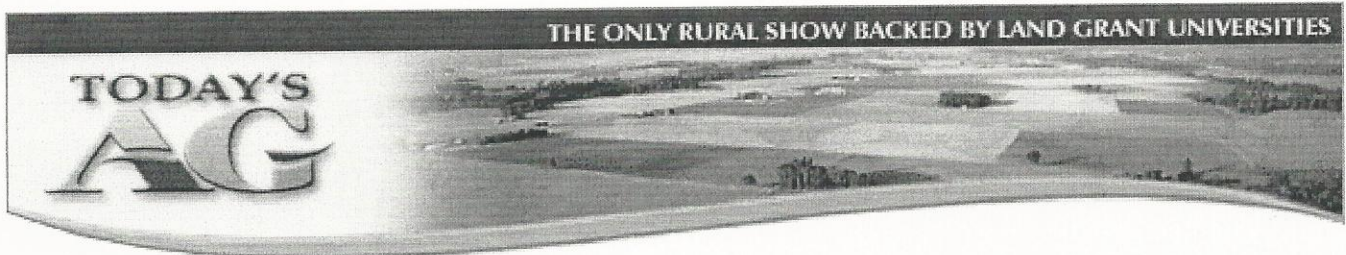

As Officer Clark approaches the vehicle, two of the occupants exit the vehicle and then take off on foot. The driver and a passenger are taken into custody without incident. Although the vehicle is riddled with bullet holes and ammo is found during a routine search of the vehicle, the driver denies his involvement in the shooting.
