1. Jessica Krugger, Development and Public Relations Coordinator – Erie St. Martin Center	North Coast Views Sunday, Dec 01, 2019 6:00am - 30 min	1. FIGHTING POVERTY - Learned that the St Martin Center was started by (and is currently a part of) the Erie Diocese to cover food & clothing and then utility services – and changes as the needs of the community change – including an Early Learning Center (which is one of the few programs that are for a fee – all others are free). They serve the 13 counties under the diocese. Learned details about all of their programs including financial literacy classes & home buying classes. Talked about how the community can help with monetary donations, household or clothing donations, maybe a drive for hats, gloves and socks – or by getting involved with the gift trees that are out and around our area. 29m52s
1. Shannon Wohlford, Engagement Lead - Blue Zones Project	North Coast Views Sunday, Dec 08, 2019 6:00am - 30 min	1. HEALTHY COMMUNITY – Learned that Blue Zones Project is an evidence based, community wide approach to improving the overall health of a community. So residents live longer – with a good quality of life. Heard that a man who worked with National Geographic, who traveled for work, found 5 areas in the world where residents were living over the age of 100 – and living well. In looking more closely, they found that there are 9 common principals that set apart those that live in a blue zone – from moving naturally to eating more plant based – having a purpose – a community to rely on – faith based practices – and managing stress, to name a few. Learned that all 3 local health systems are backing this financially in Corry for the next 3yrs as a pilot program – where they will keep track of how the participants are doing, with the hope that this will spread to other communities in our area. Heard about free information and classes are available to everyone and learned how to get involved. 29m53s

EDUCATION – Heard the status of the Community College application & the criteria for the application to be considered. 1) Show adequate population 2) Show wealth in community to support it (the county would be responsible for 1/3 of cost per student) monies will come from gaming 3) Show need (Kathy says studies show that there are gaps in other education sources in the area that do not give area businesses a steady stream of viable students that can be candidates for their businesses when the large number of baby boomers retire over the next several years) Got details on where to get more information for the community and learned that the final vote will happen in March letting us know if the Community College will move forward. Talked briefly about the census coming in 2020 and why it is important. 29m58s
1. Guy G. McUmbert - Northwest Regional Director - Green Building Alliance – Erie 2030 District	North Coast Views Sunday, Dec 22, 2019 6:00am - 30 min	1. ENVIRONMENT – Learned that the Green Building Alliance is based in Pittsburgh, they came out of the LEED movement, where companies were saying that their buildings were “green” when they weren’t. Learned that being a green building means that the buildings are energy efficient, have proper ventilation, proper storm water management, proper air and that they use recycled materials, making them healthy for

They have expanded into having a green schools academy – and have also branched into working with cities on the 2030 project, which is an international program to reduce energy use in cities by 50% by the year 2030. People associate energy use with only transportation, when it also involves energy use and water use. There are 22 programs in North America. Heard that we became a 2030 district – which is an educational program that does have metrics involved to measure outcomes. We have 60 buildings that are involved and hoping to expand. Learned that we create as much carbon emissions with buildings as we do with cars. We use a lot of electricity, burning coal, also treating and everything associated with water. Talked about how everyone can get more information on this project and how we can help in our own homes (and they do hope to expand into homes in the future. 29m57s</p>

It started in MA when business leaders wanted to help prepare students for the working world – but although they were in business, they wanted to make sure everyone they taught would help make well rounded, better citizens, by teaching life skills, soft skills, financial literacy and entrepreneurship. They keep advancing with technology, while still keeping an emphasis on the soft skills and communication skills. Learned about their new program - biztown – showing how what you do in your personal life is important – but then how you work in with the rest of the community. They work with K-12, but cater each lesson plan to be age specific. Found out that volunteers are who run the program (some in 4 hrs in one day – some for 45min for a number of weeks) – but it is completely ready for the volunteer who will lead the program. It is free. Learned how to get involved by either requesting their program as an educator or how to volunteer – also got details about a fundraiser in January. 29m52s</p>
