Political/Health	Nine counties in West Virginia are being affected by this water crisis, and we're still in a state of emergency. 300,000 people have gone more than three days without clean tap water. Tomblin issued the state of emergency Thursday night, after a chemical leaked into the Elk River in Charleston. The chemical used to clean coal, started leaking from a 48,000 gallon storage tank at Freedom Industries, a chemical manufacturer. West Virginia regulators have ordered Freedom Industries to shutdown.	1/13/14
Education/Health	Families across the region are worried about the water inside their children's schools. Six schools had to re-flush their lines this weekend after they tested above the acceptable levels for crude M.C.H.M. Tests show that George Washington High School, John Adams Middle School, and Andrew Heights Elementary in Kanawha County are now in the clear.	2/3/14

The sentence is in connection to the July murder and robbery of Sherry Matthews in her own home in Princeton.
