Wolverine Water Tests	(Day/Time) 10/9/17	(Note whether local, syndicated or network) New results are in from water tests, showing contamination in the well water of more homes, near an old Wolverine World Wide toxic waste site. State environmental workers first found contamination in the ground water in homes in the immediate area of the dump side along House Street in Belmont, just west of Rockford. Now testing shows there are toxic chemicals in the wells of homes across u-s 131, along Chandler Drive. The homeowners who have contaminated wells are being notified this week. WZZM 13's Noah Fromson is in the information center with more on the new findings. The E-P-A says you don't have to find much of these toxic chemicals, sometimes called P-FAHS, for them to be dangerous. The homes I visited on Chandler Driver had readings that exceeded the lowest E-P-A standards, and the families are scared of the unknown effects. Kristi Meyerholtz turned off her faucets in September. Last Spring, state officials traced fluorinated chemicals in Plainfield Township wells to an old Wolverine Worldwide dumpsite about a half mile from Kristi's house. New tests found multiple homes on Chandler Drive tested above the 40 parts per trillion advisory level. The chemicals' health effects are unclear. And that scares Kristi, whose family of six has lived on Chandler for 13 years. It's not just the immediate family. Kristi's cousin Lisa lives just next door. Her house tested an extremely high 10,000 parts per trillion. Wolverine Worldwide told WZZM 13 it's giving bottled water and whole house water filtration systems to affected families. But the Meyerholtzs had to buy their own dispenser. And the water isn't cheap. They spent nearly 400 dollars for water in September

But that doesn't take away the fact that some women are more at risk because of the *type* of breast tissue they have. Women with dense breasts are five times more likely to develop breast cancer. Which is why Michigan recently passed a "Breast Density Law" requiring doctors to inform women when they have dense breast tissue. 40% of women in Michigan have dense breasts. But even fewer know what that means. This is a side by side. One breast without dense tissue and one with. You can see the one with dense tissue is white. Here's why that's a problem. Cancer *also* shows up white on a mammogram. So if you have dense breasts it is VERY difficult to see if there is something suspicious. This information can be both life- saving and expensive as one West Michigan mom learned.
Addiction Support	10/13/17 at noon	Drug addiction is a growing concern nationwide and one way to combat this epidemic is to have adequate resources. The Alano Club of Kent County provides

	executive director. The opiate epidemic is the largest
	man-made epidemic in history. The United States is
	currently experiencing an opiate epidemic, The Kent
	County Health Examiner reported that in 2016, opiate
	overdose deaths reached 65, down from 87 in 2015.
	The rate of opiate deaths is decreasing thanks in-part to
	an increased use of Naloxone (Narcan) by first
	responders. The total rate of individuals with opiate addicted individuals in Kent County isn't known.
	However, first responders are reporting a spike in use
	of Naloxone, indicating that opiate addiction continues
	to be a community issue. Communities, experience
	many tragic consequences of opiate addiction,
	overdoses are simply one of the most visible. Families,
	health care systems, and public safety all suffer as well.
	Specifically, the opiate epidemic has taken a financial
	toll on the healthcare system. We, at the Club, have
	seen an increase in individuals addicted to opiates
	going back at least eight years significantly. We have a responsibility to address this issue head on, change our
	programming we offer to serve the needs of the
	individuals that were walking in our doors, difference

Opioid Epidemic Setup	10/26/17 at 5:00pm	It's no secret opioid addiction and overdoses have become an epidemic in the U-S. Now President Trump is declaring it a nationwide public health emergency. The President's declaration this afternoon eases certain laws and regulation, and allows grant money to be used to fight opioid abuse. But it falls short of what many Trump Administration advisors wanted: declaring a "national emergency" which would have provided much more in federal funds and resources, to tackle the issue. Why are opioids a concern? More than 62- thousand people nationwide were killed in opioid overdoses last year. That's more deaths than H-I-V and AIDS at the height of the epidemic in 1995. And, listen to this, more Americans died of drug overdoses in 2016 than died in the entire Vietnam War. Opioids, which include prescription painkillers and illegal drugs like heroin, are a deadly problem in Michigan. In 2015, nearly 13-hundred people died from opioid overdoses more than deaths from guns and traffic crashes. We have team coverage on the opioid epidemic, looking at the health crisis from the view of police, who are often the first responders to overdoses. And we'll look at how Michigan is fighting the crisis. Police are the people who see some of the ugliest parts of the opioid epidemic. They go after the drug dealers "and" suppliers. And they're often the first ones to respond to overdoses. The epidemic has reshaped how they handle drug cases. WZZM 13's Nina DeSarro continues our team coverage, with the police perspective of the opioid crisis.
Heart Stents	11/3/17 at 5:00pm	Nearly 2 million Americans receive heart stents every year now a new study says these stents ~ used to relieve chest pain~ may be useless. The study was published in the Lancet and reported on by the New York Times and questions whether stents should be used as often or even at *all to treat chest pain. The patients in the study were either treated with a stent or without one. All of them were put on high dose blood clotting drugs. Six weeks later researchers found there was relatively no difference between the two groups of patients. Dr. David Wohns Chief of Cardiovascular Medicine at Spectrum Health Medical Group gave me this statement about the study. Dr. Wohns went on to say the study was too small to verify whether or not a change in heart stent protocol should be taken and more research needs to be done. Whole House Filters	11/4/17 at 6:30pm	Wolverine Worldwide started installing whole-house filters this week for homes in Plainfield Township testing with the highest amounts of the toxic chemicals found at the old Wolverine Dump on House Street. And some of the homeowners tell us Wolverine said it will retest the water now that the filters are in. The filters themselves are huge, taking up a good chunk of people's basements. They were provided by Culligan and installed by contractors on Thursday. Wolverine

