On Pastors Under Fire: For over six months, it has been illegal for 99.9% of Californians to worship in Church and the state is taking enforcement seriously. A little over a week ago, a pastor was hauled before a court to face contempt for refusing to close his church because of the COVID-19 restrictions the governor has placed on churches in that state alone. The persecution is real and is not just in California. At the time of this taping, Illinois, New York, and many other states, have prohibited religious gatherings completely, imposing strict fines and potential jail time on those who violate their orders. No pastor or person in America should be forced to choose between worship or prison. The Liberty Counsel legal team is currently fighting battles across the United States so that churches can gather and practice religious freedom. Mat Staver, the Founder and Chairman of Liberty Counsel, explains the right to worship under the Constitution, what is happening in the United States, and the purpose of government. We hear from several pastors who have been under fire: Andrew Wommack, Founder of Wommack Ministries from Colorado; Senior Pastor Che Ahn of Harvest Rock Church from California; and Senior Pastor Ken Graves of Calvary Chapel Bangor from Maine; and Pastor Cristian Ionescu of Elim Romanian Pentecostal Church from Chicago. Pastor Ken shares that while his church can feed, shelter, and provide social services to an unlimited number of people, religious services remain limited in size and scope. We learn that the church is even more essential during this pandemic as poverty is generated, and suicide, depression, isolation, drug addiction, and drug overdose death rates continue to rise. Research shows there is only one group that we have not seen an increase in mental health problems and that is individuals who regularly attend church in 2020 compared to 2019.

CBN News Reporter Caitlin Burke Reports: Right now, an estimated 80 inmates are serving mandatory life sentences because of a federal "Three Strikes" drug law. He (Herman Tate) was sentenced to life at the age of 28 for a low-level, non-violent, drug offense. His sentence fell under the "Three Strikes" drug law passed by Congress in the 1980s. The law states that if someone is charged with a federal drug crime and already has two prior drug offenses, then that's the "third strike," and a federal prosecutor can require the judge to impose a mandatory life sentence. Tate's first strike came in 1992 for selling half a gram of crack. He was sentenced to six months' probation. He gained his second strike two years later. That time he sold 7.7 grams of cocaine and was sentenced to five years in prison, but was only required to serve eight months. Then in 1998, he struck out, charged with conspiracy to sell cocaine. Tate, however, had never heard of the "Three Strikes' drug law and since no drugs were found in his possession, he chose to go to trial. The prosecutor filed what's known as an 851 Notice. Tate headed to federal prison. It took two years for the gravity of his sentence to sink in. The "Three Strikes" federal drug law covers all 50 states. Many states have gone further, expanding Three Strikes laws that impose mandatory life sentences for three convictions of certain felonies. In California for example, the 1994 "Three Strikes You're Out" law was designed to keep murderers, rapists, and child molesters behind bars. Today, however, more than half sentenced under that law are serving life sentences for non-violent crimes, evidence that these Three Strike laws can result in unintended consequences. Many of her (Attorney MiAngel Cody, Director of the Decarceration Collective) clients were teenagers or young adults when convicted with their third strike, which basically erases taking into consideration the possibility of maturation and grown, stamping them instead as irredeemable. When Congress passed the Fair Sentencing Act in 2010, it provided the potential for a lower sentence but did nothing for those already in prison. Then in 2018, President Trump signed the First Step Act, which finally allowed the opportunity to reconsider prior sentences. In reading the new law, Tate regained a sense of hope for the first time in nearly 22 years as he realized that he fit the criteria. Cody and her team officially requested his life sentence be reduced. In January of 2020, Tate learned of his freedom. Cody and her team have won freedom for 50 men and women who were previously sentenced to die in prison. Still, a disproportionate number of those still behind bars are black. No legislation reforming the federal "Three Strikes" drug law includes those sentenced to life for marijuana convictions, but Cody believes more change is coming. Cody says now is the time for the American people to ask questions and put pressure on our elected officials. That's because voters can make a major impact at the ballot box and be the catalyst that helps keep Cody's clients and many others from being buried alive behind bars. The Decarceration Collective teamed up with the Buried Alive Project to produce a documentary sharing the stories of the men and women they've saved, but also those still serving life sentences under the "Three Strikes" law. Its release date is still to be determined.

CBN News Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: Murder rates saw a historic increase nationwide last year according to a report from the National Commission of COVID-19 and Criminal Justice. The study looked at crime rates in 34 cities ranging in size from New York to Norfolk, Virginia. In addition to the significant spike in homicides researchers found how the pandemic may have contributed to the uptick in violence. While 2020 will be remembered for deaths due to COVID-19, this report found an increase of 1,268 homicides over the year before. Statistics in urban areas tell an even bigger story. In Milwaukee, the total number of homicides increased by 85 percent. Seattle saw a 63 percent rise, while New York's murder rate shot up 43 percent. And in Chicago, a city known for shootings, there were 278 more murders in 2020, representing an increase of 55 percent. Other crimes such as stolen cars and aggravated assaults rose as well, but the report took a close look at the connection between the homicide increase and the coronavirus pandemic. It pointed to stress caused by isolation and extreme social restrictions, combined with economic loss and fear of death as possible factors. Still, COVID isn't the only reason behind the increase in murders. Extreme violence and "Defund the Police" riots wracked many cities following the police-related deaths of George Floyd and other African-Americans. Criminologists also cite increased gang violence and a surge in gun ownership. Filmmaker Dimas Salaberrios recently looked at the impact of surging violence in his faith-based film called, "Chicago: America's Hidden War" which is under consideration for an Academy Award. Salaberrios discussed its devastation on communities, particularly children, during an appearance on CBN's Faith Nation. Salaberrios said the church can make a difference. Meanwhile, experts say given these findings it is crucial we get the pandemic under control. Then law enforcement, the church and community leaders can work on ways to bring people together to stem violence across America.

