklahoma is signed into law. The "Protect Our Loved Ones Act" cruised through both chambers of the Oklahoma legislature this fall and allows cameras in nursing home rooms without the fear of retaliation from the facilities. The law was written after several elderly individuals were being physically abused.

ISSUE: WOMAN'S ISSUES

Description: Oklahomans are torn as the debate on over purchasing the morning after pill over the counter continues. New legislation could make the pill available to anyone of any age.

Currently the pill is available to anyone over the age of 17. Those under 17 need a prescription. Several family advocate groups would like the federal government to step in and stop the legislation.

Description: Two-thirds of Oklahoma hospitals are implementing policies to eliminate unnecessary early births. This is being done after research says births before 39 weeks carry an enhanced risk of neonatal respiratory distress.

Description: A Moore family that survived two close tornado had their home burn down after being struck by lightning. The family is expecting their second child just days after the fire burned down their home. Their oldest child survived the May 20 tornado in Plaza Towers Elementary. A fund has been set up to help the family recover.
