ECONOMIC ISSUES IN UPPER PENINSULA

A big layoff at Delta County's largest employer. The Billerud paper mill is idling over a quarter of its workforce, some 280 employees. CLEAN ENERGY BILL EFFECTS ON UPPER PENINSULA

Governor Whitmer has signed clean energy legislation into law, which requires all of the state's electricity must come from so-called "clean" sources by 2035. State Representative Jenn Hill is pushing back on claims that new state energy legislation will usurp local control over wind and solar projects. The Soo Tribe of Chippewa say it will appeal a federal court ruling on tribal fishing rights. The ruling from U.S. District Court Judge Paul Maloney would regulate tribal fishing rights for the next 24 years. The Keweenaw Bay Tribe of Chippewa cleared one hurdle Tuesday in its efforts to get compensated for land it says was stolen from them. MACKINAC STRAITS UTILITY TUNNEL/LINE FIVE

After a five-year delay, the Michigan Public Service Commission Friday okayed construction of a tunnel to house an oil and gas pipeline now submerged in the straits of Mackinac. U-P State Senator Ed McBroom says, however, that the Army Corps of Engineers is delaying a decision on a tiny easement needed for the tunnel until 2026. U.P.'s Morning News. Former Congressman and U.S. Senate candidate Mike Rogers says small business faces a blizzard of regulations at both the state and federal level. UPPER PENINSULA FORESTS PROTECTION VS USAGE

State Senator Ed McBroom is speaking out about a proposal to designate 51-thousand acres of the U-P's Ottawa National Forest as a federally protected wilderness. McBroom says the designation would mean a prohibition on cutting timber either for sale or to manage wildfire hazards. Mc Broom says the wilderness idea is not supported by the people of the U-P, but originates with a group from Chicago and a state senator from Ann Arbor. U.P.'s Morning News. Two members of the U-P's state house delegation also oppose the proposed wilderness area.
