Harvey is currently moving at roughly seven miles an hour with forty five mile an hour winds. Currently it's made landfall just west of Cameron Louisiana. . .dousing extreme southeast Texas and southwest Louisiana with rain. It is likely going to remain a tropical storm for most of the day. Flash flood warnings remain in effect for areas near Port Arthur and Beaumont Texas. Some forecasters are suggesting that, even if the situation is still a bit dangerous, the threat of heavy rains might be over for Houston and Galveston as the storm lumbers away. Though parts of Louisiana have already recorded over a foot of rain, while certain parts of Texas may have had up to fifty inches of rain dumped on them when all is said and done. Houston's latest forecast. . .less than an inch of rain with. . .maybe. . .some sunshine. Still things are far from over. So far nearly twenty thousand people have been rescued by responders across Southeast Texas alone. Though two-hundred and seventy five thousand are still without power. This particular system is expected to first sweep southwest then northeast across Louisiana through Baton Rouge and New Orleans. Harvey's current path is expected to go southwest then northeast through Baton Rough and New Orleans. Arkansas, Tennessee, and parts of Missouri are on alert because by the end of the day they may start to see Harvey's approach. Harvey is currently moving north with max sustained winds of 45 mph dropping lots of rain on Louisiana. Parts of Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee could also see rain and flooding. Angelina, Jasper, and Newton counties are under a flood warning. Evacuees at Port Arthur's Bob Bower Civic Center are being re-evacuated to the Carl Park Center. Harris County is under a Flash Flood Warning. Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Orange and Tyler counties are all under a Flood Warning. Right now, watersheds are pushing less water into Houston's bayous, creeks and lakes. Although they may be at record highs or even over the banks, water levels have crested or dropping in some places including the east and west forks of the San Jacinto River, Lake Houston, Cedar Bayou, Cypress Creek, Clear Creek, Hunting Bayou, Greens Bayou and Spring Creek. Thankfully, no more flooding expected in areas surrounding Brays Bayou, Sims Bayou, or in Pasadena. Big worry though. Flood officers are concerned the a section of the levy along the Cypress Creek in Inverness Forrest has breached and could flood homes, up the rooftops. Mandatory evacuation orders are in place. FEMA says about 30-thousand evacuees are being housed in over 230 Texas shelters. More than 50 counties have been impacted. Thousands of homes upstream from the Barker and Addicks Reservoirs have flooded after both dams backed up from heavy rainfall. Port Arthur is experiencing flooding and the city tweeted that people with boats are needed for rescues. Besides the major destruction, 20 lives have now been lost – and that number should, unfortunately, grow. Please pray for God's peace and protection in the midst of this storm and its aftermath.</p>

FEMA says that there are thirty thousand people in over two hundred thirty shelters in Texas and that more than 50 counties have been impacted. The Inveress Forest subdivision remains under mandatory evacuation following levy seepage. Residents won't be able to return until Wednesday evening. Thousands of homes upstream from the Barker and Addicks Reservoirs have flooded after both dams backed up from heavy rainfall. Folks living in the area won't be able to return for several weeks and when they do there could be a lot of damage. Port Arthur is experiencing flooding and the city tweeted that people with boats are needed for rescues. The Houston area will reach a high of 83 today being mostly cloudy and with only a slight chance of rain and calmer winds compared to the last few days. Harvey is now over Louisiana, and is expected to weaken as it goes over Mississippi, Tennessee, and into Kentucky. But it could cause tornadoes across the South as it moves North through Louisiana with maximum sustained winds of 45 mph. They may develop in northeast Louisiana and across southern and central portions of Mississippi. Tornadoes are also possible across parts of southern and central Alabama. People are using social media to try to find missing family members from Harvey and those posts are being shared and retweeted by the thousands. NRG Stadium in Houston is still taking in evacuees and their four legged friends, it was open last night as the most recent major shelter. Immigration and Customs enforcement wanted to let people know they are not conducting operations in the areas affected by Harvey. This is kind of important because apparently some individuals are impersonating Homeland Security agents and have false credentials. They are using this as a ruse that ends in robbery. Loss of life has increased to now at least 22 people. A bowling alley in Port Arthur has opened its doors as a shelter. So far, there at more than 500 people there and nearly 100 pets, including dogs, cats, a lizard and a monkey. The bowling alley is feeding people and donations of clothes, toiletries and water have been pouring in. Beaumont and Port Arthur are still struggling with rising water and are evacuating people. Harvey's hit southwestern Louisiana as a tropical storm with heavy rain and it'll spread into Western Kentucky. Lake Charles has already seen more than a foot of rain. A chemical plant in Crosby may explode after losing power as a direct result of Harvey. All employees have been evacuated. In the Houston-area, Pastor Scott Jones is rowing through through the streets plucking people out of flood waters. Meanwhile back at Grace Church, members and volunteers are working to staff a transitional shelter. The church is also providing hot meals, laptops and internet access so evacuees can register for FEMA or Red Cross assistance. Singapore's Defense Ministry has four CH-47 Chinook helicopters. These are the big ones you see in movies...and Singapore has dedicated those vehicles to assisting in Harvey Relief efforts. They made the decision to</p>
