Problem # 2: Wastewater Overflow In Prichard – How To Protect Yourself

The Prichard Water Works & Sewer Board says recent heavy rains caused over 170,000 gallons of wastewater to overflow.

According to a press release, the Mobile County Health
Department said the Prichard Water Works & Sewer Board responded
to these manhole locations after reports of sanitary sewer overflows on
March 26. An estimated 178,025 gallons of wastewater overflowed
from these incidents.

The board said heavy rains caused the overflows.

Health officials advised residents to take precautions when encountering standing water that may have accumulated from overflows.

"Those who have come into direct contact with untreated sewage are advised to wash their hands and clothing thoroughly," said the Health Officer for Mobile County, Dr. Kevin Philip Michaels.

Area residents should be on guard when using Gum Tree Branch and Toulmins Spring Branch for recreational purposes or harvesting seafood from the area, according to the health department.

All seafood harvested should be cooked thoroughly before eating, and people should wash their hands after cleaning seafood and before preparing food.

Problem # 6: Keeping Kids Safe Online

The clear takeaway from the U.S. Senate's recent hearing, "Big Tech and the Child Sexual Exploitation Crisis," is that social media is not safe for children. Senators from both sides of the aisle questioned social media CEOs about the harms their platforms cause to kids.

Democratic Senator Dick Durbin noted, "As early as 2017, law enforcement identified Snapchat as the pedophile's go-to sexual exploitation tool." Republican Ted Cruz chided Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg for Instagram allowing users to view child sexual content.

For years, social media companies have claimed that better parental controls would protect children, but as CEO of the National Center on Sexual Exploitation Dawn Hawkins argued in a Heritage Foundation panel after the hearing, "[T]he parental controls ... do not work. ... They've designed these platforms without parents in mind." The conclusion is obvious. Tech companies cannot (and will not even if they could) protect kids. Parents have to.

Problem # 7: A Sense Of Purpose Challenges Addiction

Eastern Kentucky has been an epicenter of the opioid epidemic that has ravaged middle America. As jobs declined and a sense of futility set in, drug use spiked. Coal mines were replaced with "pill mills."

Recently, however, the region has seen hopeful signs. In the town of Hazard, 43 businesses have opened, creating 171 new jobs, about a quarter of which are held by those recovering from opioid addiction. Several businesses have been started by those who fought for their own sobriety. Other communities are seeing similar growth. As one small business owner and former addict put it, "When somebody gets clean, they want to change the world, and have ideas of how to change the world. You do something just to prove you can do it."

This is a powerful reminder of the importance of purpose. Underneath the social epidemics we face is a catastrophic loss of meaning and purpose. The antidote is finding the true WHY of life. And, when they do, there's an awful lot to celebrate.
