CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: The Department of Veterans Affairs became the first federal agency on Monday to require vaccination for its 115,000 health care workers. The American Medical Association and 56 other leading organizations are now calling for mandatory vaccinations for workers at all health care settings, including nursing homes nationwide. California will soon require vaccination or negative weekly COVID tests for state and health care workers. New York City will also mandate vaccines or tests for municipal workers, including teachers and health care workers, and urging private employers to require shots. In the meantime, Florida's governor says ordinary people should not be forced or mocked into taking the vaccinated. That goes against CDC guidance stating only the unvaccinated should wear masks inside, but that may change. The delta variant, which makes up 83% of COVID cases in America, is much more contagious than other strains we've seen before, largely because people infected with it can carry up to 1,000 times more virus. That means people who have no immunity are most vulnerable. In fact, 99% of US hospitalizations and deaths are unvaccinated. Many Americans are responding to the delta danger. Nearly 800,000 got their shot over the weekend, a big jump over previous ones.

CBN Senior Washington Correspondent Jennifer Wishon Reports: The Delta variant of the coronavirus is being blamed for a surge in new cases and hospitalizations in numbers similar to what we saw last summer. Internal documents at the CDC obtained by the Washington Post, reveal the variant is "spread as easily as chickenpox" and is likely more deadly. This comes hours after a somber White House address by President Biden where he issued strict new rules. The order impacts more than four million federal workers. Pushback was immediate from the US Postal Workers Union, the Association of Federal Law Enforcement Officers, and several teachers unions. Still, more Americans are protecting themselves against COVID. Last week 2.8 million people got shots – a number up 18 percent over the previous week. But frustration over mixed messaging from the White House is growing after the CDC issued new guidance this week suggesting even vaccinated people wear masks indoors. On Capitol Hill, it's a tale of two houses. In the Senate, masks are recommended. In the House, they're required. Seven states have already banned mask mandates. At the same time, vaccine requirements are appearing in the private sector. Google, Facebook, and Netflix now require most employees get vaccinated before returning to work. Entry into the Lallapalooza music festival kicking off this week in Chicago requires proof of a vaccine or negative test. And while vaccinated Americans are still testing positive for COVID their cases tend to be mild. But as cases rise, it's clear the debate over how to treat the latest surge is far from over.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Millions of children are headed back to school. For many, it's the first time in over a year they're gathering in person, something medical experts say is much healthier for the kids than distance learning. Educators worry, however, that in-person instruction may be halted due to widespread COVID-19 outbreaks in school, in which case children will be forced back into distance learning. Pediatric COVID-19 cases continue to rise. More than 204,000 COVID-19 cases were reported among children last week, the second highest on record. More than 300 children are being admitted to hospitals every day. In an effort to minimize infections, many school districts are considering mask mandates, with some getting considerable push-back from parents who feel masks should be optional. A Gallup poll shows 48 percent of parents say all students should wear masks at school. 41 percent say no students should be required to wear masks and 11 percent say masks should only be required for unvaccinated students. The governors of Florida, Texas, Arkansas, Iowa, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Utah have outlawed school mask mandates. The U.S. Department of Education announced it's conducting a civil rights investigation into Iowa, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Utah for possibly discriminating against students with compromised immune systems and other issues that make students more vulnerable to catching COVID-19. For now, the Department of Education is ignoring states like Florida, Texas, Arkansas, and Arizona, because they are already facing legal challenges to their mask mandate bans. The CDC says based on recent data, school districts should require masks. However, some dispute those findings. W. Chris Winter, M.D., author of "The Rested Child," told CBN News although masks are unpleasant, they are necessary for school children at this time. Proponents of mask mandates say the masks may make the difference between keeping schools open and shutting them down due to outbreaks. Those who oppose mask mandates say parents should have the right to decide what's best for their children.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: The U.S. continues to struggle with the COVID-19 pandemic, with the average number of new daily cases recently hovering around 150,000 and 1,500 deaths per day. The case numbers are four times higher than they were at this time last year. And right now the U.S. is recording twice the number of hospitalizations compared with last September. It comes as America has hit a new milestone - 75 percent of adults have now gotten at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. Meanwhile, over the Labor Day weekend, college football kicked off with hundreds of thousands of screaming fans packed should-to-shoulder into stadiums. Only five college teams and three professional ones reported require proof of vaccination or a negative COVID-19 test before entering. Despite the CDC warning against unvaccinated people traveling over the holiday weekend, the T.S.A. screened 3.5 million air travelers, a number not seen since before the pandemic. Highways, beaches, and national parks were all packed. As children return to the classrooms, heated debates have resumed over whether they should wear masks. Just in the last week, nearly 252,000 children tested positive for COVID-19, prompting 1,400 schools in 35 states to revert back to distance learning. While most of the U.S. adult and pediatric hospitalizations and deaths are among the unvaccinated or those without natural immunity, new data shows vaccines aren't as effective as they once were, prompting calls for boosters as early as this month. While the delta variant makes up 99 percent of all U.S. cases, health experts are examining a new variant, mu, which has been detected in 49 states.

