Mark Hunt finished first with 8,725 votes. 22.13% Chris Pelly finished second with 8,172 votes. 20.73% Jan Davis finished third with 7,682 votes. 19.49% Lael Gray finished fourth with 7,642 votes. 19.38% Mark Cates finished fifth with 5,246 votes. 13.31% Saul Chase finished sixth with 1,753 votes. 4.45% Hunt celebrated with his supporters at Asheville Pizza on Coxe Avenue in Downtown Asheville. At age 55 he won his first bid for elective office. Incumbent Jan Davis, who finished fourth in the primary, moved into third position and retained his seat, but just barely. at one point in the evening he thought he would finish fourth. But when the results came in from the final precinct to be counted, he narrowly defeated Lael Gray. The Buncombe County Sales and Use Tax Referendum For the quarter cent sales tax increase 16,795 50.74% Against 16,303 49.26%.

Incumbent Jan Davis thought his election night would end in defeat. he trailed most of the night but with one precinct outstanding he trailed political newcomer Lael Gray by just three votes. When the votes came in from the final precinct, Davis had been reelected by a forty vote margin.

201-11-07

Voters in Buncombe County will weigh in November 8th on the proposed quarter-cent sales tax increase. County Commissioners voted unanimously back in January to put the tax on the ballot, saying the proceeds would be used for capital improvements to A-B Tech. Supporters contend the improvements will stimulate the area's economy and create jobs. Those opposed to it argue that there's no guarantee the revenue will be used for community college projects. It's become a highly-charged issue the weeks leading up to the election. Both sides have spent thousands of dollars on mailings, radio ads, and yard signs to try to get their message out.