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help partly due to the longstanding relationship between the Texas National Guard and Singapore's Air Force. It is after all in Texas where Singaporean airmen train to face major emergencies. The storm is weak but it's not ready to give up. Tomorrow it will dump rain on central Louisiana. Then northern Mississippi on Friday. By Saturday afternoons folks in eastern Kentucky will be feeling it. In Houston, floodwaters have started to recede. Governor Abbott put in a request for rescue vehicles, 200 boats and 200 from Department of Defense. They still need them desperately in the Greater Beaumont and Greater Harris County area. When the flooding started GRACE CHURCH got a call from the Sherriff's Dept. asking them to house flood victims. They welcomed several hundred evacuees into one of their old sanctuary buildings; now the church is transitioning from "shelter" to "warehouse." They have literally tons stuff that people need. "We have gotten a massive response in the way of supplies so we're transitioning into being a community resource center; the non per food water clothing towels bedding sleeping bags toiletries bedding we do have good supply of that." The church has so much stuff they needed another place to put it. "We've also partnered with a local company that's over by Intercontinental airport that's offered up 15,000 sq ft. of storage space. So for the groups that are contacting us saying 'I've got an 18 wheeler coming from this part of the country, where do I drop it?' Not that we've secured this loading dock, we'll be able to take in those 18 wheelers and become a storage depot for other shelters, other churches other community resources looking to help with the rebuilding process." Want to help? He says Houston really needs 3 things from you: "Pray first, and then give, give of yourself; and then ultimately, don't forget. Remember. Because in these situations within a couple of weeks the world moves on; but in Houston it's gonna be a year, year and half before we have fully rebuilt. So just remember that the work is going on here and it will be for some time. Some evacuees are already being moving OUT of the area. Governor Abbot confirmed the U.S. National Guard is sending 10,000 additional troops to join the Texas Guard Members. Officially downgraded to a tropical depression now, Harvey's winds have dropped to 35 mph with no coastal watches or warnings in effect at this time, but the flooding rain continues over extreme eastern Texas and Western Louisiana with an additional 4 to 8 inches anticipated between now and Friday with isolated amounts up to 12 inches. The heavy rain threat has ended in the Houston/Galveston area, but the flooding is far from over around Houston, Beaumont/Port Arthur and eastward into Louisiana with Harvey now on a path northeastward into western Kentucky by way of Arkansas and Tennessee. Reports at this point that at least 28 lives have been lost in this storm so far. In Crosby, Texas - Arkema Chemical Plant is formally apologizing for the plant's critical condition. Arkema says it's setting up call and claims center hotlines to handle any questions or financial claims that may come. Safety experts are predicting an explosion may be imminent.

For much of the Houston area, forecasters are saying the rain is pretty much over and water levels have started to go down, HOWEVER many thousands of Houston area homes are underwater and could stay that way for days or weeks. Flood and flash flood warnings and watches are in effect from Eastern Texas through parts of the lower Mississippi valley and into western portions of the Tennessee valley and the lower Ohio Valley. Harvey is expected to produce between 3 and 5 inches of rain today, causing more flash flooding. You might want to get gas today and sooner than later. Colonial Pipeline says it plans to shut down a key line that supplies gas to the South because of storm-related refinery shutdowns and Harvey's effect on its facilities west of Lake Charles, Louisiana. The pipeline provides nearly 40 percent of the South's gasoline. Quick-Trip plans to stop selling gasoline at about half of its 135 stores in the Dallas-Fort Worth metro area, as it anticipates shortages due to refinery and pipeline shut-downs. All stores will remain open, though only half will have gasoline. Richmond, Texas is under a mandatory evacuation. The Addicks and Barker reservoirs are holding but, excess water is spilling over into Houston. Mandatory evacuations are in effect. Several Harris County emergency responders went to the hospital as a precaution after inhaling fumes following two explosions at the Arkema plant. Last night an Arkema spokeswoman said power was out at the flooded facility and it could pose a danger. In Beaumont, the water system has failed and Beaumont is out of clean water. It's unknown how long Beaumont will be without clean water so Baptist Beaumont Hospital is evacuating nearly 200 patients by air. Isolated tornadoes are possible tonight across parts of Mississippi, southern Alabama, and southwest Georgia. Additional