Sunday, January 7 & February 3 - #309

In school shootings where the intruder is armed with a rifle, some police officers are outgunned. Brendan Keefe surveyed police departments across the country and found some school-based officers do not have access to a patrol rifle. Plus, a new report by the federal government strongly urges law enforcement agencies to enact policies to reduce high-speed chases in their communities.

Outgunned: While patrol rifles are usually standard issue for city police, that's not always the case for school police officers. The concern for some is that in the event of an armed intruder – police pistols aren't as effective as patrol rifles because officers must generally get closer for an accurate shot. In some cases, that could mean a school resource officer might be outgunned by a shooter. In this story, we sampled departments nationwide and found school officers without patrol rifles. In the Atlanta area, some school departments decided to change that as a result of our questions. You'll hear from police, the National Association of School Resource Officers, and the mother of a school shooting survivor in Nashville.

High-Speed Stakes: Police chases can have deadly consequences – not just for officers or those they are pursuing – but for innocent drivers and other bystanders. In this story, we look at the number of police chases nationwide where people have been killed, and why some experts say that risk isn't worth the potential of catching a criminal, particularly those who are accused of low-level offenses. Now, the DOJ has released a report outlining new recommendations for when law enforcement should chase and when they should let the person go. For example, they say now pursuits should only happen for a violent crime or when there's an imminent threat they'll commit another violent crime. InvestigateTV speaks with the researchers behind the report and a mother who lost her 12-year-old son when a car he was in was being chased – with a driver not accused of a violent crime.

Danger for Sale: When you buy a new car, the dealership can't sell it to you if it has any open safety recalls. That's not the case with used cars. Cars that can catch fire, or are equipped with potentially deadly airbags, can all be sold without being fixed, and without any warning to the buyer. This report shares the story of one woman who bought a used car, not knowing it had a federal safety recall attached to it. The only reason she found out was because she got into a crash when her vehicle started swaying on the road. A consumer safety expert explains there are no laws protecting people from these dangers. This report takes a closer look at dangerous used cars that can be sold and what you can do to protect yourself from ending up with one.

Flood-Damaged Vehicles: According to a Carfax analysis there are hundreds of thousands of flood damaged vehicles on the road right now. And more could soon flood the market. Susan Campbell shows what to watch out for.

Sunday, January 14 & February 10- #310

Machines that look like the slots found in Las Vegas casinos are popping up in gas stations, convenience stores, bars and social halls across the nation. But as Joce Sterman found, while they may look similar, these games play by a different set of rules, which has created regulatory headaches and confusion nationwide. Plus, the federal government has proposed a new rule that would prohibit companies from paying for positive online reviews and other deceptive practices.

Gaming the System: So-called "skill games" have popped up in bars, convenience stores and gas stations across the country. They look and sound just like slot machines, but they're largely unregulated, operating in a gray area. Opponents argue the lack of regulation in many states means less protection for consumers and addicted gamblers - and a loss of billions of dollars in tax revenue. But supporters are racking up court victories - with the courts saying their games are fair and deserve to stay. We look at the complex battle to deal with "gray games" and interview a man who lost nearly half a million dollars playing them.

Five Star Fakes – Paying for Positives: The federal government is looking to crack down on fake reviews for products and services you buy online. The Federal Trade Commission is proposing a new rule to help consumers make better decisions. That proposed rule would ban companies from trading negative or positive ratings, so you don't get duped by finding them. Our national investigative team continues its yearlong investigation into Five Star Fakes. Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa talks to a man who says he was bribed by a company to remove a negative review, and she highlights the latest scam, where fraudsters are boosting the ratings for products you buy online. We find out if the new rules will make a difference - and how companies are skirting the current law by bribing consumers to write fake testimonials.

Button Battery Dangers: In the United States, a child visits an emergency department for a batteryrelated injury every 75 minutes, with more than 80% of patients under the age of 5. That's according to a recent Safe Kids Worldwide study that analyzed nearly a decade's worth of data. Experts say the button or coin batteries that power many small electronics in our homes pose a serious risk to children prone to placing shiny objects in their mouths. Lynn Kawano spoke with a woman who pushed for legislative change after her 18-month-old daughter tragically died in a button battery incident.

Watching Your Wallet – Junk Fees: The government is going after junk fees, but will that save you any money? In this Watching Your Wallet, Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa talks to an expert about what these fees are and what you can expect to see over the next year.

Sunday, January 21 & February 17- #311

Drug agents are searching innocent people boarding flights at airports across the nation. The DEA and local police aren't making many arrests but they are seizing money from passengers, even when no drugs are found. Brendan Keefe tracked down plain clothes agents as they searched passengers at the gate. Plus, A criminology expert says the homicide clearance rate in the U.S. is the worst in the western world. We investigate what can be done to reverse the trend, and we take you inside a state lab to see how detectives use unique markings on bullet shells to bring criminals to justice.

