 "Movin' Moped" Officers chase a suspect on a stolen moped. He is apprehended outside his family's apartment. While the family members protest the suspect's arrest, he is still booked on several charges. "Crazyhorse Sings" Officers respond to a report of a male suspect exposing himself and brandishing a knife on a street corner. At the scene, the officers interrogate the suspect and conclude that motorists thought the suspect was intentionally exposing himself when he bent over, wearing a skirt. The officers take away his knife (which the suspect was throwing at a wooden target) and educated the man about proper skirt-wearing etiquette. The following are the featured fugitives and others being sought by federal, state or local authorities. The Update (if any) gives current status, previous references, or related information.

Markeith Lamar Braxton (Murder, Armed Robbery) -- On the morning of January 11, 1997, Igor Razilov, a hard-working Russian immigrant with a wife and two children, was sitting behind the safety of bulletproof glass in a South Central Los Angeles pawn shop. His boss, Tony, had gone to the bank, and Igor was working alone. That's when, police say, Markeith Braxton and his partner in crime walked through the front door. The scene that unfolded that morning was caught on a disturbing video surveillance tape. Posing as customers, the two suspects asked for assistance with a television set, and Igor left his cage. After he helped them and returned, they called for help again. Again, the unsuspecting victim exposed himself to danger, and it came. The robbers tried to wrestle him to the ground and get behind the counter, and when Igor fought back, police say, Braxton pulled his 9mm Glock pistol and shot him through the head. The suspects immediately panicked and ran out the door empty-handed, only to find that their getaway driver had panicked as well, and left without them. They fled on foot and disappeared into the vast Los Angeles metropolis. Police had plenty of evidence - the tape, the murder weapon, fingerprints, and a ring with the initial "J." However they had no suspects until a year later, when someone caved in. In January 1998, a former jailhouse informant was arrested on a narcotics charge, and wanted to make a deal. He told police that on the morning of Igor's murder, three frightened men showed up at his house and asked him to get rid of their blood-stained clothing. But the informant liked the style of one shirt, and thought it could be salvaged. The shirt was still at his house, still stained with Igor's blood. The informant then did one better. He gave them the name James Dulaney, Braxton's alleged accomplice, who police say was the one who dropped the ring at the scene. Next to be arrested was the alleged driver. Only Braxton remains at large, and police are hoping he won't stay on the streets long. Looking for more leads, Detective Bill Smith of the LAPD took the surveillance tape to the suspect's mother. Horrified, she claimed that there is no doubt that her son is the one on the tape, and asked him to turn himself in: "I don't know what I am gonna do if something happens to you, man, so please just contact someone, Markeith, please. I love you." If Braxton is convicted, he could face the death penalty. Braxton, whose nickname is "Chilly", has a birthmark on his left thigh, a 1" scar near his right eye and a scar above his left knee. He is an alleged member of the 8-Trey Crips streeg gang. Braxton is 21, 5'10" and 165 pounds. (See Show #460, OAD 8/2/97)

Unknown (Armed Bank Robbery) -- FBI agents are looking for a bank robber who likes to blend in. His methods and manner, however, are unmistakable. As he walks into a bank, he looks just like any other well-dressed businessman on his lunch break from work. But "Tierob," as agents call him, seems to think his work is making large withdrawals at gunpoint. Tierob has

so far hit at least 20 banks in 19 cities with alarming regularity. Agents remark that he seems to think he is just going in to cash his paycheck. He waits in line like any other customer, but when he reaches the teller, he hands her a note and shows his shiny pistol. His notes ask for a specific amount of money - usually in the range of \$5,000 -- and demand that the teller wait a specified number of seconds before sounding the alarm. Agents fear that Tierob may be growing bored with his work and professional demeanor. During recent robberies, he has grown more threatening, and on one occasion, he spun his pistol like a roulette wheel, and dared the teller to grab it. Latest reports suggest that Tierob may have moved to Florida, but there is no indication that he plans to retire. The suspect usually wears dark blue blazer or suit, colored dress shirt, paisley or floral tie, and black shoes. He occasionally wears a mustache or eyeglasses. He has a receding hairline, parted on left side with a possible bald spot on upper left head. He usually carries a canvas shoulder bag or soft-sided briefcase. The suspect is 45-55, 5'7"-5'10" and 200 pounds.

Daniel Fling (Murder) -- Friends, family, and associates describe Daniel Fling as driven, ambitious, and full of promise. After completing high school and college in just six years, the son of a prominent Texas attorney chose to follow in his father's footsteps by enrolling at the University of Oklahoma Law School. At the age of 24, he was just shy of graduation when he met Kathryn Canning -- a meeting that would change both of their lives forever. Kathryn had studied hard to make the grade at University of Oklahoma Law School, but found herself struggling. She needed help, and Daniel's academic reputation suggested to her that he was just the sort of help she needed. His other reputation as something of a loner wasn't her concern. But, Kathryn says, as they studied together for long hours, Fling soon became obsessed with his classmate. His phone calls and conversations grew more personal and more suggestive. Before long she realized that he was determined to possess her. Kathryn's heart, however, belonged to another. She had been seeing 35-year-old Greg Randall who would regularly drive 160 miles from Ft. Worth to be with Kathryn. One of these trips placed him at Kathryn's door as she was studying with Fling. As Kathryn and Greg embraced, Kathryn noticed that Fling's expression had become an icy stare. She believes that this is when he set himself on a course that would change all of their lives forever. On January 8, 1998, Kathryn received a phone call from Greg, who could barely contain himself. He had bought a ring, and if Kathryn would accept it, they would be married. Kathryn, of course, accepted. The next day she received another phone call, but this one was from Fling. She recalls that he told her he was going to make her suffer for not accepting his advances, and that he had a sawed-off shotgun in his car, "ready to go." That day, police found Greg in his doorway, shot in the head at point-blank range with a shotgun. A man matching Fling's description was seen running from the grisly scene. Fling is usually clean-shaven, frequently wears baseball caps and may wear glasses or blue-tinted contact lenses. He has noticeably prominent ears. Police suspect he has ties to militia groups. He is quiet, enjoys camping, and is knowledgeable about computers. He may be driving a rusting maroon,

white-paneled 1984 Ford longbed regular-cab pickup (possibly an F150) with tinted windows, metal bed rails, Texas "Rebel" flag stickers on the rear bumper and window, with Texas license plate TV9 529. Fling is 24, 6'1" and 150 pounds.

