Section I. Issues

KSDL & KXKX have identified the following issues as significant issues facing our community this quarter:

1. Job Training: State Fair Community College has a strong agriculture program designed for its "Aggies" and the ag-related businesses in the great midwest. The college revcently purchased a 200-acre working farm and now has 32 head of cattle. One public program that is becoming increasingly popular is "Ag Forward' hosted by the college and sponsored by Central Bank of Sedalia. Missouri Director of Agriculture Chris Chinn was the guest speaker for Ag Forward. Chinn said she lives on a farm in Shelby County and raises hogs, cattle, soybeans, corn and hay. The event was attended by about 70 people, including local producers, SFCC Aggies, ag instructors and Ag Program Director Brad Driskill. Agriculture is one of the main industries in mid-Missouri, so job training in that area is vital. Manufacturing is also a major player in Pettis County, and the college is instrumental in helping train workers for job-specific duties.

2. Community Development: The second anniversary of the grand opening of the Heckart Community Center, 1800 W. 3rd was observed by a large crowd at the Center, listening as Sue Heckart, whom the Center is named after, announcing: "It is my intention to

build a state-of-the-art bowling facility at the new aquatic facility on East Broadway. It will be called memory Lanes, in honor of my parents, Bill and Stella Heckart." The bowling alley is expected to open in 2026, along with the aquatic center on the east side of town. Most development in Sedalia has been on the west or south side of town over the past decade or more. And Sedalia has not had a bowling alley since the old one was torn down several years ago to make way for a parking lot. Gov. Mike Parson and his wife Thersea Parson attended the event, and stayed after the ceremony to sign copies of his newly-published autobiography, No Turnin' Back.

3. Domestic Violence: Julie Hoefert, development director for Citizens Against Spouse Abuse (CASA) spoke with Randy Kirby in studio about a fund-raiser scheduled for April 6 at the Missouri State Fairgrounds called the 5K Color Run. NUCOR and Van Natta Fabrication are the major sponsors. There is also a Kid's Dash that starts the event, which takes place on a Saturday. CASA has been in existence in Sedalia for over 40 years and serves Pettis, Saline and Benton counties. Call (660) 827-5555 if you need help. CASA receives 300 to 400 hotline calls per year, Hoefert said, and the number varies from year to year. Domestic violence is a recurring theme in the Sedalia Police reports every week, and is one of the most potentially dangerous situations for officers to respond to in their daily jobs. Reports of domestic disturbances tend to spike on weekends and holidays.

4. Code Enforcement: A hot-button topic in Sedalia right now is enhanced and updated building code enforcement. The issue was highlighted at several recent City Council meetings. There are many stories of Sedalia residents losing their house to the City because they could not afford to make the necessary remodeling requested by the City to bring their housing up to code, recently published by the state and adopted by the City. United Way of Pettis County is attempting to help out in that regrd with Day of Action, planned for June 22 at Katy Park in Sedalia, starting at 7 a.m. Volunteer teams will clean up in a six-block area around the park. There are also special projects at individual homes that volunteers can take part in. A lot of the folks asking for help are eldery or can't afford to pay for a home project. Last year's event drew 250 volunteers on 20 teams. Simon's goal this year is 300 volunteers on 25 teams. A free breakfast will be served at 7 to kick off the event, which is scheduled to end at noon. Many businesses are complaining that the new code books are overly restrictive, making their ability to conduct business and make a profit in Sedalia very difficult.

5. Child Abuse: Child abuse is an on going problem in Pettis County and numerous counties aross mid-Missouri, as avidenced by Child Safe Incorprated states. Child Safe Executive Director Heather Lynn, who recently retired as a Children's Divsion's Circuit Manager for Pettis and Cooper counties after 30 years of service, said that Child Safe serves 11 counties, plus two more counties in Missouri, with a mutual aid agreement, serving a little over 450 kids in the region, who have experienced child abuse in their home. Many recent police reports show adults being arrested for child abuse or child endangerment, whether occurring at home, or driving while intoxicated with children present in the car.

Section II. Responsive Programming

KSDL & KXKX addresses these issues through responsive programming which includes:

1/7	KSDL & KXKX	Matt Irwin	Townsquare Talk	20:00	Sedalia Fire Chief Matt Irwin visited with Randy Kirby in studio about some of the accomplishments achieved by the Sedalia Fire Department in 2023 and what to expect in 2024. the SFD responded to 2,668 calls for service in 2023, about 60 more than in 2022, Chief Irwin said. The increase can be attributed to an increase in population and traffic in Sedalia, he said. "We have an older population, so we are running more medical calls. We are actually down on house fires. This past year, we only ran 24 (two structure fires per month, on average). The fire chief attributes to that to a very pleasant November and December. "Generally, November, December, January and February are our busiest months of the year," Irwin said, contrasting the nicer weather with the bitter cold of previous years in which residents are more likley to use space heaters and overloading electrical outlets." Three members of the fire department are under the age of 21, he noted, addding that overall, his firefighters in the nation. "I'd put them up against New York any day," he said. In 2024, a new custom-built fire engine is expected to arrive in February from Spartan. The fire truck was ordered 20 months ago.
