The city of Mobile has released its locations for Christmas tree recycling and holiday garbage pickup:

Because there was no garbage pickup on Christmas Day,
December 25, the makeup date will be Saturday, December 29. There
will also be no garbage pickup on Tuesday, New Year's Day. The
makeup date will be January 5. There will be no trash (limbs and
debris) pickup on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day or New Year's Day.
Citizens are asked to properly secure bags and boxes to prevent litter.

Recycling locations will be open during the holidays every day except for Christmas Day and New Year's Day. The locations are near the Mobile Museum of Art in the parking lot of the City's Western Administrative Complex and behind Police Headquarters off Pinehill Drive. The hours of operation are from 7 am to 6 pm, Monday through Friday, and 7 am to 4 pm, Saturday through Sunday.

Want to improve your child's memory? Help her do better in school? Maybe improve his language skills? If so, take advantage of this unlimited-time offer...

It's easy, cheap and effective.

No, it's not a miracle drug found in special proteins from jellyfish. It's not a super food. It's not even kale. You don't even need a prescription. And all the potential side effects are positive.

Here it is: Limit your child's time in front of a digital device to two hours a day.

A recent study published in Lancet Child and Adolescent Health found that 8- to 11-year-olds who met Canada's "Movement Guidelines for Children and Youth" showed "superior global cognition." The guidelines call for less than 2 hours of screen time, 1 hour of physical exercise, and 9 to 11 hours of sleep.

Problem # 7: You Can Now Be Fined For Your Dog Running Loose In Mobile County

Mobile County Commission held a public hearing on dogs roaming at large in MOBILE COUNTY, Ala.

You can now receive a ticket for not keeping your dog on a leash or behind a fence in Mobile County.

Mobile County Commissioners passed an ordinance Monday that will fine dog owners if their dog is found roaming unincorporated areas of the county, a misdemeanor offense.

This comes after thousands of complaints about dogs biting people, or killing other pets or livestock.

The law allows animal control officers to now ticket a dog owner instead of taking their dog, which avoids overcrowding in shelters.

In a release from the commissioners' office, it also says the law generates money, an estimated 57k-74k a year, with each ticket costing anywhere from two to fifty dollars.

Although approved Monday, it'll take some time for animal control officers to be authorized to write tickets. So it may be days or even weeks until tickets are written.