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CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: The FDA has issued a warning to parents: Do not seek a COVID vaccine for your child until the agency has approved one. The CDC website shows the percentage of children with cases of COVID-19 that are serious enough to need hospitalization is 0.008%. But with cases reportedly rising among children, some parents want to get their kids vaccinated. CDC data show COVID symptoms among children under 12 usually range from asymptomatic to mild, and yet the former head of the FDA, Scott Gottlieb, indicated a vaccine for children could be coming. This, as opposition grows against Joe Biden's vaccine mandate last week that orders businesses with more than 100 employees to either require vaccinations or offer weekly testing. Lindsey Curnutte with the conservative group, Heritage Action for America, told CBN News the move is unconstitutional. The rule to be crafted by OSHA, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, carries penalties up to \$14,000 per violation. At least seven Republican governors say they will fight it, with some already announcing legal action. And the Alliance Defending Freedom warns it's also prepared to challenge Biden's vaccine mandates in court. However, one upstate New York Hospital has had to stop delivering babies after maternity staff quit over a COVID Vaccine Mandate.

CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Shortly after the FDA gave the green light for people over 65 to get a booster shot at least six months after their last shot, the CDC signed off Thursday night giving final approval. Pfizer's booster shot received the endorsement of a final panel of independent advisors with the CDC in a 9-to-6 vote. It comes after an FDA panel said last week the data was not strong enough to advocate an extra shot for a majority of Americans, only for senior citizens and others who are most at risk. The CDC panel recommended a booster for people over 65, nursing home residents, people who are over 50 with underlying health problems, and immunecompromised people over the age of 18. The panel stopped shy of giving the go-ahead for frontline workers. But in a surprising swing, CDC Director Rochelle Walensky reversed one recommendation by her own advisors and authorized the booster for health care workers, teachers, and other frontline workers, giving a big boost for the president's vaccination campaign. Walensky explained why she bypassed the CDC panel's recommendation to make her own decision. And while the boosters for Moderna and Johnson & Johnson wait their turn for approval, hospitals around the country continue to deal with the Delta variant, which has hit the unvaccinated at far higher rates. The Pfizer booster shot decision was founded on trial data from Israel where a third shot is already being given, despite objections from the World Health Organization purporting poor countries don't have enough for their first dose. Wednesday, President Biden announced the purchase of an additional 500-million doses of the Pfizer vaccine to donate to countries with limited access to their first does. The goal is to vaccinate 70% of the world's population by June of 2022.

CBN White House Correspondent Eric Philips Reports: So far this year nearly 23,000 American lives have been lost to gun violence. Over the past weekend alone, gun violence surged in cities like Chicago where 40 people were shot, 11 of them died. On Monday, President Biden held a roundtable to discuss what to do about it with police chiefs, mayors, and other stockholders. The meeting came after an ABC/Washington Post poll released earlier this month indicated just 38 percent of adults overall approval of how Biden is handling crime in this country. Bullets have been flying with people dying at an increasing rate across the country, starting in April last year to this very moment. And it has ranged in scope. Sadly, just last month, 16-year-old stand out high school student Kassius-Kohn glay was shot to death in Northwest D.C. Two months prior, multiple people were killed when a gunman opened fire at a supermarket in Boulder, Colorado. The list goes on, but the president says his strategy has multiple prongs. Mike Jones is a retired police chief and public safety expert who's been in policing for 45 years. He says the uptick in violent crime is not surprising. Jones says with the pandemic leaving some 20 million people out of work and businesses closed, the tension of society's problems is escalating. Plus, there is a problem within police ranks. The president says more, not less police are needed and he hopes to address that along with partners. Another key factor Biden focused on was gun control. Among those taking part in the White House crime meeting was Eric Adams who just won the Democratic primary to be New York City's next mayor. He is against defunding the police, and his electoral win may serve as a clear signal that the defund the police mantra is a loser at the polls.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Deaths from drug overdoses are soaring to astronomical levels. 2020 saw a record of 93,000 overdose deaths in the US. That's about 250 deaths each day, or roughly 11 every hour. The overdose death rate in 2020 was a whopping one-third more than the previous record which occurred in 2019. The main culprit is the drug Fentanyl, which is often secretly added to other drugs, thereby catching the unsuspecting user off guard. Virginia, like much of the nation, saw dramatic increases in drug overdose deaths in which the victims' bodies contained Fentanyl, according to forensic epidemiologist Rosie Hobron, who works at the state medical examiner's office. Hobron says nearly three out of four overdose deaths involved Fentanyl and almost all of the deaths were accidental. The trend shows no signs of slowing down. Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 100 times more powerful than morphine. Alexandria, Virginia's opioid response coordinator Emily Bentley told CBN News Fentanyl is so potent that the equivalent of a couple of grains of sand can kill. Fentanyl is also added to pills like Xanax, Oxycodone, and MDMA, the party drug often referred to as "Ecstasy" or "Molly." Bentely says it's almost impossible to spot fake pills. That's because drug dealers crush the real pills, add Fentanyl, then re-press them using a sophisticated pill press that makes the final product look identical to real pills. In addition to the Fentanyllaced street drugs, pandemic closures also contributed to the high number of overdoses. Dr. Paul Hardy, who runs Recover for Life, a drug treatment center in Virginia, told CBN News far too many recovering addicts relapsed when they could no longer attend support group meetings. Disruption of a routine schedule combined with being cooped up at home with family members who can "trigger" drug use also contributed to relapses. Some drug prevention organizations, such as those affiliated with police departments, are taking action to stop future overdoses by giving known users two things: Fentanyl test strips, which detect the substance in other drugs, and Narcan, the opioidreversal spray. Fentanyl test strips can be purchased online through BTNX or DanceSafe. Many pharmacies sell Narcan without a prescription. Drug users are being advised to never use when they are alone so that if an accidental overdose occurs, the person with them can administer the Narcan nasal spray and call 911. Users are also being warned against buying pills on the street that are in unlabeled prescription bottles or are in bottles with pills that are not identical in appearance. While law enforcement and drug prevention organizations are trying to diminish the number of deaths among people who use illegal drugs, they say the best solution is for the user to get into drug treatment. Dr. Hardy says it's the only option that works in the long run.