tornadoes are possible on Thursday afternoon and evening across northern portions of Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and into parts of Tennessee. The official death toll for the storm went passed 30 and is expected to climb as teams search for missing people. More than 1,000 homes have been destroyed and close to 50,000 damaged, and over 32,000 people were in shelters across the state. Catastrophic and life-threatening flooding will continue In and around Houston, Beaumont/port Arthur, and eastward into Southwest Louisiana for the rest of the week. The expected heavy rains spreading northeastward from Louisiana into western Kentucky May also lead to flash flooding and increased river and small stream flooding. Do not attempt to travel in the affected area if you are in a safe place. Do not drive into flooded roadways. When the flooding started Pastor Mike Acosta of GRACE CHURCH got a call from the Sherriff's Department asking them to house flood victims. They welcomed several hundred evacuees into one of their old sanctuary buildings; now the church is transitioning from "shelter" to "warehouse." That allows FEMA to get involved, providing money and equipment. Irma's center will cross over into Alabama later today. Some schools have delayed openings or are closed all together. Additional river flooding is possible across eastern Alabama but it looks like the worst from the storm is over. Irma evacuees from Florida and Georgia can use food stamps in Alabama. In TENNESSEE: The State Emergency Operations Center in Nashville was activated at State of Emergency status and then deactivated at 1am. Irma's center is expected to be near Dyersburg around 8 a.m. tomorrow. IN South Carolina more than 150 roads are closed due to flooding. Irma knocked out power to around 250,000 customers. Many schools are closed or are opening on a delayed schedule. At least 40 people lost their lives during the Hurricane, including 12 in Florida and 3 people in Georgia. It's not safe outside until the storm has passed and cleanup is done. Officials are slowly piecing together the extent of Irma's path of destruction across the state. The fate of the Florida Keys remains largely a question mark. We do know there is no water, power or cell service on the islands. The Keys highway remains closed, and must be checked for safety before travel will be allowed back onto the islands. It's believed about 10,000 of us rode out the storm in the Keys, and could require evacuation. Officials warn us to please don't try to return to the Keys until you get an official okay. Police are warning of scams in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma. In Boynton Beach, two men posing as power company workers stole nearly \$13,000 in jewelry from a 95-year-old woman. Police say there is no reason for anyone with a power company to enter individual homes at this time. Any power company officials will be credentialed and most will be driving vehicles marked with company signage. Gov. Rick Scott has called the damage from Hurricane Irma "devastating" after flying over the Keys yesterday. The governor described overturned mobile homes, washed-ashore boats and rampant flood damage. He also says the Navy has deployed three ships, including the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln, to help provide emergency services, in the Keys. Scott also flew over the west coast and said the damage was not as bad as he thought it would be. Cleanup in the Keys is focused on the roads and the airports. They will be very important in getting rescuers and supplies to people who need it. It's been said the airport runways at the Key West airport are in excellent shape, and crews are working to get the Marathon Airport back up and running. Many airports are operating but on a limited basis. If you do have a flight at any of the airports in the state call ahead and make sure your flight is on schedule. Recovery efforts are underway. Some stores and restaurants have begun to open in some areas, which make it seem just a little bit more normal for some of us. Some evacuation orders were lifted for about 90-thouand of us living in Miami and the Keys. Officials say if you go home, it's probably not a good idea to stay there yet. In Jacksonville, officials say they've had some of the worst flooding in 100 years. Jacksonville Sheriff Mike Williams

				<p>says they're still assessing damage to the beach bridges, and they'll let us know when it's safe to return. In general, travel will be difficult, and it's not really safe to move around just yet. The best bet is to check with floridadisaster.org to find what roadways are open, and which are closed. You also may find information on where gas may be available. Miami International is expected to open today as is Orlando's airport. Speaking of Orlando, most of the parks will be re-opening today, which is good news. KLOVE and Air1 have partnered with Convoy of Hope to provide resources in the greatest areas of need distributing food, water and hygiene kits. They began helping in Houston, Texas and now they're in Daytona and Fort Myers here in Florida. Jeff Nene with our ministry partner, Convoy of Hope, says they're preparing to get ready for Florida operations, however, they aren't completely sure when that will begin. We're having to play some of that by ear, the two biggest issues right now in Florida are fuel and infrastructure. So we're having to wait you know much longer than we'd hoped for. Join with us in prayer for all here in Florida, as we've all been impacted by Irma in some form or another. The rescue and recovery will be ongoing for a long time.</p>