CBN News Reporter Eric Philips Reports: The Superbowl weekend attack on a water treatment facility near Tampa, Florida has once again put the spotlight on the ever-present cyber threat in the U.S. Someone hacked into the plant's computer system and increased the level of lye going into the water. Fortunately, the deed was detected before anyone was hurt. In the days following the breach, investigators say they have leads but no suspects. It's just the latest strike in an ongoing cyberwar. U.S. lawmakers want to make sure Americans win this war. It's why they called a group of experts to Capitol Hill on Wednesday to try and figure out the best strategies to implement next. One expert points out the battleground is enormous. The panel provided Congress a "to do" list which included getting a leader, perhaps empowering the head of a government agency, to oversee cybersecurity in the civilian world. Also, experts say, the relationship between the public and private sectors in this area need to be seamless. Just weeks ago, prior to the Presidential Inauguration, hackers breached information technology contractor Solar Winds, gaining access to government agencies including the Treasury and Commerce Departments. President Biden followed up by earmarking \$10 billion in his COVID-19 relief plan for cybersecurity. John Mills is the former director of Cyber Security Policy, Strategy, and International Affairs. He tells CBN News, while they are all dangerous, China is chief. Sadly, though, this war must be waged inside U.S. borders as well, where experts say disinformation has become a main cyber threat. The cybersecurity experts said it is absolutely essential that the U.S. strike back when attacked. They add, however, leaders must strongly consider on a case-by-case basis whether such retaliation should take a cyber route or a physical one.

CBN News Reporter Eric Philips Reports: How many times a week do you think you are unknowingly caught on camera? Researchers believe that number is in the hundreds given the explosion of surveillance technology and that's worrying privacy advocates, especially here in the United States. A recent report by Safety.com estimates there a billion security cameras rolling worldwide with up to 18 percent of them in the United States. That puts the US second only to China when it comes to keeping eyes on its citizens. According to the report, the average American is caught on camera 238 times each week. The 238 camera views rack up each week by capturing you 14 times at home or in your neighborhood, 160 times behind the wheel, 40 times while at work (more if you're in retail, travel, or a high-security industry), and 24 times while shopping or running errands. Stanley (Jay Stanley, a senior policy analyst at the American Civil Liberties Union) says often it's artificial intelligence keeping track, not humans. Volokh (UCLA Law professor Eugene Volokh) believes the positives of increased cameras outweigh the negatives. Both experts agree the biggest concern is the potential for government to track its citizens under the guise of crime prevention. Part of the solution, experts say, is private citizens asking themselves several questions before installing cameras on personal property: Do you trust the manufacturer who may store images on their own servers? Do you trust the internet knowing any cameras tied to the web are susceptible to hacking? Do you trust the government that in many cases can use a warrant to access what your camera captures? Stanley says that's where lawmakers need to step in. He says they should implement laws that would control access to these cameras. That way, citizens could enjoy the benefit of this tech without becoming a surveillance society.

CBN News Reporter Jennifer Wishon Reports: For the private prison industry, locking up humans is a major money-making enterprise that generates billions of dollars, but now the Biden administration is working to end it. For decades, the federal government has relied on private partners to help lessen the load of housing Americans doing time. It's a practice that's been controversial from the start. As one of his first actions in office, President Joe Biden used his executive pen to direct the Department of Justice not to renew its contracts with the facilities. A 2016 inspector general's report found private prisons had more safety and security incidents than state and federal penal institutions over a four-year period. However, industry insiders and even some criminal justice experts say Biden's move is nothing more than a feel-good nod to activists. Of the 152,000 federal inmates incarcerated today, only about 14,000 are housed at privately managed facilities and Wilkes says just 300 of those are U.S. citizens. The rest are criminal aliens who will be deported after completing their sentences. Wilkes argues in ending their partnership, the federal government is throwing out an important tool. Pfaff (John Pfaff, professor at Fordham Law School) says if used correctly, the private industry could make positive changes. In other words, let the business model work for society by tying profits to results that benefit inmates rather than paying for the number of prisoners. As it currently stands, private facilities stand to benefit from locking up more people, which some argue encourages repeat offenders. And many critics can't forget the shocking 2012 deal pitched by Corrections Corporations of American, now known as CoreCivic. The company would purchase prisons in 48 states if those states would guarantee a 90-percent occupancy rate. CBN News's requests to learn when the first DOJ contracts will end, thus potentially beginning to shutter private prisons were not answered by the White House or Bureau of Prisons, but the process will likely take years and can be reversed by the next administration's executive pen unless Congress acts.

