### **Arts**

KING 5 News at 7:00 P.M & 11:00 P.M., July 13. TRT: 3:20

Seattle's distinctive skyline is changing. Every few months, there's a new addition to the range of towers. Architects are sketching out bold designs, testing the limits of what they can build, adding a new level of flair to the city's silhouette. Ted Land reports that architects are given quite a bit of room to flex their creative muscles in Seattle, and they're doing just that.

KING 5 News at 4:00 P.M., July 27. TRT: 3:30

Max and Louis Boyang are 11-year-old twins who are considered art prodigies. Their work recently raised nearly \$1,000 in a silent auction benefiting the U-W Autism Center. They talked about their art with anchor Amanda Grace.

KING 5 News at 11:00 P.M., August 2. 1:30.

Proponents of a King County ballot initiative to fund arts programs say they are disappointed by the first round of election returns from the August 1 primary. Those results show the arts tax trailing, with just 45 percent of votes supporting it. Supporters blamed "levy fatigue," as King County voters have been asked to pass multiple tax and bonding measures in recent elections.

Inside a small trailer at the San Juan County Fairgrounds in Friday Harbor, nine dogs are learning to do things doctors can't even do right now. They're learning to sniff out and detect Parkinson's disease. It's a sort of med school for mutts. "I could actually start crying when I think about it," said Lisa Holt, founder of Parkinson's Alert Dogs (PADs). "It's amazing to us. It's just amazing." Holt is a dog trainer and certified instructor who specializes in teaching dogs to follow scents. She is leading what is believed to be the only training of this kind in the United States. Dogs are being taught to smell otherwise undetectable traces of Parkinson's disease.

Seattle Children's Ben Towne Center for Childhood Cancer Research are actively fighting pediatric leukemia by harvesting and reprogramming a child's own T cells - using the immune system to fight

cancer. Those T cells are collected from the patient and re-engineered into targeted cancer killing cells called "car-t cells."

A Seattle physician warns viewers about the dangers of trying to look directly at the sun during the total solar eclipse on August 21. Even a split-second glance at the sun can result in permanent eye damage.

Seattle City Attorney Pete Holmes filed a separate lawsuit today against Purdue, as well as Teva Pharmaceuticals, Janssen, Endo and Allergan.

A popular swimming spot on the Skykomish River near Eagle Falls has also become one of the dirtiest. Bill Corson runs Outdoor Adventures, a rafting company that aims to give people a taste of the wild. Corson and others have formed a group that's planning a clean-up next month. The event begins at 10 a.m. on August 5 at Eagle Falls, located 2.1 miles west of the town of Baring, Wash. Volunteers are encouraged to carpool, if possible, as there is limited parking along Highway 2.

The owners of the fish farm say higher-than-normal tides that occurred in conjunction with the solar eclipse caused its nets to fail. Environmental groups cast doubt on that

explanation, while state wildlife officials encouraged the public to travel to this part of Puget Sound to fish for the escaped farmed salmon.

More than 30 dogs from Texas were flown to Seattle and taken to the Bellevue Humane Society to be put up for adoption. The dogs were sent to the Pacific Northwest from shelters in Texas can make room for the large number of animals abandoned or lost in the wake of Hurricane Harvey.

An orca belonging to one of the Puget Sound's resident pods has died, the eighth death among the resident pods in the past 16 months. Jerry Brown (D)** told moderator Chuck Todd this morning on a special edition of "Meet the Press: Our Broken Politics." When asked whether abortion should be a litmus test for Democrats, Brown said, "The litmus test should be intelligence, caring about ... the common man."

On party leadership, Brown says that "if you added up pluses and minuses, I think Nancy <u>Pelosi is a major pillar of the Democratic Party.</u> And the answer is not to try to replace her with somebody, but to make sure the candidates represent and can empathize and be a part of the district they're running in."

Brown also <u>supported the idea of a lawsuit</u> over President Trump's latest attempt to punish so-called "sanctuary cities." <u>Watch the full interview.</u>

Todd exclusively spoke with Sen. Jeff Flake (R-Ariz.), calling the senator's new book, "Conscience of a Conservative" "as much of an indictment on the Republican leadership of the last 15 years as it is on Donald Trump." Despite this, Flake says he didn't think about leaving the party: "Not at all. I'm a proud Republican. Lifelong Republican. And I'm from Arizona. Arizona tends to elect independent-minded people and people who stand on principle, so I'm doing what I think my voters expect of me."

Flake shared that he wishes the party would stand up more to "staff that is demonstrably false," including birtherism: "I wish that we, as a party, would have stood up, for example, when the birtherism thing was going along. A lot of people did stand up but not enough." Watch the full interview.

AUGUST 13, 2017 – "Of course it was terrorism," Lt. Gen. H.R. McMaster, national security adviser to President Trump, told "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd this morning in reaction to the Charlottesville rally violence.

When asked why Trump did not single-out the neo-Nazis or white supremacists in his response, McMaster said, "When he condemned bigotry and hatred on all sides, that includes white supremacists and neo-Nazis, and I think it's clear. I know it's clear in his mind."

The national security adviser reacted to recent criticism about Secretary Tillerson from Sebastian Gorka, deputy assistant to the president, who had told the BBC that the secretary on "military matters is simply nonsensical," telling Todd: "We should always take Secretary of State Tillerson at his word."

McMaster also called the speculation about his relationship with the president's senior counselor Steve Bannon "just a lot of noise," <u>repeatedly declining to answer</u> whether they can work in the same White House.
