PERSPECTIVES: Renard Murray, Regional Administrator Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. Medicare annual open enrollment period is open for citizens to switch Medicare plans for the coming year. In the workplace, we face making choices about your health care plans each year in the fall. That's the time rates and plan benefits would change. The same is true for certain types of Medicare insurance plans. Once a year – between Oct. 15 and Dec. 7 – seniors have a chance to change from your current plan to a different plan. The Medicare open enrollment period impacts Medicare Advantage and Medicare Part D drug plans. There are some exceptions to changing plans outside the Medicare annual enrollment period. If you move you may be able to change plans or, if for some reason, your plan is terminated. Also there are some Medicare Advantage and Medicare Part D plans that you can switch to anytime during the year. These Medicare plans carry a 5-Star rating, awarded by Medicare. THE HEART OF ATLANTA: Year in review highlighting some top shows & organizations: ODBF, ALS, AIDS, Camp Monarch, DBGA, Be A Role Model, and Living Water. Also included highlights and partial re-air of LWG first show. Living Water for Girls is open and state licensed to offer a long-term comprehensive program for 10 girls at a time, in the 12-17 year old age group. Services being provided are individual, group, family, and addiction counseling; on-site home-school education, GED and vocational services; and life-skills training and spiritual wellness. Living Water for Girls combats sexual trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation through raising awareness, providing a safe therapeutic refuge, and an aftercare wraparound program. Throughout 2009, we have had the opportunity to speak out, to raise awareness of the evil that is commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC). Thankfully, over 14,122 people have become aware and many are active in the battle against this horrible crime by their involvement with LWG and other community advocacy programs. Through simply raising awareness 23 youth lives have already been spared, by not committing suicide or running away. Our services also identified, addressed and reported sexual abuse towards one teenager which led to the perpetrator being arrested, charged and convicted with the crime of rape. Living Water for Girls is located in a safe undisclosed rural area away from known predators. Residents will participate in the planning and preparation of their own meals; engage in recreational activities that build strong minds, bodies and spirits; plant, cultivate and maintain organic gardens; and participate in other progressive therapeutic activities that engage them in building positive self-images and esteem, as well as healthy life styles and relationships. SOL organization is headquartered in the United States and Monrovia, Liberia. Our board of four directors, all of whom give their time on a voluntary basis, administer the organization. These individuals bring a broad range of skills and are responsible for the overall supervision, as well as major policy and ethical decision-making. Founder Miama Azelea Hoff is the responsible for the daily administration of SOL. Liberia, the name given by freed American slaves, means "freedom" and S.H.A.D.E.S means not only to "preserve" the youth's legacy, by Restoring, Reshaping, and Educating the youths of Liberia. Residents will participate in the planning and preparation of their own meals; engage in recreational activities that build strong minds, bodies and spirits; plant, cultivate and maintain organic gardens; and participate in other progressive therapeutic activities that engage them in building positive self-images and esteem, as well as healthy life styles and relationships.
