7-20-14 *A Boy and a Jaguar* by Alan Rabinowitz: Alan loves animals, but the great cat house at the Bronx Zoo makes him sad. Why are they all alone in empty cages? Are they being punished? More than anything, he wants to be their champion—their voice—but he stutters uncontrollably. Except when he talks to animals... Then he is fluent. Rabinowitz is a wildlife conservationist and spokesperson for the Stuttering Foundation of America. When he was a boy, he discovered that, despite severe speech challenges, he had a gift for communicating with animals. The story will help children empathize with their peers with speech issues and will be a lifeline to those with special needs or who feel like outsiders for one reason or another. Every library should own this book, a testament to the fierce beauty of jaguars and the human spirit.

7-20-14 *Timmy Failure* by Stephan Pastis (Author, Illustrator) Meet "detective" Timmy Failure, star of the kids' comedy of the year. Created by New York Times cartoonist Stephan Pastis. Take Timmy Failure — the clueless, comically self-confident CEO of the best detective agency in town, perhaps even the nation. Add his impressively lazy business partner, a very large polar bear named Total. Stephan Pastis gets you snorting with laughter, then slyly carries the joke a beat further — or sweetens it with an unexpected poignant moment — making this a comics-inspired story that truly stands apart from the pack.

7-27-14 Thom Gimbel of Foreigner - August 1st at Marymoor Park. Foreigner bandmember, guitarist, saxophonist, keyboardist (the list of instruments goes on and on) – Thom Gimbel – joined me on the phone from the road. Of course, we talked about being in a world famous rock and roll band... and about playing with the amazing Mick Jones... on whatever happened to Lou Graham... how they found the crazy talented lead singer Kelly Hanson... how Thom hooked up with Aerosmith for 6 years and why he left for Foreigner... and the most scandalous thing he ever did as a rock star.

8-10-14 Sugar Ray frontman Mark McGrath is an interviewer's dream. All I had to do was prepare a few questions – and off he went! He's a great story teller with high energy, and he's a perfect gentleman. He called me himself, which is always amazing (not patched in by his publicist) and he called on time. I made note of that, and he told me not being punctual was a pet-peeve: "Why is my time more valuable than someone else's?" Sugar Ray, Blues Traveler, Gin Blossoms and Uncle Kracker have been touring together all summer and finally arrive at The Tulalip Resort Casino for Jackstock on August 15th. And, they're playing THE HITS, and nothing but THE HITS. "This is a Greatest Hits package. If you're going to play new stuff or B-sides, we may need to have a conversation. These bands love playing the hits. These bands get it." Mark McGrath is a renaissance man, meaning, he does it all. And we talked about it all: from touring with a rock band, to donning the cover of Rolling Stone magazine, to being a 3-time Champion of Rock & Roll Jeopardy, to hosting Extra!, to starring in Sharknado 2, (where he had the best line in the movie).

8-10-14 Frank Ferrante is Groucho Marx. Award-winning actor Frank Ferrante returns to one of his favorite cities worldwide to perform his hilarious one-man tribute to the comedic legend of Groucho Marx. Directed by Dreya Weber Groucho Returns runs for three weeks in a show that is never the same twice. 9-7-14 Author Nick Jans, an Alaskan nature writer and photographer, has a book called A Wolf Called Romeo. – this wolf is without a pack and befriends an Alaskan community who tend to not like wolves around...Wolves generate controversy wherever they live. There is a huge chasm between those who wish us to leave them in peace and those who wish their extermination. Bridging that void is one of the central themes of Nick Jans' A Wolf Called Romeo. Wolves are apex predators that avoid human contact, contrary to movies (most recently Liam Neeson's "The Grey") about packs that hunt men and kill indiscriminately. Though they are the stuff of dark legend and fearful tales, they are extremely difficult to locate in the wild, even by experts Author Nick Jans, an Alaskan nature writer and photographer, had limited contact with wolves despite great effort. He had even lived with native subsistence hunters to increase his chances. Then a black wolf found him at his home near Juneau. A Wolf Called Romeo. is the true story of a lone black wolf and his six-year relationship with Jans and the town of Juneau. Romeo remains a wild predator, yet finds a way to form a pack with Juneau's domestic dogs and to tolerate, then accept, the people who own them. Jans discovers in his research, and his contact with Romeo, that wolves mate for life, that their packs are actually parent and children, that they are caring, loyal, nurturing and, perhaps, capable of love. Romeo's affect on the community, both pro- and anti-wolf, is dramatic.

7-20-14 The Witness Wore Red: The 19th Wife Who Brought Polygamous Cult Leaders to Justice by Rebecca Musser. Rebecca Musser grew up in fear, concealing her family's polygamous lifestyle from the "dangerous" outside world. Covered head-to-toe in strict, modest clothing, she received a rigorous education at Alta Academy, the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints' school headed by Warren Jeffs. Always seeking to be an obedient Priesthood girl, in her teens she became the nineteenth wife of her people's prophet: 85-year-old Rulon Jeffs, Warren's father. Finally sickened by the abuse she suffered and saw around her, she pulled off a daring escape and sought to build a new life and family. The Witness Wore Red is a gripping account of one woman's struggle to escape the perverse embrace of religious fanaticism and sexual slavery, and a courageous story of hope and transformation