		with my little blood pressure cuff and measured their blood pressure. I found that the numbers split right
		down the middle. With half being over 130-over-80 and
		half being under 130-over-80. Which is almost right on
		the mark with the research that says about 46% of
		Americans will now be considered to have high blood
		pressure. Cardiologists obviously believe the drop in
		the numbers is needed. Yes because if doctors get on their patients earlier when it comes to high blood
		pressure the less chance they'll have of developing
		cardiovascular disease or ever be put on blood
		pressure medication. And that really is the goal. Think
		of it this way. When you first start pumping up a balloon
		it's easy. The more pressure you get in the balloon the
		harder it is to pump. That's how much harder your heart

		has to work when you have high blood pressure.
Water Worries Update	11/27/17 at 5:00pm	A lot has happened over the last three months regarding the water contamination in the Rockford area. One-hundred seventy three homes have water contaminated with industrial chemicals that were used by Wolverine Worldwide years ago at the company's
		tannery. This family of man-made chemicals is called PFAS, and there's a lot we, state officials and scientists still don't know about the suspected carcinogen. WZZM 13's Noah Fromson, has been on your side reporting on this issue for months he's here to talk us through the
		latest conversation he had with top health leaders in the state of Michigan. Noah, what are some of the major takeways? One of the first points the Department of Health and Human Services made was that this contamination is much different than what we saw in
Grip Strength & Your Heart	11/30/17 at 6:00am	Flint. And in some ways, it's more difficult to solve. There are many things that can increase your risk of a heart attack but this is one you may not have thought of your grip strength. Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here with how it can affect your heart health. A pretty big study of nearly 140-thousand people in 17 different countries found a connection with how strong your grip is and you're likelihood of having a heart attack. Researchers believe a weak grip strength could be an indicator of high blood pressure or cardiovascular disease because those make your arteries weak which makes your grip weak. So let's test out our grip strengths. We don't have the Dynamometer, so we'll use the poor man's way with this bathroom scale. Dan you go first. For men grip strength should be around 68 to 70. For women it should be between 38 and 40. The study found for every 10 pounds you were under the optimal grip strength you are 17-percent more likely to die of a heart attack or stroke. So what is the correlation between grip strength and heart health? Well, that's the frustrating thing researchers aren't entirely sure why. It didn't have anything to do with age weight or smoking drinking or exercising. I do have a way for you to improve your grip ~ in addition to consulting your doctor try using this hand-gripper while you

Today, the state released a set of rules which will govern the medical pot industry. WZZM 13's Amir Abbas is here with more, Amir? Nick, there is concern tonight because the state will start accepting applications from medical marijuana businesses in just 11 days. Same of the types released this

		and locally active in light yellow, including here in Michigan. So here's a reminder of what you can do to protect yourself or reduce your risk of getting the flu. Cover your mouth and nose with tissue to cough or sneeze or use the crook of your arm. Washing your hands is really important and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.

Mental Health Court	12/20/17 at 5:00pm	In just a few weeks, Kent County will launch a new program designed to help mentally ill people arrested for certain crimes. It's called "mental health court. A Kent County Circuit Court judge will handle the specialized docket, targeting offenders suffering from mental illness. The pilot program is being funded a 193- thousand dollar state grant. WZZM 13's John Hogan sat down with the Kent County Prosecutor to talk about this new approach to criminal justice. He's here with more. State lawmakers in 2013 established the framework for mental health courts in Michigan. Nearly three dozen are now up and running. Kent County's program will begin next month. Mental health courts work with local agencies like Network 180 to offer court-supervised treatment as an alternative to incarceration. The program is for felony offenders diagnosed with a serious mental illness. Those accused of violent crimes are not eligible. Prosecutor Chris Becker says the number of people locked up with mental health issues has reached epic proportions.
