Spring Water Hoosick Falls- WNYT- April 1, 2016- 5:00 am

The owners of a syrup business in the town of Hoosick are hoping to break into the water business. Not many people associate that area with clean water these days but the Knapp family seems to have hit the jackpot when it comes to clean, natural, spring water on their property and they hope to be selling it soon. The Knapp's want people to know their water is PFOA free. The couple is working to sell it- calling their business Indian Springs Water. Time will tell if their liquid gold is the silver lining people in Hoosick Falls have been waiting for.

State Budget Deadline- WNYT- April 1, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

The New York State budget is late. It the first time in year's lawmakers have missed the deadline but they're probably not going to miss it by much. The senate and assembly have been debating the bills all morning. The assembly finally recessed at 4:40 this morning and they should finish passing the necessary budget bills today. The 147 billion-dollar budget and the minimum wage going up eventually to 15 dollars an hour in New York City. In the Capital Region and the rest of Upstate New York the minimum wage would go up to 9.70 by the end of this year and then increases would be phased in until hitting 12.50 an hour in 2020. It will increase to 15 dollars an hour upstate but it's still not certain when. Twelve weeks of paid family leave is in the budget but it won't be phased in until 2018. It will allow workers to take paid leave to care for a baby or a family member with a serious health condition.

The controversial vote to allow major renovations at Albany High School will stand. The State Education Commissioner made the decision today. An appeal was filed after problems during the February vote. Not enough ballots were printed and that led to long lines and wait times and some people leaving without ever voting but the education commissioner ruled there wasn't enough evidence that the vote was unfair. Albany County Comptroller Mike Conners has been pushing for a revote. He hopes to file a lawsuit in federal court next week.

Bernie Sanders supporters will rally at the State Capitol in Albany at noontime Monday. Sanders himself will not be there.

At the top of your news tonight, the race for the democratic presidential nomination is still close. As we get closer to the New York Primary, now a little over two weeks away, New York is in the sights of both Bernie Sanders and Hillary Clinton. Today we learned Clinton is going to make a direct appeal to Capital Region voters with a campaign stop in Cohoes. Clinton will be at the Cohoes High School gym at 6:15 p.m. Monday. The school superintendent just got a call today from the Clinton campaign to set up the event. The gym holds 1500 people. You must reserve a spot on the Clinton campaign website if you hope to attend the event.

Fiscal Year- WNYA- April 2, 2016- 10:00 pm

Now two-thirds through the fiscal year, North Adams looks poised to end the year in black. City officials say they are on track to close out the budget without relying on transfers from reserves. Our media partners at the Berkshire Eagle say despite this, the city faces a large deficit as it begins looking at the 2017 budget. Mayor Richard Alcombright is expected to unveil a new proposal in the next few weeks.

Nicholaus Building Construction- WNYA- April 3, 2016- 10:00 pm

Construction work continues on the Nicholaus building in Schenectady. The mayor's office tells us they're making progress in shoring up the structural integrity of the nearly 200-year-old building. The building began shaking on Friday. Erie Boulevard will remain closed southbound from Liberty Street to Erie through Monday. Also closed is State Street between South Ferry and Erie Boulevard. Commuters and residents are being asked to use alternate routes.

Hillary Cohoes- WNYT- April 4, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

Hillary Clinton's campaign is coming to the Capital Region today. She is preparing for an expected loss tomorrow in the important Wisconsin Primary. So she is looking ahead, to assure a win in what's considered her home state. While she wasn't born in New York, the former first lady and secretary of state was a U.S. senator representing New York for eight years and resides here with her husband- the former president. Bernie Sanders is growing closer in some New York polls, so Clinton is coming here today. She's expected to land at Albany International Airport this afternoon. Then she'll meet privately with New York legislators and after that hold a rally at Cohoes High School starting at 6:15 p.m. Clinton was in Brooklyn yesterday and earlier today she'll be in New York City with Governor Andrew Cuomo as he signs legislation making the 15-dollar minimum wage and paid family leave law.

Emily Bechand has sung the National Anthem many times but on Monday evening she'll sing the country's most patriotic songs before the woman who could become the first female president of the United States. The Cohoes high student got the call Saturday that her school would be the venue for the Clinton rally. The small school of 505 students got the nod with the help of its alumnus and former mayor, Assemblyman John McDonald, a Clinton supporter who says the school is the perfect location. In classrooms throughout the school- students like those in Mr. Michael Snitzler's U.S. history class- were not only discussing the history they're about to make but issues that impact them.

The new convention center in Albany- slated to be called the Albany Capital Center- will open on March 22<sup>nd</sup> of next year. That's the big news out of the Albany Convention Center Authority's board meeting this morning and according to the center's operators- the opening will be just the beginning. Five events have already signed contracts with the center- expected to bring over 37 hundred visitors and book over 31-hundred hotel rooms. It's estimated the center will bring in an additional 1.5 million dollars in tax revenue per year- from the hotel bed tax and sales tax. The center will also create 200 construction jobs and 300 permanent jobs. The Capital Center will connect with the Times Union Center and the Empire State Plaza for larger events- like an NCAA tournament game. The Capital Center itself has 25 foot ceilings on one floor so it can host practices for NCAA games.

Before Clinton took the stage, the crowd needed some warming up. Not someone trying to get them pumped up- but actual warmth. The majority of people spent at least an hour outside in the freezing cold- waiting in a line described as unorganized, even chaotic. Still, there was plenty of excitement around a presidential candidate's visit. It's not often a presidential candidate makes campaign stops in upstate New York, much less Cohoes. That's why so many people were excited to have a front row seat and a say in presidential politics.

The intersection of Erie Boulevard and State Street in Schenectady is still shut down tonight. The foundation of the Nicholaus building shifted on Friday, a month after the Olender Building next door, was torn down. The mayor's office says workers finished installing braces on the outside wall, but there's still more work to be done inside to make sure it's stable.

Madison Avenue Closed- WNYT- April 5, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

A portion of Madison Avenue in Albany will be closed tonight and tomorrow night. Crews will be working on the stairs forming a bridge over Madison Avenue at Empire State Plaza. So the presence of a crane and construction vehicles will require Madison to be closed between South Swan Street and Eagle Street, between 7 p.m. and 3 a.m. tonight and tomorrow night.



City hall reports "the cupola on the building has been secured." The building was evacuated and roads closed when the building shifted last Friday.

Nicholaus Update- WNYT- April 5, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm

Several roads, closed around the Nicholaus Building in Schenectady, are now re-open. That includes most of Erie Boulevard and part of State Street. The mayor says the eastbound lane of State Street is expected to re-open tomorrow. The city says it's been making a lot of progress shoring up and inspecting the historic structure. The building was evacuated when it shifted last Friday and cracks were found in the walls, one month after the building next door was torn down.

Environmental groups from across the northeast gathered in Albany today. They want to block construction of a natural gas pipeline between Pennsylvania and New England. The project has been approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission but it still needs a water quality certificate from the State Department of Environmental Conservation and a permit from the ARMY Corp of Engineers. Protestors, including Robert F. Kennedy Jr. and Karenna Gore, marched from the Capitol to the DEC headquarters. The pipeline company says it will help create 24 hundred jobs but the protestors wonder, at what cost. Supporters of the "Constitution Pipeline" say none of the gas will be shipped overseas. While New York runs on natural gas, 97 percent comes from other states.

A new program in Saratoga Springs is helping an organization dedicated to improving the lives of veterans who suffer from PTSD. The Saratoga Lions Club is selling flags that can be personalized with the names of veterans. You can buy them on the Lion's website for five dollars. The group hopes to raise tens of thousands of dollars for Saratoga War Horse- an organization that pairs veterans with retired race horses to help the vets deal with emotional scars.

Cruz Coming to Capital Region- WNYT- April 5, 2016- 11:00 pm- WNYA- April 5, 2016- 10:00 pm

Republican Ted Cruz is scheduled to hold a town hall meeting at Mekeel Christian Academy, in Scotia, on Thursday. This most recent visit from a presidential hopeful comes just three days after Hillary Clinton was in Cohoes. Supporters say his presence means that New York State is in play, for the first time in a long time, for the GOP. It's empty now but come Thursday morning, the Mekeel Christian Academy gym will be packed with 13 hundred people anxious for a hello or handshake from presidential hopeful and Republican Senator, Ted Cruz. Republican leaders in Schenectady County have been scouting locations for a few weeks but only just heard from the Cruz Campaign that Mekeel would be the site for Cruz' town hall forum. A republican presidential candidate hasn't visited Schenectady County since George Bush Sr., in 1988. Races are typically decided by our April 19<sup>th</sup> primary but not this year. Presidential politics that the Mekeel kids will actually experience and not just see on TV, hear about from their teachers and family or read about in a text book.

A new law in Saratoga Springs will require you to safely store your gun when you're not using it. City Council last night, passed the new law unanimously. It's called "Nicholas's Law," named for Nicholas Naumkin, a 12-year-old, who was accidentally shot and killed by a friend.

New York State could play an important role in deciding which presidential candidates win their party's nomination. There will be a lot of delegates at stake in the April 19<sup>th</sup> primary. That's why part of the focus for the candidates is on the Capital Region. Hillary Clinton was already here this week and we learned today that Donald Trump could be holding a rally at the Times Union Center on Monday. His campaign reached out to the arena but nothing is set in stone just yet. A candidate who's definitely coming is Ted Cruz. He'll be at Mekeel Christian Academy in Scotia tomorrow morning. Schenectady County Republican Chair, Michael Cuevas, helped convince the campaign to have the event there. There are three delegates per congressional district. If the first place candidate gets more than 50 percent of the vote, they'll win all three. If no one gets 50 percent of the vote in the district, first place gets two delegates and second place gets one. A statewide poll out today, has Trump at 52 percent, Kasich at 25 percent and Cruz at 17 percent. Cohoes Mayor Shawn Morse estimates he paid a few thousand dollars in overtime. Also on the house in Scotia, a free haircut for Ted Cruz.

VT PFOA Update- WNYT- April 6, 2016- 5:00 pm

Vermont plans to expand its testing for PFOA. Governor Pete Shumlin says testing will be done in the vicinity of 11 sites around the state. The governor says the tests are not a result of specific concerns for drinking water safety. Rather, they're being done at sites where the state believes PFOA may have been used in certain manufacturing processes. All of this follows the discovery of PFOA in private wells in North Bennington.

Residents in Albany have a chance today to dispose of their household hazardous waste. The mayor's office says this is the first of nine dates this year where you can drop off hazardous materials and electronics at the city's Rapp Road landfill. You need to pre-register.

Cruz Scotia- WNYT- April 7, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

Republican presidential candidate Ted Cruz is coming to the Capital Region today. He'll hold a rally in Scotia at McKeel Christian Academy. He's scheduled to appear at 10:30 this morning and some of the streets around the school are going to start closing to the public this morning. Hillary Clinton has already come to campaign in the Capital Region and there is word both Donald Trump and John Kasich are making plans to come here. New York is playing a role in the selection of the democrat and republican party candidates for the first time in a long time.

Many of the people who crowded into the Cruz rally today seemed to be mesmerized by the man. The question now becomes: do those people believe Ted Cruz's Christian values outweigh the candidates controversial New York values comment made earlier in the campaign? Despite the antics, despite the seemingly less-than-presidential remarks during the campaign, it seems many people of faith are willing to place their faith in Ted Cruz to become the next occupant of the White House, no matter how much of an uphill climb it might be- especially in New York. The moment that Senator Ted Cruz arrived in the Capital Region it became both historic and symbolic. Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin hasn't endorsed anyone yet, but says a face-to-face meeting may help him decide. The overwhelming majority of rally goers came out to support Ted Cruz.

Structural issues were discovered with a bridge in Lee. The Berkshire Eagle reports the state has set a weight limit on the West Park Street Bridge until it can be repaired or replaced. The cost to replace the span would be more than six million dollars. Another option is to run new beams alongside the deficient ones.

The campaign trails in the race for the White House are carving a path through the Capital Region. Hillary Clinton was here on Monday. Today, Ted Cruz brought his campaign to Mekeel Christian Academy in Scotia. He talked about the need for more jobs, getting rid of Obamacare and protecting religious freedom. The town organized a special meeting to educate people about the proposed pipeline and what can be done, if people don't want it near their property. Even though it wasn't meant to be informational, there were still plenty of angry residents. Kinder Morgan's Northeast energy direct pipeline project would carry fracked natural gas from Pennsylvania through Schoharie, Albany, and Rensselaer counties. Residents voiced concerns with possible accidents, eminent domain, and pollution. The same complaints we've been hearing since last summer. Kinder Morgan's pipeline still needs approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission or FERC. They told her she missed the deadline. Megan wasn't alone. Voters were showing up in large numbers at the Albany County Board of Elections, all day long. Democratic Elections Commissioner Matt Clyne says the intensity of the campaign combining with the passion of voters created a perfect storm of political confusion and he was caught directly in the middle of it.



here in New York. Over the weekend- Siena said Republican Chris McGrath opened up an eight-point lead in the special election for the ninth senate district. With 100 percent of precincts reporting- it's Democratic Assemblyman Todd Kaminsky who holds a five-point lead- and has claimed victory. McGrath has not yet conceded the race. Kaminsky leads McGrath by under 800 votes out of more than 68-thousand cast. The special election is being held for former Senate Majority Leader Dean Skelos' seat- which he lost after being convicted on federal corruption charges. Before the special election- republicans and democrats each held 31 seats in the Senate- with the republicans partnering with the independent democratic caucus for a majority. Now- democrats would have a slim- one vote majority- if the IDC comes back to work with them. The potential for a swing in power with this election was so great- even President Barack Obama weighed in with an endorsement.