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: Online gaming is one of the world's fastest-growing entertainment industries. While many players log on looking to battle with friends, speed through a simulated race track, or even build a virtual world, there's a seriously dangerous aspect to gaming. A new FBI campaign, It's Not a Game, warns parents that sexual predators consider these platforms "hunting grounds." CBN News checked out a popular gaming platform to get a clearer picture of what children may encounter. Within minutes we found a publicly available chat that included explicit language and even avatar pornography. In the summer of 2020, FBI analyst Chris Travis noticed a trend in several child exploitation cases. Once on a social media app, the suspect would push the child to send photos, getting increasingly aggressive. After more than a decade working in cyber investigations, Branzetti (Kevin Branzetti, an NYPD veteran and co-founder of the National Child Protection Task Force) says some of the same technology he uses to find missing kids, could also help prevent them from ever being targeted. It all has to do with the personal data collected by the websites, social media platforms, and apps we use. While Big Tech companies may have that information, they don't currently use it to keep their spaces safe for children. Nealon is on a mission to change that. While she's making progress with these companies, it's a slow process. So in the meantime, parents need to be vigilant. The FBI's campaign is aimed at educating parents and children about these online threats, but also about the controls available to secure their devices. Still, kids are digital natives and controls may only go so far. Chris McKenna, the founder of Protect Young Eyes, says building a strong relationship with your child is one of the best forms of protection. All of these experts stress not to attempt banning your child from the internet. For one, it's not realistic. Instead take more control over what they can access, in order to stop unwanted access to them.

CBN Senior Washington Correspondent Tara Mergener Reports: Fifteen hundred migrants, all of them COVID positive, flooded into McAllen, Texas, in just one week. But that's only the tip of the iceberg. Hundreds of thousands of them are landing in American communities day after day - the highest number in 21 years. The numbers tell the story. Between June and July, there was a 13 percent increase in migrants crossing the border illegally. Since President Biden took office, the numbers have gone up every month. There are more and more calls now on his administration to act. In July alone, a record 210,000 migrants entered the U.S. along the border often with the help of smugglers. Many of those putting their feet on American soil for the first time are said to be infected with COVID-19. Detention facilities are out of space and agents are overwhelmed. The mayor said more than 7,000 COVID-positive migrants and counting have come across the border in just six months. Across the entire southwest border, illegal crossings are at a 21-year high with swarms of people, including 19,000-plus unaccompanied children turning themselves in to agents in July. Critics are sounding the alarm across the country, blaming Biden's border policies. Day after day, hundreds of them landing in communities across the nation via planes, trains, and automobiles. As the crisis worsens, even some on the left are calling on the President to impose order on an increasingly out-of-control migration, which is adding fuel to the pandemic fire. Agencies on the border report as many as 1 in 5 migrants are showing up with COVID. The administration is reported preparing to help control it by offering them vaccines, paid for by U.S. taxpayers.

