- 2. Regularly aired announcements from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, describing the warning signs of housing discrimination.
- 3. Regularly aired announcements about food safety and properly cooked foods from the USDA and DHHS.
- 4. Regularly aired announcements from the EPA about Living Green, encouraging good air quality and radon awareness for home owners.
- 5. Regularly aired announcements for the Just Play! campaign, encouraging people of all ages to make music
- 6. Regularly aired announcements promoting children's literacy and libraries, from the Library of Congress.
- 7. Regularly aired announcements encouraging drivers to avoid texting and using distracting devices while on the road.
- 8. Regularly aired announcements promoting adoption information from DHHS.
- 9. Regularly aired announcements with tips on saving energy in the home.
- 10. Regularly aired United Way announcements with information for people to mentor young people.
- 11. Regularly aired announcements for animal adoption from shelters.

C. Spanish & Vietnamese Public Service Announcements

D. Feature Programming

- 1) How's It Growin'? Wednesdays at 11:00 a.m. (60 minutes)
 - On a weekly, basis, this gardening/outdoor program takes calls from local listeners to answer their gardening and outdoor questions.
 - July 5: Jeremiah Picard, of Big Red Worms, discussed the environmental benefits of composting and the outlook for composting in the City of Lincoln and how residents can take initiative on their own.
 - August 2: Angie Lemke, with Community CROPS, discussed the nonprofits work
 on community gardens and working with area residents on farm-to-table practices
 and healthy living strategies, especially for those with low incolme.
 - August 30: UNL Extension educator Sarah Browning discussed concerns, problems and solutions for pests and fungal diseases common to our area, as well as how to avoid spreading the issues to others.
 - September 6: Aaron French and Matt Pirog, of Community CROPS, discussed their work in the beginning farmers' programs and how community members can take advantage of the educational opportunities offered by CROPS.
- 2) The Servative Hour, Tuesdays at 11:00 p.m. (60 minutes)
 - Normal programming on "The Servative Hour" focuses on political subjects and issues in the news – both local and national – with commentary by guests and comments from callers.
 - July 18: Discussion of how the Trump administration's request for voter registration data was handled in Nebraska.
 - August 29: Discussion of the recent charges against Lancaster County treasurer Andy Stebbing
- 3) Our Street, Mondays 6-6:30 p.m. (30 minutes)
 - The program regularly features city leaders and representative of nonprofits and other organizations to discuss issues affecting local neighborhoods.
 - July 17: Kurt Elder discussed his work in the city's Urban Development department and how GIS mapping and data analysis are affecting change and progress in the city.
 - July 24: Rachel Barth, with Lincoln Electric System, discussed the upcoming LES Sustainable Living Festival, seeking to educate those in our area about

- environmentally friendly practices and educating about our city's impact on the environment.
- September 18: UNL graduate student Allison Formanack shares her research about mobile home communities in Nebraska and how she believes Lincoln can serve low income residents better by having more flexibility in policies concerned with mobile homes.
- September 25: Margie Nichols, with the Lincoln Commission on Human Rights, discussed the efforts of city government and the commission to monitor and ensure fair housing practices and mitigate discriminatory actions in the city.

4) Lavender Hill, Sundays, 11-11:30 a.m. (30 minutes)

a. On a weekly basis, this program addresses a wide variety of national and local issues relevant to the LGBT community, frequently hosting local experts and guests to speak about different topics.

5) Community Matters, 11:30 a.m.-noon (30 minutes)

- a. This weekly program features leaders from Lincoln's political, creative and economic communities, as well as those from across the country, engaging in conversation about how positive psychology and community participation can make Lincoln an even better place to live.
- b. July 24: How research can be translated into positive community experiences, and how that applied to Lincoln.
- c. August 7: Strategies the city is taking to promote kindness in Lincoln.

6) Human Services Connections, Thursdays, 1 p.m.-1:30 p.m. (30 minutes)

- a. This weekly program is produced through a partnership with the Human Services Federation, a network of 120 local nonprofit agencies. Each week, hosts interview a leader from a different nonprofit organization, to discover what they do and how listeners can take advantage of their services.
- b. July 27: Dr. Linda Moody, UNL Center for Civic Engagement, spoke about the center's work in our city and state and how listeners can get involved in their communities.
- c. August 2: Rebecca Chandler, of the People's Health Center, spoke about upcoming changes to the nonprofit and how those in Lincoln in need of health services can take advantage of its programs.
- d. August 10: Kay Matthews, of Friendship Home, discussed how the nonprofit is addressing domestic violence in Lincoln while assisting victims.
- e. August 24: Lori McAlister of the Lincoln Arts Council discussed city-wide civic art initiatives and upcoming opportunities for those in the area to engage with art.
- f. August 31: Randy Hawthorn, of the Nonprofit Hub, discussed how Lincoln is a model city for nonprofit service providers and how his organization is casting an international net from our city.
- g. September 14: Lynn Lange, of the Nebraska Coalition to End Sexual and Domestic Violence, spoke about how agencies in the state are coming together to combat widespread issues and how victims can seek resources in Lincoln.

- 7) Earth to Lincoln, Tuesdays, 6-7 p.m. (60 minutes)
 - a. This weekly program focuses on ecological and social justice issues with an emphasis on the Lincoln area. The program features interviews with policy makers, politicians, community leaders, nonprofits and more.
 - b. July 18: Local educators joined the program to discuss the upcoming March for Public Education. Included discussion of how Lincoln Public Schools is a leader nationally and a model district for others across the county.
 - c. September 12: Nick Svoboda, an organizer of Do It Ourselves Fest, discussed the free community event's educational and community-building goals.
- 8) Sports from the Grassroots, Saturdays, 8-9 a.m. (60 minutes)
 - a. The weekly program looks at sports from a social angle, examining how issues related to racism, sexism and other forms of discrimination in sports reflect our entire society.
