Animals classified as canines (K9s) have rightfully earned the title 'man's best friend' through centuries of companionship, comfort and unmatched service to humanity. Even people who prefer cats have to admit, dogs are pretty special. "Most of us know, people that pet dogs, the dog provides comfort, they get happy when they do -- and so we wanna make people happy," says Chaplain Ron Leonard with for Canines for Christ. Dogs who sign up with Canines for Christ take car rides with their families to visit sick people in cancer wards, lonely people in nursing homes, stressed people in police stations, forgotten people in prisons and anywhere else tails need to wag. "Our dogs have been able to break through depression to assure people that God really does love them and care for them," which Leonard says lifts people to better health physically, emotionally and spiritually.</p>

Their passengers never complain about leg room, and with four-legs each, they would likely have a lot to say. Instead, these travelers typically wag their tails and offer up grateful licks for landing a one-way flight for life. The co-founders of Pittsburgh Aviation Animal Rescue Team (PAART) didn't set out to use their 1974 Piper Warrior to relocate dogs from overcrowded shelters, but one phone call back in 2009 changed the game. "Our first thought was, 'why would you fly an animal in your airplane?'," admits Plesset but "when we learned this animal was gonna be euthanized if it didn't get a ride to Philadelphia, we knew right away this was something we could be passionate about." Plesset and Childs adopted the motto, "No Dog Left Behind," and combining their love of flying with their love of animals they created a non-profit network of shelters and pilots. PAART mostly serves states in the eastern U.S. and Midwest but has big dreams for nationwide expansion. Costs are covered solely by donations and sponsorships and until they can afford a bigger plane, flights are limited to 250nm (nautical miles).</p>

That's one example of the many questions Dr. Kevin Jones has been tasked with answering. The questions come from kids and the response needs to be age-appropriate for children in elementary school. The kids' curiosity about faith is part of a three-year video mission for LifeWay's "The Gospel Project," a curriculum used by many churches and Christian schools. Dr. Jones comes well qualified. He's dean and assistant professor of education at Cedarville University and also has a background in elementary education. Filming for the 108 videos is taking place at the university's Ohio campus. Dr. Jones tells us he is very deliberate about his approach to responding to a kid's question. "What does the Bible say about this question? Because the Bible is our final authority, right? Because what the kid doesn't need is my thoughts." When we asked him about children asking pretty bold and direct questions, Dr. Jones smiled and said, "Yes, that's the beauty!" He believes kids usually have a "heart posture...of pureness and sincerity" when they ask honest questions.</p>

