WZZM 13 health reporter Valerie Lego is here with some "not so good" news the flu already here. Yes, unfortunately that is true. Right now in Michigan we're seeing a few cases of it and more bad news the most common strain the C-D-C reporting also happens to be the one that hits you the hardest. It's the "A" type strain called H3N2. It causes more severe fever, coughing and aching especially ir seniors. Now here's the good news. That H3N2 strain included in this year's flu vaccine. And it's not too late get one. Just remember that it takes two weeks to develop immunity from the flu after you get vaccinate Flu cases are mild right now in Michigan but we can expect to see more of it in the months to come as ou flu season peaks the end of February beginning of March.	
UM Metro Health Merger & History	1/5/17 at 5:00pm	Grand Rapids medical community is growing yet again with a partnership between Metro Health and the University of Michigan Health System. WZZM 13 Health reporter Valerie Lego is here now with how this will impact patient care. The move went into effect last month after years of Metro using U of M health care services at its satellite campuses and also at its cancer center at its main site. Metro says one of the things their excited about is expanding cancer center treatment in West Michigan. One of the things I found most interesting about this announcement is the journey that got Metro Health to this partnership. Joining me to take a look at some of the high and low points is Lodi Zwarenstein a long time health advocate in West Michigan. Let's go back nearly 10 years ago to when Metro Health Hospital moved from Grand Rapids to their current location off M-6. There were some who said the move would never work. Then shortly after that there were concerns about how Metro Health would be able to compete as a single hospital system when other community hospitals were joining larger systems. Which led to the exploration of a partnership with the Tennessee based Community Health Systems which upset some people. And now we've got the partnership with the University of Michigan Health Care System. What do you think this will do for our medical community? In your opinion is there a little competition between Michigan State and their medical college based here and the University of Michigan wanting to have a presence too?	
Health Care Forecast	1/13/17 at 5:00pm	Every year Grand Valley State University holds its Health Check Forecast where they release the data they've collected over the past year and look at trends in health care for West Michigan. And WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego is a loyal attendee. You were	

		there this morning what did you learn? The biggest takeaway is that when it comes to coronary artery
		disease or CAD for short, the numbers are getting worse, Especially right here in Grand Rapids. Spending for CAD has increased by 22 percent over last year. We
		actually have a higher rate of CAD than the city of Detroit. Did they give a reason behind the increase? There's really no definitive answer as to why but they
		did give some possibilities like differences in patient health intensity of treatment and prices for health care services. What did they mention about health
		insurance? The good news is that more are getting it. The rate of uninsured dropped from 9% to 5%. But the bad news is that more companies are opting for high
		deductible plans. In fact 68% of companies are offering the high deductibles with the average for a single
		person being \$25-hundred dollars and \$48-hundred for families. Unfortunately, that is having a not so healthy affect. Kevin Callison/Grand Valley State
		University: There's some pretty good evidence on these high deductibles utilization and the evidence shows a steep drop in utilization right away it picks up a

		down the road. Where there any other trends you found interesting? Yes, the good news is that smoking rates are going down obesity is leveling off. AND
		maybe the most interesting that how much you pay to go to the doctor depends on your zip code. If you live in
		Kentwood you could be paying more for health care services than if you lived in say Rockford. So the big question is why? Why are so many people
Heroin Addiction	1/19/17 at 6:00pm	hooked on heroin? Health reporter Valerie Lego is here now to explain. Heroin is often referred to as the most dangerous drug on the streets and for good reason.
		Experts say just trying it once can lead to addiction, here's why; Receptors for heroin are located in the part
		of the brain that is responsible for pleasure and the perception of pain. That's right here. A person using heroin feels a rush of euphoria and no discomfort
		whatsoever. While the drug is in the body these receptors are working overtime and eventually become depleted. When the drug starts to wear off it becomes
		uncomfortable for the user and they have an urge to use it again. Another reason it is addictive heroin enters the body quickly. So, no matter how the drug is
		taken injected, snorted or smoked it gives an instant rush of pleasure. And here's why people usually die from using heroin. It causes you to become so sleepy,
		that your body relaxes to the point that you forget to breathe your respiratory drive shuts down. It can also cause your blood pressure to dip and your heart simply fails.