CBN Reporter Tara Mergener Reports: Armed with an assault rifle and a hundred rounds of ammo, a smuggler races to make the handoff. Suddenly, several men jump from the back of the vehicle, making a break for the next car and hoping to outrun the law. CBN News obtained a shocking video recorded by human smugglers themselves. This isn't a scene playing out in a third-world country but on the backroads of a small South Texas town. This is Brooks County, Texas which about 70 miles north of the Mexico border and clear evidence that ground zero of the immigration crisis is much larger than the border itself. This is known as the "Corridor of Death." We see why within minutes of our arrival in Falfurrias. Deputy Don White responds after another body turns up deep in South Texas brush country. It's one of the dozens of bodies found in the past few months and at least hundreds in recent years. The footprints are pointing in the direction of remains decomposing under the hot Texas sun, not far from the beaten path. A man's body has been moved by animals from its original resting place with his belongings scattered about the shrubs. White says it looks like he died a month ago and was likely left behind by his group. An hour south, hundreds of thousands of women and children continue to surrender to border agents after being dropped off at the river's edge by the so-called coyotes they hired to smuggle them into the United States. For those trying to avoid agents, the second hurdle maybe even harder. They have to get around the U.S. Border Patrol checkpoint in Brook's County. It's along a major human smuggling route. Along the journey, they move from stash house to stash house in the Rio Grande Valley until the cartel gives the all-clear. The miles-long trek to meet the next smuggler waiting to usher them deeper into the U.S. is punishing. Sandy loam, which is similar to what you would find on a beach, is heavy to walk on and migrants become exhausted. Scorching summers, freezing winter nights, and brutal winds all take their toll too. Bodies and skeletal remains often revealing signs of painful, even violent deaths. With the human flood crashing the southern border this year, drug cartels are raking in billions from migrants desperate to get here. Some migrants have bad intent. While law enforcement scrambles to stay vigilant along highways, resources in these parts are spread thin. Many border agents once patrolling this county are gone to assist with the massive influx on the border. Brooks County Sheriff Benny Martinez says the cartel is taking full advantage. Day after day, law enforcement agrees these human loads are defying dangerous odds in the wilderness are now fanning out in greater number across America.

CBN Reporter Caitlin Burke Reports: Right now, an estimated 80 inmates are serving mandatory life sentences because of a federal "Three Strikes" drug law. Herman Tate, was sentenced to life at the age of 28 for a low-level, non-violent, drug offense. His sentence fell under the "Three Strikes" drug law passed by Congress in the 1980s. The law states that if someone is charged with a federal drug crime and already has two prior drug offenses, then that's the "third strike," and a federal prosecutor can require the judge to impose a mandatory life sentence. Tate's first strike came in 1992 for selling half a gram of crack. He was sentenced to six months' probation. He gained his second strike two years later. That time he sold 7.7 grams of cocaine and was sentenced to five years in prison but was only required to serve eight months. Then in 1998, he struck out, charged with conspiracy to sell cocaine. Tate, however, had never heard of the "Three Strikes" drug law and since no drugs were found in his possession, he chose to go to trial. The prosecutor filed what's known as an 851 Notice. Tate headed to federal prison. It took two years for the gravity of his sentence to sink in. The "Three Strikes" federal drug law covers all 50 states. Many states have gone further, expanding Three Strikes laws that impose mandatory life sentences for three convictions of certain felonies. In California for example, the 1994 "Three Strikes You're Out" law was designed to keep murderers, rapists, and child molesters behind bars. Today, however, more than half sentenced under that law are serving life sentences for non-violent crimes, evidence that these Three Strike laws can result in unintended consequences. (Attorney MiAngel Cody, Director of the Decarceration Collective) Many of her clients were teenagers or young adults when convicted with their third strike, which basically erases taking into consideration the possibility of maturation and growth, stamping them instead as irredeemable. When Congress passed the Fair Sentencing Act in 2010, it provided the potential for a lower sentence but did nothing for those already in prison. Then in 2018, President Trump signed the First Step Act, which finally allowed the opportunity to reconsider prior sentences. In reading the new law, Tate regained a sense of hope for the first time in nearly 22 years as he realized that he fit the criteria. Cody and her team officially requested his life sentence be reduced. In January of 2020, Tate learned of his freedom. Cody and her team have won freedom for 50 men and women who were previously sentenced to die in prison. Still, a disproportionate number of those still behind bars are black. No legislation reforming the federal "Three Strikes" drug law includes those sentenced to life for marijuana convictions, but Cody believes more change is coming. Cody says now is the time for the American people to ask questions and put pressure on our elected officials. That's because voters can make a major impact at the ballot box and be the catalyst that helps keep Cody's clients and many others from being buried alive behind bars. The Decarceration Collective teamed up with the Buried Alive Project to produce a documentary sharing the stories of the men and women they've saved, but also those still serving life sentences under the "Three Strikes" law. Its release is still to be determined.