In Plane Sight: Drug agents are searching passengers at airline gates and jetways without probable cause. They're not making arrests or even finding drugs in most cases — the agents are looking for cash. When they find it, they seize the money under civil forfeiture laws that allow them to take cash with no actual evidence of drug trafficking. For example, in Atlanta, most of the supposedly random targets are people of color. Merely traveling to Los Angeles on a one-way ticket is enough to cause a search, and if agents find any significant amount of money, the passengers have to prove — on the spot — that the money didn't come from drug dealing. TSA alerts officers when the screeners see cash, even though it's not illegal to travel domestically with any amount of money. We investigate this practice at airports, speak to people who've had this experience, and take the questionable practice to Washington, D.C.

Fight for Justice: FBI data found in 2021 that nearly 23,000 people were killed. Criminology experts estimate that nearly half of those cases won't be solved, leaving the killers free and families without justice. Some experts say the clearance rate in the U.S. is the worst in the western world. We dig into the data and find out what can be done to reverse the trend.

Stolen Guns: Tens of thousands of guns are reported stolen every year across the country, according to an analysis of FBI data. And the feds believe the number of stolen firearms in the U.S. is likely higher because many gun thefts go unreported. We uncover a growing trend – guns stolen from parked cars – and share tips on how to prevent theft.

Watching Your Wallet – Phantom Debt: Every year thousands of consumers are conned into paying debts they don't really owe. It's called "phantom debt" and in this Watching Your Wallet Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa talks to a federal agency about how you can avoid falling victim.

Sunday, January 28 & March 10- #312

For many visiting the final resting place of their loved one is cherished. But African American cemeteries across the nation face dangers of being erased, desecrated or built over. It's a problem families say they've endured for decades. Caresse Jackman hears from some about the challenges they've faced while fighting to preserve their ancestors' burial sites.

Sacred Ground: Whether it's a memorial, burial site, or a site where their loved one's ashes were released, sacred ground is often cherished and honored. But that's not the case for some people in this country. African American burial grounds across the nation constantly face dangers of being erased or destroyed by development. One man shares his story about how his family's long history and how his ancestors' burial site is being erased by development. We also give historical context and legal reasons surrounding why tracking and discovering Black burial grounds is lacking or non-existent in most states—and investigate what is being done at a federal level.

Sacred Ground Part Two: For members of the Black community, maintaining the upkeep and maintenance of the final resting place of their ancestors (especially post-slavery) has remained a hurdle, mystery, and a fight for generations. One family says their ancestors' bodies were exhumed and removed without their approval. InvestigateTV found multiple cases where the lack of record keeping and funding has left families in a bind. We also uncovered states' failures to properly record Black cemeteries across the country and explore potential solutions. We spoke with local experts leading the nation in efficient databases to track Black cemeteries, despite funding issues.

Neighbors Clean Cemetery: More than a decade after power crews discovered an African American cemetery in disarray a group of neighbors has made it their mission to make sure it's properly maintained. Emilie Zuhowski tells us how the group hopes to honor the former enslaved people and their descendants buried there.

Sunday, February 25 & March 17 - #313

Troubled dentists are often allowed to surrender their license to avoid more severe discipline. Joce Sterman examined records from the boards responsible for holding these providers accountable. Plus, medical advocates ask for stricter training for dentists to prevent dental deaths.

The Dental Record: You see them for regular cleanings, cavities and checkups – but what dentists do can have a huge impact on your health. And when they screw up – who's holding them accountable for wrongdoing, injuries and deaths? Our national investigative team drilled into the discipline of dentists across the country. Our analysis of hundreds of records from dental boards in nearly every state in the nation shows that when dentists engage in misconduct that puts patients at risk, act incompetently and mess up procedures, causing harm – or even end up in jail – the punishment for their actions is often less than severe...including some allowed to give up their licenses rather than face significant sanctions from the dental board. InvestigateTV talks with the family of a woman whose daughter was killed by a dentist who illegally gave her dangerous, addictive drugs for months – but was still allowed to surrender his license rather than have it revoked. And we take our questions about accountability and transparency to the association representing dental boards nationwide – and find serious questions worth investigating within that organization.

