>>Police Chief Discusses More Efficient Ordinance Enforcement

If you're in violation of City ordinances, it's likely you'll be hearing about it from local authorities.

That was the message from Clinton Police Chief Ben Lowers at the Monday night Clinton City Council meeting after lengthy discussion regarding the lack of cooperation from community residents towards ordinances in place.

Cut 1: chiefviolators1 :53 CUE: now accomplished

Chief says the enforcement of ordinances is a renewed focus for Chief Lowers. He says because of excellent compliance in the community, there's been minimal need for much attention to the issues but he admits he would like to see that change.

Cut 2: chiefviolators2 :44 CUE: compliance

The Chief emphasizes this is not an effort of revenue generation, but rather to continue the effort to keep the community clean and presentable.

The discussion derives from local residents calls for action on vacant lots and other beautification efforts.

It's part of Fire Prevention week and Clinton Fire's Blake West says 25-30 trucks from across central Illinois will converge on the Junior High School to take part in the route that ends on the downtown Clinton Square.

At the Monday night Clinton City Council meeting, a purchase of a new squad car for the police department was approved.

Police Chief Ben Lowers says the new vehicle will be an SUV model, staying along the lines of the types of vehicles already in their fleet. The newest vehicle will serve as the K-9 unit for their K-9 officer and his handler.

With the venture into the SUV model law enforcement vehicle, Chief Lowers says they provide officers much needed space with all the equipment they carry around every day.

Cut 2: newsquadcar2 :52 CUE: number seven purchase

Since all the SUV model vehicles are a newer trend to law enforcement, the exact length of life on them is unknown at this point but he anticipates not having to plan for vehicle purchases for another few years.

>>Clinton Police Welcomes Former Farmer City Police Chief To Force

The Clinton Police Department is welcoming the former Chief of Police in Farmer City to their force.

Clinton Police Chief Ben Lowers explains with changes in enforcement and prosecution of city ordinances, the hiring of Larry Woliung makes a lot of sense right now, especially because he brings a lot of knowledge in city management and code enforcement.

Cut 1: wiohlinghire1 :63 CUE: code enforcement

According to Chief Lowers, there are some 'problem properties' and calls the police's response to complaints a reactive priority. He is excited to have a law enforcement officer focused on these areas in the community.

The Chief hopes Officer Woliung's presence can be one of a peacemaker and good community relations. He explains the position will be about outreach and educating the community on the ordinances in place.

Chief Lowers says the community and it's leadership has been involved in this effort and to discuss what areas of the community to focus on. Additionally, he says this position will allow their patrol officers to keep their focus on their day to day tasks.

>>House Fire Destroys Rural DeWitt County Home

A homeowner is safe after a fire totally destroyed their residence late Saturday.

Just before 11 pm Saturday night, emergency responders were called to a house fire on Green Valley Road in rural DeWitt County.

Responders were called to the scene of a home fully involved in a fire.

Crews had a two-and-a-half inch line out and the fire was out within 30 minutes. Fire crews indicate the blaze was tough because there were two ceilings and then a hot spot on the main level burned through the floor.

There was one occupant in the home at the time of the fire, who was able to leave the home without harm.

There were no injuries to the crews at the scene, who were there until roughly 4 am.

Crews on scene were from Kenney, Clinton, Maroa, Wapella, Waynesville, Warrensburg, Chestnut along with EMS crews and the DeWitt County Sheriff's office.

The Red Cross assistant responders and the homeowner.

The State Fire Marshall is investigating the fire but has not filed a report. The home has been deemed a total loss.

Clinton School and Exelon have reached an agreement on the EAV in light of the recent legislation to keep Exelon in the community for the foreseeable future.

The agreement was approved by the Clinton Board of Education Tuesday night at the monthly Board of Education meeting. Superintendent Curt Nettles indicates the settlement is a five-year agreement.

Cut 1: schoolsexelon1 :64 CUE: for us

Additionally, the Board approved a transfer of funds to the district's tort fund. Nettles says the fund should stabilize with decreased legal fees over negotiations with the power plant now in the rear-view window.

