Programs to address issues for 2nd quarter of 2015

A. Childhood obesity, and it's affects in the local area.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast May 4th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news feature on preventing childhood obesity. David Dzewaltowski, professor of physical activity and public health at Kansas State University, discussed ways to prevent childhood obesity by getting kids to be more physically active. Duration, 2 minutes.

B. Spring/Summertime Safety and Health issues.

More Than Just a Soundbite public affair program—broadcast May 13th at 6:15 a.m. and 1:05 p.m. Duration, 7 minutes. Guest: Dr. Brian Matthys, dermatologist with Sunflower Dermatology in Kansas City, KS, discussed the connection between tanning and cancer, including sun exposure during the summer months. Timed with May being Skin Cancer Awareness Month

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast June 1st at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news feature about allergy season. Allergist Dr. Jill Poole, with the University of Nebraska Medical Center, talked about dealing with allergy problems. Duration, 2 minutes.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast June 11th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news story about the first human case of West Nile Virus being reported in Kansas and steps residents should take to avoid contact with the virus. Duration, 2 minutes

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast June 20th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news story about protecting yourself against the dangers of high heat. Kelsey Angle, meteorologist with the National Weather Service, outlined the steps to take for safety in the heat and discussed the dangers of extreme heat. Duration, 2 minutes

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast June 22nd at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news feature about West Nile virus. K-State University veterinarian Elizabeth Davis discussed the steps to take to protect yourself against West Nile virus. Davis said West Nile can also be deadly for horses and encouraged owners to start vaccinating against the disease now. Duration, 2 minutes

C. Efforts to achieve economic development in local communities.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast April 20th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news feature on Hiawatha-based AgJunction plans to acquire California-based Novariant through a merger transaction. AgJunction CEO Rick Heiniger commented on the reasons for the merger and changes that will come because of the merger—including the impact on the Hiawatha office.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast April 27th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news feature on the recent Business-Industry Roundtable held by the Hiawatha Foundation for Economic Development. HFED Director Kristen Hillyer talked about what the local business and industry leaders identified as the biggest issues they face—a lack of employees and lack of suitable housing. Duration, 3 minutes

D. Issues pertaining to state budget cuts and affect on local school districts.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast April 14 at 12 & 5 p.m. and April 15th at 7 & 8 a.m. Local news story on around \$139,000 in budget cuts approved by the Hiawatha Board of Education as a result, in part, to a reduction in state funding. Duration, 2 minutes.

Kanzaland Local News—broadcast April 20th at 7 & 8 a.m. and 12 & 5 p.m. Local news story on the first round of budget cuts approved by the Prairie Hills USD 113 Board of Education for next school year to address of projected more than \$500,000 budget shortfall. Duration, 2 minutes.

Kanzaland Local News--broadcast April 23rd at 12 & 5 p.m. and April 24th at 7 & 8 a.m. Local news story about the Doniphan West Board of Education voting to close the Primary School in Highland, effective June 30th due to state cuts in public education. Duration, 2 minutes.
