2) Bend water 101 - 1/11/24

Bend is fortunate to have two main sources of pristine water, surface water from mountain springs in the Bend Municipal Watershed below Broken Top and groundwater pulled from the Deschutes Basin Aquifer through our 20 active wells. We produce and deliver avg. 4.5 billion gallons of water per year. Our surface water is diverted to our filtration facility and then to the water system in town by gravity, this supplies our baseline use (indoor). When summer demands increase due to landscape irrigation we turn on our 20 wells to meet demands. Water travels through a system of approx. 500 miles of pipe through town and through 27,000 water meters to our homes or business's.

3) What's the deal with Water Conservation in Bend? - 1/18/24

Some people may ask why does Bend have a Water Conservation prog? We're sitting at the foothills of the Cascade range, and atop an enormous aquifer? We're also a high desert that receives less than 12" of precipitation a year and have been experiencing consecutive years of drought. All that aside, Bend has a water conservation program as a necessity not a nice to have, all municipalities serving more than XXX customers must have some basic water conservation efforts in place.

The City of Bend has invested in additional Conservation efforts to be effective as a source of supply, and a form of adaptive management to mitigate against drought, infrastructure needs, and growth. Even if there was more water available our rights limit us to a maximum amount we cannot exceed, and there are no new water right's that are cheap or easy to come by. Conservation isn't meant to be the end game meaning we will never need more water, but it does help us kick that date farther into the future. Our latest analysis done in our water master plan identified the need to save 7 billion gallons of water over the next 20 years to offset the need for \$21 million dollars in new infrastructure. So our conservation program will be adding several new programs and are currently working on some development code that will make new developments more water efficient.

4) How does Bend measure up with water use? - 1/25/24

GPCD =Gallons per Capita per Day is a metric that looks at aggregate water use across their service area, city or state.

Bend -149

St, George-170

Las Vegas-104

State across the West have invested in programs to reduce this number through water use efficiency measures. Some states have legislation in place to create a framework for municipalities to reach these goals. The City of Bend has seen a downward trend since 2016 and with our current goals would like to see that number reach closer to 130 in the next decade. Therefore our conservation program has in place lots of existing programs and will be rolling out new programs this spring to help support these goals along the way. Simple things everyone can

Feb 1- Get pumped for Spring during these snow free warm ups we can dream of spring. In Bend we have plentiful opportunities to experience beautiful gardens exhibiting water wise plantings ranging from true Central Oregon natives, more ornamental species, pollinators and even edibles that can make up an attractive low water us garden. Some spots to check out include the collaborative OSU extension demonstration garden Hollins Head park, another at Alpen glow park, Franklin community garden and 8th st pocket park. Also don't forget your local nursery, they are good resources for finding your water wise plants.

Feb 8- Save the date This March we are bringing back our exciting Water Wise workshop series Partnering with the Green Gardens Group. This year's webinars are titled Good bye grass Hello garden is all about how to properly plan and carry out a lawn to xeriscape garden conversion. We'll walk you through the process step by step from removal to planting to irrigation. We'll also cover the process of how to take advantage of our turf removal rebate program and get \$3 per sqft of turf removed. We will have three opportunities for folks on March 9th , 12th and 21st. There are only 100 spots in each class and this always fill up so make sure to get registered cause its first come first serve. Feb 15- How to measure your success. We often get asked how much water does a normal house use? We want to know how we compare to the average household to figure out if we have an issue. So here it is , in 2023 the average household in Bend uses 104 gpd in the winter and 388 gpd in the summer. So you may say that's nice how do I use that number? We can't save what we can't measure, luckily City of Bend customers have access to their water use through Water Smart our customer water us portal. One of the metrics you can see on your portal page is a current GPD you used that month, so knowing the numbers we just talked about you can see how your water use measures up and decide if you need to take action. Of course, if you have any questions about you r water use you can contact our department and we can talk through the specifics of your use and even schedule an evaluation during the summer.

PREPARING FOR THE COLD WEATHER AHEAD

With several days of predicted below-freezing weather upon us, the Bend Fire Department would like to remind everyone that a little bit of prep now can help prevent disasters during and after the freezing temperatures, especially due to frozen pipes. This is for everyone from homeowners, tenants, maintenance managers to contractors alike.