It seems like adding insult to injury. Why are people in Hoosick Falls getting bills for water that was contaminated by PFOA, when the state promised they wouldn't have to pay them? All across the village of Hoosick Falls people are getting the unpleasant surprise- a bill for water that was contaminated with PFOA. The state says the municipal water is safe now, thanks to a working filtration system. Once that happens, the village will send out rebates- but only after people pay their water bill. Wednesday night a state representative told me they hold to get the village 240-thousand dollars to cover the cost of the bills next week.

People are worried about their neighbors in Berkshire County and other parts of New York state dealing with pipeline construction on different projects.

There's no known source for the PFOS yet. Taconic, which was responsible for earlier contamination says it never used PFOS at its plant.

New Yorkers spent a record amount of money last year on lottery games and video lottery terminals. The State Gaming Commission says ticket sales for traditional lottery games grew six percent to 7.7 billion dollars. That includes Powerball, Mega-Millions, Take Five and Quick Draw. Included in that amount are instant games or scratch offs, which brought in about four billion. VLT's made a record two billion dollars of the combined total, a record 3.3 billion will go to school districts across the state.

Right now, it's used for storage, and office space by Arnoff Logistics, but developer Bill Barber wants to put in around 70 apartments on the top floors and shops below. Then Barber would like to build another mixed-use building right next door. Arnoff says Nipper will be in good hands, but Nipper was there long before Arnoff. RTA, a distributor for RCA, owned the four story poured concrete structure in the late 1950's. The RCA dog was built in Illinois and transported in three pieces by rail to the building in the 1950's, and there he's sat ever since. Even Nipper's first master, designer of the statue, Harris Sanders was there to see his dog fight for immortality. Hoping Albany's top dog, stays right where he is.

Developers broke ground on a big apartment building in Troy for families of all incomes. Next to Tapestry is a new building with lofts for artists. Across the street, Capital Roots is creating an urban grow center that will offer food from local farms. It was a festive groundbreaking on River Street- the culmination of work by many different partners. Transforming the sprawling former Mooradian's Warehouse on River Street, into 67 mixed income family rental apartments. The project combining historic preservation with sustainability. The apartment building for veterans, for years, was an eyesore. A stretch of vacant, rundown buildings heavily damaged by a 2012 suspicious fire. Troy Housing Authority ripped down the dilapidated buildings and will offer eight new, permanent homes to veterans in the fall. The move comes as Vermont deals with PFOA contamination in public and private water supplies in North Bennington and Pownal.

Today was the deadline for absentee ballots but the voting machines are impounded by court order, so it's unclear when the absentees will be counted.

With health concerns mounting- blood testing will begin in Bennington, Vermont to find out how much PFOA people have in their blood. The testing starts tomorrow, and this is a big enough deal- Vermont's health commissioner will be on hand for the first blood tests. The clinic opens tomorrow at the State Health Department's Bennington office. More than 100 private water wells in the area around the former ChemFab plant in North Bennington tested positive for PFOA levels as high as nearly 3000 parts per trillion. The state says anything about 20 parts per trillion for drinking water is unsafe. PFOA is a toxic industrial chemical linked to cancer. The blood tests will measure the level of PFOA in an individual's blood. It will be several months before the results are known.

Albany is shining new lights on some of its parks, to cut energy costs. The city showed off new lighting today at Mullen's Field. An internal police investigation is ongoing, and New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman says an executive order by Governor Cuomo means he should have jurisdiction to review the case.

Thursday, Schneiderman sued Rensselaer County District Attorney Joel Abelove, claiming Abelove disregarded the AG's jurisdiction under Executive Order-147, which allows the state to take over certain cases involving police-related shootings. Thevenin was shot and killed April 17<sup>th</sup>, after a police chase that ended on the Collar City Bridge.

Abelove took the case to a grand jury, and cleared French of all charges.

The governor of Vermont says of the 40 wells tested in Bennington, 34 had levels above 20 parts per trillion, three were below 20 and three had no PFOA. The highest level found was 201 parts per trillion. That's well above what the state considers safe for drinking water, which is 20 parts per trillion. The majority of these results were from homes with private wells south of the Bennington landfill.

jurisdiction in the investigation into a police involved shooting that left a Watervliet man dead. We heard from the attorney general yesterday about this unusual legal battle. Today, the district attorney answered all our questions, but with different variations of no comment. Rensselaer County District Attorney Joel Ablove was a speaker today at a county event about welfare fraud. He did not want to comment about the attorney general's lawsuit against him. New York Attorney Eric Schneiderman is suing Ablove over the investigation into the Troy Police shooting of Edson Thevenin of Watervliet on April 17<sup>th</sup> in Troy. Police say an officer fired eight shots in self-defense after Thevenin pinned the officer with a car. Five days after the shooting, Ablove announced that a grand jury found Sergeant Randall French's use of deadly force was justifiable. Schneiderman believes the case falls under his jurisdiction, under Executive Order 147 that allows the attorney general's office to take over certain police-related shooting investigations. The AG spoke in Albany yesterday. Thevenin's family believes the grand jury investigation was rushed, and that the investigation should not have been done by Troy Police.

Government watchdog groups are calling for ethics reform too. These good government groups say they've been mystified that nothing's been done to tighten up Albany. NYPIRG and the League of Women Voters have a five-point plan. It includes campaign finance reform, slashing contribution limits to political committees, and making sure the public knows who is contributing. The groups also want to restrict companies that do business with the state from donating to campaigns.

Rensselaer County DA Joel Ablove is speaking out for the first time since he was sued by the New York State Attorney General. The feud is over the investigation into a deadly police shooting. Edson Thevenin was killed during a traffic stop on the Collar City Bridge. Police say the officer fired in self-defense after getting pinned by a car driven by Thevenin. Just days later, Ablove announced the officer was cleared by a grand jury. Attorney General Eric Schneiderman says an executive order gives him jurisdiction to investigate further. A judge will decide jurisdiction this week.

Schumer Dairy Farms- WNYT- May 4, 2016- 5:00 am

Could Canada make war on Capital Region dairy farms? U.S. Senator Chuck Schumer from New York says a proposed law in Canada would hurt dairy farmers here by imposing limits on how much milk could be imported to our neighbors to the north. Schumer will be in Hudson Falls this morning, at the Ideal Dairy Farm. He's imploring Washington to head off Canada's passage of the trade barrier, saying it will harm dairy farmers upstate.

Bennington PFOA- WNYT- May 4, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

There's another blood testing clinic today and tomorrow for people concerned about PFOA in Bennington. The deadline to register for additional testing clinics has now been extended to May 31<sup>st</sup> as more private wells have tested positive for high levels of the toxic chemical. Vermont's governor says out of 40 wells tested, 34 have levels of PFOA above what the state considers safe to drink. The majority of these results are from homes with private wells south of the Bennington landfill.

CDTA Assault- WNYT- May 4, 2016- 12:00 pm- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm

Not a word from 20 year-olds Asha Burwell, Ariel Agudio and Alexis Briggs as they walked into the Albany County Courthouse to face a judge. The three are accused of lying about a hate crime. Prosecutors say they were the ones who actually went on the attack. The three women initially claimed they were the victims of an attack on a CDTA bus in the early morning hours of January 30<sup>th</sup>. It was reported as a group of students, including white men, assaulted and hurled racial slurs at the women who are black. That sparked protest and a rally on the UAlbany campus. However, the indictment paints a different picture- the charges allege that Burwell, Agudio and Briggs were the aggressors in a fight that was caught on video. Unusual, the defense attorney says is the indictment of misdemeanors and violations. It came after talks of a plea agreement, that includes an apology from the women, broke down. Supporters, also packed the courtroom saying they don't believe this case will get a fair shake. They question the justice system and despite the video and indictment, they still believe the women were victimized.

Each state has a different Tax Freedom Day determined by their tax load. Vermont's Tax Freedom Day was April 17<sup>th</sup>. New York State's Tax Freedom Day doesn't come until next Wednesday.

If passed by the assembly, the law would change anyone who hurts or kills an animal while committing another crime with a felony- which could potentially send them to prison for two years.

Five-hundred-forty gallons of untreated sewage spilled into Stoney Creek in Clifton Park today. According to the Department of Environmental Conservation sewage alert grease deposits caused the back up. Clifton Park Town Supervisor Phil Barrett tells NewsChannel 13 the town of Colonie owns the reservoir. We checked with them and they say it is a back-up drinking water supply that has never been used. NewsChannel 13 found out about this because we signed up to receive DEC sewage alerts. UAlbany is taking action against three students accused of lying about the circumstances surrounding an attack on a bus. Ariel Agudio and Asha Burwell have been dismissed from the university. At the time they were being questioned as the victims. Police say the video from inside the bus shows the three women were actually the aggressors. They were charged with assault and falsely reporting an incident.

There's a high profile legal battle underway tonight in our area that involves two high profile politicians, that some say over shadows a recent tragedy. Just a matter of days after a Troy Police officer shot and killed motorist Edson Thevenin during a traffic stop on the Collar City Bridge April 17<sup>th</sup>, a Rensselaer County Grand Jury cleared Sergeant Randall French of any wrongdoing in the case. In the aftermath of the tragedy, State Attorney General Eric Schneiderman has claimed foul, filing a lawsuit against Rensselaer County DA Joel Ablove. The lawsuit involves Executive Order 147, signed by the governor last summer, at a time when police shootings of unarmed civilians across the country were creating what he referred to as a "crisis of confidence," the perception or belief that local prosecutors were more interested in protecting police than they were in finding justice. Ablove disagrees with the executive order, which is why Schneiderman filed his lawsuit, arguing the public is entitled to a full, reasoned, and independent investigation, and in the DA's rush to judgement, Ablove has frustrated the AG's ability to provide his own investigation. Ablove's outside counsel has until next Tuesday to file a response to the lawsuit, with oral arguments on May 17<sup>th</sup>. If Schneiderman wins jurisdiction, legal experts say the Grand Jury decision could be undone, which means an exonerated police officer might not be off the hook.



NewsChannel 13 has confirmed that Rensselaer County has hired outside counsel to defend District Attorney Joel Ablove. State Attorney General Eric Schneiderman filed a lawsuit accusing Ablove of initiating an unauthorized grand jury investigation. This stemmed from the shooting of Edson Thevenin on the Collar City Bridge by a Troy Police officer back in April. Ablove's grand jury cleared the officer of any wrong doing. The attorney general believes the investigation should have gone through his office. The county now has to convince a state supreme court judge that the district attorney acted within his jurisdiction. If not, the case goes to trial.

Ali has an answer prepared for that inevitable question and proof. Her younger brother, Moe-Sin Nack-Bi, a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army, was killed in Afghanistan in 2008. He enlisted in the Army after his best friend was killed in the 9/11 terrorist attacks. The hardest question Ali has ever had to answer, after all, came from her own daughter who had just heard on the news that there are politicians, and people, who want to ban Muslims, just like her family, from the U.S.

The state attorney general is no longer suing the Rensselaer County DA. That's because Joel Ablove has turned over his case file on the police officer involved shooting death of Edson Thevenin in Troy. The AG filed a lawsuit saying Ablove ignored an executive order made by the governor. That order appoints the AG as special prosecutor in cases involving unarmed people being killed by police officers.

Voters in New York State go to the polls next week to decide school budgets. The State Association of School Business officials has analyzed information submitted to the State Education Department. Their report card shows spending is expected to increase by 2.2 percent next year, while student enrollment continues to decline. The allowable tax levy statewide is 9/10ths of a percent, the lowest since the tax cap was approved in 2012. The proposed tax levy increase proposed by school districts is 7/10<sup>th</sup> of a percent, the lowest in six years.

Twenty-one. That's how old you'll likely have to be to buy tobacco in Albany County. The legislature passed a law raising the age from 18, but not everyone thinks the smoking legislation is so hot. Lawmakers voted 24 to 13 to raise the tobacco-buying age. Tonight, supporters said it will discourage young people from every starting to smoke. Some opponents say, it's not that easy. Legislators voting yes said they're starting a trend. The legislation includes chewing tobacco, rolling papers, pipes and e-cigarettes. You can still smoke at 18 in Albany County, you just can't buy it there. That's why some lawmakers voted no, saying it won't make a difference. Some people argued more anti-tobacco education is the real answer. At Smokers Choice in Latham, some smokers could soon lose their choice. Saying most smokers get started in their teens and anything making it harder is worth it.