Unknown (Murder) -- Twenty-four-year-old Chris Trickle was a star NASCAR driver - a man who could muscle a car around hairpin turns at nearly 200 miles an hour. But on February 9, 1997, Chris was shot in the head as he was driving eastbound on Las Vegas' Blue Diamond Road. He careened off the road, rolled across the desert and crashed into a billboard post. For months, Chris lay in a coma in the hospital, as the crime remained unsolved. For a while, he appeared to have taken a turn for the better. On October 26, 1997, while his girlfriend was making her usual phone call, talking to Chris as she was accustomed to doing, he suddenly spoke these magic words: "I love you." By Thanksgiving, Chris was home and seemed to be on the road to recovery. But on March 25, 1998, he had trouble breathing, and was returned to the hospital. He died later that day. Who would shoot Chris as he drove down the highway, and why? When AMW first aired this case, police thought that a man seen near the site of the shooting would have their answers, but he came forward, and said he hadn't seen anything. Then, finally, a witness came forward with information that could break this case wide open. Although she wanted to remain anonymous, the witness took police to the scene of the crime, and told them what she saw: A car driving through the desert, kicking up a cloud of dust. As the dust cleared, she saw Chris' car off the road. She didn't think it was a problem at the time - just a drunk who had lost his way. But after interviews with police, she was able to describe the make and model of another car that may have been involved in the incident. Police are now looking for a tan Dodge Shadow, Aries or Diplomat with a dark stripe. They know someone knows something, and they need that person to come forward. Selim "Jake" Kelmendi (Aggravated sexual assault, aggravated assault) -- Police say that Selim Kelmendi entered the United States in 1991, seeking asylum from political persecution in his native war-ravaged Yugoslavia. After an alleged run-in with the law in New York, he relocated to the Dallas-Ft. Worth area with his relatives, where they made their bid for the American dream with a pizza parlor in North Richland Hills. Customers say that the food was good and cheap, and the atmosphere was welcoming and fun, but police say that as they served pizza to their patrons, they served up an array of abuse to their employees. Kelmendi is now accused of running the pizza parlor like a petty dictator, using his sidearm to threaten, assault, and sexually harass nearly everyone who worked for him. Female employees were particularly threatened, according to police and victims. When his cousin Niki allegedly impregnated a waitress, investigators claim that Kelmendi held her at gunpoint, and told her that if she didn't abort, she would die. That woman has since relocated, but claims she continues to be harassed by other members of Niki's family, and fears for her life. But the worst of

Kelmendi's alleged offenses took place outside the pizza parlor. "Misty," a customer who liked the restaurant so much she became a waitress, says she was regularly harassed at work by Kelmendi, but never suspected it would follow her home. One day, however, she says opened the door to find Kelmendi on the other side, armed and determined to take her by force. Her pleas, she continues, went unheard, and she says he proceeded to rape her at gunpoint, completely unconcerned that he was being watched by her two young children. Kelmendi and his relatives were finally arrested in March 1995 by U.S. Immigration Officials and North Richland Hills Police, and charged with assault and entering the United States illegally. Kelmendi was further charged with rape. A federal judge later granted Kelmendi political asylum, and he was bailed out by his family. Kelmendi's new residential status apparently didn't give him respect for the law, however, and he fled. Police suspect that he is involved in a wide range of criminal activity, and should be considered armed and extremely dangerous. Kelmendi is a Yugoslavian national, speaks with European accent. He is an avid kickboxer and bodybuilder. Police claim he may be involved with drug dealing and counterfeiting. Kelmendi frequents trendy nightclubs and considers himself a playboy. Kelmendi is 29, 6'3" and 225 pounds. (See Show #409, OAD 5/11/96)

AMW PUBLIC ENEMY #1:

Edward Mathis (Murder, Narcotics Violations) -- Four days before Christmas in 1994, 12-year-old Chris Valdez made a discovery that will stay with him for the rest of his life. While he was away at school, someone broke into his home and murdered his mother and stepfather. He couldn't get inside, but he didn't have to. He could already see the blood. It was everywhere. Chris' mother, Millie Espinal, was found in the bedroom belonging to Chris' 4-year-old brother. Millie had been shot in the face nine times while the child cowered in his closet. In the basement was another body - Chris' stepfather, Ari Espinal. He was lying in a pool of blood from 16 gunshot wounds. Police and federal agents soon had a motive and a suspect for the horrific killings. They say that Ari Espinal had been dealing drugs, and had a large store of cash in his home. Word of his riches had fallen on the ears of a man US Marshals call one of the most ruthless outlaws they have ever put on their 15 Most Wanted List: Eddie "Lucky" Mathis. Marshals say that Mathis made a career out of violence as a drug enforcer. Even his associates in the ruthless narcotics underworld, agents claim, were shaken by his stories of pistol-whippings, robberies, and getaways. Mathis is alleged to routinely carry as many as five handguns at once, and he never leaves home without his bulletproof vest. Law enforcement thought they had Mathis when they stormed an apartment in Atlanta, Georgia, but he made his getaway through the back. Now that he has gotten used to life on the run, officials fear that his next victim may be an unsuspecting police officer who stops him for a traffic violation. "Lucky," they say, is unlikely to ever believe his luck has run out. Mathis has used the aliases Eddie Whitson and

John Whitson. He has a tattoo of a chain around his left bicep and may have a mustache or goatee. He is believed to be heavily armed. Mathis is 34, 5'9" and 190 pounds.

CAPTURED:

Glenn Dale Horner (Attempted murder of police officer, vehicle theft) -- In March 1998, a computer worker made a life-threatening error, one that directly led to the premature release of convicted rapist Glenn Dale Horner. Horner, apparently couldn't believe his luck, and rather than sneak off and just disappear, he allegedly launched a new crime spree that left residents in several states shaken and victimized. His first stop was Mont Belvieu, Texas, where, police say, he broke into the home of Ronald Patterson and stabbed him eleven times, all in the course of a robbery attempt. He then moved on to St. Landry's Parish, Louisiana, to celebrate his unexpected freedom and his alleged crime. He partied late into the night, even having his picture taken with a barmaid. When he left, police say, he treated himself to a Camaro in the parking lot. An hour later, the Eunice, Louisiana police were on his tail, and thought the chase would end at a roadblock. Horner however, was reportedly out of control, and plowed straight through the barriers, ignoring the bullets the police sent after him. A few miles away, he crashed the Camaro, and took off on foot. He didn't resurface until three days later, when police tracked him to a motel in Alexandria, Louisiana. Again, he stole a car and gave them the slip. Perhaps thinking that nothing could stop him now, Horner allegedly moved on to a new city and his next crime. In Mobile, Alabama, a teenage girl grew nervous as a strange man cruised a high school parking lot. Suddenly, he was on her, punching her repeatedly in the face without warning, and attempting to get into her car. She screamed, and the high school's maintenance man rushed to the scene. Horner reportedly ran from the parking lot. Law enforcement had had enough, and when they tracked down Horner in the remote North Carolina woods, they showed up one hundred strong. Horner, however, managed to hold them off for more than six hours before he finally surrendered peacefully.

Vincent Lee Douglas (Murder, Kidnapping) -- On January 23, 1997, Michelle Thomas and her sister Tasha went out to a nightclub in Albany, Georgia for a night of celebration. They didn't suspect that Michelle's ex-boyfriend, Vincent Lee Douglas would be joining them. When Douglas showed up at the club, police say, he ordered Michelle to leave with him. Tasha followed them out to the parking lot, pleading with Douglas not to harm her sister. But as Michelle got in the car, Tasha told police, Douglas pulled a rifle or shotgun from his trunk. Michelle's body was found dumped on the side of US 319, south of Thomasville, the next morning. She had been shot multiple times in the head with a .22 caliber weapon. Douglas has

burn scars on his neck and arms, and may wear a moustache. He may be driving a gray 1994 Mazda Protégé with Georgia tags: TLW-374. Douglas is 28, 5'10" and 170 pounds.

