TSA Precheck Center expedites boarding for some passengers who qualify. Background checks are performed on people who apply for Precheck. This will expedite boarding. Not everyone needs to be screened the same. They need to be US citizens who apply online and provide basic information provide ID and pay \$85.00. The identification lasts for 5 years. When you buy your ticket you provide your Precheck number and you are in!. Approximately, 1300 people have enrolled at Sky Harbor already at Terminal 4 level 2. There is a center in Gilbert which also verifies eligibility for employment.

Family Promise is a non-profit organization founded in New York. Churches began opening their doors to homeless families. Here in Arizona the network began slowly. In 2000 the first congregation offered sheltered. Family Promise is small. Only about 12 families at a time. It is very cost effective. Children who are homeless have behavioral problems later in life and learning problems. The ones helped by Family Promise quickly learn to trust others. Family pets are allowed in the family shelter. The families love being able to take care of their pets. The congregations pay for the food but the homeless families feed their pets. Familypromiseaz.org is their website which will explain more.
