Problem # 5: Keep It Clean, Tough Litter Rules Begin Soon

Bishop State students spend the afternoon picking up junk along Dr. Martin Luther King Junior Avenue.

The day of service helps but only puts a small dent in the problem. Mobile city officials want people to be better about cleaning up their homes and their businesses. I ask, haven't we tried this before? In the past city officials say it was compliance based. People would get warnings, then tickets-but if they cleaned things up those tickets would be thrown out. Now tickets will be the first thing issued if you're caught breaking the new litter rules.

"Instead of warnings we're tired of the streets being dirty a lot of citizens are demanding this so the enforcement piece is more than anything in the ordinance itself," says Director of Planning and Development Dianne Irby. There's a special focus on businesses—whether it be owners and or tenants to clean up their properties. They should have a place for cigarette butts too. A provision to keep dumpsters enclosed on three sides won't start until March first. There's hope for this new plan.

"I just hope they can clean up some of this blight, with Airbus coming in it's going to leave a bad impression," says Clerk Ron Mann. To keep messes like this from starting, it's going to take a cultural shift according to city officials and these students pitching in.