Winterizing your home should be done in the fall as the first freeze comes around. Now that we're into the middle of winter and prepping for a winter storm, ensure those preparations are done and takes these extra precautions around your home. All of these are much easier when the snow is fresh and not frozen solid like it will be later this weekend.

- Ensure outdoor faucets and water outlets still have their covers on them.
- Identify your homes water shut off valve so it can be quickly accessed in the event of a leak.
- Clear any snow off a fire hydrant in front of your house.

Clear off your sidewalks, driveways, pathways, accesses to utilities, access to pets/farm animals, and vehicles. This is very important for access in the event of an emergency. If the snow accumulates too much, doors may not open, those with disabilities may not be able to traverse the snow and will slow down emergency services from getting to you in a time of need. As a public service reminder, if you know your neighbor, friend or family member can't clear their walkway or driveway, please help them out.

For your businesses, Bend Fire & Rescue would like to remind building owners, facility managers, and building maintenance personnel to take actions before the cold weather hits to prevent fire sprinkler systems from freezing. Our department responds to several fire sprinkler activations due to pipes breaking from freezing every year. These breaks can cause significant water damage but can easily be prevented. Also, frozen fire sprinkler pipes, even if they don't break, render the sprinkler system inoperative to protect buildings from fire, thus jeopardizing lives and property.

Most fire sprinkler systems that do freeze are the result of lack of maintenance. Ensure that all periodic maintenance has been completed. Contact your fire sprinkler service company to schedule service if it is overdue. Frequencies for maintenance vary depending on the type of system that is installed. Empty any drains for the sprinkler system to prevent water from building up on the exterior or exposed areas of these systems.

Another common cause of water line and sprinkler system freezing is inadequate heating in normally heated spaces. This often occurs in vacant areas when the heating system is turned down or off when no one is home or the space is vacant. While some sprinkler systems are designed to operate in cold temperatures, the majority of fire

sprinkler pipe must be installed in areas that can maintain a minimum temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Make sure your heating and ventilation systems are in good working order. For homes, consider opening up the cupboards below sinks at night to allow warm air to get into the cabinet to prevent freezing.

These simple steps can prevent the costly damage from water line breaks, not to mention time lost to restore your building/home back to full operation. Check your fire sprinkler system today. Call your service company to schedule maintenance. Check your heating and ventilation system. Use safe heating practices. Call us for any questions related to fire sprinkler systems and how to prevent a freeze.

When using supplemental heating equipment utilize only equipment that is listed and approved for its intended use. Many gas powered heaters are not designed for indoor use. Always provide at least 3 feet of clearance when using portable space heaters. Ensure all electrical heating appliances are plugged in safely into an outlet or approved surge protector.

Ensure all your smoke and CO alarms are in working order. As the weather gets colder, we tend to shut the house up much more tightly. This can lead to a quicker build up of smoke and CO inside a home. The quicker build up can lead to less time to escape, making those alarms even more important.

RE: PUBLIC SAFETY ALERT

There is an important safety issue that people should be made aware of concerning the upcoming eclipse on April 8, 2024. People should NOT use old eclipse glasses, especially ones that they used during a prior eclipse such as the one in 2017. The protective coatings on some eclipse glasses deteriorate over time and will not protect a person properly. It is entirely safe to use new glasses, and those who experience the period of totality do not need any glasses during those few minutes. But used glasses should not be reused, and should be discarded after this upcoming eclipse.

Astronomy Magazine (April 2024, p. 15) elaborates on this danger in the following way:

No one can deny the beauty of a solar eclipse, but seeing one is not worth endangering your eyesight. Even a momentary look at the Sun with your naked eye during the partial phases risks long-lasting vision problems. A view through binoculars or a telescope can cause permanent blindness in a second or less. And the damage occurs painlessly, so you might not be aware of problems until hours later. Eclipse glasses are the easiest and cheapest way to protect your eyes. . . . One note of caution, however: If you saved your eclipse glasses from seven years ago, toss them. The protective coating deteriorates over time and typically doesn't last more than three years.

I have encountered a number of people that were planning on using their glasses from 2017, so I would like to suggest some public announcements on this danger.