>>The Board approved the purchase and trade of the district's drivers education vehicle at a cost not to exceed \$20-thousand.

>>School Board Compares Figures For Wages For Aides

Discussion and research has been done on the wages of aides in the Clinton district and Tuesday night at the Clinton Board of Education meeting, that work came to a head when the district released Clinton figures compared to area districts.

Superintendent Curt Nettles presented the Board of Education with figures they gathered in the past month and says Clinton Schools compare well but points to the issue of attracting good aides and retaining them.

Cut 1: aidepayscale1 :59 CUE: in their life

Advocate for the aides, Ron Conner, says this discussion boils down to bringing in the best possible candidates and the administration holding them accountable. He's calling for a scale to be established for the aides.

Cut 2: aidepayscale2 :48 CUE: next year

Clinton's highest paid aides did not compare well to other districts and it was pointed out that the retention of aides was not very high. Nettles says if aides are not staying around, for whatever reason, they will not be employed long enough to get salary increases of a long tenured aide elsewhere.

Cut 3: aidepayscale3 :39 CUE: something else

Principal of Jerry Wayne indicates in the interviewing process for aides at the high school, many turn down the opportunity because the pay is not enough.

Cut 4: aidepayscale4 :15 CUE: to do that

Nettles says he will do further research, come up with a pay scale and present that to the Board during the spring semester to have scale in place for the next school year. He would like to also have something in place that considers the assignment an aide has.

Cut 5: aidepayscale5 1:19 CUE: for next year

The razed Washington School lot in Clinton has been vacant with the intent of the Clinton Board of Education to potentially sell or donate the property but a recent proposal for a building trades program in Clinton has put that action on hold.

The potential building trades program at the high school is still in the works but at last Tuesday's Clinton Board of Education meeting, Superintendent Curt Nettles put the ball in the court of the Board on what they would like to do going forward.

Cut 1: washingtonlot1 1:25 CUE: ourselves

If administration could find a qualified instructor for such a course at the high school, it is possible the district could offer building trades at the high school as soon as next school year.

Cut 2: washingtonlot2 1:24 CUE: looking at

Former Board President, John Blythe, proposed a summer course in partnership with Richland Community College.

Cut 3: washingtonlot3 :67 CUE: can be done

Board President Mike Walker threw his arm of support around the idea of holding on to the properties until a building trades program is established or it is decided the school cannot support a building trades program.

Cut 4: washingtonlot4 :66 CUE: in town

The Board decided they would continue to pursue a building trades program or partnership of some sort before they decide the future of the lot.

Nettles indicated last Wednesday on Regional Radio, he would like to know within the next few months if they could get a program going for 2018-19 school year.

>>Clinton Schools Facing Teacher Shortage

A shortage of teachers, substitute teachers, and aides has been highlighted by administrators and state leaders across the state and at the latest Clinton Board of Education meeting, the topic came to a head for discussion.

A shortage of special education teachers in the district resulted in the issue being highlighted to the Board. Superintendent Curt Nettles says the district is working to better fill the needs at Clinton Elementary School.

Cut 1: teachersneed1 1:18 CUE: into it

The need for special education teacher is vast across the state. According to Nettles, districts across the state's needs top 250 vacancies in special education alone.

Cut 2: teachersneed2 1:14 CUE: special education

Nettles could see the situation worsening and becoming a crisis. He does not feel the State of Illinois is to blame as they have not made Illinois a good place to work.

Cut 3: teachersneed3 :47 CUE: teaching

Nettles indicates the main struggle for teachers is in special education but points out there is also a struggle for elementary educators, which is a new struggle in recent years.

The budget is viewable to the public and will remain that way until late November when the Baord will hold a special meeting to approve it and enact it.

DeWitt County residents filled the DeWitt County Board room Monday night in support of a proposal for a wind farm on the northwest side of the county near Waynesville.

Ken Shaffer addressed the County Board's land use committee for roughly 20 minutes and discussed topics ranging from variance of the towers to studies and other concerns surrounding the structures.

Shaffer hopes his comments and the support behind him will begin and continue the dialogue.

The proposals presented by Shaffer ask the County to do a shadow flicker study, set back from structures at a distance of six-times the structure height and a reduction in tower height, among other requests.

