**“The Lost children of Haiti”** – This is a report on the plight of children in post-earthquake Haiti, half a million of whom are still living on the streets, in crowded orphanages or in makeshift camps. They are also vulnerable to becoming “restaveks” – child slaves, legal in Haiti. This segment includes interviews with Joe Knitting, Moise Vaval and Mike Fox of the Global Orphan Project; Marie de la Soudiere of UNICEF; Renise, and Jean-Robert Cadet, former child slaves.

**“The People Behind the Mosque”** – This is a report on the controversy over the plan to build an Islamic Community Center new the World Trade Center site in Manhattan, referred to by opponents of the project as “the mosque at ground zero”. This segment includes interviews with Sharif El-Gamal, owner and developer of the project; Pamela Geller, writer/blogger and opponent of the project and Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf, Muslim congregation leader...

**“Into The Wild – The Great Migration”** – This is a report on the wildebeest migration across the volcanic plain of the Masai Mara in Kenya and the dangers that confront them. These include predators and the low water level in the Mara River, caused by the destruction of the Mau Forest for human agricultural needs and the burning of the trees for charcoal. Those interviewed in this segment are Robin Reid, scientist, Colorado State University; John Sena, resident of the Mau Forest; Dickson Kaelo. Who works for a non-profit foundation that’s paying the Masai to turn over management of their land to a wildlife conservancy.

**“130 Million Tons of waste”** – This is a report on the health risks caused by the improper disposal of coal ash, which contains mercury, arsenic, lead and other toxic metals. Problems occurred in Kingston, Tennessee, where coal ash disposed by the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) eventually spilled into the Emory River; and in Chesapeake, Virginia, where coal ash was spread under a golf course. This segment has interviews with Jim Roewer, lobbyist for the power industry; Leo Francendese, environmentalist for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); and Gary Topmiller a resident who lives near the Emory River.

**“The Blowout”** – This is an investigation into the causes of the explosion of the Deepwater Horizon oil drilling rig in the Gulf of Mexico on April 20<sup>th</sup>, resulting in an ongoing oil leak into the waters off of Louisiana. Discussed are the roles and responsibilities of the companies involved, Transocean, owner of the rig; BP, owner of the well; and Halliburton, a subcontractor. Featured is an interviewed with Mike Williams, the chief electronics technician on the rig.

**“Growing Body Parts”** – This is a report on regenerative medicine, the emerging technology of growing body parts by manipulating human stem cells into regrowing tissue and body parts, providing new hope for amputees and patients on organ transplant lists. Interview in this segment are Dr. Anthony Atala, Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine in North Carolina; Dr. Steven Badylak, Deputy Director of the McGowan Institute for Regenerative Medicine in Pittsburg; and Dr. Blair Jobe from the University of Pittsburg.

**“The Cost of Dying”** – This is a report on the high cost of end-of-life care, including procedures and surgeries that often times prolong patients’ lives, and how Medicare paid \$50 billion just for doctors and hospital bills during their last months. As President Obama and Congress address health care reform, these cost, which used to be a bipartisan issue, have become politically explosive, and perfect example of the health care costs that threaten to bankrupt the country. This segment includes interviews with Dr. Ira Byock, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, Lebanon, NH; Dr. Elliott Fisher, Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Meredith Snedeker, daughter of a patient.

**“60 Billion Dollar Fraud”** – This is a report on Medicare and Medicaid fraud, focusing on criminals in South Florida, who set up phony clinics and pharmacies and, with the use of illegally obtained but valid patient numbers and Medicare codes, are able to bill Medicare for unrequested and undelivered supplies. Those interviewed in this segment are FBI Special Agent Brian Waterman; Justice Department prosecutor Kirk Ogrosky, who oversees half a dozen Medicare fraud strike forces.

**48 Hours Mystery: Live To Tell: “Kidnap on Highway 1”** - In November 2007, Chris and Debra Hall and their children, Tyler and Divinia, were driving back to California from Mexico, when they were pulled over a few miles from the US border by what they thought were police. A man in a military uniform approached and suddenly put a gun to Chris’ head. Moments later the family was ambushed by a second car of gunmen. As the kidnappers drive the mo onto a dirt road in the mountains outside Tijuana, they began asking about a race car. While in Mexico, Chris and Tyler worked as part of a pit crew at the Baja 1000. When Chris explained that there was no race car, the men ransacked the family’s trailer and then took them farther into the mountains. The gunmen put the family in a ditch and threw sleeping bags over them, as the Hall Family lay hugging in the ditch, the men drove away. Ultimately the Halls crawled through the brush in the night to a house where a woman took them in and called police for help. Despite her assurances that they could trust these officers, the family could not help but fear they were in danger all over again. The authorities rushed them to the border. For the moment they are safe, but with the gunmen in possession of their drivers’ licenses and their address they will carry the memory of the traumatic night with them. Mexican authorities never investigated the kidnapping, and the Halls still don’t know who their assailants were. Drug gangs in Mexico are known to war police uniforms as a way to trap their victims.

**“Love and Death in Alaska”** – This is an update of the 9/13/08 rebroadcast of “Love and Death in Alaska”. On May 2, 1996, the body of Kent Leppink was found off a deserted road 90 miles south of Anchorage, Alaska. He had been shot three times. Police investigation discovered that he had been involved with Mecele Hughes, a young woman who worked as a stripper in a club called the Great Alaskan Bush Company. Mechele was also involved with two other men – John Carlin III and Scott Hilke. Ten years later, after further investigation, Mechele (now Mechele Linehan) and John Carlin were indicted for Leppink’s murder. At his trial, Carlin was found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced to 99 years in prison. At her trial, she was also found guilty of first degree murder. She awaits sentencing.

**“Live to Tell: Krystal’s Courage”** – This is an updated and edited version of Krystal’s courage. On December 30, 1999, 10 year old Krystal Surles, a Yates, Kansas girl, and her friend Kaylene Harris were attacked in Kaylene’s Del Rio, Texas home, by a knife wielding intruder who slashed both girls’ throats. Kaylene died... Krystal not only survived the attack but was able to help a police sketch artist draw an image that let to the arrest of her attacker, Tommy Lynn Sells. After his arrest Sells confessed to the crime and revealed that he has been traveling across the country killing men, women and children for twenty years and had never in the past left a witness alive. Krystal Surles testified during Sells’ trial for the December 1999 murder of Kaylene Harris, which ended in his being sentenced to death. This updated edition includes new commentary by Krystal Surles; Marque Surles, her sister; Pam Surles, her mother; Mark Surles, her father; Johnny Allen, Texas Ranger.