Albany County Tobacco Age- WNYT- May 10, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

Albany County has become the latest to pass a new law raising the smoking age to 21. The county legislature passed the legislation last night. It raises the age from 18 to 21 to buy any tobacco products: cigarettes, chewing tobacco, rolling papers, pipes and E-cigarettes. The law does not apply to people under 21 who buy tobacco products in another county but use them in Albany County. If County Executive Dan McCoy signs off on the legislation, the law would go into effect after it's filed with the secretary of state.

There are new developments in the investigation of a police involved shooting in Troy. The Rensselaer County DA has agreed to turn over his file on the case to the state attorney general. Rensselaer County DA Joel Ablove was being sued by the state attorney general, over his investigation into the shooting of Edson Thevenin by a Troy police sergeant. Ablove presented the case to a grand jury "within days" of the shooting, and the jury ruled "the use of deadly force" was justified. In a statement: Ablove has announced the attorney general has withdrawn his lawsuit. In his written statement, Ablove says he's glad the attorney general agreed to withdraw his claims against the DA's office and he will continue to perform his duties on behalf of the people of Rensselaer County. The attorney general's office has now responded with a written statement saying they are pleased the DA agreed to each and every one of their legal demands but they say the agreement does not exonerate Ablove for any potential claims of misconduct.

He had refused to do so until Schneiderman filed a lawsuit against him. The DA presented the case to a grand jury just days after Thevenin was shot and killed. The jury decided the use of deadly force by Troy Police was justified.

They quickly got back to Saratoga Water, saying they have no intention of getting into the water business, but now there's a petition to cancel the juice company's trademark, meaning they're essentially being sued. There are at least 90 other local companies using Saratoga in their names. Saratoga Juice was told to prepare for a legal battle that could cost more than 100-thousand dollars and take a year and a half to resolve. In the meantime, they've stopped selling Saratoga Spring Water. We reached out to the water company for our story today, but neither them nor their Rochester-area attorney got back to us.

Governor Cuomo traveled to Essex County today to announce a major land acquisition. The state is buying nearly 21-thousand acres in the town of North Hudson known as the Boreas Ponds Tract. The selling price was 14.5 million dollars. The money comes from the Environmental Protection Fund. This completes an agreement the state signed with the Nature Conservancy to preserve 69-thousand acres in the Adirondacks, previously owned by the Finch Pryn Paper Company.

People in Hoosick Falls still haven't been reimbursed for water bills issued during PFOA contamination and the state says their pools are safe for swimming. Those are just a couple of the updates at a village board meeting tonight. People packed into a small room inside village hall to hear hours-worth of talk on this PFOA crisis, and also to hear the mayor defend himself after a Times Union article questioning whether or not he worked too closely with Saint Gobain. The temporary water system works in Hoosick Falls, but people are still wondering whether they should have known about PFOA sooner. The mayor addressed the Times Union article flagging possible conflicts of interest and citing dozens of obtained emails showing Borge and Saint Gobain worked closely together during this contamination issue. The mayor acknowledged Saint Gobain paying for Hoosick Falls to use a law firm and communications agency. Even though the law firm could be negotiating against Saint Gobain's interests, Residents still haven't received promised reimbursement checks for six months of water bills on water they couldn't drink. The state told us they hoped to send the up to 240-thousand dollars to the village two weeks ago. The village says it hasn't received the money yet. As for swimming pools containing PFOA, the DEC and Health Department say it's safe to swim, despite advice to keep showers short in PFOA water. All in all, the mayor says the village's reaction to this PFOA crisis has been swift.

**Cohoes Water Tests-** WNYT- May 11, 2016- 5:00 am

The city of Cohoes says results of tests it ran on their water have come back. The water department reports the tests were "precautionary," but they tell us tests for PFOA have concluded 'Cohoes drinking water' is 'safe to drink.'

Concerned residents in Bennington, Vermont are meeting tonight. They have questions and complaints since toxins have been found in their water. Last Friday, a group of Bennington residents filed a lawsuit against Saint Gobain. The company where the pollutants are believed to have come from. Tonight's meeting is at Bennington College beginning at 7.

DiNapoli applauded the city's new Mayor Patrick Madden for agreeing to take immediate steps to remedy the situation. Democrats on the city council say they were not allowed to provide any input on the corrective action plan. They are calling for an open, and transparent discussion at tonight's meeting.

As difficult as the uncertainty has been, there are no guarantees that closure will feel any better.

The man is now behind bars for mail fraud and conspiracy.

The demonstrators sat on the tracks, taking a little time to relax- while trying to make a bold statement about fossil fuel. Sitting on train tracks is normally dangerous and you could get arrested. The group says- for the cause it was worth the risk but in the spot, there was never any danger. The railroad blocked off that section of the tracks with a temporary chain link fence. Railroad police and other law enforcement were standing by to keep the peace. The protest kicked off at Lincoln Park earlier in the day with a rally. Drummers and musicians set the mood as the throng held signs and several speakers revved them up. Then, the group made their way to the port of Albany, marching down Morton Avenue- chanting and holding signs along the way. It's all part of the Break Free Movement worldwide- with activities aiming to keep fossil fuel in the ground. The protestors came from many parts of the country- they want to stop trains that carry Bakken crude oil and proposed pipelines. We spoke to energy giant Global Partners- they stood by their statement that said, "It's clear we take our jobs, and our responsibility to the community, to safety, and the environment, very seriously. Yesterday, the town ran out. We reached out to the town supervisor and he tells us he didn't order enough last week. He says there will be plenty available on Wednesday when they get their next delivery.

More PFOA in Petersburgh. New test results show nine more homes are over the so-called safe limit set by the EPA, and to make matters worse, they ran out of bottled water over the weekend. In an often out of control public comment period, people urged the town board to do more in forcing the state and Taconic to fix their PFOA problem. People asked for home bottled water deliveries paid for by Taconic, an independent review of negotiations between the state and Taconic, and generally- a faster fix. After the new results out today, 47 of 173 private well tests are over the 100 parts per trillion limit. Rensselaer County says over a dozen filtration systems have been installed so far. Seventy-two are over the 20 parts per trillion level, including Edward Perrotti-Sousis in his Potter Hill Road home. Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin was listening in. He recognizes the position into which the town board was thrust. McLaughlin says the state and Taconic are the ones who need to start moving faster.

A park in the hometown of Dan Skelos could get a new name. The village in Rockville Center has already taken down signs with the name of the former state senate majority leader on them. He's a Marine from that area, killed in Iraq.

The letter includes the number of deaths around the state by region and those numbers paint a startling picture. Heroin Opioid Task Force- WNYT- May 17, 2016- 5:00 pm

Tomorrow, state lawmakers will be taking up more bills to fight the growing heroin epidemic. The senate passed 22 bills today that some are calling "significant and impactful" drug legislation. What the senate task force came up with was a four-pronged approach to battle heroin and opioid addiction, a list that deals with prevention, treatment, recovery and law enforcement. Among the 48 recommendations was the passage of Laree's Law, which would allow authorities to charge drug dealers with homicide if the product they sell causes someone's death, which is what happened to Colonie teenager Laree Farrell Lincoln. The senate remains in session as we speak. This package of legislation is expected to sail through today. It will have to pass in the assembly as well. There are also some budgetary considerations like how much it will cost. To make the changes happen, senate republicans want to commit 166-million dollars. The assembly also needs to pass the reforms.

Police say they do not have a specific person of interest at this time that they're focusing on. Audrey May Herron was a 31-year-old mother of three children, a nurse who left work in August of 2002 and disappeared. Both she and her black Jeep vanished. Her family and police investigators have never given up. At this point, police say they have wrapped up their search at Cauterskill Road. Police have followed more than 1,000 leads in this case. In fact, some of the people who had this case, even those who are retired, were there because of their interest in the case. Police say anyone with information about Audrey May Herron should give them a call.

Poestenkill relies on the town of Mohawk for ambulance. Sand Lake and North Greenbush ambulance units rushed to the student's aid because Mohawk wasn't available. Wohlleber and fellow Board Member Harold Van Slyke have formed a committee to come up with a solution for Poestenkill- though it's an unpopular one because it involves a tax increase.

The changes are possible because of state funding and a grant totaling 600-thousand dollars.

A business in Saratoga Springs will start paying the health insurance premiums for all 150 of its workers. Fingerprint is a marketing agency on Broadway. The announcement that came as a surprise to employees will cost the company more than a million dollars a year. The general manager says Fingerprint is a "people first" business. Danette Kadlic has worked for Fingerprint for three and a half years. She gets the company offered health insurance for herself, her husband and their 7-year-old daughter, Chloe, who has a heart condition. Danette was a little nervous this week when she was called to an all-employees meeting. She wasn't alone in her trepidation. It turns out they had nothing at all to worry about. In fact, they had reason to celebrate. General Manager Bill McEllen called the meeting to tell them that Fingerprint would begin paying employee health insurance premiums. The company doesn't use offices or job titles in the workplace, and allows employees to bring their dogs to work. It'll cost 1.2 million to pay workers premiums and the change takes effect July 1<sup>st</sup>. They'll begin offering it to all 150 of its employees, including Danette Kadlic.

There has been a surge of violence in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. NewsChannel 13 spoke with several people in Pittsfield who blame gang rivalries on the surge in gun violence. That hasn't been confirmed, but what is clear is that residents and officials want it to stop, they just can't agree on how to make that happen. Despite the surge in violence, Pittsfield locals say it's unusual to have three shootings within 17 hours of each other. One man, who asked us not to reveal his identity, says he saw Thursday's shooting near Wahconah Street at Pecks Road. A single mom of three, says she fears for her children's safety. City officials, including Councilman John Krol say they know it's a problem. Krol says community policing could be a solution, especially in the west side and morning side neighborhoods. Some locals like Bob Nichol's believes it's a city-wide problem. He owns Harry's Supermarket- a century old family-run business just down the street from the scene of Thursday's shooting. Some residents say they would like to see police engage with the community more.

There was a beep and honk from drivers traveling down Central Avenue in Colonie, signaling their support for Verizon workers on the picket line. Families, that's what picketers say this is all about. They brought their children in front of the Verizon store to be a part of what they say has become a struggle for survival. The CWA union members are part of Local 1118 with about 600 Verizon workers from the Capital Region to the Canadian border. They're part of about 40-thousand employees on the East Coast who walked off the job in April. They had been working without a contract since August last year, when negotiations at the bargaining table didn't work out. They say the company wants to ship jobs overseas and they want workers to pay more for healthcare as profits are recorded in the billions. NewsChannel 13 contacted Verizon, and didn't hear back. Company officers have said in the past that all they want is an agreement that's fair to employees, good for customers and help the company compete.

Verizon employees on strike say the company doesn't need to cut their benefits. Hundreds of workers were on the picket line at the Verizon store in Colonie yesterday. They say they're being asked to pay more for healthcare, and the time away from work is hurting their families. The strike has been going since last month without a resolution. For its part, Verizon has said it wants an agreement that's fair to workers, but still lets the company compete. Verizon employees by the hundreds were demonstrating yesterday, saying the company is harming their families. The striking workers picketed in front of the Verizon store in Colonie. They had been working without a contract since last August, when negotiations didn't lead to an agreement. So last month, they went on strike. They workers claim they company wants to offshore jobs, and is asking them to pay more for their health care. NewsChannel 13 tried to get a response from Verizon, but they haven't given a response yet.

The superfund site has been the center of contamination concerns in Nassau for decades, but a new report that could have put resident's minds at ease, is doing just the opposite. EPA tests confirm low levels of PFOA and other contaminants at the Dewey Loeffel superfund site in Nassau. The agency says they don't pose a health risk. Nassau Supervisor David Fleming says the town isn't convinced.

The violence also has the attention of city leaders, who held a news conference with law enforcement today. The police chief said part of the long-term solution is getting two dozen more officers on the force. That way they can focus more on things like intelligence and community building. The two people arrested tonight are both charged with illegally having a gun. They also had other outstanding warrants. Police tell us there are local and national gangs in the city. There are also teenagers in those gangs.

Soon thousands of people will begin flocking to Lake George for the Memorial Day weekend. It's the unofficial start to tourist season and visitors will have some new options this year. Excelsior Conservation Corps is putting in a new walkway at the summit of Prospect Mountain, making the views accessible to everyone. Back down on Canada Street, all the talk is about the new hotel construction. Some of the excitement is coming from Salim Amersi's Surfside on the Lake. In business for 34 years, they're building a brand new 55,000 square-foot hotel building. Fifty new rooms and suites, and they're trying to get it done before the unofficial start to summer. The new Courtyard by Marriott was hoping to be opening soon, but they now expect to be open in late July. Amersi says there's more than enough business to go around.