CBN News Reporter Brody Carter Reports: The FBI says 2020 was the most dangerous violent year in more than half a century. While the world was dealing with COVID-19, civil unrest, and many other unknowns, homicides were hitting an all-time high. More than 21,500 people were murdered in America last year. The pandemic and higher gun sales are being cited as possible reasons for the surge in violence. Another factor is the high number of police officers leaving the force in cities across the country. The FBI's annual report on crime shows murders in 2020 jumped by almost 30% over 2019. That's roughly 5,000 more homicides and the numbers are only going up. In addition to homicide rates, mass shootings have hit their highest levels since the 1990s. Also, gun violence against kids erupted during COVID with 15,000 kids shot, 1,300 killed. Contrary to popular belief, murder isn't just a big-city issue. In 2020, we saw a national phenomenon with a 20% increase in each region of the country. Louisiana led the nation for the 32nd year in a row. Jason Rantz, one of Seattle's leading conservative voices on the Jason Rantz Show, says the shocking rise in violent crime is a direct response to the murder of George Floyd, social activists working to defund police, gang activity, and the death of America's police force. For the most part, police morale has been crushed. During a year of crime and protests, police retirements rose 45% and resignations were up by 18% in 2020. As murder rates rise, senators have been arduously working to pass bipartisan federal police form. That effort died last week. Sen. Tim Scott (R-SC) says he's still "waiting at the table" after Democrats walked away from finalizing the bill. Meantime, more than 20 major cities have reduced police budgets, amounting to an \$840 million cut nationwide. With regards to the rising murder rate, numbers could be even higher since the data is incomplete. Roughly 3,000 departments nationwide failed to submit crime data to the FBI last year. As for where things are headed, 2021 has already seen a 16-percent increase in murder.

CBN Reporter George Thomas Reports: The Chinese were the first in the world to invent paper money back in the 7th Century. Now, more than 1,400 years later, China is again on the cusp of creating a new form of government currency that some say could pose a serious economic threat to America and the West. Bethel says while the world fixates on private cryptocurrencies like Bitcoin, Beijing is busy building a digital version of its own currency, the Yuan, also known as the Renminbi, to control its citizens and eventually threaten the dominance of the U.S. Dollar. Yaya Fanusie, a former economic and counterterrorism analyst in the CIA, says China's goal is to replace cash with digital currency that's controlled by the communist government's central bank. That digital currency will also be issued by the government bank allowing what Congressman Michael McCaul, the top Republican on the House Foreign Affairs Committee, says is unprecedented access to people's financial transactions. And it gives Beijing the power to track that spending in real-time. This means if you are a human rights activist or a Christian, authorities can use this new technology to punish you if you engage in activities they consider anti-government. Eventually, U.S. and other foreign companies doing business in China will be required to use the government's new digital currency payment system. The U.S. Dollar is the world's dominant reserve currency. China's Renminbi is number 8. Beijing's ambition is to eventually supplant the Dollar's global dominance with the digital Yuan. This month the Communist government announced it will hand out more than \$6 million worth of its digital currency to its citizens as part of a series of trials around the country. The first test kicks off in Beijing allowing residents there to use two government bank apps to make digital payments. China then plans to make its big digital currency splash at the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics. Now that the world's largest authoritarian regime has launched this first-of-a-kind sovereign digital currency, some in the U.S. like Congressman Mike Waltz (R-FL) worry Beijing will use this form of payment to also skirt economic sanctions. Based on history, Waltz believes China is only too happy to share the technology with other roque regimes that seek to enhance their own surveillance capabilities over their citizens.

CBN Reporter Mark Martin Reports: Congress gave out trillions of dollars in federal aid in the form of expanded unemployment benefits to help our crippled economy and people forced out of work by COVID. Pandemic-related benefits for unemployed workers over the past 18 months include aid to self-employed and gig workers, workers who have been unemployed for more than six months, and a federal \$300 weekly supplemental unemployment benefit. Now, those benefits are going away and it's affecting about 7 million people who relied on them during the start of the pandemic. Single mother April Stokes, who hasn't worked full-time since last year, says the extended unemployment benefits kept her family afloat, citing affordable childcare as a major hurdle. Some economists say ending the federal benefits is good for the economy because it will encourage more people to return to the workforce. Steve Moore, economist, and former economic advisor to President Donald Trump, says the unemployment benefits kept some from taking jobs. Moore points out just how generous the policies have been hurt. According to the Labor Department, there are still 5.7 million fewer jobs than before the pandemic. Still, for those willing and able to work, some 10 million jobs are open. Meanwhile, the Biden administration has encourage states to use COVID relief money to keep the unemployment programs going, but none plan to do so.