They believe mothers, who have swallowed the most bitter pill, can help with that mission. She (Carolyn Johnson Turner) is one of more than 2,000 mothers making up the newly formed Voices of Black Mothers United, an anti-violence initiative of the non-profit Woodson center in Washington DC. (Sylvia Bennett-Stone, the group's director) Bennett-Stone's daughter, Krystal Joy, and her daughter's friend, Terrin, died as random, innocent victims from a single bullet after gunfire erupted outside a Birmingham convenience store in 2004. For mothers who've suffered the ultimate loss, Voices of Black Mothers United serves as a support group. Bennett-Stone says the Black Lives Matter and De-fund the Police movements are so strong many African Americans are reluctant to speak out against them, even if they disagree. She says police need black mothers partnering with them when and where deadly crimes happen. Retired Police Chief Rodney Monroe, who advises the group, agrees. Organizers say no one can relate more to grieving families than these mothers, and nothing

CBN News Reporter John Jessup Reports: Anger over the haunting images of the death of George Floyd sparked a worldwide movement. As the Derek Chauvin trial gets underway in Minneapolis, it's bringing renewed attention to another movement gaining traction, although it's not as well known. It's marked by two words that many have never heard: qualified immunity – a legal doctrine that effectively acts as a shield for law enforcement. When police use excessive force that may violate a person's rights, that person can try to recover damages by claiming violation of civil rights. But increasingly those claims are not even given their day in court because of the doctrine of qualified immunity coupled with the doctrine's widespread application in civil cases seeking police accountability. The law's origin comes from the Enforcement Act of 1871, designed to protect recently-freed slaves after the Civil War. Over the years, a section of the law - protecting public officials in the course of their work - evolved into today's version of qualified immunity, a principle created by the Supreme court. It essentially provides a "shield of liability against civil lawsuits," so long as the public official's conduct does not violate "clearly established law." However, no two cases are exactly the same. For example, after being cleared of any wrongdoing, a Cleveland man filed a lawsuit alleging he was punched in the neck and jailed by police who never identified themselves but suspected he was breaking into his own apartment. A judge ruled because of qualified immunity, neither the police nor the city could be sued. And an appeals court in 2019 ruled two California police officers - who allegedly stole over \$225,000 while executing a warrant - also couldn't be sued, simply because there's no legal precedent in that part of California. Schweikert (Jay Schweikert, a lawyer at the Cato Institute's Project on Criminal Justice) isn't the only one drawing attention to the legal question. Last year, a Reuters investigation reviewed nearly 530 cases over 15 years and found a trend: courts denying victims the right to challenge violations of their constitutional rights, which, in turn, makes it harder to win future cases against the police. Some members of law enforcement seem willing to reconsider the unintended effects of the rule. But many also hesitate to end the doctrine seen as essential so police can carry out their duties without the constant fear of lawsuits. Captain Sonia Pruitt has served nearly 30 years with the Montgomery County, MD, Police Department and calls policing a noble profession. As the chairwoman of the National Black Police Association, Pruit says it's time for qualified immunity for law enforcement to be re-examined. Schweikert believes it not only thwarts justice but works against the very men and women it's designed to protect. Momentum for change is building, with both justices on the liberal and conservative wings saying it's time to review the courts own solidified principle. Meanwhile, lawmakers are introducing legislation to revoke the provision for officers in an effort to combat excessive force and police brutality. It's a rare issue of consensus across ideological lines, seen recently on criminal justice reform. Nicole D. Porter, of The Sentencing Project, witnessed the power of the faith community when she worked to advance the First Step Act. Porter and Schweikert agree that among the ways to honor George Floyd is to change the broken system before it gets worse.

CBN News Reporter Caitlin Burke Reports: President Joe Biden is preparing to spend big. His goal, to rescue Americans and the US economy from the COVID-19 pandemic. The question remains, is he spending too much? His administration's proposed \$1.9 trillion rescue package would pump money into vaccine deployment, re-opening schools, funding state and local governments, and of course, putting money right into the hands of Americans. It's a steep price tag, but Biden says the nation can't afford anything less. Economists agree, getting out of the pandemic is the first step towards economic recovery. What they don't agree on begins from that point on. By some estimates, Biden has proposed close to \$11 trillion in long-term spending plans; investing in healthcare, infrastructure, energy, and education over the next decade. A third of that new spending would be courtesy of more than \$3.5 trillion in new taxes. Including reversing Trump's tax cuts for large corporations and high-earning families, along with some new taxes. Critics say the tax hikes would hurt the economy, including many smaller businesses, at a time when we can't afford it. He (Chris Edwards of the CATO Institute) predicts the higher corporate tax will send business back overseas. Laurence Kotlikoff, a professor of economics at Boston University, disagrees. He says there are incentives that can lure businesses to invest in the US. Some economists warn that Biden's tax increases will trickle down to the average American. If economic growth slows and businesses don't grow as quickly, the American worker won't make as much money and will end up with a lower standard of living. The almost \$28 trillion national debt is another major concern. Goolsbee (Austan Goolsbee, once an economic advisor for former President Obama, and now for Biden) says raising taxes is how we begin to address our debt. Biden's economic policies will have to make it through Congress. Budget bills, including tax bills, need 51 votes to pass in the Senate. So each Democrat will need to back any legislation that eventually comes through, or it will need bipartisan support.

