Governor Kristi Noem's office confirmed Cole's resignation as head of South Dakota's only public psychiatric hospital.

Cole has been on the job about a year.

The effective date of Cole's resignation wasn't immediately clear. In addition, state officials have not released the name of an interim administrator or an expected timeline for filling the HSC vacancy.

Her committee will hold their first meeting on July seventeenth.

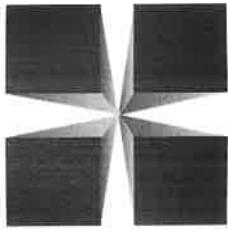

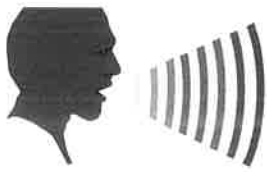