The following are the featured fugitives and others being sought by federal, state or local authorities. The Update (if any) gives current status, previous references, or related information.

Unknown New York East Side Rapist (Rape - 1st Degree, Sodomy, Robbery) -- New York City's Upper East Side is an area with a reputation for the chic: chic stores, chic addresses, and chic women. But there's a dark side to the East Side. For the last three years it's been the hunting ground for a serial rapist. So far he's raped at least 14 women. Each one was attacked as she entered her apartment building after dark. None of the buildings had a doorman. The attacks have all taken place from 64th to 95th Streets, between Lexington and York Avenues - an area the rapist seems to know very well. There are few clues to his identity. Ironically, each victim has described the rapist as an angelic-looking man with a baby face and the full cheeks of a cherub. But this man is neither virtuous nor moral. He's been scared off or fought off while trying to attack several women, but he's never given up his evil hunt. He has, however, left a pattern - the predator has always called off the hunt during the months of May, June, July, February, and December. This may indicate that the suspect has a seasonal job, such as work on a cruise line, that takes his terror temporarily out of the city. He could, detectives speculate, also be a student in the city who leaves when school is out. Either way, all detectives are sure is that as long as he is in New York, women on the Upper East Side will continue to be threatened. The suspect has very smooth skin, a slight mustache, and large brown eyes with long eyelashes. He is approximately 25, 5'11", and 190 pounds.

Tomas Navarro Alcantar (Murder) -- Tomas Navarro Alcantar loved his 17-year-old daughter, America. Trouble is, he loved her too much -- too much to let her live her own life. When America fell in love with 16-year-old Cesar Vasquez, Alcantar insisted that the young couple marry. At first they resisted, saying that they were too young to marry, but Alcantar was relentless, and Cesar and America finally gave in. On June 3, 1995, the teenagers were married at the Circus, Circus Casino in Las Vegas. After the marriage the newlyweds moved into a garage behind Alcantar's house in Los Angeles. It was no honeymoon. After nearly four months, Cesar wanted to move back in with his family so that he could finish high school and create a real future for America. On November 15, 1995, Cesar began packing his car to go home. Alcantar came home unexpectedly. Deputies say he flew into a rage, pulled out a gun and shot Cesar six times - once even after America threw herself on Cesar. Deputies believe Alcantar fled to Mexico immediately after the murder, but they believe he's now slipped back into the USA and may be in the Pacific Northwest. Alcantar has worked as a cook in fast food restaurants. He is 52, 5'5" and 160 pounds. (See Show #1019, OAD 4/12/97)

Hugo Zarco (murder) -- It was Memorial Day in 1994, and 16-year-old Michael Bruce was celebrating at a cookout in the suburb of Hoffman Estates, 50 miles from Chicago. As a girl rode by on a bicycle, Michael reportedly shouted an obscene comment. It was a mistake he wouldn't live to regret. The girl rode home, and allegedly told her brother Hugo Zarco, a reputed member of the KGB, or Krazy Getdown Boys street gang. Zarco and his sister returned to the party, and, according to witnesses, tried to pick a fight with Michael. Police were called, and the guests sent home, but police say Zarco wouldn't let it go. Ten minutes after the police left, Zarco was allegedly back at the scene, armed with a brick and a knife. Reports say that he threw the brick through a window and demanded to see Michael on the front lawn. Michael complied, and was stabbed to death. Michael's friends didn't realize what had happened as Zarco allegedly walked away. Zarco is a U.S. citizen, but reportedly has family in Salvatierra, Mexico, near Guadalajara, where he was last seen. Zarco has scars on his forehead, bushy eyebrows, and may have shoulder-length hair and a moustache. He has a five-year-old daughter in Illinois. Zarco is 23, 5'4" and 108 pounds.

Kevin Louis Vermette (Second Degree Murder (3), Attempted Murder) -- Folks around Kitimat, British Columbia always thought Kevin Vermette was a curious man. A quiet loner with a passion for restoring old cars, he lived and worked at the Kitimat Hotel. Some in town called him a "silent psycho." On July 12, 1997, police say Vermette exploded. Four young men - 20-year-old Mark Teves, 20-year-old Michael Mauro, 21-year-old David Nunes, and 20-year-old Donny Oliveira stopped at Kitimat's Hirsch-Creek Park that evening. At 9:30, fishermen heard eight gunshots. When police arrived, they found all four young men lying on the ground in a pool of blood. Only Donny Oliveira was still alive - he was rushed to a hospital by helicopter. Witness accounts and evidence left at the scene led investigators to suspect Vermette. When Mounties went to Vermette's hotel room to question him, they discovered he had cleared out. Armed and dangerous, he's taken to the woods, but police say he could resurface anywhere. Vermette never drinks or smokes and is a health food and fitness enthusiast. He has tattoos on his upper arms. He may be wearing wire-rimmed glasses. Vermette is 43, 5'8" and 165 pounds. (See Show #458, OAD 7/19/97)

Michael Patrick Cleary (Murder - 3 counts, Felony Firearms Violation) -- A triple murder at a rustic cabin in Michigan has a task force desperate to catch the suspect, Michael Patrick Cleary. He's been described by police and acquaintances as a paranoid schizophrenic and a crack cocaine abuser - a lethal combination. Police say on the evening of October 3, 1997, Cleary and his friend, Dan Charles went to visit Max Handley and his wife, Brenda Hurley. The

couple lived in a cabin along Lake Van Alken - just outside South Haven, Michigan. Police say Max wanted to buy a gun from Cleary. Cleary had brought the gun, but police say he got greedy - he used the gun to rob and kill Max and Brenda as well as his own friend, Dan. Cleary's a survivalist who knows the nearby Allegan State Game Forest well. When the carnage was discovered the next morning, state and county police mounted a massive ground and air search for him. Two days later searchers discovered Cleary's red pickup truck parked at a crude campsite. Among the camping gear was a cache of weapons, including the gun police say was used in the triple murder. Cleary never returned to his campsite, but police believe he may be driving a stolen dark blue 1977 or 1978 Ford LTD II. Cleary has several tattoos including: Right forearm - dagger Left or right biceps - "Marilynn" Left or right biceps - star with a "6" next to each point. He has a receding hairline and has cut or shaved his hair very short. Cleary is 40, 5'8" and 190 pounds. (See Show #474, OAD 11/15/97)

