I. Community Issues

A. Local Public Service Announcements

KZUM produced and aired several local public service announcements. At least two PSAs are aired every hour, for most hours of the day. Individual programmers can choose which PSAs to play or read from a pool of local and national announcements. Most of these are produced at KZUM. - 2. Regularly aired announcements from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, describing the warning signs of housing discrimination.
- 3. Regularly aired announcements about food safety and properly cooked foods from the USDA and DHHS.
- 4. Regularly aired announcements from the EPA about Living Green, encouraging good air quality and radon awareness for home owners.
- 5. Regularly aired announcements for the Just Play! campaign, encouraging people of all ages to make music
- 6. Regularly aired announcements promoting children's literacy and libraries, from the Library of Congress.
- 7. Regularly aired announcements encouraging drivers to avoid texting and using distracting devices while on the road.
- 8. Regularly aired announcements promoting adoption information from DHHS.

- 9. Regularly aired announcements with tips on saving energy in the home.
- 10. Regularly aired United Way announcements with information for people to mentor young people.
- 11. Regularly aired announcements for animal adoption from shelters.
- 12. Regularly aired teacher recruitment announcements

C. Spanish & Vietnamese Public Service Announcements

KZUM aired Spanish and Vietnamese language public service announcements during its cultural programming. Here are a few examples of those spots:

- 1. Local recycling Information (Spanish and Vietnamese).
- 2. Information for victims of housing discrimination (Spanish)
- 3. Announcement for the local Fresh Start transitional shelter for women (Spanish)
- 4. Announcement for local St. Monica's behavioral health and treatment program for women (Spanish)
- 5. Parent involvement (Spanish)
- 6. Conserving resources (Spanish and Vietnamese)
- 7. Information about the dangers of keeping expired medications in the home (Spanish)

D. Feature Programming

- 1) How's It Growin'? Wednesdays at 11:00 a.m. (60 minutes)
 - On a weekly, basis, this gardening/outdoor program takes calls from local listeners to answer their gardening and outdoor questions.
 - October 25: Alice Reed and Steve Nosal, with the City of Lincoln's Sunken Gardens spoke about the community support essential to making a community garden successful, as well as what's new at the garden.
 - November 22: Alice Henneman, of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, joined the program to discuss Thanksgiving ideas, including how to use local late-season produce in recipes.
- 2) The Servative Hour, Tuesdays at 11:00 p.m. (60 minutes)
 - Normal programming on "The Servative Hour" focuses on political subjects and issues in the news – both local and national – with commentary by guests and comments from callers.
 - October 3-17: three weeks of discussions on gun control issues in the country and in the state of Nebraska, following the mass shooting at the country music festival in Las Vegas.
 - October 24: Discussing symbolic protests at local sporting events throughout Nebraska and how the state fits into the national conversation about racism and police brutality.
 - November 28: Discussion of the situation on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus involving demonstrations between staff and students and criticism from the Nebraska legislature.
 - December 5: Detailing President Trump's tax bill proposals and how they would affect Nebraskans.

• December 19: Discussion of the FCC's revocation of Net Neutrality rules and what that might mean for the country and the state.

3) Our Street, Mondays 6-6:30 p.m. (30 minutes)

- The program regularly features city leaders and representative of nonprofits and other organizations to discuss issues affecting local neighborhoods.
- October 9: Community CROPS representatives joined the program to discuss community agriculture and how Lincoln residents can get involved in neighborhood gardening.
- October 17: State Sen. Kate Bolz, of Lincoln, joined the program to give her take on Nebraska's 2017 fall legislative session and what her goals are for the legislature in 2018.
- October 23: Bob Krist joined the program to discuss his candidacy for Nebraska governor.
- October 30: Representatives from Collective Impact Lincoln discuss the tools available for encouraging collaboration between the city's stakeholders, including government, business, nonprofits and citizens.
- December 18: State Sen. Matt Hansen, of Lincoln, discussed the 2017 legislative sessions and goals for the coming year in the unicameral.

4) Lavender Hill, Sundays, 11-11:30 a.m. (30 minutes)

a. On a weekly basis, this program addresses a wide variety of national and local issues relevant to the LGBT community, frequently hosting local experts and guests to speak about different topics.

5) Community Matters, 11:30 a.m.-noon (30 minutes)

- a. This weekly program features leaders from Lincoln's political, creative and economic communities, as well as those from across the country, engaging in conversation about how positive psychology and community participation can make Lincoln an even better place to live.
- b. October 23: Rex Walton, with the Nebraska Literary Heritage Association, discussed Nebraska literature and resources available to those in the area interested in exploring the state's literary culture.
- c. Staff from CASA of Lincoln/Lancaster County discussed the nonprofit's work training court-appointed advocates for children in the area who are often left without others to look out for them in the legal system.

6) Human Services Connections, Thursdays, 1 p.m.-1:30 p.m. (30 minutes)

- a. This weekly program is produced through a partnership with the Human Services Federation, a network of 120 local nonprofit agencies. Each week, hosts interview a leader from a different nonprofit organization, to discover what they do and how listeners can take advantage of their services.
- b. October 12: Staff from the Nebraska State Stroke Association joined the program to discuss the state's stroke statistics, the nonprofit's work across Nebraska as well as what to look for in terms of stroke symptoms.

- c. October 26: Staff from Bright Lights discussed the local children's camp offerings to get kids involved in various technology fields and the opportunities that exist for area professionals and businesses to volunteer their time to help spark interest in their industries.
- d. November 2: Staff from Bridges to Hope spoke about how community members can support those who have been recently incarcerated by donating furniture, clothing, toiletries and more.
- e. November 9: Monica Zinke, of Fresh Start Home, and Lee Heflebower, Supporting Housing Administrator at Community Action, discussed National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week and what poverty looks like in Lincoln, as well as what community members can do to help.
- f. December 7: CEDARS President/CEO Jim Blue discussed the nonprofit's work with young people in Lincoln as it marks 70 years.
- g. December 14: Julie Diegel, executive director of The Nebraska Recycling Council, discussed the nonprofits work to maximize resource recovery in our area.
- h. December 21: Mark Koller, of the new HOPE Federal Credit Union, discussed its mission to give the community an alternative to harmful financial institution practices, as well as financial literacy training.
- 7) Earth to Lincoln, Tuesdays, 6-7 p.m. (60 minutes)
 - a. This weekly program focuses on ecological and social justice issues with an emphasis on the Lincoln area. The program features interviews with policy makers, politicians, community leaders, nonprofits and more.
 - b. October 3: Representatives of Nebraskans Against Gun Violence discussed the state's gun laws, statistics and their work to raise awareness and affect change in the state.
 - c. November 21: Discussion of the Nebraska Public Service Commission's decision to approve the Keystone XL Pipeline construction in Nebraska.
- 8) Sports from the Grassroots, Saturdays, 8-9 a.m. (60 minutes)
 - a. The weekly program looks at sports from a social angle, examining how issues related to racism, sexism and other forms of discrimination in sports reflect our entire society.
