KCQL provides its listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Animal Adoption & Population Control: Stacie Voss of the Farmington Regional Animal Shelter was our guest this week to discuss animal overpopulation and adoption. This time of year adds a huge burden at the shelter due to the yearly kitten explosion, when cats give birth in numbers much too large for the shelter to take in. Instead of euthanization, the shelter uses other methods to help them out. Adoption and fostering takes place for cats and dogs, and some animals end up as far away as Denver in hopes of finding a home. We also discussed spay & neuter programs, perhaps the best deterrent to the unwanted pet overpopulation.
- Civic Pride, Tribute, Remembrance: 9/11/2001 is truly a day that all Americans will remember. This week we took a look back at that horrible morning that showed us all in striking detail that things were changing in America, and the war on terrorism was ferociously on our doorstep. We heard from survivors, on the ground and in the buildings when it all took place. We heard from first responders about their singular view of the disaster as they tried desperately to save those in the Twin Towers. We heard from family members who lost loved ones, and we paid tribute to all who fell, and who have fallen since that day.
- Economic Development/Downtown Revitalization: The planned Main Street Project in downtown Farmington was the subject of this week (tm)s show. Sherry Roach spoke about the complete overview of the work to be done, along with some answers to questions regarding components of the project. Those included are the need to do all the work at once since it is a very large project, the use of roundabouts, parking, the inebriate problem, and the concern of being able to fill the storefronts after the work is completed. Mrs. Roach also spoke about the timeline for the construction, and it looks like work will begin in early 2019.
- Historical Presentation/Childrens Programs: ~Dining with the Dead (tm) is a yearly fundraiser for Rio Del Sol Kiwanis, who use the monies to support its many children (tm)s charities, including Clothes for Kids, Shoes for Kids, and Books for Kids. At ~Dining with the Dead (tm), local actors take on the roles of those famous or even infamous in the history of Farmington and the Four Corners. They stand at the graves of

the people they represent in Greenlawn Cemetary, among the trees and Gothic markers, telling their tales to the living on tours through the setting.

- Law Enforcement: Farmington Police Department Public Information Officer, Georgette Allen spoke this week about two important subjects: an increase in DUI checkpoints throughout the city in the month of September, and a new program that the department recently started, in which a rescue medic will ride along with officers on patrol to cut down on time and resources used in the aid of citizens in immediate distress. A medic on site will save valuable time and emergency resources for calls that would normally require fire department, ambulance and/or rescue vehicles being dispatched.
- Law Enforcement, Community Partnership: Farmington Police POI Georgette Allen was our guest this week with updates on things happening in the Farmington Police Department. We talked about cold cases being reopened, the relationship between the public and law enforcement and how it can be improved, and National Night Out, an evening in which the public is encouraged to come out and meet members of the Farmington Police department and other First Responders in a casual, fun atmosphere.
- Native American Culture and Art: For 30 years, The Totah Festival and Indian Market has brought incredibly talented Native artists together in one place to show their wares, not only in a juried art show, but to display and sell them in a large Indian Market. Attendees to the festival will be truly enchanted by the displays of all types of art, from rugs to jewelry, sand paintings to statues, carvings and much more! Also included in the event is a contest Pow-Wow and Cultural Dance Expo. A wonderful display of the Native American culture and art.
- Performing Arts/Charity: Steve Clark of Theatre Ensemble Arts was our guest this week, in to talk about their latest stage production, an adaptation of the Mel Brooks comedy TV series, Get Smart . We talked about how one becomes involved in local theater and what it takes to direct a show like this, that has many effects and a large cast. He spoke about his background in theater, starting in Montana, and finally becoming the much loved Drama teacher at Farmington High. On one specific night of the run, cans of food were collected to be given to the local Women (tm)s Shelter.
- Safety and Security: We are all concerned about terrorism or terrorist related crime. What can we do about it? What should we look for? And, if we see something, what should we do? In depth answers were given to these questions and more by Taylor Price of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. Discussion also centered on a new public awareness campaign, See Something, Say Something that brings light to what you should do if you encounter or suspect suspicious activity. In conjunction with this campaign, September 25th, will be called National See Say Day.
- Volunteerism: Natalie Spruell of the Sycamore Park Community Center was our guest this week and our topic of discussion centered on volunteerism for two upcoming community events. Over 200 volunteers are needed to be seaters/greeters for the upcoming Connie Mack World

Series. Seaters/greeters do just that. They make sure patrons get to their assigned seats, and represent the city as an ambassador, generally making visitors feel welcome in our town. We also discussed the annual Rod Run car show, and the need for volunteers at this family event as well.

- Women's Issues/Safety/Awareness/Empowerment: Our guest this week was Officer LeLe Monclova of the Farmington Police Department and we discussed, ~Women with Insight (tm), a program sponsored in conjunction with the Farmington Police Department that offers women a chance to learn more about empowering their lives. The poll also found that only half of parents considered themselves "very confident" at discerning which childcare options were truly safe and healthy. She outlined the most important questions that parents should ask when evaluating childcare providers. She said 82% of parents would be in favor of a national standard for health and safety for childcare centers and in-home childcare providers.
