



The following is an excerpt from Breezeline's Channel Leased Application form and expresses the company's policy with respect to indecent leased access programming.

Section IV - Sexually Explicit Programming

- A. **Obscene Programming:** It is Breezeline's policy to comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations concerning the transmission of sexually explicit programming over leased access channels. The transmission of obscene programming or other programming not protected by the Constitution over the cable system is a crime pursuant to Section 639 of the Communications Act, 47 U.S.C. S S59. Because cable operators face criminal and civil liability for the transmission of such programming over leased access channels pursuant to Section 638 of the Communications Act, 47 U.S.C. § 558, Breezeline will not permit programmers to transmit obscene programming over the cable system. Please complete the following certification that the proposed programming is not obscene:

I certify that the programming described in Section III above is not obscene or otherwise unprotected under the Constitution. _____ (Applicant's initials)

Failure to complete this portion of the Application will result in the rejection of the entire Application by Breezeline. Applicant will, therefore, not be permitted to transmit its programming over a leased access channel.

- B. **Indecent Programming:** It is Breezeline's policy to prohibit indecent programming pursuant to Section 61 2(h) of the Communications Art, 47 U.S.C. § 532(h). Please read carefully and complete the following certification that the proposed programming is not indecent:

I certify that the programming described in Section III above is not indecent; namely it does not describe or depict sexual or excretory activities or organs in a patently offensive manner as measured by contemporary community standards. _____ (Applicant's initials)

Failure to complete this portion of the Application will result in the rejection of the entire Application by Breezeline. Applicant will, therefore, not be permitted to transmit its programming over a leased access channel.