CBN News Reporter Chuck Holton Reports: The Biden administration's recent cancellation of the Keystone XL Pipeline has shaken an entire industry and may cost thousands of workers their jobs. Some of those workers are already facing sudden unemployment. Shortly after taking office, President Joe Biden wasted no time making good on one of his central campaign promises – putting a stop to the Keystone XL Pipeline. And Republican lawmakers are among the many Americans who are fuming. Opposition to the Keystone XL Pipeline centers on the environmental impact, for those who care about clean energy, targeting pipelines might be the worst thing to do. The Trump administration fast-tracked approvals for oil and gas pipelines across the country, and at the end of President Trump's time in office there were oil and natural gas pipelines covering more than 9,500 miles under construction in the United States, and dozens more that had received approvals but have yet to start construction. The new administration's hostility toward fossil fuels put the future in doubt for these companies, but it won't affect the demand for the product they carry. And moving petroleum products by rail or truck results in as much as six times more pollution than moving it by pipeline. Moreover, the Biden administration's canceling of oil and gas contracts on federal lands will do even more environmental damage. And those

Among the seven: The global move toward digital currency and a cashless society. Bentley said the transition actually began years ago and has proceeded rapidly since COVID-19 hit. Also, when the US Congress considered another multi-billion dollar stimulus package, most Americans wanted to know how much to expect in their bank accounts or mailboxes. Bentley warns temporary relief payments could easily turn into a permanent, universal basic income program. Bentley believes this is a result of the US embracing modern monetary theory, that debt doesn't matter so, the Fed goes on printing dollars indefinitely. A similar trend in Venezuela led to hyperinflation with an overall five-year rate that rose a whopping 53-million percent. The national debt now exceeds the size of the American economy and is expected to total 102% of the US gross domestic product by the end of this fiscal year. Bentley doubts the debt will ever be repaid and that would lead America's creditors to inflict some painful options on the public. The use of biometrics and social scoring also make up these gray swan trends. Airlines are pushing for COVID-19 contact tracing and the use of smartphone apps to prove travelers have been vaccinated for the virus. And Bentley said a number of companies are already using social scoring. We see some of this ranging from Twitter blue checks to Facebook likes and others. In China, the Communist Party uses social scoring to rate its citizens' obedience to government authority and loyalty to communist ideology. Positive scores garner favor while those with low scores are denied jobs, travel benefits, and education. Eventually, such a system could prove dangerous for Americans unwilling to comply with acceptable speech and cancel-culture norms. So, if the birth pangs of the seven gray swan events are already upon us, how can we prepare and protect our families and investments? Bentley said we must prudently chart a wise path without becoming paralyzed, or reacting emotionally.

CBN News Reporter Heather Sells Reports: As a college senior, Dacari Middlebrooks got a dreadful call. His best friend had been murdered. This led to three years of violent nightmares when finally, one of his seminary professors suggested therapy. Middlebrooks rejected the advice flat-out. Middlebrooks is part of a growing number of Americans suffering from mental health issues. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) reports that one in five adults experience some type of mental illness every year. Despite Middlebrook's initial resistance, he eventually made his way to a therapist and it changed his life. He began attending a church with a pastor who openly talked about his struggle after his first wife died. Bishop Joseph Walker of Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Nashville told CBN News about his journey. Bishop Walker also eventually sought out counseling and as he healed he realized his own church needed a wake-up call. Now remarried, Walker and his wife Dr. Stephanie Walker, a pediatrician, decided to bring mental health to the forefront in their church. They started ChurchFit(http://www.thechurchfit.org/) to encourage mental health as part of a holistic health package including physical and emotional health right alongside spiritual growth. ChurchFit offers exercise classes, nutritional advice, and a focus on daily mental health. This includes a push from the pulpit to fight the stigma. Psychologist Veronica Bell attends Mt. Zion and says the new direction and Bishop Walker's leadership have made a big difference. Dr. Walker has developed a referral system for Mt. Zion. Church members or anyone in the community can use it to find a counselor, psychiatrist, or support group. Mt. Zion makes sure its people know how to help, ask the right questions, and not let go when someone is hurting. Flash forward to 2021 and Mt. Zion is now completely virtual. Its focus on mental health is perhaps needed more than ever given the impact of the pandemic. The church is using its website and social media to communicate about spiritual, mental, and physical health. Fitness classes are offered online alongside uplifting content and practical help like resources on Covid-19. Middlebrooks has gone from shame to healing and transparency. He writes about his journey in the book "The Depressed millennial." In addition to Mt. Zion, many free mental health resources are available online. The CDC offers a number of possibilities including hotline numbers and tips on improving emotional and physical health to encourage better mental health.

CBN News Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: To better inform the African American community about the coronavirus vaccine, Bishop T.D. Jakes of Dallas' Potters House, brought in big name experts for an online event on Monday called "In Conversations with America: Understanding the COVID-19 Vaccine." Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett, a viral immunologist and lead scientist on the coronavirus research team at the National Institute of Infectious and Allergic Disease's Vaccine Research Center, did not hesitate to respond. Much of the concern among blacks dates back to the Tuskegee Syphilis Experiment, a 40-year government study involving hundreds of black men. The men, mostly poor sharecroppers suffering from syphilis, were monitored yet not treated by government health officials. Many died, went blind or experienced other severe health problems. Dr Anthony Fauci, the nation's top medical advisor, admitted the skepticism in the black community is understandable. With that being said, the US has now reported nearly 200 cases of more contagious COVID-19 variant. The variant which was first detected in the UK has spread in 23 states including Maryland and Virginia. Jakes addressed that concern by asking if there were strains on the horizon that could threaten the efficacy of the COVID vaccine. Jakes also explained that while hard-hit communities of color desperately need the vaccine, access and distribution could be a problem. He suggested using churches and other faith-based groups as a solution. Meanwhile, Jakes says while the online conversation provides people with education and knowledge about the shot, he also wants to offer hope to those affected by the pandemic.