Hiding in plain sight in Albany. Limited Liability Companies can donate tens of thousands of dollar to state candidates, and no one has to know where that money's coming from. With a corrupt politician on your side, it's a good way to get some pull or maybe a state contract. It's a big anonymous temptation the lawmakers have been missing, so far. One of those leaders, Governor Cuomo said yesterday he'll put forth different variations on a bill to cap contributions from LLC's at five-thousand dollars. There's another LLC loophole we told you about this winter. The state is spending millions of your tax dollars in lease agreements with LLC's but nobody can tell us who actually owns the buildings. Assemblyman John McDonald wrote a bill requiring names on LLC leases. Ithaca Assemblywoman Barabara Lifton saw our story too, and introduced her own comprehensive bill. Back to the governor's plan, familiar skeptics point out there are only nine legislative days left. Democrat McDonald says comprehensive ethics reform is coming by the end of the session. Blair Horner says it better come, for the sake of the voters.

Ride sharing companies could be one step closer to coming upstate. Companies like Uber and Lyft aren't allowed in the Capital Region now, but lawmakers are considering a bill that could open the door for that to happen. The bill is much less ambitious than similar proposals, but it does tackle the issue of insurance laws, which could be enough to make ride-sharing a reality in the upstate region. If you live north of New York City- ride sharing services could be coming to an app near you. Supporters of a bill aimed at making it easier for companies like Uber and Lyft to operate upstate are rallying at Troy's Takk House, including Uber Policy Advisor Josh Gold. Michael McLoughlin says ride sharing is the next wave of transportation, he doesn't want to be left behind. One of the hang-ups keeping ride-sharing services out of the region is current insurance laws. Lawmakers hope to pass a bill in the next several weeks that would change those laws. Assembly member John McDonald says the bill would also allow drivers to be covered through an extension on their personal insurance policies. Jay Holland of the New York State Restaurant Association says it's about economic development.

High levels of that toxic chemical, PFOA, are still being found in private water wells in Bennington. Four-hundred-thirty-two private wells in North Bennington and Bennington have now been tested, and 227 came back with unsafe levels of PFOA. More tests will be done next week. Bottled water is being provided for those with high levels of the chemical in their drinking water.

Crews will work around the clock, but the commissioner says Madison Street will be closed through Saturday. Crews are still hard at work, trying to fix a broken sewer line at Madison Avenue and New Scotland Avenue in Albany. They still aren't sure exactly what caused the sinkhole. They aren't sure how they're going to fix it, and they aren't sure when it's going to be done. Usually you'd have traffic on Madison Avenue, but right now you have a vacuum like truck still sucking rocks and bricks and dirt out of the hole. So they can get a clean look at the problem, and they're almost there. After 150 years, something went wrong 13 feet below Madison Avenue. There were a couple of the old chimney manhole structures that came out of the pipe. It may have been a failure of one of those that fell down into the sewer. Yes, manholes were made out of brick, and there might have been a shift. A lot of what's under the street is a mystery. Crews have dug through trolley tracks. Three layers of road, including cobblestone, and they've even found a pipe from Washington Park Lake they didn't know about. Albany Medical Center's a block away and says it has detours in place for ambulances. South Lake to Myrtle or Delaware to Morris. There have been no problems yet. No water or sewer service has been interrupted. What could be a problem in the coming days is rain. So, Commissioner Coffey will be keeping an eye on the sky as his crew fixes what's below the ground.

Until then, they're sending out letters, announcing Walmart is donating clean drinking water. It will be available on Saturday, June 4<sup>th</sup> at the Walmart in Cobleskill. Each family can get up to 20 gallons.

Washington County's sheriff has found a new way to keep inmates busy, and it's straight out of a Hollywood movie. Books were an important part of the plot in the Shawshank Redemption. Now, they're being offered to inmates at the Washington County Jail. They've always had a law library where inmates could read about the legal system, but now they can borrow books they're interested in. They pay five dollars for a library card. If they return the books in good condition, they can keep borrowing from a couple thousand or so titles. All the books were donated after the sheriff put out the word on social media.

The Massachusetts Council on Compulsive Gambling hopes this will prevent casual players from going down the path of gambling addiction.

Lawmakers return to the Capitol tomorrow, for the first of nine session-days left in the 2016 go-round. It started with questions of ethics reform, but lately it's been about wages, drugs and even Uber. As we're about to turn the calendar to June, lawmakers are due back tomorrow to hear from lobbyists and voters on key issues, so we took on our own poll too. Raising the minimum wage and allowing Uber to operate in the Capital Region are just some issues they'd like to see given sharper teeth in the closing days at the Capitol. It was a session that started with talk of major ethics reform and the conviction and sentencing of the two top leaders. Some Republicans say that has fallen off drastically. Assemblyman John McDonald spoke at Cohoes Senior Center about opioid reform. The pharmacist is backing a move to limit initial prescriptions of highly addictive pain killers to five days. Right now if the unfinished yet opened bottle sits around, it could wind up in the wrong hands.

Albany's mayor and police chief are back home from the White House. Albany Police Department was one of 15 law enforcement agencies in the country to be recognized by the federal government. The selection means the Department of Justice will study APD. Then it will issue guidelines to help improve community relations and trust, reduce crime, and improve officer wellness and well-being.

Hoosick Falls Blood Testing- WNYT- June 2, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 2, 2016- 10:00 pm

Blood test results will soon be on the way to people living in Hoosick Falls. The governor's office tells NewsChannel 13 they'll be in the mail tomorrow. People have been anxiously waiting to find out their level of exposure to the toxic chemical PFOA. The results were supposed to be released last week. People are frustrated and the problem isn't going away. The town of Hoosick supervisor tells us many still have contaminated water. The village has a filtration system and has cleared the water for drinking, but private wells outside the village were also contaminated and many wells haven't been tested at all.

School Blood Test Help- WNYT- June 3, 2016- 5:00 pm

The State Department of Health will be in Hoosick Falls tomorrow to answer questions or concerns residents may have about those blood test results. They'll have representatives at the Armory from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The school district says any student, parent or guardian who has questions will find support from its nurses and school physician. State Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin wants U.S. Attorney General Preet Bharara to investigate the Cuomo administration and the Department of Health. He says they botched the handling of the water crisis in Hoosick Falls. Meanwhile, PFOA blood test results are being mailed to people in the village. A state health official tells us the average person had 23.5 parts per trillion PFOA in their blood. That's more than 10 times the average American, but health officials tell NewsChannel 13 there's just not enough research to show exactly what that means. The state health officials also say local doctors have been briefed. They also told us we could only paraphrase what they said. While the camera was off, we asked those two secret officials their thoughts on hundreds of pages of documents we obtained from the EPA. Emails that showed the EPA seemingly frustrated with the health department's handling of the PFOA crisis. In November, Nidal Azzam from the EPA wrote "apparently DOG does not want to take the lead, although I have tried to push them into that path about three weeks ago." That same day, Region Two Director Judith Enck wrote, "Bottom line: the town of Hoosick Falls has known about this contamination in their water supply for over a year. We need the state health department to focus on the water supply issues fast." The state official admitted the health department has known about PFOA since 2014. The DOH will be in Hoosick Falls tomorrow to answer questions people have about their blood test results. The anonymous official says they were in the lead, he says anything less is a false characterization. They'll have representatives at the Armory from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Central Bridge Trihalomethane- WNYT- June 3, 2016- 5:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 3, 2016- 10:00 pm

Starting tomorrow, people living in Central Bridge will have access to clean drinking water. Their water has had elevated levels of trihalomethane, or THM. It happens when chlorine interacts with organic material like decaying plants. Walmart is now donating water to residents. It will be available tomorrow from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the store in Cobleskill.

Bennington PFOA- WNYT- June 3, 2016- 6:00 pm

Bennington, Vermont has been dealing with high levels of PFOA found in private water wells. Vermont Governor Peter Shumlin signed a bill giving the state more power to hold accountable companies that pollute the environment. The new law aims to protect residents against hazardous chemicals like PFOA. The chemical has contaminated more than 200 private wells in North Bennington and Bennington.

State DEC says Saint Gobain and Honeywell are responsible for the PFOA contamination in the Hoosick Falls area. As part of an agreement- the companies will investigate the contamination, pay for the village water system and reimburse the state for the costs. Great Barrington Crosswalk- WNYA- June 3, 2016- 10:00 pm

Crosswalks are now more visible in Great Barrington, Massachusetts. They've been painted bright red- less than one week after a driver hit four pedestrians trying to cross Main Street. The message "Stop, Look, Wave" is also painted on the crosswalks, to urge pedestrians to be more aware of oncoming traffic.

Stockbridge Flood Damage- WNYA- June 3, 2016- 10:00 pm

The repair bill following last weekend's flooding in Stockbridge is more than 100-thousand dollars. On Sunday, five inches of rain fell in a two-hour-period, flooding the downtown business center. The Berkshire Eagle reports a special town meeting will be held later this month to approve emergency spending for repairs.

The latest round of tests in Petersburgh show more wells contaminated with PFOA. The county says out of 17 additional samples taken, one was over the EPA guidance level of 70 parts per trillion. Ten were below 70, and six had non-detectable levels. However, dozens of private wells in the town have shown extremely elevated levels of the toxic chemical. The suspected source- Taconic Plastics, has been declared a superfund site.

People in Hoosick Falls are waiting to hear the results of blood testing, to find out the level of exposure they've had to the toxic chemical PFOA. State health officials were standing by today for any questions or concerns. Representatives from state health were ready to go Saturday morning, all set to answer questions from residents who might have gotten their

area. PFOA has been linked to many illnesses, including cancer.

Hoosick Falls Blood Test Results- WNYT- June 5, 2016- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 5, 2016- 10:00 pm

It was the blood test results for both Harold and Marion Stevens, reflecting the amount of exposure they've had to the toxic chemical PFOA, and right away, it caught their attention. The Stevens say the numbers seemed a bit high. Marion tested at 104 parts per billion. Her husband was higher at 159 parts per billion. To give you an idea, state officials say the average in Hoosick Falls is 23.5 parts per billion- that's still more than 10 times the sample from the average American. The Stevens lived in their home on Wilder Avenue for more than 35 years. They've been drinking the municipal water where the PFOA contamination was discovered. No one knows exactly how long the man-made chemical that's been linked to cancer and other illnesses, has been in the water supply. The Stevens are planning a visit with their physician to try to make sense of the numbers and how they could impact their health. Blood testing began back in February. The Stevens were part of the first groups to be tested and one of the first couples to receive their results.

Most people living in Hoosick Falls who had their blood tested for PFOA should have their results by now. Many are wondering what exactly the numbers mean. Unfortunately, the State Health Department isn't much help. PFOA has been linked to cancer, but the state says knowing how much is in your blood, can't tell you if you have, or will have, health problems. The EPA is the agency that started sounding the alarm about PFOA in the water, so we called them to see what high blood levels could mean. They referred us to the CDC, and they referred us back to state health. We were told a health department official would be available to talk with us tomorrow. We'll let you know if that happens. Gordon Metcalfe was one of the many opening a letter from the state health department, it said his blood contained 100 times more PFOA than the average American's. People are trying to wrap their heads around what their levels mean. The average Hoosick Falls resident came back with 24 part per billion PFOA in his blood, about 11 times higher than the average American. Older people tend to have more PFOA in their blood. State health says time decreased your PFOA level. Every three years, levels are split in half. That means Gordon is just waiting. Local physicians got a copy of their patient's blood test results too. State health advises people to talk to their doctor if they're worried.

Prison Break Report- WNYT- June 7, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

Those who operate prisons and jails in New York State all have a copy of a new investigation into last summer's prison break at Dannemora. The report by the state inspector general cites 'significant lapses in security and protocol...Allowing two convicted killers: David Sweat and Richard Matt to escape from Clinton Correctional Facility.' Three weeks later Matt was shot and killed, and then Sweat was shot and captured. The report details how the pair was given unusual access to certain areas of the prison by correction officers they were cozy with. They include a catwalk, which they later used to escape. Prison workers also gave them supplies like hacksaw blades. Sweat and Matt shared cells next to one another- allowing them to pass tools back and forth and look out for guards. Sweat tells investigators he was able to get his hands on tools left behind by construction workers, like a sledge hammer. A year since the escape, residents in Dannemora have been reflecting on the fear that swept their community when the pair finally made it out. Other failures include poorly conducted or missed night checks, cell searches and employee screenings. Correction officials are also condemned for failing to detect the inappropriate relationship between David Sweat and Joyce Mitchell. Mitchell- a former prison seamstress- is currently serving jail time for helping the inmates escape.