On this episode of Somebody's Gotta Do It, Host, Mike Rowe, goes to Orlando, Florida to introduce us to the Wadley family, owners of Wadleys Freshwater Commercial Fishermen, to learn about net fishing or seine fishing. Anywhere from 5,000 to 20,000 pounds of tilapia are caught daily. Although not native to Florida, Tilapia are taking over the waters, reducing the number of native and game fish, due to overpopulation. There's also the Pleco, a non-indigenous aquarium fish that was unwisely introduced to these waters by humans and are now trashing the local ecology. CBN Reporter Heather Sells Reports: Deep in the woods of Mt. Airy Forest Park in Cincinnati, a group of hikers whose lives normally heavily restricted find themselves enjoying the abundant foliage and accompanying sights and sounds of this remote terrain. Even the buzz of the cicadas is a welcome change from their daily lives that offer little to no outdoor activity. These hikers have physical limitations that typically keep them constrained to wheelchairs but thanks to an innovative ministry they're now able to explore the woods and hiking trails that were previously inaccessible. Pastor Kevin Schwieger started this ministry, Luke 5 Adventures, right before the pandemic began. His friendship with a wheelchair-bound friend prompted what would become a one-of-a-kind endeavor. During a visit after one of Schwieger's hikes, he wanted to share his enthusiasm with her, only to realize how painful that might be. Schwieger found himself troubled by the thought and began a journey to explore all-terrain wheelchairs that would lead to the new ministry. He discovered a one-wheel chair that can be easily navigated by two people. The Joëlette chair is popular in Europe but Schwieger became the first to bring it to the US. Luke 5 Adventures uses the chair to transport children and adults with disabilities through various terrains, mainly in southwest Ohio, but Schwieger is hoping that other churches will grab hold of the concept. Doug Frank is just one of the hikers thrilled to be involved. His family loves to hike but Frank's cerebral palsy has kept him on the sidelines for years. Since Luke 5 started, he's participated in four excursions and his mom Pam says the trails offer a welcome challenge. And Frank says her son has found friendship offered by Luke 5 volunteers to be equally valuable. Part of Schweiger's strategy in starting Luke 5 has been to reach those with disabilities and their families in ways that churches typically have not. Research from Clemson University sociologist Andrew Whitehead has shown that these families usually struggle to just get to church and often have a painful experience when they attend, leading them to stay at home. Kids with chronic health conditions are 14% more likely to never attend and Whitehead discovered that disabilities that affect social interaction provide the biggest impediment. One in 4 children with developmental delays, learning disabilities, and anxiety never attend church and one in three with autism, speech problems, brain injury or depression never attend. Luke 5 Adventures vice president Whitney Blackston has an eight-year-old daughter who is blind, hearing-impaired, and non-verbal. But she and her husband have enjoyed the community and observed their daughter beginning to love the outdoors, thanks to Luke 5. Blackston shared a recent photo of her daughter plunging her tiny hand into a stream that answered her prayer for God to confirm that He indeed reveals Himself to her child. Blackston and Schwieger are working to multiply Luke 5 so that other churches can offer those with disabilities the opportunity to experience the outdoors within Christian community.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: Are events like Hurricane Ida and the heatwave in the western U.S. signs of a "climate emergency?" The United Nations says they are and called it a "code red for humanity." The media has repeated the claim without challenging it. But what if it's all "hogwash?" What if what we really had this year is nothing more than what folks used to call a "hot summer," and not even close to the hottest summer this nation has ever experienced? The summer heat this year wasn't even close to 1936. Tony Heller of RealClimateScience.com is an environmentalist who, as an electrical engineer, helped develop the modern computer microprocessor. His website has become a collection of weather history which shows it was a lot hotter 90 and 100 years ago than it is now. In the 1930s most of the nation saw temperatures over 100 degrees. Without air conditioning, it was common for families to sleep outdoors. Many thousands died, and what would become known as the Dust Bowl forced the migration of three and a half million climate refugees out of the Great Plains and Midwest; many of them to California. But what about wildfires? News reports suggest they're getting a lot more common. But the record shows wildfire burn acreage is down 90% from the 1920s and 30s. One reason wildfires seem to have increased is that the wildfire data before 1983 has been erased. The website of the National Interagency Fire Center used to show how wildfires were much worse in the 1920s and 30s. That has been removed. So now, when the media visit the website, it shows wildfires steadily getting worse. Heller also documents how NASA has changed its historic weather data. NASA's temperature graph from 1999 showed the warmest temperatures in the early 1900s. Sometime later NASA's graph changed and now shows U.S. temperatures getting warmer. Joe Bastardi, Chief Forecaster at Weatherbell com and author of "The Weaponization of Weather in the Phony Climate War," says catastrophic weather events such as Hurricane Ida are used to show a climate emergency when hurricanes just as strong hit this continent hundreds of years ago. But this isn't just a debate about the weather. It's costing you money. The sweeping "Green New Deal" proposed by Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez could cost as much as 93 trillion dollars, and most of us are already paying more in taxes because of the belief in a climate emergency that some say doesn't exist.