If you have a house hold income under \$100,000 or have a with high-deductible plan you will get the injectors for free or for very low out-of-pocket costs. Kaleo's announcement of the Auvi-Q follows last month's announcement by C-V-S of a generic version that would sell for \$109.99 for a two-pack. Ok guys time for you to listen up. You can see that in Michigan we have widespread flu activity and we can expect that to increase over the next few weeks. Joining me to talk about why this year's flu is more serious is Dr. Daniel McGee from Helen DeVos children's hospital. It has something to do with the type of virus that is circulating this year. Mammogram Call Backs	2/13/17 at 5:00pm	It's 13 Friends For Life day and one of the most important things a woman can do when it comes to breast cancer is to get her yearly mammogram starting at age 40. WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego talks about the importance of keeping your appointment when you get called back for a second look. It's 13
		Friends for Life day and that means it's time to contact your friend for life and remind her to do her breast self-exam, know her normal and get that yearly mammogram. Yearly mammograms are recommended for women beginning at age 40. For many women this can a scary thing, but receiving a phone call that your
		doctor has found something suspicious can be even scarier for women and their families. But a suspicious finding does not mean that you have cancer. Dr. Courtney Garlick, Medical Director and Fellowship-Trained Breast Radiologist at the Mercy Health Comprehensive Breast Center in Muskegon is here to

		discuss what a call back after a mammagram sould be
		discuss what a call back after a mammogram could be. If someone does receive a call back, what else could it be? The vast majority of the time, if you get called back from a screening mammogram, the results are benign. About 100 out of 1000 women will be called back and most commonly no further imaging or biopsy is needed. The most common findings are overlapping normal tissue, benign calcification or cysts. How often are the suspicious findings something besides breast cancer? Between 50-70% of the time the biopsied lesion comes back benign. Per 1000 women screened, only 5 will actually end up being diagnosed with cancer. What happens during a follow up appointment after a call back? Often the initial first step is additional mammographic views. Then the radiologist reviews these and determines if they need more imaging, such as ultrasound. Some women skip the additional views and go right to ultrasound, depending on the screening findings. The radiologist reviews all the images while you wait and you always leave knowing what the additional imaging showed and if there is any need for further follow-up imaging or biopsy. What if someone were to need a breast biopsy? What types of biopsies are there? There are several ways to perform biopsies. The type used depends on the type of lesion and what imaging modality will give us the best chance at successfully sampling the area. The different image guided biopsies are ultrasound guided, mammographic guided and MRI guided. Rarely, a lesion is not amenable to these and some women get a surgical biopsy. What happens if it is cancer? The breast care team will lead you through all the next steps. At Mercy Health Muskegon you will be contacted by one of our 2 outstanding nurse navigators who help you with every step of your breast journey. You are never alone in this journey and we have lots of resources available to help with the transition.