CBN News Reporter Heather Sells Reports: COVID-19 has taken the lives of more than 425,000 Americans, and the latest White House forecast shows that in the next month, the U.S. will reach between 479,000 and 514,000 deaths. The federal government is racing to get the vaccine out as many Americans desperately try and get their shot. In Kansas this week, hundreds of people over 80 waited in the cold for their vaccine while in Alabama, people lined up in their cars for hours. Sherry St. John waited in the line of cars with her mom until they gave up. The president says a million extra doses will go out next week, but his advisors are cautious. Still there are some positive signs. New confirmed cases and hospitalizations have dropped significantly in the last two weeks. In some states, like California and New York, authorities are easing up on restrictions. But the CDC director wants Americans to remain vigilant. She says COVID mutations are now confirmed in half of the country. Experts believe that by March, the highly contagious variant from the UK will likely become the dominant source of infection in the U.S. On another pandemic front, many school districts are debating reopening. In Philadelphia, kids haven't been in their classrooms since the pandemic began. A new plan has them transitioning back with a hybrid model, starting with the younger students. In Chicago, the mayor wants to reopen schools but so far, the teachers' union has said no. This week the mayor defended a plan to safely reopen. The Biden administration wants to reopen most schools within 100 days. A new CDC report says children should go back to class and that the risk of virus transmission is small if precautions are followed.

CBN News Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: In the last decade, health experts touted the benefits of having plenty of good bacteria in the gut. They say having a diverse gut microbiome strengthens the immune system. As it turns out, a diverse microbiome in our environment operates the same way. In other words, there are plenty of good bugs all around us that can help us fight off disease. However, during the COVID pandemic more than ever before, many of the good bugs in our environment are being wiped out with high-powered cleansers like antibacterial agents and bleach. While health experts stress the importance of fighting COVID by washing hands and surfaces with mild cleansers, such as old-fashioned soap and water, they say disinfecting may literally be overkill. When New York City shut down the subways for four hours each day for disinfecting it deprived untold residents of much-needed transportation. Many of these travelers worked at hospitals and other health care facilities treating COVID patients, the last people who needed additional hardship during the pandemic. To make matters worse, some scientists declared the subway shutdown a colossal waste of time and money. That's because science tells us COVID-19 is spread mainly through personal contact. Furthermore, Dr. Gilbert (Dr. Jack Gilbert, microbiome researcher, University of California professor and author of "Dirt Is Good: The Advantage of Germs for Your Child's Developing Immune System") points out the fact that once a surface is sanitized it doesn't stay that way for long. During this pandemic, welcoming some of the germs living all around us may seem scary, but it's generally better than killing them all. Think about all the germs surrounding barnyard animals or even household pets. Turns out, those bugs are good for us. Growing up with animals can reduce the lifetime risk of a number of aliments. For example, asthma strikes about one in ten Americans. Children who grow up with a dog, however, are 13-percent less likely to develop this serious lung disease. Kids on farms do even better, enjoying a 50-percent reduction. In the age of COVID, doctors say it's never been more important to wash our hands. However, we can go overboard. Mayo Clinic researcher Dr. Heidi Nelson told CBN News that exposure to certain microorganisms can help fight disease. In his book, "Eat Dirt: Why Leaky Gut May Be the Root Cause of Your Health Problems and 5 Surprising Steps to Cure It," Dr. Josh Axe, who has the number one natural health website, told CBN that a preoccupation with disinfecting everything insight puts us at risk for chronic illnesses. Dr. Axe says some cleansers contain harsh chemicals that can harm the skin and gut. He recommends a more natural approach. He recommends this recipe for a general household cleanser.

HOMEMADE HOUSEHOLD CLEANSER INGREDIENTS: 8 Ounces Water 4 Ounces Distilled White Vinegar 15 Drops Tea Tree Essential Oil 15 Drops Lemon Essential Oil

DIRECTIONS: Fill a spray bottle with ingredients. Close bottle and shake to mix. Shake bottle before each spray.

In addition to gentle cleansers that kill bad germs while still allowing our immune system to flourish, Dr. Axe points to other COVID-fighting strategies. So while health experts advise washing hands and surfaces often with plain, old soap and water or another type of mild cleanser, they warn that super-sanitizing with antibacterial soap or bleach may literally be overkill.

Often it includes treatments that aren't new and some people might even call them ancient. Since its inception, many have called modern medicine a gift from God. Sometimes, however, we look back to the treatments of our ancestors. Many people are content to use medicines that are made in a lab, however, if given the choice, might prefer something a little more natural. Dr. Axe points out that many of today's man-made drugs often began as limitations of their natural counterparts. Dr. Axe says that process can result in side effects like nutritional deficiencies. Dr. Axe maintains that regardless of the disease, the first step towards healing involves building a better gut since that's where most of our immune system resides. He said healing the gut not only involves adding the right foods to our diet, but also subtracting the wrong ones. Dr. Axe says we can also boost our body's natural defenses against disease by balancing our hormones, lowering stress, and getting a good night's sleep. He says marijuana's sober cousin, CBD, can do all three. So while drug companies churn out their pills, Dr. Josh Axe points to nature. He says we, like people centuries before us, can use the remedies there to cure what ails us.