Eric Robert Rudolph (Causing the Death of a Person, Use of an Explosive) -- A moonlighting police officer becomes the first fatality of anti-abortion bombings. Friends of slain Officer Robert Sanderson of the Birmingham Police Department, Alabama, can't see his death as part of a political action. Even though he was moonlighting as a security guard for a family planning clinic, they say he was outside of the abortion controversy - that he was just doing his job, that he was enforcing the law. But on January 29, 1998, someone took his life with a cowardly and indiscriminate homemade bomb loaded with nails - a bomb designed to kill and maim, not just to damage property. The same bomb seriously injured nurse Emily Lyons as she opened the clinic, depriving her of sight in her left eye and leaving her with several broken bones and burns. Authorities now say that man is Eric Robert Rudolph, a mysterious and reclusive man from the rugged mountains of North Carolina. Immediately after the bomb went off, witnesses saw a man wearing a wig fleeing the scene. Three witnesses saw his truck pull away, and were able to provide a description and a license plate number. The truck was then traced to Rudolph, but he had already made his escape. Police found Rudolph's truck in a pasture near Murphy, North Carolina on February 7, 1998. They believe the experienced woodsman may be hiding out somewhere in the Great Smokey Mountains, but they also believe that his rage, now unleashed, will cause him to strike again. Rudolph has used the alias Bob Randolph. He is estranged from his family. He spent 18 months in the US Army, but has a reputation for anti-government views. He is an experienced woodsman who completed army survival training. Rudolph is 31, 5'11", and 150 pounds. The case is now being pursued by a task force called "Sandbomb". They now believe he may have joined a cult, possibly The Army of God, who claims responsibility for the Birmingham bombing. Authorities have now offered a \$100,000 reward for information leading to Rudolph's arrest. (See Shows #483, #485 and 487, OADs 2/21/98, 3/14/98 and 3/28/98)

Donald Richard Davis, Jr. (Aggravated Sexual Assault, Failure to Appear) -- In early 1995, the normally safe and quiet Texas A & M campus became the hunting ground for a sexual predator. An unidentified man abducted young coeds by holding a knife to their throats, then sexually assaulted them. Not only was the attacker brazen in his approach, he left behind undeniable physical evidence. The women described him as young and clean cut. They speculated he might be a student himself. Trouble was, he looked so common, so all-American, that police didn't have any firm leads on his identity. Then in November 1995, one of the victims went to a local grocery store. Going through the checkout line, she began trembling and shaking; police say she recognized the clerk as her attacker. He was Don Richard Davis, an architecture student at Texas A & M. A blood sample taken from Davis matched the DNA in the crime scene evidence. He was charged with the sexual assault of two women, but a judge let him out on \$100,000 bond. In August 1996, Don Davis' parents reported that he had stolen their Nissan Sentra and had disappeared. The car was found abandoned in Little Rock, Arkansas, but there was no sign of Davis. Now police say that Davis' parents actually helped their son flee. Don Davis, Sr. pled guilty to Hindering the Apprehension of a Felon. In June 1997, Don Davis issued this message to his son: "Mom and Dad will face this with ya...this is your call to come home. It's time." Well, Davis, Jr. didn't turn himself in, and on June 20, his father began serving a six month term in Brazos County, Texas. On January 11, 1998, police got word of Davis' new location and lifestyle. In Dearborn, Michigan, police nabbed a man they thought was a vagrant in a department store. He was allegedly shoplifting items essential for survival in a Michigan winter - socks, gloves, and a wool cap. Davis reportedly gave them a false name, and was released without charge. Cold, probably scared, and most likely homeless, Davis is believed to still be in Michigan, possibly on the streets or in a homeless shelter. Davis usually wears casual student attire. His weight fluctuates. He has been avid jogger. Davis is a soft spoken ladies' man. He holds BA in architecture. Davis may have a Fu Man Chu style mustache. Davis is 24, 5'10" and 200 pounds. On May 25, 1996, 19-year-old Kristin Smart disappeared under very mysterious circumstances from the campus of California Polytechnic in San Luis Obispo. While her body has never been found, sadly, her family can only assume that she was murdered. In fact, the Smarts believe they know the identity of Kristin's killer - yet they cannot find justice. On May 24, 1996, Kristin and her friends attended a party in the quiet suburb of San Luis Obispo, where Kristin was a freshman at California Polytechnic. There, according to partygoers, she met fellow student, Paul Flores. Kristin had reportedly been drinking, and at about 1:30 a.m., one of her female friends offered to accompany her on the short walk back to the dorms. Flores, witnesses say, joined them as they were leaving. As they arrived at the dorms, Kristin's friend split off from the other two, as her dorm was in the opposite direction. She says she was assured by Flores that he would get Kristin home safely. But Kristin never made it home. Despite a search by authorities and an enormous effort by Kristin's own family, police still haven't uncovered enough information to name a suspect. However, they say, all leads point to the man who saw her last - Paul Flores. Flores was reportedly seen with bruises on his face the next day, including a mild black eye. When questioned by police, they report that he provided inconsistent statements, and then suddenly refused to cooperate, communicating only through his lawyer. Weeks after Kristin disappeared, Flores reportedly dropped out of school and moved off campus. Then came, police say, the most damning piece of evidence yet - cadaver-sniffing dogs were brought on campus to inspect mattresses throughout the school. Handlers claimed that the only one they were in the least drawn to was the one used by Paul Flores. But that was a full month after Kristin disappeared, and when a search warrant was served on his parents' home, no evidence was found. Flores remains a free man. Despite the fact that police are convinced that he either did something or knows something, their hands are tied. Meanwhile, the Smart family suffers one unbearable day after another, unsure that they will ever know the full story of what happened to their daughter. Karen left town almost immediately after the police contacted her, and was arrested some time later. Although she was sentenced to two years in prison for custodial interference, she has continued to refuse to disclose Elisabeth's location. Elisabeth has crooked upper front teeth and takes Ritalin for hyperactivity.

Hero Cop -- In 1997, Arkansas State Trooper Ted Grigson answered his door to find the son of his distant neighbor, Hans Hoeler, in a state of panic. Hans had fallen from a tree, injuring his back and head, and had sent his son to call for help. They never could have guessed how much help Ted would be. When Ted got to the scene, he found Hans and his wife Tanya crying and praying. Hans couldn't feel his legs, arms, or hands. The auction made enough money to help Hans continue his physical therapy, and prepare to return home. But Ted wasn't done yet. As Hans was getting ready to come home, Ted helped remodel the farmhouse to accommodate Hans' wheelchair. Ted will always remember his days as a farmhand - the first experience he had with the long hours and backbreaking work that puts food on our tables. But now he can rest, knowing that with his help, Hans' farm may yet survive, and knowing that he will keep his promises, no matter how difficult.

Ava Egg Scam -- Ava, of Nassau County, New York, had a reputation as the bane of evil spirits everywhere, but when one of her clients became suspicious, she called the police. Detectives came to the client's house and installed a hidden camera to catch the alleged con artist in the act. AMW is proud to bring you this cautionary tale, caught on tape. The client's suspicions were fueled by Ava's insistence that the demons that were ruining her life had to be bought off by \$20,000. She allegedly instructed her client to stuff the cash into her underwear and parade around the house for a few days before the final rites were performed. Then Ava

made a house call with her ultimate weapon - a good luck egg wrapped in paper towels. Apparently, these demons were determined. The egg was broken, and the evil spirits, according to Ava, had invaded the 20 grand! She allegedly told her client that the money was now worthless, and would have to be "sacrificed." This, she reportedly said, she could do alone, at a graveyard on her way home.

The following are the featured fugitives and others being sought by federal, state or local authorities. The Update (if any) gives current status, previous references, or related information.

