


PUBLIC AFFAIRS PROGRAMS





PROGRAMMING:

1. TAXES

News and Views for April 12th, 2015

Summary:

Guest: Alexandra Sirota, NC Budget and Tax Center

Summary: One of the most controversial bills introduced this session is a plan by three Senate leaders to slash income taxes again in North Carolina, reducing state revenue by one billion dollars. Alexandra Sirota of the NC Budget and Tax Center discusses the implications of such a cut and the impact on state services.

Lawmakers are considering legislation this session that would decrease the sales tax revenue going to urban areas and instead allocate that money for rural areas. Another proposal would change the way local elections are conducted. Scott Mooneyham with the NC League of Municipalities discusses the legislation and its impact on NC cities and towns. Issues discussed: Rural vs. urban North Carolina, historic tax credits, economic recovery from the recession.

2. ABORTION

News and Views for April 19th, 2015

Guest: Paige Johnson, Planned Parenthood of Central North Carolina


Summary: One of the most restrictive anti-abortion bills in the country has been introduced in the NC General Assembly. House Bill 465 imposes longer waiting periods on women and restricts what can be taught at the state's two medical schools. Paige Johnson discusses the bill and the potential impact on women's health.

3. ENVIROMENT

News and Views for APRIL 19TH, 2015

Guest: Sierra Weaver, Southern Environmental Law Center

Summary: Governor Pat McCrory reiterated his support for offshore drilling this week before the U.S. House Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources. McCrory told the congressional



panel the federal government's 50-mile imposed buffer zone "unnecessarily puts much of North Carolina's most accessible undiscovered resources under lock and key."

Sierra Weaver, a senior attorney with the Southern Environmental Law Center, discusses the risks posed by offshore drilling and the review process now underway by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management.

4. EDUCATION

News and Views for MAY 10TH, 2015

Guest: Senator Terry Van Duyn discusses Senate Bill 343, making the assault of a teacher a felony. Van Duyn also weighs in on the announcement this week that North Carolina no longer owes \$2.75 billion it borrowed from the federal government pay first time unemployment claims during the Great Recession.

Summary: Next week's public hearings on voter ID will be held across the state. Isela Gutierrez, Democracy NC discusses why the public needs to attend the State Board of Elections hearings and have their voices heard. Guest: Jill Bullard, Interfaith Food Shuttle



7. HUMAN RIGHTS

News and Views for June 7th, 2015

Guest: Sarah Preston, acting state director of the ACLU of North Carolina

Summary: The battle over abortion rights and marriage equality have dominated the news in Raleigh this week. Gov. Pat McCrory vetoed the legislation allowing magistrates to refuse to marry same-sex couples and said he'd sign a bill forcing women to wait 72 hours before accessing abortion services. Sarah Preston with the ACLU of North Carolina joins us to discuss why both bills take North Carolina in the wrong direction.



8. HOUSING

News and Views for June 7th, 2015

Guest: Satana Deberry, NC Housing Coalition


Summary: A new report by the National Low Income Housing Coalition shows renting an affordable apartment is out of reach for many North Carolinians. Renters would need to make at least \$17 .65 per hour to afford a decent 2-bedroom apartment in our state. What that means is that workers earning minimum wage would need two full-time jobs and work 96 hours a week to afford a two-bedroom unit. 9. BUDGET

News and Views for June 21st, 2015

Guest: Senator Mike Woodard

Summary: The Senate rolled out its \$21.5 billion budget this week, which spends far less than the House proposal and includes dozens of policy changes mixed in with spending decisions. The Senate spending plan would notably abolish more than 8,500 teacher assistant jobs, with budget writers saying that money would be better used to reduce the size of classrooms. Joining us this week to discuss the Senate budget is Senator Mike Woodard of Durham County.




News and Views for APRIL 19TH, 2015