CBN News Reporter Eric Philips Reports: There is promising news in the war on the coronavirus. Thursday, President Biden announced the country will have enough vaccine to vaccinate 300 million Americans by the end of summer. Not only that, but those who are fully vaccinated may not have to quarantine if they are exposed to the virus. The president is encouraged because the U.S. is on track to exceed his goal of administering 100 million vaccine doses in his first 100 days in office. So far, 26 million shots have been delivered in his first three weeks. The announcement came during a visit to the National Institutes of Health Thursday. Mr. Biden explained that the U.S. has secured commitments for 200 million more doses of the COVID-19 vaccine from Pfizer and Moderna to be delivered by the end of July. He added, 100 million doses that had been promised by June will now arrive in May. It's a grand total of 600 million doses for the US, with Americans needing two shots each. More promising news as the president's Chief Medical Advisor, Dr. Anthony Fauci, said eligibility should soon open up to any American who wants to be vaccinated. The Biden administration has deployed active-duty troops to help stand up mass vaccination sites in several states in anticipation of increased supply. But for now, frustration as people scramble to get inoculated amid what is still a vaccine crunch. The current shortage forced hard-hit Los Angeles to shut down a few vaccination sites for days as the new California variant ricochets across the state and country. Meanwhile, the CDC says once people have been fully vaccinated, they no longer have to quarantine if they are exposed to the COVID-19 virus. But officials caution that, for now, they should still wear masks. Where schools are concerned, the White House says it will follow new guidance from the CDC on when and how schools should open. This as critics say the president has been backing away from his pledge to reopen a majority of schools in his first 100 days in office.

CBN News Reporter John Jessup Reports: From the playground to the political arena, anger is the overriding emotion that seems to reflect society's dominant mood. It's an emotion seen erupting on the road with rage directed at strangers. But it also hits closer to heart and home - with families torn apart over political, religious, and other sources of disagreement. Psychologists say anger is a natural human response designed to help us quickly process and solve problems. But excessive anger can cause emotional and physical harm like heart disease, lung damage, or shortened lifespans. Brant Hansen tackled the issue of rampant anger in his book "Unoffendable," published in 2015. The book was a response to lingering personal questions about anger in his own life - a quest that ultimately led him to resolve years of childhood bitterness after growing up in a broken home. The journey led him to the Bible, which he believes reveals the true antidote. Hansen believes anger is a choice, and people can choose not to be offended - a radical idea based on the life and words of Jesus Christ. Forgiveness is a central tenet in Christianity, not only in profession but in practice. It's an act that can create and save healthy relationships. Brian Edwards, A Christian counselor and a minister of marriage and family at a church in suburban Washington, DC, adds that it's also important to be humble and admit fallibility. According to Hansen, while it may seem unnatural, Christians should choose to forgive and be gracious even when it comes to the most hotly contentious issues, including polarized politics and conflicting worldviews. He noted many of the challenging presentday issues existed during Jesus's lifetime. Another adverse effect of anger is how it makes people more prone to misinformation, while simultaneously raising confidence and reducing the memory's accuracy according to a study on anger. Hansen admits even though he has written a book about anger and advocates choosing not to take offense, it's still something with which he struggles. However, he says being "undefendable" and letting go of anger has clear rewards.

CBN News Reporter Eric Philips Reports: To shoot or not to shoot: that's the question police officers often have to answer in just a split second. The pressure to make the right decision is only increasing following the number of high-profile shootings in 2020. Law enforcement officers face a critical balancing act each shift they work. The strive to follow the law, protect and serve citizens, and then safely return to their own families at the end of the day. It's an unenviable position they're in - to make quick decisions that are sometimes deadly and often second-guessed. We traveled to one facility outside Atlanta to see first-hand the training that can better prepare officers for those high-pressure situations. At The Georgia Public Training Center, officers use a simulator that's about as real as it gets. Made by InVeris, the simulator puts trainees into a 300-degree video environment of a crime taking place. This facility has been training officers across Georgia in crucial decision-making since the 1980s. I asked Wigginton (Chris Wigginton, the director of the training center) about statistics that indicate blacks are more likely to be killed by law enforcement than others. We talked specifically about three high-profile cases in 2020 and asked Wigginton his take on each. First, we asked about the case that electrified the nation, the killing of George Floyd. Then there was Breonna Taylor, an innocent woman shot to death when Louisville police stormed her home searching for illegal contraband. Her boyfriend shot at the police, thinking they were robbers breaking in. Officers returned fire, and one of their bullets killed Taylor. Then there is the case of Rayshard Brooks, shot to death not too far away from The Georgia Public Training Center, by Atlanta Police after a tussle where Brooks grabbed one of the officers' tasers and ran. He also told us the center requires racial sensitivity and diversity training, but some things are out of officer's control. He says the training here is designed to prevent as many deaths as possible, which he believes is the goal of the vast majority of officers on the streets. Law enforcement officials say it's important to remember the emotional toll officers suffer when they shoot and kill someone. They must live with that for the rest of their lives. That's where a different kind of training or therapy comes in. Even then, some can't recover and are forced to give up their careers.

CBN News Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: More than one in four American adults have gotten at least one COVID-19 shot. Two states, Alaska and Mississippi, are now allowing anyone over the age of 16 to get vaccinated. President Biden says he hopes all American adults will be allowed to get one by May first. Meanwhile, health officials are now looking at vaccinating the younger generation. Moderna is now beginning a COVID-19 trial on children ages six months to 12 years old. If it's successful, most children that age will be able to get a COVID vaccine in early 2022. Trials on teenagers first began in December of last year. If they are successful, most adolescents will be able to get vaccinated by this coming fall. Christian psychiatrist Dr. Daniel Amen told CBN News that expanding vaccinations to children and teens could clearly help in the long run. Religious leaders from many faiths went public with their shots on Tuesday at Washington, D.C.'s National Cathedral in an effort to encourage the larger faith community to help end the pandemic as soon as possible. President Trump, who is now fully vaccinated, recommended on Tuesday for others to follow his lead. Meanwhile, in Western Europe, the AstraZeneca vaccine is suspended in a handful of countries over the possibility that blood clotting in some recipients might be caused by the vaccine. However, some health officials there believe an investigation will show no link. The AstraZeneca vaccine is not available in the United States. The only vaccines currently being given in the U.S. are made by Pfizer, Modern, and Johnson & Johnson. At the same time, health officials in Europe are pulling back on the AstraZeneca vaccine, that part of the world is experiencing a surge in cases that some blame on lifting lockdowns too