Shannon Marie Ludington (Aggravated Kidnapping, Aggravated Robbery)

Jimmie Neal Hays (Aggravated Kidnapping, Aggravated Robbery) -- Friends and family of Shannon Marie Ludington were appalled when she started dating Jimmie Neal Hays. For one thing, the former meat packer is more than ten years older than Shannon, a 17-year-old accomplished high school basketball player. And besides, they say, he likes to gamble. But nothing in Hays' past or in their odd but devoted relationship could prepare Ludington's family and friends for the gamble police say they have taken with their own lives and the lives of two of their victims. Officials claim that Ludington and Hays have hit the road in search of a Bonnie-and-Clyde style romance, and they didn't have to look far to get started. Their first stop, say police, was the home of Sheriff's Deputy Gary Nelson, an old friend of Hays. Once inside, apparently just for a visit, Deputy Nelson says Hays examined his gun collection, and suddenly announced that he was helping himself to a few choice pieces. Nelson couldn't believe his ears, but Hays assured him that this was no joke. Investigators say that the couple made their next stop in Amarillo, Texas, where they posed as potential car buyers and took salesman Gil Reeves for a wild test drive. Once inside the car and away from the dealership, Gil says they told him they were planning to "borrow" the Jeep, and backed up their plan with their ill-gotten guns. One hundred miles away from Amarillo, a very nervous Gil was tied to a tree with duct tape and abandoned. Now no one knows where they young suspected bandits will turn up next, but they still have a chance to save their futures. If they are indeed acting out a fantasy, police say, they should remember that they could inadvertently kill someone, or be killed by one of their potential victims. The couple may be traveling in a charcoal-gray 4-wheel drive Jeep Grand Cherokee Limited. Vehicle has no registration or inspection stickers. Shannon Ludington is tall and athletic. She wears her hair just above her shoulders. She smokes cigarettes and is a suspected methamphetamine user. Ludington is 17, 6'1" and 140 pounds. Jimmie Hays may have a reddish-orange mustache and/or goatee. He has a distinctive bump on bridge of nose. Hays has worked in jails, and as meat packer, and has claimed to be an undercover police officer. He likes to gamble, drinks beer, and is a suspected methamphetamine user. Hays is 29, 5'11" and 180 pounds.

Unknown (Murder) -- Chad Frantzich lived a life of adventure, a life on the edge. At the age of twenty-five, he had traveled extensively through England in a VW bus, and had fed his hunger for excitement by exploring South America, where he traveled mostly by foot or mountain bike. Even though he was held up at gunpoint during his South American travels, he kept his spirits high, and completed his trip safely. In November 1996, he returned home to Southern California to surprise his parents for Thanksgiving. His girlfriend, Cara, picked him up at the border town of Tijuana, and the couple drove north toward Chad's home. In Laguna Beach, they stopped near a record store on Pacific Coast Highway, and Chad went inside to buy a CD while Cara waited in her car. Suddenly, Cara heard brakes squeal, and looked up to see a white pick-up truck with a driver and a single passenger stop just ahead. Without realizing what had happened, she focused in on the license plate, and remembered the partial number: 5H2. Then, as the truck sped away, she realized that her boyfriend was lying injured on the pavement. He had been hit by the truck. Chad died hours later in the hospital, before he even had a chance to see his parents. Although police have a description and a partial license plate, they have been unable to find the suspect's vehicle among the millions of cars registered in California. As precious time slips away, Chad's family still holds out hope that their offer of a \$2,000 reward will finally bring Chad's killer to justice. The suspect may be driving a white or cream two-tone Ford or Dodge pickup truck. The license plate starts with 5H2, and may contain an 8. The truck is probably a recent model and may have front-end damage.

Andres Escobar (Kidnapping of Irma Luna) -- Irma Luna (See below) was just 14 when police in Medina, New York say she was abducted by Andres Escobar, now 40 years old. On October 21, 1993, investigators claim, Escobar's black truck bearing a Georgia license plate was seen driving toward Irma as she walked home from school. She hasn't been seen since. According to investigators, this wasn't Escobar's first attempt to possess Irma. In April 1993, he was arrested while traveling through Georgia with Irma. Doris Edith Inzunza

Age: 41 Height: 5'1"

Weight: 110 pounds

Friends and family are desperately hoping that the life of Doris Inzunza, a life of triumph over adversity, hasn't come to a tragic end. Doris, an inspiration to countless stalking victims in the Sacramento, California area, disappeared from her home in Ranch Cordova on August 26, 1997, leaving four children, a fiancée, and an aggravating mystery behind. Back in 1993, Doris was reportedly the victim of an abusive husband-turned-stalker, Rick Morales, who, after twelve years of marriage and four children, just couldn't let go. Doris reported that her ex-husband was out to terrorize her in any way possible - he allegedly slashed her tires, broke windows, and stole her car. Finally, she says, he burned down her house. Although the courts didn't put Morales behind bars for arson, they did slap a sentence on him for violating a restraining order. Doris got on with her life, and soon met Charles Mosley, a former Air Force officer and paralegal. For three years, the relationship grew, but when it turned unpredictable and she tried to break it off, Mosley beat and blackmailed her. Again, she sought a restraining order, and again she got one. Doris had by now had enough of being a punching bag for abusive males. She became one of the pioneer members of "Sacramento Survivors of Stalking," not only offering solace to women in

similar circumstances, but taking on what she saw as an ignorant and dismissive legal system. As her confidence grew, she began to feel ready to trust someone again, and began a relationship with a longtime family friend. They were engaged in August of 1997. Late at night on August 26, Doris was doing household chores while her children slept. According to friends and family, that night was one of the few nights her guard was down - as she worked, the house alarm was off and the garage door was open. One of the children remembers seeing her around midnight, when he got up for a drink of water. A neighbor remembers seeing her at 12:30 a.m. in front of her house. No one has seen her since. Police launched a massive search almost immediately, and friends and relatives have continued the grim search along riverbeds and in forests. They fear the worst, but haven't yet given up hope. Doris, they say, is a survivor, and they pray that she will survive this ordeal, wherever she may be. Doris Inzunza has pierced ears and a caesarian scar on her stomach. When last seen, she was wearing a gold watch on her right wrist.

John Steven Conaway

Height: 5'10"

Weight: 140 pounds

Police are searching for John Steven Conaway, who was last seen between 10:00 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. at Buffalo Joe's, on 13th and D streets in Omaha, Nebraska, near Roseblat Stadium. John usually wears a baseball cap and glasses, and needs insulin for diabetes. He was last seen wearing long-sleeve, button down shirt with blue vertical stripes and tan pants, driving his gold 1989 Ford Taurus 4-door, Iowa license #977-CLN. He wears a mustache and goatee.