PFOA Hoosick Falls- WNYT- June 7, 2016- 12:00 pm

Representatives with the Department of Health will be at the Armory in Hoosick Falls this afternoon. They will answer questions or concerns residents may have about the recent blood tests. Most people living in the village who had their blood tested for PFOA should have their results, but many people are wondering what exactly those numbers mean. The health department hasn't been too helpful. It says knowing how much in your blood, cannot tell you if you have, or will have, health problems. Today's scheduled meeting is from 2-8 p.m. We will speak with them and have more in our evening newscasts.

Psychiatrist Anthony Ferraioli talked about how to tend to relationships like a flower garden.

PFOA Health Department- WNYT- June 7, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm

It was the first chance for many in Hoosick Falls to talk and try and figure out what their PFOA blood results mean. Their blood levels were sent out in the mail last week, and today state health staff was at the Armory to interpret that information. Maryann Jacobs hugged her friend after her meeting with the state health department. She was hoping to understand what her 148 parts per billion PFOA level meant to her health, but she says she didn't get any answers. Maryann's PFOA blood level is about 70 times higher than the average American's. Studies have linked PFOA exposure to cancer, but state health maintains that having even a relatively high amount of PFOA in your blood, can't tell you if you have or will have health problems. Dr. Nathan Graber says the science just isn't there yet. Graber recommends seeing your doctor if you're concerned about your PFOA levels, but doesn't say treatment will be any different. Kathy Lingener was passing around a petition outside the Armory. She hasn't forgotten about agreed upon hearings to investigate the handling of the PFOA crisis. So far she has nearly 400 signatures. As for lowering the amount of cancer linked chemical in your blood, the only remedy is time. PFOA levels split in half every three years. The armory is open for a couple more hours tonight. They've been here since 2 p.m., but because state health and the scientific community knows so little about the effects of PFOA, some people are coming out of here frustrated.

An arts program in Troy is helping people express themselves, and create works that they show off and sell. It's at Brunswick Center Services, and it's so popular, people line up to get into class. This is the 10<sup>th</sup> year for the program through the ARC of Rensselaer County. Today, NewsChannel 13 got the chance to sit in the studio and hear from the instructor and some of the artists. Rebecca was born without sight. Teacher Patricia Carley wanted a way to make colors come alive for her, and came up with the idea of adding scents to the paint like lilac, peppermint, orange and lavender. Rebecca also sometimes feels the colors. It took Shadoo a while to get involved, but now he is prolific and loves to create. With great excitement and pride they show their work. One exhibit is at RPI and they get a thrill when they sell their art. The ARC of Rensselaer County is hosting an event of art and auction on June 13<sup>th</sup> at the Old Daley on Crooked Lake in Averill Park. There's a show in August at the Arts Center in Sand Lake.

Saratoga Sidewalks- WNYT- June 7, 2016- 5:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 7, 2016- 10:00 pm

Saratoga Springs is trying to get rid of what some consider aggressive panhandling. That's why the city council passed a measure tonight, making it a violation to sit on the sidewalk. Not everyone is in favor of it- including the mayor. This has been a debate of public safety versus homelessness and the rights of people to hang out. It went deep into the night and passed, but not unanimously. Just minutes ago the city council passed the measure four to one. The crackdown comes as the city is trying to tackle what some view as an increase in aggressive panhandling. The city says panhandlers are sitting on sidewalks and going after people frequenting streets like Broadway, Caroline and others. Fines could be anywhere between 50 and 100 dollars.

How safe is it for your child to drink from the water fountain at his or her school? At the 20 buildings that are part of the Schenectady School District, they've already checked the water. Larry Spring says the preliminary testing has showed very low levels, but low levels of lead doesn't exactly merit an A-plus comfort level with parents. In Amsterdam, after finding elevated levels of lead in 3 out of 4 elementary schools, faucets were turned off, and bottled water was brought in. The problem is, many districts can't afford to test their water. Which is why state lawmakers are in a hurry to pass legislation requiring schools to test for lead contamination, to provide money for the testing, and for remediation as well, if necessary, and also inform parents and teachers of the test results. Time is running out, there are only six legislative session days left.

Saratoga Sidewalks- WNYT June 8, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

There are places to sit and places not to sit in Saratoga Springs. The sidewalk may have spots for playing guitar or chalk art but not sleeping or hanging out and blocking pedestrians. So say city leaders. Those opposed said it was about the homeless and panhandlers, which the city denied. Early in the meeting, there were hints of how the vote might go-there was an exchange between Mayor Yepsen and the Commissioner of Public Safety, Chris Mathiesen.

Medical Marijuana- WNYT- June 8, 2016- 12:00 pm- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 8, 2016- 10:00 pm

There will be just four days left in the legislative session when state lawmakers show up for work tomorrow. One of the items on the agenda is medical marijuana reform. It was legalized in New York less than two years ago, but some advocates say it's not working, and they want to make some changes. Only one percent of New York doctors have signed up, and many believe there aren't enough places to get it. Advocates want to allow nurse practitioners and physician's assistants to prescribe medical marijuana.

It seems as if every day we are finding another story about the PFOA contamination, whether at a farm or with a family. To go along with that, those affected are trying to find ways to help their neighbor, and end this ongoing crisis. We've learned that a class-action lawsuit could be filed before the end of the week. There were two meetings in Hoosick Falls tonight and at one a group introduced a natural solution. A glass jug of crystal clear, artesian water from Indian Springs may just hold the key to the ongoing water woes in Hoosick Falls. It is backed by three women who call themselves the Water Warriors. The water is sourced from six springs and is offered as an alternative. Hoosick Falls has filtration systems in place and the water there has been deemed safe to drink, but some remain skeptical. In the wake of the PFOA crisis, it has taken on new concern from the faces that attend the quarterly sessions. The Water Warriors are hoping they can get bureaucrats to fast-track their water source and find the funding to boot.

**PFOA Meeting Tomorrow- WNYT- June 9, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm- WNYA- June 9, 2016- 10:00 pm**

Weitz and Luxenberg is expanding its class action lawsuit filed on behalf of people living in Hoosick Falls. The firm says some of its clients got blood test results showing levels of PFOA far exceeding the national average. It now plans to seek medical monitoring for those residents as part of the suit against Saint Gobain and Honeywell International. They are the suspected sources of the toxic chemical linked to cancer. The firm is holding an emergency community meeting tomorrow. It's from 2-7 p.m. at the North Hoosick Falls Fire House.

**Opt Out Schools- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am**

A new report says nearly 100 New York schools missed out on the chance for tens of thousands of dollars in grants because too many students opted out of state tests. This contradicts a long-held belief by opt out advocates that there would be no punishment for schools where high numbers of students opted out. Ninety-nine schools in New York State missed out on being named "Reward Schools"- specifically because those schools had too many kids opt out of the state's math and English assessment tests in 2015. To be named a reward school, a school's students must perform well or show improvement on the assessment tests- and post a 95 percent participation rate- or higher. Being named a Reward School is mostly about prestige, but if schools are on the list for two years they are able to apply for grants up to 75-thousand dollars. Two-hundred-twenty schools in New York State are designated as Reward Schools.

**Bennington Heroin Opioid- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am**

The heroin and opioid epidemic will get attention tomorrow in Bennington, Vermont. A free day-long summit is planned on how to tackle the growing abuse of deadly drugs. The Alliance for Community Transformations and others are organizing it at the Masonic Lodge at 504 Main Street downtown. It goes from 7:50 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. They would like you to register for the event.

**PFOA Meeting- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am**

There's an emergency meeting today in Hoosick Falls on the ongoing PFOA crisis there. The law firm Weitz and Luxenberg from New York City is holding this meeting now that blood test results have started to come in. The firm says the results show some residents in Hoosick Falls have high levels of the toxic chemical in their blood. They say one person has 130 times the national average in her bloodstream. PFOA has been linked to cancer. Weitz and Luxenberg says it is now seeking medical treatment for those residents as part of a lawsuit against Saint Gobain and Honeywell. Those companies are being blamed for causing the PFOA contamination. The emergency meeting today is from 2-7 p.m. at the North Hoosick Falls Fire House. It is open to the public.

**PFOA Friday- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 12:00 pm**

Lawyers are trying to figure out how to consolidate four separate cases into one. It seems the attorneys could not come to an agreement on their own as to which firm gets the lead on this massive class action lawsuit. So they came to federal court this morning to present their argument and let the judge decide. The judge gave them two weeks to figure it out on their own and then he'll make a decision. More than 3000 people were potentially exposed to the toxic chemical PFOA in Hoosick Falls. PFOA has been linked to cancer and other illnesses. Weitz and Luxenberg out of New York City is the law firm with the most plaintiffs, but four other firms also have clients. They're suing Saint Gobain and Honeywell- the companies deemed responsible for the PFOA contamination. Lawyers for Saint Gobain and Honeywell were also in court this morning to observe. The five firms are trying to consolidate four lawsuits into one. Part of the problem is who will take the lead and how do they divide everything that needs to get done. Some Hoosick Falls residents who were in court this morning say they don't really care about who does what. They just want the problem fixed and those responsible to pay.

Kate Corey from the Martin Harding and Mazzotti Capital Region Pet Show joins us to discuss skin infections in pets.

**Hoosick Falls PFOA Lawsuits- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 5:00 pm**

The North Hoosick Fire House in Hoosick Falls, packed with residents early this afternoon- many of them armed with paperwork from the State Health Department- searching for answers about their blood test. Attorneys from Weitz and Luxenberg, one of the law firms that represents hundreds of residents in a lawsuit, hosted the informational meeting to answer some questions and provide legal guidance. It's also about their health- blood tests for PFOA in Hoosick Falls came back more than 10 times higher than the national average. According to the law firm, one test came back at more than 800 parts per billion (PPB). The average American has 2 PPB. Attorney Robin Greenwald says the chemical has a half-life and it'll dissipate with time given that the person is no longer exposed to PFOA. A Weitz and Luxenberg attorney says that's a tough pill to swallow because if a person has high levels, it could be 20, 30 years before it's out of your body.

**PFOA Project- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 5:00 pm- 11:00 pm- June 11, 2016- 8:00 am**

Some people in Hoosick Falls have launched a Twitter campaign that they hope will get the attention of lawmakers. It's called "The PFOA Project NY." It puts faces to blood test result numbers, including those of young children and their families. The group is pushing for legislative hearings on the crisis and for support from local, state and federal leaders.

**PFOA Emergency Meeting- WNYT- June 10, 2016- 6:00 pm- June 11, 2016- 8:00 am**

They came in search for answers and came away with more questions. The lawsuit is underway. Attorneys from Weitz and Luxenberg and four other law firms were in federal court this morning to figure out a way to consolidate four separate cases into one. Attorneys from the firm then provided legal guidance to residents at the North Hoosick Fire House- telling them about property damage, personal injury, health monitoring- all options to consider. People were mostly concerned about how the levels of PFOA in their blood will affect their health. Blood tests for PFOA in Hoosick Falls came back more than 10 times higher than the national average. The average American has 2 parts per billion (PPB), one test came back at more than 800 PPB PFOA.

**Saratoga Sit-In Protest- WNYT- June 11, 2016- 7:00 pm- 11:00 pm- June 12, 2016- 7:00 am- 8:00 am- WNYA- June 11, 2016- 10:00 pm**

Tonight protestors in Saratoga Springs are sitting down in solidarity with those they say are being unfairly targeted. It has to do with a controversial new ordinance banning people from sitting or lying down on the sidewalks. Protestors say they're standing up for people they say are being singled out just for taking a seat. They say the law targets the less fortunate and ignores larger issues. You could say these demonstrators are breaking the law. Protestors like organizer, Brian Michael say the controversial ordinance making it a crime to sit or lay on city sidewalks is too broad and unfairly targets homeless people and panhandlers. The city council passed the law earlier in the week with a four-to-one vote. Though- not without opposition, including from Saratoga Springs Mayor Joanne Yepsen. She was the only one to vote no. Public Safety Commissioner Chris Mathiesen tells local media outlets the law isn't meant to target the homeless but stop people from blocking foot traffic. Dawn Hudson says she's familiar with the problem because she once worked in the city's homeless shelter and while they agree homelessness is a problem, demonstrators say this isn't the way to solve it.

**Muslim Community Reacts- WNYT- June 12, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am- 12:00 pm- 11:00 pm**

Members of the Albany Common Council and other city leaders joined with the local Muslim community tonight to show their solidarity with the victims in the Orlando attack. Shamshad Ahmed, the president of the Masjid As-Salam Mosque says he didn't hear about the shooting until this afternoon, when Councilman Judd Krasher called him. Without knowing exactly what was going on in the gunman's mind, it's hard to fathom what would cause him to do this, but it certainly puts many on edge. That's one reason to hold a news conference like this one, to show people that the Muslim community is not the same as those who are radicalized.