Flu Latest	2/17/17 at 5:00pm	The latest flu numbers are out and they are confirming that we are in the height of the flu season. WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here with a reminder that it's not too late for the flu shot. It is *not too late. The flu lasts through the end of March in West Michigan and sometimes even a little longer. So if you haven't gotten your flu shot, here's something that might convince you to get it. There are four viruses circulating this year. The "A" virus is the most prevalent and the one that is really taking its toll on kids and the elderly. But even if you get that strain of the flu and recover, you can still catch one or more of the other three strains going around. Unless you get your flu shot. And then you are protected. But remember it takes two weeks before you have immunity from the flu. And it can also be hard to tell the difference between a cold and the flu. Here's the symptom you need to watch for. If you have a sudden onset of fever and muscle aches and I mean like a hour ago you felt fine and now you are sick and feeling worse by the minute you more than likely have the flu and should call you doctor. And again the number one way to protect yourself from the flu is to wash your hands often. And if you are sick, don't sneeze into your hands, use your arm, that reduces the risk of spreading the virus to others.
Mercy Health Stent	2/21/17 at 5:00pm	It's a medical device that's been around for 30 years but recently got an upgrade. WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here to tell us about a new dissolvable stent used for heart patients being used here in West Michigan. I first learned about this new stent last fall. Borgess Hospital in Kalamazoo was using it on patients as part of a study. The hope was that it would be available in the next few years for patients but it's been working so well the F-D-A moved up its approval. So it's now available at Mercy Health Saint Mary's here in Grand Rapids for patients. Here's what's so neat about this new stent. It dissolves over time until it is completely gone after 3 to 5 years. You may wonder why this is important. "Absorb"~ the name of the bioabsorbable stent~ opens clogged arteries to restore blood flow just like other stents but then because it gradually dissolves in the body it reduces the risk of future blockages that can occur with metal stents and actually promotes the healing of the artery. What makes this so much better than a metal stent? Metal stents are permanent implants and sometimes the body tries to heal itself knowing that there is a a foreign object where there shouldn't be anything and scar tissue can build up over time causing problems, 15 million people in the U-S have coronary artery disease and this is a great option. Especially for younger patients like Stu McLean who is just 33 years old. He

		was the first to get the dissolvable stent at Mercy Health Saint Mary's back in January. Since then they've used the stent on three other heart patients. It's not for everyone so you should talk with your doctor about it when deciding what treatment you need.
Flu Facts	2/24/17 at 5:00pm	The flu is hitting west Michigan hard As we first told you yesterday at five, the entire Kalamazoo school district is closed today because of the flu. About 19-hundred children reported being sick yesterday. The closure gives the district three days to clean and disinfect its buildings. "Climax- Scotts Schools" in Kalamazoo County are also closed today due to illness. Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here to sort the "fact from fiction" when it comes to the flu. This year's flu season is exactly as the C-D-C predicted. The Type A virus that is circulating is hitting kids hard. The good news is that the vaccine is a near perfect match for this year's flu and that virus is included in the vaccine. It's not too late to get the flu shot. We still have about a month to six weeks to go for our flu season here in West Michigan. Although doctors suggest the flu shot some people like to try home remedies. Yes they sure do. So I thought this would be a good time to take a look at the ones that do and don't work. Let's start with garlic. Eating raw garlic helps boost your immune systemthat's true according to N-B-C News Medical Contributor Dr. Natalie Azar. Raw garlic can be helpful in warding off a cold or flu. Have you heard of putting onions in your socks before bed? Some people thinks it helps but that is false. There's no scientific evidence to back this one. But get this, chicken soup is actually good for your body when you're sick. Steam from the soup helps to loosen nasal congestion and the salt helps soothe a sore throat. Drinking caffeine can help you get through the day when you're sickthat one is false. Caffeine can be dehydrating. And put some honey in your teathis one works. It's a cough suppressant and has anti-bacterial properties BUT it can be harmful to infants because of the bacteria botulinum. So there you go, a few flu remedy facts for you.
Spinal Stroke	3/1/17 at 6:00pm	There are many aspects of heart health that many of us don't think about. Like how it includes our entire cardiovascular system. WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here with a reminder about how quickly life can change when one part of it is affected in this month's Love Your Heart Report. It's so true. When you think about keeping your heart healthy you need to think not just about heart attacks but also strokes. And how a clogged artery anywhere in your body can cause a life to change in an instant. Heather Warner will never forget the day her life changed. At just 26 years old, Heather had a stroke. But it took doctors a week to diagnose it. Dr. Daniel Fechtner, a rehabilitation physician at Mary Free Bed diagnosed Heather with a spinal cord stroke, "In some ways they are harder to recognize." Mostly because the symptoms of spinal cord stroke are very different from other strokes that affect the brain. "A spinal cord stroke is recognized by a sudden onset of weakness in the legs. There's numbness that goes along with it and very often there's pain." But there is one similarity. Heather's stroke like