They were on the long trek to raise awareness and funding for a Dream Center project in Colorado City, once home to an infamous polygamous leader. Just past 500 miles into the hike, Luke and Annalee climbed down at a tricky point on the trail and saw a boulder start to move! Luke immediately went into dad mode and pushed his daughter out of the way, "thinking I could get out of the way as well, but it caught me." The boulder, estimated to weigh 8,000 pounds, "rolled me for about 15, 20 feet [headfirst]," but then, "it teetered upon a rock, somehow miraculously, so my daughter could pull me out." "I broke my femur, I broke my hip, I broke my forearm, three ribs and lots of stitches and bandages along the way." Incredibly, the boulder onslaught did not derail the Barnetts' mission. All the media attention to the close brush with death led to massive interest in the Short Creek Dream Center and saw \$2,000,000 raised...instead of the hoped for \$1,000,000! At this point in our story, it would seem reasonable to point to this particular Bible verse: "And we know that God causes everything to work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to his purpose for them." The Gateway Church Coffield Prison Campus, with more than 4,000 inmates, launched their first services at the end of 2018 with more than 300 men in attendance. Brian knew it was important for the teaching staff to come together, with social distancing, and laugh and have some fun. As the non-profit explains, "According to the United States Census Bureau, more than one in six South Florida households are currently struggling with food insecurity ... A community fridge is a refrigerator located in a public space that enables food to be shared amongst the community. Anyone can put food in and take food out! Thank You” – After 17 Years, Army Vet Catches Up with Kids Who Encouraged Him with Letters Sent to Iraq It was 2003. Nearly 200,000 American troops were in Iraq. This resulted in the removal of dictator Saddam Hussein and led to an extended deployment of allied forces in the region. Among those was West Virginia soldier Mark Bland. At the time, many school children were urged to write letters of encouragement to soldiers they knew and even those they didn't. Ways were arranged to get the letters and packages to the troops. Mark recalls, “We were getting care packages and troop fan mail from all over the country and these would be from kids in second grade to full-grown adults just saying, ‘Hey we’re praying for you guys, we’re thinking about you...We’d love to pray for you...You guys are our heroes, what do you do over there? How’s the sandstorms?’” Fast-forward 17 years, Mark admits he never had the time to sit down and go through all the letters he had saved. One day recently, Mark was thanking his wife, Hannah, for all the letters she had mailed him in Iraq – more than 300 letters - when she was still his girlfriend. They looked at her letters and then the letters from all the school kids. “And I said, you know what would be a really cool project, to be able to use social media and try to find some of these kids and show them their letter and really just say ‘thank you’ for thinking of me back in 2003.” And that’s exactly what Mark is doing today at his Facebook blog site, P.S. Thank You. So far, Mark has been able to connect with 15 students, who are full-grown adults now, as well as some of the teachers who helped organized the letter-writing efforts.</p>

The barrage of mystifying information crowds into their minds alongside the other considerable pressures of growing up. This overload can drive kids into dangerous states of anxiety or depression. Suicides among young children have been steadily rising the last decade. The COVID19 pandemic made a dire situation even worse.</p>

Mental health experts urge parents, teachers and pastors to turn the tide of dark thoughts with these three little words: “Tell me more.” Monika Kelly gets advice from Maureen Underwood with the Society for the Prevention of Teen Suicide who also serves as a social worker and psychotherapist. Girls are more likely to attempt to take their own lives. Boys are more likely to succeed. Triggers include bullying, loss of a parent due to death or divorce, family history of depression or becoming convinced that no one in the world knows or understands them.</p>

Soldiers For Faith Ministries launched 'call-in' bible studies back in 2012, but stay-at-home orders in 2020 crystalized the ministry purpose and mission. “When the pandemic hit,” says founder Kelly McAndrew, “all of a sudden we understood what God had prepared us for.” Headquartered in Texas, with facilitators in New Jersey, Florida and Colorado, all Soldiers For Faith bible studies are by-phone only. They deliberately avoid video. “There’s something about just picking up the telephone, not having that judgement,” explains McAndrew. “It’s just absolutely pure to be on the phone, to hear people’s voices, to hear their hearts.”</p> <p>While the pandemic forced millions into unexpected solitude, McAndrew points to the millions of people with health limitations or disabilities who live that kind of isolation every day. Soldiers For Faith currently has about 25 ongoing studies, running one hour in length, all days of the week, early morning to night. The ministry is always looking for new group leaders to add more study options.</p>

Finances	Closer Look	2/28/21	7:00pm	29min	<p>Families Living on One-Income, Possible?</p> <p>Families with two working parents sometimes wonder – could we make it if one of us lost our job? “We live in a culture that I would call a ‘two-income world,’” says budgeting expert Mary Hunt. She readily admits the challenges of living on one income. “But here’s the good news – yes! yes you can do this.” Once a family has decided to test the waters of change, Hunt recommends a 7-Day Cash Diet for everyday expenses like gas and groceries. Buying in cash for a while “is the best way to pull in the reigns to manage your money in a reasoned way.” The next step is adding up what that second income is actually costing you. Expenses like gas to get to the job, daycare for the kids even the fast food you buy because you are too tired to cook – every dollar associated with working must be subtracted from the net pay. “What is the ‘real hourly wage’ of that second income?” Hunt says people are often shocked that their second income boils down to actually just \$1 or \$2 an hour and may be pushing them into a higher tax bracket. But can a family live – and happy and healthy on what seems to be less money per month? Hunt firmly believes they can. “You can’t do this overnight,” she cautions, as “sometimes parents need to go through a whole process of deciding who is going to be the one who gives up the formal income and how to make that one income stretch twice as far.” Then you may have to get out of debt to pave the way, “which means you have to stop using the credit cards.” And finally, she says, resist peer pressure to live beyond your means.</p>