Forty-seven percent of Americans say they're lonely. Fifty-seven percent say they have no one they can really confide in. Generation Z (1995 – 2015) is the loneliest. They are so connected digitally through technology, but they are not heart connected in real relationships. Chronic loneliness can become dangerous because it raises cortisol levels, stress hormone, inflammation in our body, and attacks the frontal cortex lobe of our brain which effects our emotional thinking and the way we respond to people. Loneliness is different from solitude. Solitude is something that we enjoy that allows us to recalibrate to think our thoughts and have some time alone but is also different from isolation. Isolation can be dangerous. The Bible says the man who isolates himself is not wise. In our culture we think isolation is the worst form of punishment when we put someone in solitary confinement. Loneliness can be transformed. God can transform it into His purposes so that we deepen our relationship with Him and with others so we can have a more satisfying relationship with Him and with others.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Many cancer patients experience often-overlooked emotional trauma from the moment they are diagnosed with the disease until long after their doctor declares they have recovered. About 17 million Americans living today have beaten cancer. That's the highest level of survival of the dreaded disease in history. Oncologists and other cancer specialists focus on ridding the body of the disease, but rarely delve into the emotional aspects of what it means to hear the devastating diagnosis, endure cancer treatment, and live with its after-effects. One of those after-effects is the fear that the disease might be back whenever a cancer survivor experiences the slightest ache or pain. Others include anxiety and depression which are common emotions among patients who have been given a clean bill of health. Unfortunately, these emotions are rarely addressed. Some call it "cancer PTSD." Traumatic emotions associated with cancer often begin with the initial impact from the original devastation a patient feels upon hearing the words, "You have cancer," according to Cynthia Hayes, a cancer survivor who knows first-hand about the wide variety of emotions associated with the various phases of cancer. A successful marketing executive, Cynthia thought she was healthy. Then a routine pap test revealed an aggressive gynecological cancer. Fortunately, her treatment worked, and doctors told her the cancer was gone. For Cynthia, however, the emotions associated with the diagnosis remained. After doing her own research involving hundreds of cancer survivors as well as oncologists and mental health professionals, Cynthia discovered she wasn't alone. That revelation led to her best-selling book, "The Big Ordeal: Understanding and Managing the Psychological Turmoil of Cancer." To do that, your body needs help. Cynthia's research led her to discover that an antiinflammatory diet helps heal the emotions. That involves eating a diet rich in a variety of vegetables and fruits. Another key to an anti-inflammatory diet involves consuming healthy fats such as avocadoes, olive oil, and nuts. Aim for so-called "clean" protein, such as wild-caught fish, as well as beef and poultry that have been raised without chemical feeds. Additionally, try to avoid food and drinks that can cause inflammation such as sugary sodas and other sweet treats. Unfortunately, most processed foods lead to harmful inflammation in the body. That's because most packaged foods and fast foods are made with harmful oils and sweeteners. There are over 100 different types of sugar added to processed foods. Cynthia's research also led her to understand the importance of stress reduction when trying to deal with negative emotions associated with cancer. Exercise is an excellent stress reliever. Check with your doctor about what type of exercise is right for you during and after treatment. Sometimes it helps to gradually resume an exercise routine that fits your lifestyle. Make sure not to overdo it at first which can lead to injury or can sometimes sabotage your desire to continue exercising. A brisk daily walk is often all a person needs to notice the positive mental effects of exercise. Another red flag when it comes to stress is jumping back into work too quickly or too aggressively. Most cancer patients should ease back into stressful responsibilities. That sometimes requires discipline. Talking through your emotions can also help. Cancer patients can also find a variety of online support groups. A growing number of churches provide cancer ministries too. Discussing emotions dealing with cancer has shown to help participants not only heal from painful feelings, but Cynthia described many people who actually grow into a stronger person, both emotionally and spiritually, than they were before their cancer diagnosis. She explained many people have realizations such as, "I'm going to guit my job, I'm going to go back to the church, I'm going to do whatever it is that I haven't done because I've been so focused on other things but now the cancer has taught me what's important to me." While no one wants a cancer diagnosis, a number of cancer survivors say facing death put their life in proper perspective and became the best thing that ever happened to them.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: If you suffer from back pain, you're not alone. About one billion people complain about this problem, making it the world's single largest cause of disability. The pandemic led to more people experiencing this painful condition. Doctors say the shut-downs caused people to stop going to the gym, lay on the couch, and eat too much junk food, all of which are bad for the back. Spine surgeon Gbolahan Okubadejo told CBN News the best way to prevent back pain is by maintaining flexibility. Dr. Okubadejo said our bodies naturally get stiffer as we age, which increases the risk of back injury. He says stretching is the number one way to combat that stiffness and prevent back pain. He recommends stretching at least fifteen minutes a day, five days a week. The next best move to avoid back pain is by strengthening your core muscles. These are the ones in vour torso, and include back muscles, but also side and stomach muscles, called abdominals. Strengthening these muscles involves resistance training. That can mean using weight machines at a fitness club or using free weights at home. You can even do core resistance training at home using your own weight by performing exercises like leg lifts, planks, and sit-ups. Many people injure their backs while using non-ergonomic workstations. This has become an increasingly prevalent problem during the Covid-19 pandemic as more people than ever are working at home. Typing away on a computer for hours on end in your bed, on the couch or other non-ergonomic settings can cause back pain. That's why doctors say whether you work at home or in the office, invest in an ergonomic workstation. Extra pounds can strain bones and muscles in your back, so try to maintain a healthy weight. That usually means avoiding junk food, which typically contains high amounts of sugar. That sweet ingredient as well as hundreds of sugar-like substances found in processed foods, such as corn syrup and fruit juice, can lead to inflammation, which many health experts believe is the root of low back pain. To keep your back working right, don't smoke. That habit restricts blood flow to the spine and impairs your body's ability to heal. Also, consider where you sleep. When getting dressed, avoid flip-flops and high heels, when possible, and take other precautions. Protect your back by bending at the knees, not at the waist. If back pain does arrive, doctors say it's better to move around rather than staying in bed. Also, proper medications can help. When drugs don't work, Dr. Okubadejo said surgery is an option.

