A local non-profit organization, that works to provide support services for students across the area, is getting a record-breaking donation this week. Chris Douglas, chief executive officer for Communities In Schools of South Central Texas, says they have received an astounding \$3 million donation from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott. Douglas says the one-time donation is amazing news for their organization, and will go a long way towards supporting the work that they do on behalf of children in this area. Scott's donation to Communities In Schools of South Central Texas is part of a much larger overall donation to the national Communities In Schools Organization. In all, Scott donated more than \$133 million to CIS, which is easily the largest gift ever received by the nationwide program in its 40 year history. If you're not familiar with the work of Communities In Schools, there's a good chance that they are working in partnership with a school district in your area. Douglas says they have staff members that work inside of schools. They build one-on-one relationships with students and help them to move beyond the barriers that might exists in the classroom, at home, or in the community. They currently work with 59 schools in seven school districts in this area. The list of districts includes the Comal,

New Braunfels, Seguin, Luling, Marion, Nixon-Smiley and Schertz-Cibolo-Universal City school districts. Our guest is Chris Douglas, CEO of CIS of South Central Texas. 18:00