exercise expenditures. Although exercise is necessary for overall health, research shows increasing our movement can't make us thin. These finds come from years of research on cultures that endure strenuous physical activity each day who don't have a lot of food. A prime example would be the Hazda people living in southeast Africa. Duke University researcher Dr. Herman Pontzer and his team first examined the Hazdas' daily energy output ten years ago. They were wrong. The researchers witnessed and documented extreme levels of exercise among the hunter-gatherer people group. However, using highly advanced and accurate measurement techniques, they discovered the Hazdas didn't burn more calories than their couch-potato counterparts half a world away. That number? In his book, "Burn: New Research Blows the Lid Off How We Really Burn Calories, Lose Weight, and Stay Healthy," Dr. Pontzer lays out a number of similar studies on calorie expenditure in different cultures around the world over the last decade that all reached the same startling conclusion: people who exercise more don't burn markedly more calories than people who hardly exercise at all. To help explain this metabolic mystery, scientists discovered that regardless of how much we exercise, the human body's daily calorie expenditure primarily consists of burning most of its energy in ways that keep our bodies operating. Dr. Pontzer says he and his fellow scientists learned that when people exercise a great deal, the body's metabolism shifts in a way that doesn't allow a person to burn more calories. Although excess exercise prevents people from losing weight, which many overweight westerners may view as a drawback, since these cultures have an abundance of food, it also prevents people from starving to death in cultures that don't have a lot of high-calorie foods. In light of this discovery, how does a person drop those unwanted pounds? Pontzer says the answer is easy to understand but difficult to implement. Scientists tell us we should look to the old adage, "calories in versus calories out." In other words, our weight is determined by the difference between how many calories we consume versus how many calories we burn. Dr. Pontzer says since we now understand the number of calories we burn is relatively fixed, in order to manage our weight, we need to focus on the variable that is flexible: the number of calories we consume. Surprisingly, however, he discourages people from trying to count them because people tend to make mistakes. Instead, he recommends daily weighing and adjusting food intake based on what the scale reads. If the number on the scale is higher than you'd like, cut back on what you're consuming. Dr. Pontzer says the best place to start is by avoiding processed items such as sugary drinks and prepared packaged foods. Dr. Pontzer says people who are trying to lose weight should replace processed foods with whole foods. These are items that are close to their original state[s], such as fresh produce, meat, fish, and dairy. Many of these items can be found on the exterior of the grocery store. They are foods that are generally lower in calories than processed foods while at the same time make you feel fuller than processed foods. Pontzer stresses that even though exercise is not necessary to lose weight we still need to exercise. Physical activity helps fight disease in many ways such as lowering inflammation, improving brain function, and strengthening the cardiovascular system.

CBN News Reporter Caitlin Burke Reports: Students nationwide are falling behind. While virtual learning might be considered safer, it's also causing many to struggle. Teachers say students tend to either succeed or fail, with very little middle ground. A 25-year classroom veteran, Sanders says she's never seen this level of failure. The Martin family is a prime example. Their son, Dorian, struggled with remote learning from the start. Dorian has ADHD, and even with medication, the virtual learning model feels impossible for him. Clarissa Price majors in chemical engineering at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. She's used to excelling in school. As a deaf student, however, she found herself failing one of her key classes after switching to virtual learning. Unable to keep up, Price failed the course, which was required for advancement in her major. Fortunately, the school decided to offer it again in the Fall, this time in person. According to a RAND Corporation report, students most likely to fall behind with virtual learning are those with disabilities, of color, and those who fall below the poverty line. That's pushing schools to address these issues before students face long-term consequences. In South Florida, the Palm Beach County School District sent out letters to nearly 175,000 students in K-12 not making adequate progress learning from home. The state, requiring schools to give parents the option to send their struggling child back to the classroom come Spring. In California, Gov. Gavin Newsom encouraged schools to begin reopening, starting with elementary schools. So far, data suggests children are not major transmitters of the Coronavirus, especially in school settings. Still, states will expand safety measures and implement COVID testing to make people more comfortable about returning to the classroom.

accelerated by COVID-19. Many students, struggling with family finances and turned off by remote learning, are opting out and colleges are taking yet another financial hit. Dr. Peter Wood, president of the National Association of Scholars, has worked for years to reform higher education by promoting academic freedom. He sees a dramatic re-organization coming. In 2020, undergraduate enrollment fell by 3.6 percent over 2019. Community colleges showed a 10 percent decline for undergraduates. Institutions that have gutted traditional content could also be contributing to the decline as Americans rethink the value of higher education. Dr. Gerson Moreno-Riano, the chief academic officer for Regent University, says he's concerned about a growing shift in education that's caused public institutions to lose their way after years of a general consensus on what undergraduate curriculum should look like. In the last 50 to 60 years Moreno-Riano observes that academia has come to believe that Western civilization is deeply flawed and that it's unjust to force students to learn its ideals. Wood says the content has moved from critiquing American institutions to a wholesale rejection of them. Alongside new course content has come stiff resistance and often outright rejection to opposing viewpoints. A RealClearEducation survey of nearly 20,000 students shows many are worried about criticism for their views. Six in 10 say they have self-censored at least once in college over fears of how others would respond. Just one in 4 say they're very comfortable discussing controversial political topics like abortion, race and gun control. And faculty are well aware that politically incorrect moves can cost them. Just last fall, the University of Southern California suspended a business professor who, while teaching online, explained a Chinese business word that mimics a US racial slur. Scott Shephard, a fellow at the National Center for Public Policy Research, says these types of incidents chill free speech and worse. He and a growing number of conservatives have worked for years to reform higher education. One plan is state laws that promote intellectual diversity. South Dakota, for instance, recently passed a law that requires campuses to publish regular reports explaining any actions to encourage academic freedom. A more radial plan involves taking money away. That can start with alumni stopping donations or federal and state funding being reassessed. Moreno-Riano says he supports defunding where it makes sense. With many universities already on shaking financial ground during the pandemic, more financial pressure could force them to reorganize. That could pave the way for universities to rethink their curriculum while creating the best environments for students to truly learn from a variety of viewpoints.