The Dental Record Part Two: When you're knocked out for surgery – an anesthesiologist handles your sedation & monitors your vital signs as another doctor focuses on the procedure at hand. But that's not the case with most dentists tasked with not only managing what's happening in your mouth but ALSO making sure you come out of the chair alive and unharmed. They're not always successful – with our team discovering deaths and injuries across the nation, along with a lack of uniform guidelines & standards when it comes to critical training for dentists and staff, monitoring during procedures, case tracking, and reporting requirements when patients are hurt or die. Joce Sterman talks to a Harvard expert leading the call for change in the dental industry and the widow of a prominent cardiologist who died during a routine dental procedure.

'Death with Dignity' Law: Physician-assisted suicide or physician-assisted death is controversial and now legal in 10 states and Washington, D.C. But one state opened the door for anyone to travel there to seek assistance with dying. Anna Katayama takes us to Oregon where some are searching for solutions to streamline the process.

Watching Your Wallet – Updating Beneficiaries: It's one of those things people forget about until they have a life-changing event. But naming the family members who will get your assets in the event of a death is so important. In this Watching Your Wallet, Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa explains why you should make sure your beneficiaries are up to date to start the new year.

A government agency says you shouldn't trust "non-toxic" labels on everything – especially water beads. While many major retailers announced they'd no longer sell the product as toys – our team finds they're available – often with just a new description. Plus, hundreds of sets of cremated remains, known as cremains, sit in a USPS facility, undeliverable, months or even years after being sent.

Defective – Non-Toxic: Major retailers have said they would stop selling water beads marketed to children due to thousands of injuries and at least one death, but we've found many remain for sale online. Many of those water beads also say they are "non-toxic" on the labels, but as one mom found out when her child nearly died swallowing a water bead, that label doesn't carry a lot of weight. We look into the phrase "non-toxic" and the Consumer Product Safety Commission's findings when it comes to water beads and toxicity – plus how water beads are being advertised online.

Missing in the Mail: When a family needs to ship their loved ones' cremated remains, they must use the U.S. Postal Service. But sometimes the cremains don't make it to the family. A recent federal audit found more than 400 sets of undeliverable cremains - sometimes because the USPS doesn't comply with its own procedures. We investigate where unidentified cremains end up and alert a Senator who called for the audit that there's been no movement for reunification. Plus – hear from families who are still waiting on their mothers and grandmother to be returned with dignity and had no idea the government found issues with the USPS handling of cremains.

Delivery Dangers: According to the U.S. Postal Service, mail carriers are tasked with delivering more than 162 million pieces of mail nationwide every single day. Oftentimes they're a familiar, even friendly face in our neighborhoods. But according to USPS data, nearly 500 mail carriers were robbed on their routes in 2022, with that number on track to be even higher in 2023. Heather Graf digs into the increase and the call for change.

Watching Your Wallet – Check Washing: A clever scam continues to surge in popularity, and it means you really need to be careful about using checks to make payments. In this Watching Your Wallet Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa finds out how you can avoid becoming a target.

Sunday, March 31 - #315

Some homeowners are concerned their homes may be undervalued because of their race. Caresse Jackman looks into cases of alleged housing discrimination—and what's being done for those being undervalued. Plus, we examine how fake deeds have families fighting for what they own.

Undervalued: Home ownership is one of the keys to generational wealth. But appraisal bias is keeping many black and brown families from achieving that American dream and widening the racial wealth gap. InvestigateTV examines the appraisal industry and housing discrimination using public records to document how appraisal bias is impacting communities. Caresse Jackman talks with one homeowner whose bias case is being investigated by the feds after he says a lowball appraisal came in more than \$100,000 less than he expected, costing him an opportunity to obtain his dream property. Plus, we look at solutions, talk to an appraiser and a researcher who says there's more to the numbers.

Deed Fraud: It's a misdeed that could cost everything you own. Houses stolen from families after fake deeds were filed on their homes. Ciara Cummings reveals one small factor that makes it even easier for thieves.

Sacred Ground – Unfunded: Hundreds of black cemeteries across the country are at risk of being destroyed by construction, development and neglect. Despite Congress passing a bill to help protect those sites, the program still has no federal funding to help those communities. Consumer Investigator Caresse Jackman spoke with leaders on capitol hill to explain what's happening, as African Americans fight to preserve sacred ground.

Repair Despair: At least 54 million U.S. adults have been in credit card debt for the last year according to a new study, and some might still be paying off debt they've accumulated during the holidays last year. Credit card balances are increasing faster than any other type of debt – putting consumers in vulnerable positions. But government agencies are warning of a new scam with credit debt relief programs convincing consumers that they can fix their problem by just paying a small "fee". Searching all over social media, consumers are turning to these programs without knowing the true financial cost if they choose the wrong company. Consumer Investigator Rachel DePompa digs into companies banned from the credit repair business, talks to experts in the business on the warning signs and speaks with a woman who was able to pay off more than \$20K in debt-- with help from a nonprofit organization.