CBN Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: Both the Trump and Biden administration declared a moratorium on evictions during the pandemic. However, the US Supreme Court recently struck down efforts to extend it. That means a lot of people could be out of their homes, although federal money meant to help landlords and tenants is stuck in bureaucratic red tape. Tawana Smith of Las Vegas, NV lost her job when the pandemic first hit. She and her family, which include her disabled husband and five children, have struggled to make ends meet. Smith is not alone. Evictions, mostly on pause during the pandemic, are expected to ramp up now that the federal eviction moratorium has ended. According to Census data by National Equity Atlas, more than six million households in the country are behind in their rent payments. A federal program that gave grants to states to help tenants and landlords was supposed to help the situation, but most states have failed miserably to distribute the money, mostly due to bureaucracy and red tape. Of the 46.5 billion rental assistance allocated by Congress only eleven percent of that had been distributed as of July. Most states have distributed 20 percent or less of their share. Virginia and Texas are two success stories, followed by Alaska, Illinois, and Massachusetts. Through July 28, the Virginia Rent Relief program processed and disbursed more than \$335.7 million. Amanda Love of the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development applauds the state's swift action to put a plan into place last summer. Housing providers say it is important for residents and landlords to know that there is money available to help. Meanwhile, Smith's eviction is on hold as she waits to see if the help, she needs will come to get her caught up on back rent. Smith and her family are in the process of finding another home now that her lease has expired.

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: Electrical substations are in almost every city nationwide. Most house transformers play a huge part in getting power out to you. The larger they are, the more critical. Transformers take voltage sent by power plants and convert it to a level that can be distributed. Essentially, they keep electricity flowing at safe levels. While the U.S. electric grid consists of thousands of them, the high voltage carriers make up less than three percent. Even so, they are responsible for transporting 60 to 70 percent of our electricity. They're also custom-made in China and experts like Weiss (Joe Weiss, an engineer and independent consultant) say, while the U.S. is busy securing its networks, China has the ability and opportunity to sabotage the equipment we rely on them to manufacture. Essentially, they've created a "backdoor" into our electric grid. He said this is no hypothetical warning. The U.S. has already discovered backdoor electronics in a Chinesemade transformer. The discovery also led to something that's never happened before. Llewellyn King is a journalist who has been covering the energy field for decades. When he approached the Energy Department about the missing transformer he was met with a veil of silence. There are more than 200 of these large Chinese transformers in our electric grid today. One accounts for 10 percent of the power going to New York City, another supplies 18 to 20 percent of the power going to Las Vegas. Yet, the U.S. is focused on our cyber networks, something China has already proven it can bypass. In February of 2021, an arctic blast froze 40 percent of Texas' electric grid. Millions of homes and businesses were left without power. The outages lasted only days, but more than 100 people died. Back in 2012, then-Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta warned a room full of business leaders about the scope of a true attack on the U.S. grid. Weiss said the question is not if this kind of attack will happen, but rather, will we even know it was a cyberattack. He points to Stuxnet, the U.S. cyberattack that took out a fifth of Iran's nuclear centrifuges. Experts like Weiss stress that our critical infrastructure is made up of engineering equipment and it will take a partnership between engineers and cybersecurity defenders to truly protect it. This "backdoor" threat from our adversaries applies to all of our critical infrastructure, not just the grid. The parts that make up this critical infrastructure area also old, and as we've seen in Texas, susceptible to extreme weather events. So whether it's a malicious or unintentional, if these systems go offline, it will be months if not years before we get them back, making us truly vulnerable.
