WJUL Young Harris, GA

- During this quarter, WJUL continued to devote a significant portion of broadcast time to keep the public informed about the Covid-19 pandemic. WJUL has stayed in contact with city, county, state, and health department officials, to keep up to date with current Covid-19 information.
- WJUL has continued regular interviews with local chamber of commerce members to inform the public about local Covid-19-related business closures, and to support local businesses that have remained open and are struggling during this difficult time.
- As most businesses have either changed structure or struggled throughout this pandemic, WJUL regularly interviews local chambers of commerce presidents in order to inform the public about changes in local businesses, openings and closings, companies hiring for structural changes or support medical supply manufacturing etc.
- WJUL airs a 1:30 local news segment Monday-Friday several times during the day to inform listeners about local news and issues. Throughout this quarter, this local news segment has continued to include Covid-19 information to help keep the public safe.
- During this quarter, WJUL has added an additional Covid-19 related 30 second News-cast that airs several times per day to inform listeners about the latest restrictions and health advice from professionals and officials. This news-cast includes soundbytes from healthcare and medical officials.

- WJUL airs “The Mountain Scoreboard” a 5 minute Monday-Friday morning show that focuses on local sports and athletic achievements in our local school systems. The host also chooses an “Athlete of the week” and congratulates student-athletes on exceptional performance.
- WJUL airs “Off the Beaten Tracks” which introduces listeners to music rarely played on radio. This includes helping to promote local musical artists and their events.
- WJUL airs “Mountain Mornings” a 15 minute Monday-Friday program which contains local news segments, and interviews with local community members regarding local, state, and national events. “Mountain Mornings” provides an important connection between GA and NC State Capitals to keep listeners informed on important state issues including changes in laws, investigations, elections, etc. This program has regularly included Covid-19 information gathered from official sources.
- WJUL “Mountain Daybreak” that airs Monday-Friday. This program incorporates both live and pre-recorded interviews with local public officials intended to inform listeners about current events such as school closings, emergency weather/road conditions, crime, missing persons, honorable mentions etc. This program includes local news segments, and interviews with local community members regarding local, state, and national events. This program has regularly included Covid-19 information gathered from official sources.
- WJUL airs “The Morning Dish” a locally based comedy show that also incorporates a “Community Calendar” that informs listeners about fun community events, local meetings, job openings, etc. The “Community Calendar” highlights local

events and charities that are submitted by community leaders and members to the station. “The Morning Dish” interviews local Chamber of Commerce members from Clay County, Nc, Union County, Ga, Cherokee County, NC and Towns County, Ga, Monday-Friday to inform listeners about local issues, upcoming events, and helpful business opportunities. One of the regular co-hosts of this program is the Chamber of commerce president of Cherokee Co. NC. Which helps to keep NC listeners updated on community events and opportunities.

- WJUL airs “Off the Beaten Tracks” which discusses educates listeners about music history and introduces listeners to a variety of music and recording artists typically unheard.
- WJUL airs “Deep Cuts” a 56 minute program which is produced by a local community member. This show revisits Classic music and explains the history behind the music.
- WJUL airs “Heart, Soul, and Rock and Roll”, with local DJ breaks that help promote local events, job openings, meetings, emergency PSA's etc.
- WJUL airs Casey Kasem's top 40 which revisits the hits of the 60s, 70s, and 80s.