Kristen Modafferi

Age: 18 Height: 5'8"

Weight: 140 pounds

Eighteen-year-old Kristen Modafferi planned to spend the summer in the San Francisco Bay area attending a summer photography course at UC Berkley. But after only three weeks, she vanished without a trace. It was June 23, 1997. Kristen left her job at Spinelli's Coffee Shop in San Francisco's Crocker Gallery Mall at 3 p.m. She asked coworkers for directions to the beach in the Lands End area. Kristen was never seen again. Bloodhounds traced her scent from the coffee shop to the Geary Street #38 bus. Then they picked it up again at Sutro Park Beach -- near Lands End Beach. But the trail ends there. (See Shows #469 and 477, OADs 10/11/97 and 12/13/97)

UPDATES:

Francis Joseph Riley (Armed Bank Robbery) -- FBI agents are looking for a bank robber who likes to blend in. His methods and manner, however, are unmistakable. As he walks

into a bank, he looks just like any other well-dressed businessman on his lunch break from work. But "Tierob," as agents call him, seems to think his work is making large withdrawals at gunpoint. Tierob has so far hit at least 20 banks in 19 cities with alarming regularity. Agents remark that he seems to think he is just going in to cash his paycheck. He waits in line like any other customer, but when he reaches the teller, he hands her a note and shows his shiny pistol. His notes ask for a specific amount of money - usually in the range of \$5,000 -- and demand that the teller wait a specified number of seconds before sounding the alarm. Agents fear that Tierob may be growing bored with his work and professional demeanor. During recent robberies, he has grown more threatening, and on one occasion, he spun his pistol like a roulette wheel, and dared the teller to grab it. Latest reports suggest that Tierob may have moved to Florida, but there is no indication that he plans to retire. The suspect usually wears dark blue blazer or suit, colored dress shirt, paisley or floral tie, and black shoes. He occasionally wears a mustache or eyeglasses. He has a receding hairline, parted on left side with a possible bald spot on upper left head. He usually carries a canvas shoulder bag or soft-sided briefcase. Following the initial broadcast, an anonymous tipster gave authorities "Tierob's" name: Francis Joseph Riley. Riley has a history of bank robbery going back nearly thirty years. He has the name "Kathy" tattooed on his arm. Riley is 55, 5'9" and 200 pounds. (See Show #488, OAD 4/4/98)

Unknown (Murder) -- "We had an accident. I didn't deserve this. He pulled out a gun and shot me. Oh please, help me." 47-year-old Richard Aderson was a mild-mannered Assistant Superintendent at the Valley Central School District in New York. Driving home on I-84 in his 1995 gray Volvo one evening, Richard had a chance encounter with a killer. It happened on February 5, 1997. At about 5:50 p.m. Richard crossed the Newburgh-Beacon Bridge and paid a toll. According to police and witnesses, a late model green Jeep Cherokee with New Hampshire plates was traveling next to Aderson in the right lane; about three miles past the toll the green Jeep drifted into Richard's lane and sideswiped the Volvo. Both drivers pulled over to exchange information, but something went wrong. An argument broke out. Then the Jeep's driver pulled out an automatic pistol and shot Richard in the chest. As the Jeep roared off, Richard struggled back to his Volvo and used his cell phone to call 911. Though mortally wounded, he gave police a full description of his location and his killer. His dying description, coupled with eyewitness accounts, have given police the information they needed to produce a composite. But the new clues put a possibly fearful and sinister twist on the events of that night. Police have released part of the 911 tape that may shed further light on the identity of Richard's killer. Richard reportedly told the operator that his killer claimed he was a cop. While this information is startling, police caution that they have not drawn any definite conclusions from Richard's dying statement. Police have also learned that the law firm of McLane, Graf and Raulerson of Manchester, New Hampshire, had been making inquiries into the death of Richard Aderson. Police immediately demanded that the law firm provide any information they may have about the identity of the killer, but although an attorney with the firm confirmed that he is representing someone who may know something, he claims attorney-client privilege prevents him from cooperating. Police are still searching for witnesses in this tragic case. The suspect is balding, with remaining hair curly. He may wear, or have recently shaved, a beard. He may wear glasses.

He may live in - or own property in - New Hampshire. He may own or drive a green Jeep Cherokee and may frequently use I-84 in New York. (See Shows #1022 and 472, OADs 5/2/97 and 11/1/97)

FEATURE:

Healing The Children -- So many of us take our health for granted that we might not even realize that we owe that health to our nation's superb doctors and the availability of healthcare. In most of the world, things are very different. Children grow up with infirmities and injuries that we would never dream of letting our own children live with - and only because they lack access to our level of technology and skill. Healing the Children is trying to change that - one child at a time. Recently, Healing the Children learned of the case of Oscar Vaca of Ecuador, who was blind from birth due to a genetic defect. It took an amazing effort by volunteers and doctors, but Oscar was finally allowed to travel to the United States to receive a cornea transplant that has restored his sight. The air travel was covered by American Airlines' Miles for Kids in Need program, which allows frequent flyers to donate their miles back to the airline for use by children like Oscar. Two Ecuadorian missionaries pitched in to coordinate Oscar's travel and work with his family, and Debbie O'Rourke, founder of the New Mexico chapter of Healing The Children, deserves credit for coordinating the stateside effort. But perhaps the key to the entire effort lay with ten-year-old Anthony Coccia. Anthony was killed in a traffic accident in New Mexico, but before he died, the boy actually mentioned to his mother that he wanted to be an organ donor. The donation arrived just as hope was dwindling that a cornea for Oscar would ever be found. Thanks to these volunteers and countless others, a young boy in Ecuador can finally see his mother with his own two eyes.

The following are the featured fugitives and others being sought by federal, state or local authorities. The Update (if any) gives current status, previous references, or related information.

Jeffrey Scott Durham (Armed Bank Robbery, Grand Theft, Resisting Officer) -- Jeffrey Durham is wanted for a string of bank robberies that are remarkable for their precision timing, and frightening for the high-grade military style hardware used by the suspects. So far, police say, Durham has successfully robbed five banks and attempted a sixth. Police and the FBI fear, with each robbery growing more violent than the last, that it is only a matter of time before Durham's weapon claims a life. According to officials, Jeffrey Durham has been promoting himself in the criminal underworld for most of his life. Allegedly starting with small-time burglary and auto theft, police say that by 1992 he had his eyes on bigger prizes - and had an unusual scheme for getting them. Police in Florida claim that he was one of the boldest thieves they have ever seen - scaling the outside walls of million-dollar condos and making off with the goodies inside. Even after an informant fingered Durham, even after constant surveillance was established, the cops still couldn't catch him in the act. Durham, they allege, had connections that allowed him to run the plates on undercover cars. Once their cover was blown, Durham would actually taunt the officers watching him. Eventually, the cops had enough, and were able to put him away for possession of stolen property. He was convicted and sent to prison, but, officials claim, he was far from learning his lesson by the time he got out. His next career move, they say, would take him out of low-profile robberies and directly into the spotlight. Allegedly taking his inspiration from the Robert DeNiro role in the movie "Heat," Durham reportedly partnered himself with a man named Lloyd Clayton for the bank heists. Police say the pair always arrived in a stolen van and armed themselves with AK-47s. They then reportedly donned boots, gloves, masks, and a flight suit, and completed the uniform with FBI jackets to serve as a distraction in case the real authorities showed up. Once at the bank, witnesses say their timing never faltered. Clayton would allegedly watch the door and the clock while Durham reportedly jumped the counter and stuffed his bags. The operation never took more than 55 seconds, with the Clayton allegedly keeping a close watch on the time. If the patrons didn't move fast enough, witnesses say, the robbers would immediately start letting loose with their powerful guns, injuring tellers behind the counter. But robbing banks wasn't the only way Durham got attention. Authorities say that after his second robbery, he found time to make an appearance on the "Jerry Springer Show", for an episode about men who fall for transsexuals. Durham was one of those men. His appearance on the show was a brazen act, considering that he was allegedly again on the wrong side of the law, but perhaps he thought nothing could go wrong. Finally, following a September 5, 1997 robbery in St. Petersburg, Florida, something went wrong. One of the tellers slipped a dye pack in with the money, and tainted the entire score. Thinking he could pass this dirty money, Clayton reportedly used it to pay a cab in Clearwater, Florida after a night of heavy