That's the prescription Dr. Sam Bastien, CEO at Four Winds Psychiatric Hospital in Saratoga says is key to helping those in the LGBTQ community in the aftermath of the Orlando murders. He says it opens doors for all of us to better understand fears, concerns and how to provide support. It can also enrich our community. People may need to seek out a mental health professional to help reclaim a sense of control says Psychologist Dr. Rudy Nydegger. As he points out, being targeted can trigger an overwhelming sense of fear or powerlessness. It's important to find common ground with each other, say the psychologists. They explain, it can help us all cope with this unthinkable violence.

There are just three days left in the legislative session, and pressure is mounting on lawmakers to pass their bills. Today, democrats and republicans came together, pushing for a bill to help Hoosick Falls residents with PFOA concerns. Assemblyman John McDonald and Senator Kathy Marchione want residents to get their past medical bills paid for by the state. They say the current statute of limitations shouldn't apply when the illnesses can be linked to what is now a superfund site.

**Terror: Safe Act-** WNYT- June 13, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm -11:00 pm

The Orlando shooting is the 47<sup>th</sup> mass shooting in America since 1984 and the 16<sup>th</sup> in just the past four years. One of the weapons most frequently used in these mass killings is the AR-15 semi-automatic rifle. A similar rifle was used in Orlando, as well as Sandy Hook and Aurora, Colorado. Could the shooter have bought that weapon if he lived in New York? Governor Andrew Cuomo told reporters in New York City that he's glad New York has a law like the SAFE Act. President Barack Obama is calling for nationwide gun legislation. So we went to a gun shop here, to see if the SAFE Act would have stopped the shooter from legally buying those guns. Orlando shooter Omar Mateen bought the AR type rifle and 9 mm semiautomatic pistol in Florida within the last week, but what if he walked into a New York gun shop like Target Sports in Glenville? Could he walk out with that same rifle? Owner and outspoken critic of the SAFE Act, Steve Borst showed us the classic AR-15. The SAFE Act prohibits non-law enforcement citizens from buying the exact weapon, but gun manufacturers are creating guns to comply with the law. A rifle that's been altered to comply lacks the illegal pistol grip and other illegal aesthetic features, but like the AR-15, it's semi-automatic with a detachable clip. Magazines are limited to ten rounds by the SAFE Act, but Borst says you can quickly reload. Borst says even this semi-automatic rifle can fire off rounds at a similar rate.

**NYS Breast Cancer-** WNYA- June 13, 2016- 10:00 pm

New York is set to expand access to breast cancer screenings. Under proposed legislation, the state will order 210 hospitals to expand hours when mammograms are offered. It will also require insurance companies to eliminate deductibles and co-pays for the screening and some other diagnostic tests. Governor Cuomo says the idea is to allow more women to get screened, because early detection saves lives. Lawmakers are expected to okay the plan this week.

**Albany Vigils-** WNYT- June 13, 2016- 11:00pm- WNYA- June 13, 2016- 10:00 pm

Tonight, people gathered locally in two cities in the Capital Region- Albany and Schenectady- to honor those killed in Orlando and spread a message of peace. The rainbow flag and symbol and people in all shapes and sizes came together for a common cause. Among those gathering in West Capitol Park to show solidarity for the massacre in Orlando, a man who grew up in Florida, came out in Florida and now calls Albany home. Organized by the Pride Center, hundreds turned out to both grieve and heal. At about the same time, over in Schenectady, a prayer vigil inside City Hall offering comfort. Outside on the steps, a symbol literally laced in solidarity, Kyrie Kosloski's Converse Pride Sneakers.

**North Pownal PFOA-** WNYT- June 14, 2016- 5:00 pm

High levels of PFOA have now been found in the village of North Pownal, Vermont. State DEC says PFOA monitoring near the former Pownal Tannery found levels of the toxic chemical above 200 parts per trillion. The safe drinking water advisory level in Vermont is 20 parts per trillion. DEC says the concentration seems like an anomaly, but homes in that area will be checked.

**Hoosick Falls PFOA-** WNYT- June 15, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

Parents and children from Hoosick Falls will bring their blood test results showing their PFOA levels to the State Capitol today. The legislative session is about to end tomorrow, but that isn't stopping families who had been drinking contaminated water from calling on legislators to hold hearings into the state's response to the crisis. Documents show that the state health department had known about the PFOA contamination in Hoosick Falls since August of 2014. It took more than a year- until December 2015- for residents to be told to stop drinking the water. PFOA is a chemical that has been linked to cancer and other illnesses. Recently, tests came back showing how much PFOA residents of Hoosick Falls have in their blood. The average American has 2 parts per billion of PFOA in their blood, the average Hoosick Falls resident has 11 times that number. According to Weitz and Luxenberg- which is handling lawsuits for hundreds of residents- one person came back at more than 400 times the national average. For months some lawmakers have been calling for hearings to look into how the state responded to the crisis. One of the most vocal proponents, Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin, will be at the rally with residents today.

**EPA Munitions-** WNYT- June 15, 2016- 5:00 pm

Construction near a Global Foundries parking lot has been suspended while the EPA investigates the discovery of dozens of potentially explosive cylinders. Thirty-four metal cylinders were found buried near the Malta Test Station property. The area was part of the now shuttered Malta Rocket Fuel area. That's where the U.S. government used to develop and test rockets and weapons. The nearest homes are about a mile away. The EPA does not believe the cylinders pose an imminent threat as long as they're not disturbed. They're now working to place them in a specialized containment locker. That should be in place either this weekend or next week.

**PFOA Hearing Presser-** WNYT- June 15, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm WNYA- June 15, 2016- 10:00 pm

After over an hour in a meeting with Governor Cuomo's top aide, Hoosick Falls residents marched out a little happier with their PFOA crisis, than when they went in. Residents were speaking with the state's Director of Operations Jim Malatras. We interviewed him afterwards. He says the governor is not going to push lawmakers to hold hearings on what happened in Hoosick Falls. Before the impromptu meeting, Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin set up shop outside of the senate. The state knew about high levels of PFOA in the water for more than a year before they told residents. McLaughlin thinks there's a cover up. The assembly backed out of a promise to hold hearings. The senate and assembly majority have the power to hold the fact finding talks. Neither have yet. Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie had nothing to say. So how did McLaughlin react to the meeting? He says his perspective on the governor's handling of the issue hasn't changed.

**NYRA Privatization-** WNYT- June 15, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm WNYA- June 15, 2016- 10:00 pm

One of the bills passed today in both the senate and the assembly calls for the New York Racing Association to return to private control and out of the hands of the government. This happened as more than 100 people were rallying in Saratoga Springs for that same cause. The state took control of NYRA four years ago. The plan was to run it for three years, then return the organization to private, not-for-profit. The people at today's rally say the governor is breaking his promise and wants to keep control. There's no word on if Governor Cuomo will veto the legislation passed today. His office did release a statement saying he and the legislature saved NYRA from yet another bankruptcy in 2012 and put in a management team that's been successful. They say they want to continue that progress.

**VT Lawmaker Sex Assault-** June 15, 2015- 6:00 pm

The woman who accused a Vermont State senator of sexual assault testified at his trial today. The 21-year-old woman worked for Norman McAllister on his farm in Franklin and as a legislative assistant. She described being forced to have oral sex in a barn and intercourse at his home. McAllister's attorney challenged the woman's credibility during cross-examination this afternoon. Last month, McAllister announced his is seeking re-election.

**Walmart Supercenter-** WNYA- June 15, 2016- 10:00 pm

A developer wants to build a 190-thousand square foot building that would house a Walmart Supercenter at William Stanley Business Park in Pittsfield. The developer tells the Berkshire Eagle is would bring more than 350 construction jobs to the city. If built, Walmart would move its Pittsfield operation from the Berkshire Crossing Shopping Mall. All employees would be transferred and more would be hired.

malls, movie theaters and stadiums. Lawmakers have the same conversation in the wake of a mass shooting in the United States- one side calls for tougher gun laws while the other side says guns aren't the problem. Could this debate be any different? Senator Chuck Schumer praised his colleagues in the senate for taking the floor for nearly 15 hours in a filibuster that he says shined a spotlight on all senators and their stance on gun control- just days after the worst mass shooting in recent American history taking place at a nightclub in Orlando. Dozens of senators, led by Connecticut Senator Chris Murphy, who represented Newtown, Connecticut as a congressman, remained on the senate floor overnight, pointing the finger at republicans for their failure to take action on gun control. Schumer says republicans are demanding any gun sale be allowed if the government cannot prove in three days that the buyer may be a terror threat. Schumer is also focusing on upstate New York- trying to protect soft targets like movie theaters and malls.

A long legislative career is ending today at the Capitol, and a rarity these days in that building, it was on his own terms. After 40 years, State Senator Hugh Farley from Niskayuna is retiring. Senator Farley says he is both relieved and sad, but was happy to look back on a long career. It's probably not accurate to say this is Senator Farley's last day in the senate, since session is expected to extend into the early morning hours. These are, certainly the 83-year-olds last hours in the chamber. After 40 and 20 elections, Hugh Farley is ending his public career. He's the second longest serving legislator in the State of New York. The Schenectady native is retiring to spend more time with his family, especially his ailing wife. The senator is known for the support he's given, during the years, to libraries. He's also credited with bringing hospice care, to New York State. Much has changed since Farley first walked into the Capitol. Recent departures of legislators, from both parties and due to scandal, should not ever, Farley believes, overshadow the good work that gets done here.

**Capitol Deadline- WNYT- June 16, 2016- 11:00 pm**

If it weren't for "the last minute," nothing would get done. That's a quote from a bestselling author but it could also be the motto at the State Capitol. Today was supposed to be the last day of session, but now lawmakers might have to come back tomorrow. Things usually come down to the 11<sup>th</sup> hour at the State Capitol. It's gotten to the point where lawmakers may have to put some overtime on the floor to tackle all of the items on their agenda, and even then some key measures may be put on hold. Legislators are making headway on a number of issues. On the list of wins for the Assembly: a pipeline bill giving local municipalities more decision making power. Earlier assembly members passed a measure sealing past convictions for marijuana possession, as well as a bill requiring the state to cover the cost of legal services for low income defendants. Over in the Senate, lawmakers passed a package of bills to fight heroin and opioid abuse. Lawmakers in the assembly say they expect to do the same. State senators also added a series of bills requiring lead testing in public schools to their scoreboard for the day. Lawmakers also passed a series of smaller bills throughout the day, but as they head down the homestretch there are several significant items that remain up in the air. Pension forfeiture is the only ethics reform measure that lawmakers can agree on, and a hotly debated ride-sharing bill remains on life support.

The state legislative session was supposed to end last night, but now we hear lawmakers may return next week, because of unfinished business. After six months of session at the Capitol, lawmakers are still there after the scheduled session officially ended yesterday. They're stuck on some very important issues, but they also managed to get a few of them through. It was a late night for lawmakers, and they were back bright and early this morning. It seems there was no real desire to get things done quickly, even though session officially ended yesterday. They did get serious about a few items- one of them is legalization of online fantasy sports. Yesterday, they were able to come to an agreement on legislation that effects Hoosick Falls and Petersburg residents. Those affected by the PFOA contamination were not able to file a personal injury lawsuit because of the statute of limitation. The new measure will allow them to do so now. They also approved a package of bills to combat the heroin epidemic, focusing on awareness, education and treatment. There's a long way to go to actually finish the people's work. Negotiations on some controversial items, including ethics reform, remains.

**Albany Gun Buyback- WNYT- June 18, 2016- 6:00 pm- 11:00pm- June 19, 2016- 7:00 am- 8:00 am- WNYA- June 18, 2016- 10:00 pm**

While Washington continues to debate the controversial issue of gun control in the wake of the Orlando attack, a local pastor is doing what he can to get guns off the streets. He held a gun buyback program today, giving out gift certificates in exchange for weapons. Five guns in a matter of two hours- off the streets and out of the hands of would be criminals who could end up using them in a crime. Pastor Charlie Muller was collecting the guns at his church- Victory Christian Church- on Quail Street in Albany. It's part of the Enough Anti-Gun Violence Program. He's been doing it for nearly a decade, but after seeing the mass shooting last Sunday in Orlando where a gunman murdered 49 people and injured dozens more, he decided it was time to do it again. The massacre in Orlando was carried out with an AR-15 assault rifle and a Glock 17. Both were legally acquired. Muller says he's trying to get people to turn in their assault rifles like the AAR-15 and illegal handguns in exchange for a gift card to Crossgates Mall. Those who actually showed up, didn't want to be on camera. Muller says one of them made sure the program was legitimate. Muller taking illegal guns and dangerous weapons off the streets is only part of the plan to prevent gun violence and more bloodshed.