CBN News Reporter Tara Mergener Reports: Experts agree academic and social development are likely slipping for many students as most public schools remain closed. Many parents, including Brandon Michon of Loudon County, Virginia, say, school districts are dragging their feet and children are suffering emotionally and academically. As CBN news has reported, Mihon recently lashed out when school board members ignored his children as they spoke to at a January meeting. Isolation, screen time, and the lack of physical activity are taking a toll on children, according to new research. Michon says the stress is showing in his young children. Experts say parents' concerns are valid as disruptions to daily life, school by screen, and separation from classmates and friends can be a recipe for anxiety and depression. Studies show mental health issues were on the rise before the pandemic which only accelerated the trend. Faced with distractions at home, and the lack of in-person attention, researchers say causes students to fall behind academically. The news isn't all bad. Educators say some children have actually done better studying at home. The numbers also show drug and alcohol use among youth appears to be down as are juvenile arrest and incarceration rates. While new CDC guidelines recommend children return to class, there are still no immediate plans to reopen schools in many states, and some teachers refusing to return even if they do. As children remain in limbo, the advice to parents is to try to stay positive.

Hours later, however, a newly sworn-in President Biden would fundamentally alter their rights, with an LBGTO executive order designed to open up school bathrooms, locker rooms, and sports to any student of any sex. The Executive Order on Preventing and Combating Discrimination on the Basis of Gender or Sexual Identity, citing respect and dignity for all, focuses on children who it says should not be denied access to the restroom, locker room or school sports while broadly stating that all people should receive equal treatment under the law, no matter their gender identity or sexual orientation. It gives federal agencies 100 days to decide how to implement the order. The country's top LGBTQ advocacy group, the Human Rights Campaign, praised the order for building on the Supreme Court's Bostock decision last year and for promoting equality. But conservatives and some feminists believe the order crushes girls and women's rights, ending their safe, protected spaces and eviscerating their sports. Perkins (Tony Perkins, Family Research Council President) argues that not only is the order unbiblical but that it will confuse children about their identities. There's also concern about the future of girl's and women's sports. Christiana Holcomb, an attorney for Alliance Defending Freedom, represents three female high school track stars in Connecticut, a state that allows biological boys that identify as girls to compete against girls. She says such transgender policies erode advancement for voung women. The president's executive order seeks to build on the 2020 Supreme Court Bostock ruling that redefined sex discrimination to include gender identity and sexual orientation but only in cases of employment. Holcomb says the order contradicts Title 9, the 1972 federal law that paved the way for sports equality. It's now wait-and-see to find out just how this executive order will play out among federal agencies. States are also debating gender issues this year, with a host of new bills on the sports and transgender medicine.

CBN News Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: Drone video shows the many asylum seekers waiting to enter the United States at a makeshift processing center in Grenjeno, Texas. Unaccompanied minors arriving at the border are supposed to be transferred to the Department of Health and Human Services, but the surge at the border has exceeded shelter capacity. More than 4,200 children are currently in Border Patrol custody with another 9,000 in shelters. Officials are so overwhelmed that the Biden administration has ordered FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Administration – which usually only helps with natural disasters – to help care for the growing number of minors. The surge of children and teens at the border comes after the Biden administration reversed some of the policies of the Trump administration. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi calls it a humanitarian crisis but blames President Trump for it. Texas Governor Greg Abbott told Fox News the Biden administration's "open border policies" are not only creating more illegal immigration to the U.S. but have enriched Mexican drug cartels that profit from smuggling migrants across the border. House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy says Republican leaders are heading to the border today to see the crisis firsthand. Meanwhile, House Democrats will put forward two bills this week to give legal status to millions of so-called "Dreamers," undocumented immigrants who entered the country as children.

CBN News Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: From disorganized virtual learning to no activities like proms and after-school sports, COVID-19 has disrupted basic elements of life for this young generation, leaving many with mental and behavioral issues that could linger well after the virus is gone. The president is not alone in that assessment. Dr. Amen told CBN News it's an impact that isn't going away anytime soon. Lockdowns and social restrictions have basically crippled many youth sports organizations leaving activities in some states cancelled for the past 10 months. While some youth sports are finally starting back up, a new study by the Aspen Institute reveals three out of ten kids won't be returning to the lineup. Drake told CBN's Prayerlink how sports often serve as a physical and emotional outlet. He also emphasized a key part of the organization's equipment list. Meanwhile with COVID vaccinations happening across the country, President Biden is pushing to reopen public schools in the next few months. Yet due to the pandemic, it is unclear when youth sports or anything else will return to normal.