partying. This led police directly to his hotel room, where he was arrested. They say he later confessed to his part in the robberies, and fingered Durham. But the most disturbing piece of information he told police was that Durham is determined and driven to never go back to jail. He claims anyone who tries to stop Durham will spark a firefight, and Durham will keep firing until he is free or dead. Durham was finally tracked down to Covington, Kentucky, where the FBI says he was living with a girlfriend and her child. Durham was one step ahead, but agents say he left behind plenty of evidence - two AK-47s, masks, and more dye-stained money. From Covington, agents claim, Durham moved on to Florence, Kentucky, where he allegedly stole a Green Ford Explorer from a dealership, using a fake ID to get a test drive, and made his getaway complete, at least for now. Durham has used several aliases, including William Anthony Dezar, Jeffrey Mullens, Jeffrey Mullins, Christopher Jason, Raymon Phillips, Corey Stevenson, Lindsay Williams, and Jeffrey Dusham. He has a Playboy bunny tattoo on his right hip. Durham works out regularly and has a muscular build. Durham is a health nut who mostly eats salads and constantly drinks bottled water. He also constantly applies Chapstick. His hair bleached by the sun, and a frequently wears fishing hats. Durham changes appearance his frequently with facial hair, eye-glasses, different lengths of hair, and different styles of clothing. He is a machine gun fanatic who reads firearms, tactical, and survivalist magazines. He also frequents public libraries. He may frequent gay/transvestite clubs or stripper bars. He may be driving a stolen green Ford Explorer, Kentucky plates DSX-249. Durham is 33, 5'10" and 160 pounds.

Mario Pallango (Sexual Battery of a Child) -- When the eldest daughter of Mario Pallango's girlfriend turned nine in 1992, her life was turned upside down. That was when, police say, Pallango decided she was old enough to rape. Repeatedly, she was made to engage in sexual acts with both Pallango and her mother, according to police. Investigators also maintain that Pallango continued the abuse when the mother was away from their home in Margate, Florida. Three years later, officials continue, the girlfriend's second daughter turned nine, and was similarly physically forced to engage in lewd sexual acts with Pallango and his girlfriend. Now, both girls have been separated from their mother, who is in police custody and has had her parental rights terminated. Pallango, however, disappeared from the Margate area on March 30, 1998. Detectives believe he may be hiding in Orlando, Florida. Pallango, who has used the alias Marco Antonio Diaz, is a native Ecuadorian who speaks English with a Spanish accent, but may pretend to only speak Spanish. He wears prescription eyeglasses, smokes cigars, and drinks Budweiser beer (1-2 six packs a day). Police believe he is no longer driving a car. He may be staying in short term housing. Pallango works as a electrician. If questioned he may say he is fleeing tax evasion charge. Pallango is 48, 5'6" and 270 pounds.

Fernando Alfaro (Grand Theft) -- On January 10, 1997, police say Alvaro Valdez and Fernando Alfaro broke into the Palm Beach mansion of Kathleen Ford, widow of automobile magnate Henry Ford II, and made off with a number of items from her priceless jewelry collection, including a 16-inch diamond and ruby necklace, set with 55 dazzling pear-shaped marquise-cut diamonds. With few leads and little hope of recovering the heirlooms, police appealed to the public on America's Most Wanted and posted photographs of the jewels on the Palm Beach Police website. Kathleen, meanwhile, offered a \$500,000 reward for information, and when the first AMW broadcast yielded no tips, she upped the reward to a staggering one million dollars. The reward was announced on the second AMW broadcast of the story, but the

capture of the thief was not a direct result of the feature. On December 2, 1997, authorities received a call from a jewelry dealer in Atlanta, Georgia. They report that the dealer had purchased some outstanding jewelry, and noticed during his wanderings on the internet that some of the pieces he had acquired were reported stolen on the Palm Beach Police website. His tip led police to a suspected jewelry fence, Barry Marshall, who led them to Alvaro Valdez. Valdez was arrested by the FBI and Palm Beach Police at his home in Margate, a suburb of Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. At a press conference, authorities announced the break in their case, and said they believe Valdez was involved in at least 80 burglaries. What they don't have are the remaining pieces. These pieces, they say might still be with Valdez's lifelong friend, Fernando Alfaro, who remains at large. Police say Alfaro is a career criminal who arrived on the Florida shores from Cuba during the 1980 Mariel Boatlift. Since then, he has showed up on the wanted lists of a number of South Florida law enforcement agencies, including the Boca Raton Police Department, who say he has committed 26 burglaries in their area alone. He allegedly uses sophisticated electronic communications equipment, the kind you would expect to see on a Secret Service agent. But police claim his professionalism can crack at any time - he may be the most dangerous of the ring, with extensive experience underground and an extremely violent temper. Alfaro has tattoos on his right hand and leg, and a scar on his left thigh. He is a native Cuban, and his wife, Flora Bess, is a Santerian priestess. He may be in the company of fellow suspected burglar Roberto Bea, working with Bea in a lunch coach in South Florida, giving them an opportunity to case wealthy areas. Alfaro is 41, 5'8" and 170 pounds.

During hearings, composites taken from earlier cases where police had chased burglary suspects were

shown to match Valdez. What police don't have yet are the remaining pieces - about five million dollars' worth. These pieces, they say, might still be with Fernando Alfaro, who remains at large. The astute and honest dealer, meanwhile, is waiting to hear about from Kathleen Ford about his reward.

Barry Marshall (Interstate Transfer of Stolen Property) -- On January 10, 1997, police say Alvaro Valdez and Fernando Alfaro broke into the Palm Beach mansion of Kathleen Ford, widow of automobile magnate Henry Ford II, and made off with a number of items from her priceless jewelry collection, including a 16-inch diamond and ruby necklace, set with 55 dazzling pear-shaped marquise-cut diamonds. By leaving the two bottom sections intact, Marshall gave the dealer enough to identify the piece, police say. After getting the dealer's consent, agents claim they taped a call to Marshall, in which the dealer asked him if he could get more emerald pieces. Marshall said he would, and agents followed him to a Dunkin' Donuts in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, where they say they watched him exchange stones for cash in the parking lot with Alvaro Valdez. Valdez was arrested by the FBI and Palm Beach Police at his home in Margate, a suburb of Ft. Lauderdale. When authorities went to Marshall's home, they say his wife agreed to cooperate with their search. She reportedly directed them to a hidden cabinet that contained more than 500 precious stones. None of the recovered stones, however, are from the Ford collection. Police are still looking for the remaining pieces - about five million dollars' worth. These pieces, they say, might still be with Fernando Alfaro, who remains at large.