**Long Night at the Capitol- WNYT- June 18, 2016- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm**

After what was beginning to look like the legislative session that wouldn't end, a deal on ethics reform in the form of pension forfeiture- reached just after three in the morning. There's little fanfare surrounding this legislative session. Voters like Shawn Youkin and good government groups hoping for a larger deal on ethics reform say pension forfeiture isn't enough. Even some lawmakers say more could have been done on ethics reform. Days before the final countdown legislators passed other several key bills including measures to fight opioid abuse and required lead testing in public schools. They failed to pass a bill that would help bring ride-sharing servers like Uber upstate- another disappointment.

Berkshire Medical Center is among seven medical organizations across Massachusetts participating in the "Berkshire Connected Communities Project." The Pittsfield Hospital is getting more than 430 thousand dollars to help establish their part of the communication system. She says it's too harsh and wonders if it contradicts a law passed last year, allowing street musicians to play on sidewalks. The penalties can reach up to 500 dollars and jail time for repeat offenders. In each case, the judge would have the option of ordering community service. Again, that's if police decide to enforce it.

Governor Andrew Cuomo signed one of the bigger pieces of legislation to come out of the end of session this morning. A package of bills to combat heroin and opioid addiction. At an event in Buffalo- Governor Cuomo signed bills to combat the rising heroin epidemic into law. Cuomo says other states have already reached out to New York to try and replicate the bill in their states. The bills let pharmacists prescribe an initial seven-day supply of opioids- often seem as gateway drugs to heroin- instead of 30 days. Comptroller Tom DiNapoli released a report saying that opioid deaths in New York are rising faster than the national average- and the State Department of Health says deaths related to opioid use went up 47 percent from 2010 to 2014.

The study covers the period between 2007 and 2015. There are over 88-thousand homeless in New York state. There are over 75-thousand in New York City alone. Albany County has the largest cluster of homeless in the Capital Region, estimated at over one thousand people.

Before that, he worked part time for Hoosick-Falls Police and was unable to get health benefits as he battled Stage 4 Hodgkins Lymphoma. Fundraisers helped him cover medical costs. In December, he found out he was in remission.

**PFOA Hearing-** WNYT- June 27, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm  
The State Department of Environmental Conservation held a hearing today on officially classifying PFOA and PFOS as hazardous substances. This isn't the PFOA hearing everyone has been talking about. This one wasn't held by lawmakers, but by the DEC on a rule change. Hoosick falls residents voiced their concerns to the state anyway. The hearing was part of the process for the DEC to add PFOA to the list of hazardous substances, but environmental advocates and a handful of Hoosick Falls residents say too little, too late. Just three people showed up to go on the record at the hearing, which is part of the formal procedure to put PFOA on a permanent list of hazardous substances. Back in April, the DEC made an emergency rule declaring PFOA and PFOS hazardous. That allowed the state to create a superfund site and go after alleged polluters Saint Gobain and Honeywell. The group at the hearing wants to make sure this doesn't happen to other communities. They're calling for more testing statewide, and still for those legislative hearings, because of what they've gone through. The DEC says this is a very important step going forward in the superfund process. One of the next steps is to accurately map the contamination. Their ultimate goal is to get the contaminators to pay for remediation.

**Regional Rural Healthcare-** WNYT- June 27, 2016- 5:00 pm- 6:00 pm- 11:00 pm  
On any given weekend in summer, in the town of Copake, the population at Camp Wubeeka, including the campsites, the recreation sites, and sandy beach, can swell upwards of 15-hundred residents. According to Rick Puricelli, who runs the campground, on occasion, accidents happen. The problem is that medical centers aren't close, but that's about to change with the opening of Rapid Care Medical Center. The facility is much closer and celebrated its opening Monday morning with a ribbon cutting. Jay Cahalan is president and CEO of Columbia Memorial Health which came up with half of the 700-thousand dollars to complete the project that includes examination rooms, x-ray facilities, and medical staff for seven days a week. Calling the need for rural health care her number one priority, Senator Kathy Marchione delivered 350-thousand dollars from the state. Cahalan says he expects to see as many as 14,000 patients a year. Rick Puricelli says he expects many healthy, and happy campers.

People living in Hoosick Falls are keeping pressure on the state to hold hearings on PFOA. They also want stricter regulations on the toxic chemical that poisoned their water supply. They were back in Albany, telling that to the DEC today. In April, the agency made an emergency ruling to declare PFOA hazardous. That allowed the state to create a superfund site and go after suspected polluters, Saint Gobain and Honeywell. Now DEC is working to get PFOA on a permanent list of hazardous chemicals. People in Hoosick Falls say that's good-but not enough.

According to the Berkshire Eagle, developers also want to feature medical offices, retail space, and light manufacturing. While many people favor the plan, others worry about the impact it would have on locally owned businesses.

MA Slots Parlor Referendum- WNYT- June 28, 2016- 6:00 pm

Voters in Massachusetts will decide a ballot question in November on whether to allow a second slots parlor in the state. The highest court in Massachusetts has ruled that the question met the requirements to be placed on the ballot. A law that passed in 2011 authorized the licensing of three casinos and a single slots parlor. The new ballot question says the second slots parlor must be located near Suffolk Downs in Boston.

Residents of Bennington and North Bennington, Vermont are encouraged to attend a meeting tomorrow night to talk about clean water. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 5:30 at the Center for the Advancement of Public Action at Bennington College. State officials will give updates on results of blood tests for PFOA and recent water samples. Engineers will also discuss the possibility of providing municipal water for people whose private wells have been contaminated with the potentially cancer causing chemical. So far, more than 200 wells in North Bennington and Bennington have been found with levels of PFOA above 20 parts per trillion.

People in Bennington, Vermont will have a chance to speak directly with the state's DEC commissioner tonight at a public meeting concerning PFOA. The PFOA contamination was discovered in wells in Bennington and North Bennington earlier this year. According to the Vermont Dec- 227 wells in Bennington and North Bennington have tested positive for levels of the potentially cancer causing chemical above 20 parts per trillion. That's the maximum allowable level in Vermont.

A public meeting is just getting underway in Bennington, where Vermont's DEC commissioner is answering questions about PFOA in their water. According to the Vermont DEC 227 wells in Bennington and North Bennington have tested positive for PFOA, at levels above the state's maximum allowable amount. The state has been looking into extending municipal water lines to people with contaminated wells. Those people have been told to use bottled water for the time being. Tonight's forum is taking place at Bennington College.

State Police are asking for anyone with information, to come forward. For 25 years, Mitt's family and police have not given up on this mystery.

McCluskey is the first inmate as part of the brand new program. The program lets low level offenders work outside the facility eight hours a day- earn a wage- and have a job waiting for them when they get out. McCluskey served in the Army- gets out in September- and will have a job at Callanan Industries waiting for him.

She says she's been ignored since then after sending a letter to a contact person with a number of questions.

Albany's LGBTQ community and supporters gather there nearly three weeks after the Orlando shooting at a gay night club and two weeks after an interfaith vigil in Albany to honor the shooting victims. Still- Albany community members say this one act of hate doesn't represent their city. The flag burning has also highlighted the issue of safety in the LGBTQ community. Some LGBTQ attendees say their fears have definitely been heightened since the Orlando shooting massacre. But, tonight is a celebration. On the last day of Pride Month, when the LGBTQ community celebrates gay pride and rights- people are focusing on the hope this new flag symbolizes.

Increasing numbers of families across the country and right here in the Capital Region are converting from a traditional health care plan, to a biblical non-insurance approach to make sure their medical and spiritual needs are met. One faith based health care sharing company, Samaritan Health, has 60-thousand participants in all 50 states covering 17-million dollars in medical bills every month. Instead of paying your insurance bill monthly, users send a 405-dollar check, less for couples or individuals, directly to other members who have submitted a health care need and the money is used to pay medical providers, essentially, out of pocket. Members claim is costs significantly less than a traditional health insurance plan, but it does come with additional work. It also requires users to have faith in god and their community. Allison and Paul Caprera were members of Samaritan Ministries for two years before they ever made a single claim. That "claim" is now a toddler. And little Georgie's birth was paid for, almost entirely, by strangers. The Capreras like that they're able to choose whichever physician they want, not who their plan dictates. And, paying in cash often gets them a discount, sometimes as high as 40%. Plus, they say they've been fully reimbursed for everything - Georgie's birth, an emergency abdominal procedure, a urological treatment and even oral surgery. The Capreras admit, health care sharing takes a lot of coordination and organization. There are explanations to providers, submitting needs to Samaritan and its members and dealing with medical billing themselves when, typically an insurance company would do it. But any inconvenience is surpassed, for the Capreras, by the personal notes and promise of prayers they receive with each payment. Users of health care sharing aren't seeking a corporate experience. It's a religious experience they are after. Users are compliant with Federal health care law after they fill out an IRS waiver. There are things that members would consider morally objectionable, like abortion, that are not covered.

The drive from Chatham to Buffalo is the same for Leah Wightman's parents. Past the grain silos rising out of the rust, the houses lining the highway, and towering City Hall.

Leah went to college at and ran for the University at Buffalo, but Leah's parents don't make that drive for track meets anymore. It's to visit her in a 3,000 employee state-of-the-art hospital.

Leah, a 24-year-old bride-to-be in perfect athletic shape, was suddenly diagnosed with leukemia. Doctors immediately put her into treatment and told her she had to cancel her July wedding. Her former UB track coach, Vicki Mitchell, got the news, and went to visit her 800-meter runner, who'd been given what seemed like a death sentence. This is where Wightman is different. The glowing cancer patient, lights up the whole ward. Twenty-five pounds lighter, bald, often in pain, with chemo IVs hanging out her arm. While grandma and mom sometimes cry, Leah doesn't see the point of it. But, there's plenty to get her down. In a few weeks, she needs a bone marrow transplant to survive. Out of the 20 million in the database, there wasn't a single perfect match. Yet again, Leah rose above. Chatham, draped in orange for Leah, responded with a "Be the Match" drive. People at Sean's Run a week ago took the simple swab test to join the bone marrow registry. Coach Vicki organized her own swab drive at UB this past weekend. Doctors will use a clinical trial with Leah. Bone marrow from her brother Ross will be genetically altered to mirror a perfect match donation. About that canceled wedding, Leah's family has everything ready, so she can be married to her fiancé Bob at any time. Leah says she always wanted a smaller ceremony. We can learn a lot from Leah Wightman. Because even when life seemed like a funeral. Leah Wightman treated it like a wedding. Presidential candidate Bernie Sanders recently said 22-percent of American children live in poverty.

In New York City on Monday, leaders in education, public health and psychology came together to discuss how the stress of living in poverty impacts kid's brains. More and more educators are worried about their students who live in poverty. Some local educators say they see students coming to school hungry, without the proper sleep and worse. Basically, they're not ready to learn.

Hurricane Sandy slammed Long Island nearly four years ago, but some people are still feeling the effects. Beverly recently moved upstate. Sadly, it didn't work out. Embarrassed, she asked for her identity to be disguised. The family, including three children, ended up homeless, in a shelter, getting food from a pantry. It is a heart wrenching story, but not one unfamiliar to North Colonie School Superintendent Joseph Corr. However, that was 10 years ago. Today, the number of kids receiving free and reduced lunches had more than doubled:

- **Blue Creek Elementary School:** 27 percent
- **Forts Ferry Elementary School:** 26 percent
- **Latham Ridge Elementary School:** 26 percent

District-wide it's about 20 percent. Corr knows that's a problem because poverty impacts learning. North Colonie is so concerned, this year they started providing backpacks full of food for students to take home for the weekend at both the high school and elementary school. Dr. Tammi Schillinger, assistant professor of education at the College of Saint Rose instructs new teachers. Now, she shares her personal classroom stories with them of teaching students facing hardships. One of Schillinger's student teachers, Jessica Smith, says she's been taught to teach to the whole child.

For years, poverty was considered an urban issue. Now, it's not only in suburbia, but small school districts like Catskill.

#### **Free and reduced lunches in Catskill:**

- **2016:** 51 percent
- **2015:** 49 percent
- **2014:** 54 percent

In the Albany School District, it's estimated about 75 to 80 percent of students are eligible for free and reduced meals. Students coming from families who are struggling to make ends meet like Beverly's.

They looked all over the world to find someone to save their daughter's life, and tonight the answer for a Chatham bride-to-be is a man in Brazil. We're talking about the search through more than 20 million people to find a bone marrow donor for cancer-stricken Leah Wightman. The plan was to use Leah's brothers bone marrow, but the risks for that transplant were higher than with a perfect match. Then Leah's doctors found the answer is South America. With all the orange ribbons in town, Steve Wightman knew Chatham was behind his daughter, Leah. That's part of the reason he never gave up hope on a perfect match. With just weeks left until she needed a life-saving bone marrow transplant, he knew the chances. After Chatham held a bone marrow donor drive, and doctors looked for three months. Not a single perfect match in a 20-million-person database last month at the Buffalo Hospital, we asked Leah's doctor why it was so hard to find that person. Tuesday, Steve got the call. The perfect match had been found in, of all places, Brazil. The family had been set to use a clinical trial to genetically modify the bone marrow of Leah's brother, Ross, for the transplant. This perfect match from a 50-year-old Brazilian man is much better. Now it's off to Buffalo again for Steve and Ross. More hopeful than ever that Leah will beat cancer with this perfect match, and also to see her join with her other perfect match. Leah's wedding has been shrunk to 12 people, switched to a Buffalo chapel, and moved up to Saturday. After a year of cancer, this toast will be different than most father's, but then again, Leah's isn't like most daughters.