And when a song he has written and performed can be of benefit to an outreach helping others, Matthew is often willing to come alongside and lend his name and talent to their project. That's the case with a ministry called Cancer Companions. When it comes to the anxiety that often accompanies a cancer diagnosis, Matthew looks at it this way: "I really think it does revolve around that word uncertainty. The unknown. A cancer diagnosis means you're about to walk a road. It's a road you've never walked before and you don't know how long that road is going to take you. You don't know what's on the other side of it, so my heart goes out to anybody who's dealing with a cancer diagnosis," Matthew speaks from his heart.</p>

"He was so afraid. And I knew that he wasn't doing well and he looked at me with so much fear in his eyes and he just kept asking me, 'Please tell me...am I going to live or am I going to die?' And at that point, I just took his hand and I knew that we were about to intubate him...once you get intubated, your survival rate was probably 10-to-20%...a really poor chance of making it through that." Leilani's response was honest and bold. "I took his hands and I looked him in the eye with all my gear on – I know all he could see was my eyes – so to be able to express what I was going to say meant so much at that point to calm him down...and I just said to him 'I don't know if you're going to die. I can't promise you anything, but I know that we're going to take great care of you, and I know that Jesus is here with you in this room right now.'" Leilani then led him through a salvation prayer. That patient passed away two weeks later. Leilani realizes that ICU patients are often sedated or in a medically-induced coma, "but I know that their spirit is still there and I just begin speaking to their spirit and whatever God has on my heart to speak to them at that moment, I say it to them. I do that quite often."</p> <p>How can people encourage healthcare workers? Leilani says nurses and other medical professionals were referred to as "heroes" when the pandemic first began, but in the media and culture, that has faded some. So, "When you see them, thank them and let them know that you still remember...and the sacrifices that they've made mean something." Nurses on the front lines, "They have a loss of hope, watching patients die constantly, they need our prayers."</p>

Once the person is released, the staff helps the individual find a long-lasting career.

He built them kid-size desks... for free! "I felt God kind of led me, you know, on the whole thing." Inspired by God and driven by compassion, Chambers, owner of Gateway Construction & Development, wanted to "give these kids something that they can create their own space to do some learning." He had heard of young students curling into closets and other areas to try and find a quiet and productive place to do their schoolwork at home. And Jonathan realized an appropriate size desk could make a big difference. He had the skills – and just asked for enough wood to eventually build 110 desks for kids in Pontiac, Michigan. Seeing how the community pitched in with donations, how God guided the project, and how children reacted, Jonathan shares, "It's been a really amazing journey for me, personally."

He reveals that especially during the COVID crisis, where visits from family have been restricted, the music DVDs have been a definite blessing, a lifeline to God. To date, through Operation Sing Again, the ministry has sent DVDs to nearly 16,000 care facilities around the nation. Gerald points out that only two nursing homes have declined the offer. Worth noting, Gerald tells us, even some nursing homes that offer services primarily to people of the Jewish faith, have been receptive.</p>

Kitchen on the Street serves more than 2000 children every year in more than 30 different schools. Ten years ago, they expanded the ministry to San Antonio, Texas. "I felt like as a Christian, a human being, a mother...all the things that you are...that if I had an interest in helping these kids, I knew others would as well," Lisa remembers. Kitchen on the Street volunteers pack "bags of hope," weekend nutrition packs filled with non-perishable food items that children can discreetly put in their backpacks on Fridays to bring home for the weekend.</p>