Among other requests from Shaffer, wildlife studies along a decommissioning plan for the structures. He wants to have the decommissioning plan revisited, updated and covered every three years.

DeWitt County Zoning Administrator, Angie Sarver indicates a number of the requests from Shaffer have already been studied.

Cut 4: landusewindhear4 :49 CUE: separately

Development Director for Trade Wind Energy, Tom Swierczewski (swear-chess-ski) says he heard a lot of concerns that he felt were valid, and some that he felt were not workable.

Cut 5: landusewindhear5 :44 CUE: text amendments

Swierczewski indicates opposition to their projects is not anything new to him. He says Trade Wind Energy is very much a community minded company and they want to get all the facts out there for everyone to have.

Cut 6: landusewindhear6 :33 CUE: best we can

The land use committee will take in to consideration the things they heard from Shaffer. There was no action Monday night.

Once the land use committee approves the language in the ordinance. The language would still need to be approved by the regional planning commission, the zoning board of appeals and then ultimately the

Paying for parking in downtown Clinton will be a thing of the past after action by the Clinton City Council meeting Monday night.

About three months ago, the Council suspended parking meters for 90 days and Monday night the Council unanimously decided the parking meters would be permanently removed. Owner of Main Street Salon, Diane Peck says there has not been much change in the availability of parking once they were suspended.

Cut 1: noparkingmeters1 :55 CUE: park there

When asked what she would like to see next, Peck said she would like to see them taken out.

Cut 2: noparkingmeters2 :21 CUE: sittin there

Clinton Police Chief Ben Lowers says the biggest factor for the parking meters is traffic flow. His concern would be tenants in downtown apartments would have the possibility of parking in front of their residence all day without consequence to move.

Cut 3: noparkingmeters3 :43 CUE: from council

City Treasurer Clint Lichtenwalter says the parking meters only bring in around \$6000 to \$9000 in revenue each year but the Chief pointed out his staff found most of the revenue was from a small portion of the meters while maintenance on the others was greater than what they collected.

Cut 4: noparkingmeters4 :42 CUE: brought in

The meters will be removed and likely the poles will be as well as they are a hazard with no good way to cap the tops of them.

Also at the Monday night Council meeting, the annual city levy was placed on file for two weeks.

Could your water bill be going up in the next six months?

That is a possibility after discussion by the Clinton City Council Monday night. City Administrator Tim Followell explains the water department has experienced losses in some circumstances because of a lack of tracking small amounts of water that are consumed in town.

Cut 1: waterchange1 :67 CUE: commercial meters

Followell explains the City is not overcharging residents for water, in fact, it is the opposite. He notes the city is losing production, or producing more water than they need to.

Cut 2: waterchange2 :

To fix the issue, Followell indicates the city plans to install electronic meters throughout the community.

Cut 3: waterchange3 :60 CUE: every hour

Followell says not only this is a positive for the City but it is also a win for the consumer. It could help homeowners find leaks in their homes.

Cut 4: waterchange4 :37 CUE: for everybody (x2)

The community risks penalization by the EPA if they do not fix the problem soon. He indicates the sanitary district is going to help pay for the approximately \$1-million cost. IT will take approximately six months for everything to get implemented.

The Clinton City Council Monday night approved their annual levy and the City Treasurer says things are looking very positive right now.

Clint Lichtenwalter indicates the levy is decreasing by just over two-percent decrease, and the EAV has slightly jumped as well.

Cut 1: clintonlevy1 :29 CUE: for the year

Lichtenwalter points out, the levy being a lower rate is a direct result of the city being diligent in funding their pensions, something many communities cannot claim.

Cut 2: clintonlevy2 :47 CUE: this time

Elsewhere in the Clinton budget, Lichtenwalter says sales tax in the community is stagnant. He says while there hasn't been growth, it is a good sign there hasn't been a decline.

Cut 3: clintonlevy3 1:19 CUE:

Lichtenwalter also points out revenue from the City's gaming ordinance draws in roughly \$8-thousand a month, which he additionally notes, has done more to help replace other lost revenues than create new revenue.