There is a photo Nick Wilock has from his wedding that is one of his most treasured. On that day filled with smiles and happy tears, nobody could have dreamed the family would experience a crushing loss less than a year later. One that's left Nick with a nagging question for the past two years. Is it ok for him to talk about his brother and the way

he died? It was the end of the semester for 22-year-old Steven Wilock at SUNY Oswego, the weekend of the infamous Bridge Street Run, where kids party and bar hop all day long. On the morning of May 10, 2014- older brother Nick was home in the Capital Region- with several missed calls from his parents. The next conversation with his dad is one that still haunts him. His father told him Steven was dead. Nick admits his brother- a 2009 Shenendehowa graduate had gotten into trouble before, but the family had never dreamed he was experimenting with a drug so deadly. Authorities told the family the heroin Steven bought from a kid on campus was laced with a lethal batch of fentanyl- a prescription pain killer. To understand why Steven's death was so shocking- you need to understand the family background. Steven wasn't some junkie from a bad family. The boys had a loving, happy upbringing in a suburban neighborhood. Steven loved sports and was doing well in school- in fact he'd just been accepted into the MBA program at Oswego. For the first few weeks after his brother died, Nick would come home from work and stare at the sunset for what felt like hours each night. After a year of emotionally treading water, Nick's wife told him he was carrying the weight of the entire family's grief. That's when he turned to counseling. A year later, Nick is still seeing that counselor twice a month. He's sharing the story with anyone who will listen- hoping for a breakthrough in how communities deal with the heroin crisis. Nick's found a new sense of normalcy. He and his wife just built a new home and they're expecting their first child this summer. Each day he finds some happiness, but he knows- the pain of his loss, will always cut deep. At the end of each day- he can always come back to pictures that remind him of the day when everything was right in the world- because his little brother who loved fishing and baseball was by his side, smiling big and bright. He'll never let the way Steven died, define his brother's memory.

Leah Wightman, the former Chatham State Champion runner who has a life threatening case of Leukemia, was married yesterday. NewsChannel 13 has been following Leah's story for over a month now. She had hoped to get married back in July, but had to postpone because of her diagnosis. Leah and her fiancé Bob were married at a chapel a block away from her Buffalo Cancer Center. Last week, more wonderful news- Leah found a bone marrow donor who is a perfect match. She'll get a transplant that will greatly increase her chances of survival.

It's sometimes referred to as the Capital Region's playground. People love to visit here for all it has to offer -- horses, dining, arts, recreation and people watching. But lately, some don't like what they're seeing. It's being called a dramatic increase in aggressive pan handling---more than just homeless people sitting on the sidewalk or benches. The mayor says the aggressive panhandlers are coming from out of town and shouldn't be confused with homeless people who've made Saratoga streets their home for years. During parts of four days walking around downtown and looking, NewsChannel 13 didn't witness anyone aggressively panhandling.

That's not to say it's not happening. In fact, some in the business community are witnessing it. And they're all telling the Chamber of Commerce about it. The Chamber of Commerce is even circulating a photo of one woman who they say is particularly aggressive, urging people not to give to her.

Both the chamber and the City Council are calling for more cops walking the beat. Panhandling or asking a stranger for money is not illegal. It's when it becomes aggressive, that it might be criminal.

Someone could be charged with harassment or disorderly conduct. Both are just violations. Michael Finocchi, executive director of Shelters of Saratoga, Saratoga's homeless shelter, who in his prior position, helped Schenectady crack down on aggressive panhandling, says in his experience increased police presence helps, but he says to really make a difference, don't give the panhandlers money. Finocchi says he's hearing stories of panhandlers making more than \$200 a day on Saratoga Springs streets. Wanting to put an end to it, the business community will soon put locked drop boxes around town, encouraging those inclined to give to a panhandler to instead donate to charities that will help the poor and the homeless.

Health insurers in New York recently proposed premium increases averaging 12 to 17 percent for next year. If history plays out, the Department of Financial Services will reduce those requests. We'll know in early August. Insurance experts say higher premiums are necessary for their financial stability. That's because a key part of their rate hike request is tied to the ever increasing cost of pharmaceutical products. When those costs squeeze the insurer, you the consumer pay, just like Sandy Schanck. Rituxan is the drug and it's keeping Schanck's blood cancer in remission. She gets it via infusion every three months. In 2015, a \$20 office visit co-pay, covered it. Since the first of this year she's been socked with a wallet busting co-insurance charge. That's because her insurer, CDPHP joined the ranks of other health insurers requiring subscribers to cough up co-insurance for expensive drugs, generally about 20 percent of the drug's price tag. Eileen Wood, RPh, CDPHP's pharmacy director explains, it's not feasible to raise premiums high enough to cover soaring drug costs. It's a conundrum Paul Macielak, CEO and President for the NYS Health Plans Association sees all the time. He says pharmaceutical costs in New York rose double digits last three years and they're still climbing. He points to costly specialty drugs, increasing costs for diabetes drugs and the many drugs about to go off patent, meaning generic, less expensive versions of those drugs will hit the market. So we have to sharpen our consumer savvy. Know your policy and be aware of out of pocket costs. The least expensive premium is not always the best buy. If you think co-insurance charges or other benefits changes that can affect your health, are not correct file an appeal with your insurer.

Ongoing problems may be settled by filing a complaint with the State Department of Financial Services. Seek out drug discount cards, private foundations that may help. That's another route to getting financial help. Schanck started hitting roadblocks because a payment code for her diagnosis and the Rituxan changed when the Feds adopted a new system of classifying drugs.

She reached out to NewsChannel 13's Benita Zahn who did some digging. She contacted the feds and working with her insurer CDPHP and her cancer treatment facility, NYOH, along with drug maker, Genentech. Working with NYOH, Genentech revisited Schanck's case and found she did, in fact, qualify for what's called replacement drug. They provide the Rituxan, free of charge to NYOH who agrees not to charge for their services. Dr. Ira Zackon with New York Oncology Hematology, says 50 percent of their patients are on the hook for a 20 percent drug co insurance. Five years ago there were few. So Schanck's got a lot of company needing help to pay for lifesaving treatment. As for Schanck, she hopes her story can empower others. Now she's focusing on staying well and enjoying her grandchildren. Because drug costs are such a big part of health care costs Assemblyman John McDonald and Senator Kemp Hannon are sponsoring legislation to make the drug makers costs more transparent. Right now, it's almost impossible to know their true costs. Assemblyman McDonald doesn't expect it to become law this year but says the work to get it passed will continue. Consumers have to be tenacious when it comes to getting help.

Siena has a new nursing program to help working nurses get their bachelor's degree and they're using a male teacher who makes lots of noises, but will never talk back to his students.

He wears a Siena shirt and doesn't argue with anyone who wants to listen to his heartbeat.

SAM, or "Student Auscultation Manikin," lets nursing students learn what different sounds mean before they test out their skills on a real patient. Dr. Lisa Flack with the Baldwin Nursing Program sets up SAM for a listen and then the students tell her what they think they're hearing.

The answer shows up on a giant screen, highlighting the correct answer in green. So why so high tech? This new program will allow working nurses to get a bachelor's degree in two years' time. The classes are all day long on Wednesdays only.

Consider all the plastic and styrofoam wrapped around anything you buy. Such materials will last thousands of years, according to Bayer. What if you could still protect products with packaging that's biodegradable? That's what Ecovative is doing, and it's not only for adults. Those teddy bears and robots were made through the company's GIY kits, which are geared toward the youngest environmentally conscious minds. It's like STEM magic -- where biology meets engineering. Bayer hopes to make a mark on the world without leaving any kind of carbon footprint.

The exhibit focuses solely on North American dinosaurs, the ancestors of our native animals, essentially. The ball flight technology is now installed at the Northway Golf Center in Clifton Park, the first of its kind in the Northeast. The system can give golfers all sorts of data, everything from ball speed to carry distance to launch angle. It can even email your results to you. Pro-Tracer also lets you compete in longest drive and closest to the pin competitions or lets you play a virtual round of golf from the driving range. It allows the casual golfer to train the same way the pros do. While hitting the ball in the right place can seem like a stroke of luck, Shaver says it all comes down to science. Couple the science of hitting a golf ball with the science of tracking it and golfers can see the future of the game in STEM.

A South Glens Falls High School graduate is adding to the theory of relativity that Albert Einstein pioneered 100 years ago. The young scientist is part of a team that relied on gravitational waves to discover colliding black holes. At 22 years old, Amber Lenon is part of the research that is shaking up the universe - literally. The recent Syracuse University grad and another physics major, created the algorithms that helped scientists to detect and interpret the gravitational waves rippling out from the collision of two black holes more than a billion years ago. The work of the students and scientists from across the country is important because it means researchers can look at the universe in a new way and make even more discoveries. Science, essentially, is being re-written. Lenon, will begin a doctorate program in Physics, at West Virginia University in the fall. It's a dream realized for this space pioneer, from the North Country.

High school students from forensics classes at Averill Park are getting involved as well after a collaboration began between the high school and UAlbany. The high school students are getting hands on experience with university level research, something they credit with getting them interested in STEM. Hayley Peterson is one of four high school students working at the lab over the summer. She's also heading to UAlbany next fall to continue to help with the research. The collaboration between UAlbany and Averill Park wasn't just a one-time deal. Even more lab activities are being planned for next school year.

Two months ago, "Her Treasure Box" opened in Schenectady. It's a craft store where all proceeds will go toward opening a home for women in this country who escape trafficking.

Love got the well-known comedian to come to Albany and play at the Palace Theatre on May 19 at 7 p.m. Part of the proceeds will go to her church for scholarships. The church she first fell in love with.

Before leaving, Taylor urged the women to not only shed anger, regrets and take time for rejuvenation but also make sure their business plan supports a mission and supports the community. Her passion after 37-years at the magazine is her non-profit, the National CARES Mentoring Movement. Its goal is to support black children.

She started thinking about all the people she met in the shelter and their need for the essentials like toiletries and clothing, so she started a non-profit just for them. It's called "Raindrops Closet for Homeless Families." It's located inside the Emmanuel-Friedens Church in Schenectady. Along with providing items for those without a place to stay or those transitioning into a home, Rivera hopes she's reminding people that homelessness could happen to anyone.

Forget those intense physical challenge shows on television. A local woman has an obstacle course she would love for you to try. No, it's not the show "American Ninja Warrior," it's the Viking Obstacle Course, located about 45 minutes outside of Albany. Here, participants move so quickly that their physical fitness on obstacles like the Norse polls defy reason. The idea for the course belongs to Tinker Nicholson Pachter. Students have finished up the first round of English Language Arts testing for this year's state assessment tests. Districts are hoping for a lower number of opt outs this year as nearly 20 percent of eligible students statewide chose not to take the test last year. The State Education Department has been working to try and reduce those numbers this year- because federal funding for schools could be on the line. The state has made a number of changes to the tests to reduce stress for students and teachers. The tests are no longer counted towards teacher's evaluations- they are shorter- with no time constraints- and teachers have helped craft the questions on the tests. The Federal Department of Education sent a letter to the State Education Department in December saying that if the state doesn't get participation numbers above 95 percent- the federal government could withhold or redirect part or all of the state's Title One funds and that has local superintendents worried.

NYS Assessment Test- WNYT- April 6, 2016- 5:00 am- 6:00 am

There's a great deal of interest in how the parents of New York school children will react to this week's standardized tests. There was rancor last year when they were referred to as "Common Core Tests." The first round of this year's standardized tests were yesterday but how many opt outs were there? It's been a mixed bag of numbers so far across the Capital District. Some school districts have higher opt out numbers- some are down- but all that we've contacted so far are above the five percent threshold. Of the six districts that got back to us yesterday- Mohonasen was the highest at 43 percent of students grades three through eight opting out of the English Language Arts test. That's down 13 percent from last year. Bethlehem had 22 percent of students opting out this year- a three percent increase over last year. Other districts included Amsterdam at 29 percent opting out- Shenendehowa at 14 percent opting out and Niskayuna at 10 percent opting out. These are just preliminary numbers- the tests run through Thursday so they may rise and then the Math assessments are next week. A reason schools are concerned is because of a letter sent by the US Department of Education to the New York State Department of Education. That letter said that any state with participation rates lower than 95 percent two years in a row could face a loss in federal education funds. New York had about 20 percent of students opt out last year- and this year's numbers look to be higher than five percent as well. Local superintendents have said a loss in federal funding would be devastating.