MISSING:

Amy Bradley

Age: 23 Height: 5'6"
Weight: 115

After a concentrated effort, Amy Bradley's family finally convinced her to come on a cruise with them through the Caribbean. Now, they say, they wish they had never gone. On March 24, 1998, Amy disappeared mysteriously from the balcony of their room as the ship made its way

from Aruba to Curacao. It is a disappearance that has the FBI baffled, and one that they are taking very seriously. After they were finally on board the "Rhapsody of the Seas," Amy, a 23-year-old college basketball player, began to relax and enjoy herself, according to family members. With her parents, Ron and Iva, and her brother, Brad, she explored the port of Aruba, the ship's first stop. That night, after a fancy dinner, Amy and Brad went dancing at the ship's disco as it sailed to the next port. The outgoing young woman cut loose with her brother and a band member, and it wasn't until nearly four in the morning that the two came back to their room. At five a.m., Ron woke up and saw Amy on the balcony, lying in a chaise lounge with her cigarettes beside her. An hour later, he awoke and saw that she was gone. Her cigarettes were still there, as were her shoes. The balcony door was open. He immediately searched the decks, and after 40 minutes, reported the disappearance to ship security. As security combed the public areas of the ship, it landed at Curacao, where several passengers disembarked. Two days later, security searched every corner of the ship, but still, there was no sign of Amy. Clearly, there were three possible answers. The first two are unacceptable to the Bradleys. Amy, they say would never have taken her own life - she had college paid for due to a basketball scholarship and was looking forward to a new job. It is unlikely that she fell over, they say, as the guardrails are four feet high. A coast guard search of the high seas also found no trace of Amy, and that leaves one clear possibility in the minds of the family - she was abducted. Amy has several tattoos including a Tasmanian devil on her left shoulder, a Chinese symbol on her right ankle, a primitive sun at her waistline and a gecko lizard around her navel. Both ears and the top of her left ear are pierced, and she has a navel ring. She wears her hair cut short. Amy is very friendly, active, athletic, and outgoing. She attended college in Longwood, VA on a basketball scholarship. She smokes Marlboro Lights cigarettes, drinks Coca-Cola and Miller Lite. She also likes hard candy. Amy wears all silver jewelry and likes black onyx.

UPDATE:

Alan William Golder (Kidnapping, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny) -- If you discovered Alan Golder in your house, you might think he had stepped out of the pages of GQ Magazine. In reality, he recently stepped out of prison, and officers hope he will be returning soon. After his feature aired on AMW, a man came forward who may be able to help - the suspect's own brother. Golder's younger brother came forward after seeing Golder's profile on AMW, a profile that filled him with concern. He says that Golder is a danger to himself and others because he simply can't stop committing crimes - he is a jewel addict, the brother claims. The only happy end to this story, the brother told AMW, would be if Golder turned himself in. Well-tanned and well-toned, Golder has made quite a name for himself, allegedly ripping off homes of the rich and famous while mixing comfortably with the rock stars and executives of the Sunset Strip crowd in Los Angeles. He even had an author interview him for a biography as he served time in prison for murder. But since he was paroled, he has, officials say, returned to what he knows best - burglary. In 1978 Golder allegedly used two accomplices - Boonert Thanarakol and Surajit Sae Sow - to rob a home in Old Brookville, New York. The robbery left the homeowner dead, and a trail of evidence led directly to Golder, who was convicted and sentenced to 15 years to life. Paroled in 1996 after 16 years behind bars, Golder told his parole officer that he wanted to be a jeweler, bartender, or a fitness trainer, but no one would hire him. Before long, police say, he was underground again, and back at work. Golder is now wanted for over 70 robberies in New

England that have allegedly netted him more than a million dollars in cash and jewels. Described as slick, fearless, and cunning, Golder reportedly only strikes when residents are home and alarms are off. While the unsuspecting victims are away from the bedroom, police say he climbs their outside walls with the agility of a chimp, enters the bedroom, loads up with valuables, and escapes undetected. After a string of robberies in Greenwich, Connecticut were reported nationwide, other police agencies came forward with similar crimes. But by then, Golder had apparently slipped away to celebrate his own cunning. Police nationwide are on the lookout for Golder, but they aren't the only ones. Apparently, Golder ratted out some of his organized crime connections when he was taken down for the Old Brookville murder to get a reduced sentence, and they'd like a piece of him as well. But even with all this attention, officials believe that Golder is probably cocky enough to be hiding in broad daylight. He apparently loves the way he looks, and spends a great deal of time in Gold's Gyms and tanning salons. At night, he frequents nightclubs, strip bars, and high-profile parties. He has allegedly convinced himself that crime pays, and it will be up to the police and concerned citizens to prove him wrong. Golder has used the aliases Alan William Kulp and Thomas A. Williamson. He may have "Alan" tattooed between his knuckles. He has a large scar on his right biceps from tattoo removal. He allegedly uses girlfriends as getaway drivers. Golder is a bodybuilder who has worked as a personal trainer and has been a member of Gold's Gym. He frequently changes identity, may have had plastic surgery and may wear a goatee. Golder is 42, 5'9"-5'11" and 175 pounds. (See Show #487, OAD 3/28/98)

FEATURES:

Local Heroine -- Young mother Tyshe Jenkins rushed to the aid of a young boy who had been abducted at knifepoint and was able to scare off his abductor with a branch, ignoring her own safety. The perpetrator was identified by witnesses and arrested shortly thereafter. Tyshe Jenkins has been honored by the Ft. Pierce, Florida police department for her heroism.

Hero Cop Update -- In 1997, Arkansas State Trooper Ted Grigson answered his door to find the son of his distant neighbor, Hans Hoerler, in a state of panic. Hans had fallen from a tree, injuring his back and head, and had sent his son to call for help. They never could have guessed how much help Ted would be. When Ted got to the scene, he found Hans and his wife Tanya crying and praying. Hans couldn't feel his legs, arms, or hands. He was praying for his family, knowing that if he was paralyzed, he couldn't continue to run this farm. When he wondered out loud who would milk the cows, Ted replied automatically that he would milk the cows. He then went home and told his children that Disney World was off that year. For the next four months, Ted lived a double life, as a trooper and as a farmer. Working at least 16 hours a day, Ted patrolled Arkansas' highways as well as Hans' barn, making sure that both were safe. Even more surprising was the fact that he had never milked a cow before. Local farmers showed him how. Soon, neighbors and friends, and even Ted's wife, were pitching in to keep the farm going. But by the fall, it was painfully obvious that Hans would never walk, much less work his own farm again, and the majority of his livestock was auctioned off. The auction made enough money to help Hans continue his physical therapy, and prepare to return home. But Ted wasn't done yet. As Hans was getting ready to come home, Ted helped remodel the farmhouse to accommodate Hans' wheelchair. And after AMW brought news of these selfless acts to the

world, viewers responded. Ted Grigson was finally able to take his family to Orlando and Cocoa Beach, Florida - and they got the royal treatment everywhere they went. As for Hans, help keeps pouring in. Ted will always remember his days as a farmhand - the first experience he had with the long hours and backbreaking work that puts food on our tables. But now he can rest, knowing that with his help, Hans' farm may yet survive, and knowing that he will keep his promises, no matter how difficult.
