An amendment to a wide-reaching fiscal bill could make Indiana the 30th state to eliminate retail sales tax on feminine hygiene products.

Indiana currently charges seven percent sales tax on products such as tampons, pads, and menstrual cups. The state tax on period products is one of the highest in the country, according to Alliance for Period Supplies.

Representative Carey Hamilton has been working to get language to exempt these products from the state retail tax since she was elected in 2016. She says this is a "critically important change" ... and these products are essential to the health of people with periods.

Muncie Mall is sold to southern property group

After years of uncertainty over its future, the Muncie Mall has been sold to a new company.

Hull Property Group from Augusta, Georgia, says it owns 35 enclosed shopping malls over 17 states, mostly in the south and east. But its portfolio already includes two Indiana properties - the mall and a Dunham's Sports in Richmond.

In a statement, owner Jim Hull says "There are no bad properties, just bad ownership, and job one for us is to do the things necessary to improve viability for the existing tenants."

The Muncie Mall lost its first anchor store in 2018 as part of a national decline in sales, eventually losing all its anchor stores. New managers, The Woodmont Company, took over in 2020 to market the mall for sale from Washington Prime Group. The next year, Washington Prime filed for bankruptcy and stopped paying the building's mortgage. The mall was eventually sold to Wells Fargo Bank in a county sheriff's sale in 2023 so the financing bank could recoup losses.

Muncie Mayor Dan Ridenour has talked about the need to save the Muncie Mall since his first year in office in 2020. That's because it's the second most-expensive property on the city's tax rolls.

No financial details were included in Hull's press release. When advertised in last year's sheriff's sale, the asking price was \$32 million.

01/03/24 Abortions Under IN Ban IN Capital Chronicle (SLW Short Edit)

A quarterly report from the Indiana Department of Health shows 17 women had abortions in Indiana since the statewide ban officially went into effect in late August.

The majority of the procedures fell under an exception for a lethal fetal anomaly.

The report shows 764 abortions were performed in Indiana from July 1st through September 30th. All but 17 came before August 21, when the Indiana Supreme Court decision upholding the new law was certified.

That law has three exceptions - lethal fetal anomaly, cases of serious health risk to the mother, and for up to 10 weeks only in cases of rape or incest. Nine of the 17 abortions since August 21st cited a fetal anomaly. Seven were due to a serious health risk or life of the woman ... and one was due to rape or incest. To use one of these exemptions, the attending physician has to certify the reason in writing to the hospital.

Class 3 Wetland Gov

The governor signed a controversial bill Monday that further reduces protections for the state's wetlands.

Because of a state law passed three years ago and the result of a recent U-S Supreme Court case, few wetlands in Indiana are protected today. The bill would lower the number of wetlands that could fall into Class 3 — Indiana's most protected group of wetlands, and the only class that didn't lose significant protections when the state changed its wetlands law in 2021.

Proponents say the bill strikes a good compromise between developers and the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. But environmental advocates and wetland experts say they weren't consulted on the bill and that it will lead to the loss of even more wetlands in Indiana.

The House bill is the first to get signed by Governor Eric Holcomb this legislative session. Opponents say it was fast-tracked through the legislature.

Ivy Tech, Ball State Join IU Speaking Out On Higher Ed Bill

After I-U President Pamela Whitten spoke out against Senate Bill 202, more public universities and colleges are opposing the bill that would change tenure and leadership on campus.

Mary Jane Michalak (Michael-ak) is Vice President for Legal and Public Affairs for Ivy Tech Community College. She spoke out specifically against a provision that would give the commission for higher education authority to review and make decisions on complaints against faculty members by students and staff.

The commission currently exists as a coordinating body and doesn't have a role in administration.

Ball State Vice President for Governmental Relations and Industry Engagement Becca Rice asked lawmakers to strike parts of the bill that would impose changes on university boards of trustees.

The bill would allow the legislature to appoint two members to each university's board of trustees.