		many others was caused by a clogged artery. But with all the struggles she has left there is one bright spot. A sign that her spinal cord is finally starting to heal. Heather may never walk without a limp or regain all of the feeling in her legs. But those are small when she thinks about being told she would never walk again.
Winter Blues	3/2/17 at 5:00pm	If you feel this has been a long winter you are not alone. So many feel that way and are ready for spring. WZZM 13 Health Reporter, Valerie Lego is here to tell us why those winter blues are "real" and what you can do to feel better. It's good to know that you're not alone right? Those long days with no sunlight really do affect you on many levels. If you love cold winter nights with pasta or mac-n-cheese blame the lack of sunlight. I talked with Dr. Margaret Moen a sleep specialist at Mercy Health and here's how she explained it. Dr. Margaret Moen/Mercy Health Sleep Specialist: "It's almost like a hibernation type and so there's this need to want to store energy and metabolism is affected by our master clock. So does our metabolism slow in the winter? A little bit but Dr. Moen says it depends on how well you process shortening of sunlight. For some it could only be a slight difference and for others a BIG one. Oh boy I'm glad the days are getting longer. I know it's the perfect cure. The more sunlight you can get the better and add with that 30 minutes of activity whether it's walking or yard work and you'll be on your way to a better mood. *AND* you'll sleep better!
C- Section Shaming	3/7/17 at 5:00pm	It should be one of the most beautiful time in a woman's life. But unfortunately, for some women, it's a time a guilt. WZZM 13 Health Reporter Valerie Lego is here with a look at why woman are not only feeling guilty about having C-sections but also judged by other moms. It seems hard to believe but it's true for many moms. However, imagine being "shamed" for it. That's what happened to one mom who wanted pictures of her C-section birth. The post went viral and reached over a thousand comments. But it still doesn't change that fact that some women feel guilty after a C-section. "It's a miracle that comes with a rush of emotions including one that may surprise you. And Tricia isn't alone. Erica Bowers recently shared her feelings of guilt on Instagram. So imagine someone judging you for having a C-section. That's what happened when an Oregon photographer refused to take birth pictures for a mom having a C-section. The mom posted the text exchange on "Sanctimommy" where the photographer says, "That is not birth no matter how you swing it and I for one don't want to be there to take pictures of it." Elsa, a mom of two, counsels a lot of moms trying to get past the guilt. She says the biggest thing you can do is form a support system but be careful who you turn to. Tricia found that support and was able to make peace with her daughter's birth. Nearly a third of women will have a C-section. The rate has declined in recent years because many hospitals will no longer allow for scheduled C-sections unless it's medically necessary.
Teen Diets	3/13/17 at 6:00pm	It's 13 Friends For Life Day. Time to remind your friend for life to know her normal From self-breast exams to getting that yearly mammogram. And moms there's something extra you can do to protect your teenage daughters from getting breast cancer. Here's this

		month's Friends For Life story: That age old saying "you are what you eat" even applies to teenagers especially teenage girls. All of those yummy foods our teens can't get enough of are setting them up for a higher risk of breast cancer in the 20's and 30's. That inflammation was the basis for a study by researchers at U-C-L-A. After studying women over 22 years from high school until their early 40's they found that those who ate an inflammatory diet meaning one filled with red meat, high fat, sugar and processed meats had a 35% increase in getting breast cancer before they turned 50. Liz Webber is a dietician with Mercy Health Saint Mary's she says inflammation can cause a lot of damage. The best advice Weber has for reducing your teenage daughter's risk for breast cancer early on is to make sure they understand the importance of healthy eating.
