Crime	In Kanawha County, several shots are fired in the parking lot of a bar. The owner of Five O'clock Somewhere tells us that an event was being held at the time to benefit the victim of a recent murder at the Motel 6 in Cross Lanes. A large group of people gathered in front of the bar, where a fight broke out between at least two people. At the time, three separate men pulled out handguns and fired approximately eight shots at one another. All three subjects ran away from the area. Anyone with information is urged to call police and may remain anonymous.	1/19/15
Economy	Thousands of outdoor enthusiasts traveled to the Capital City over the weekend. It's all part of the annual West Virginia Hunting and Fishing Show at the Charleston Civic Center. The show features everything from deer, turkey, and bear hunting supplies, to trout and bass fishing gear. The show wrapped up early yesterday evening.	1/26/15
Political	The West Virginia Senate passes a bill with the hope of decreasing heroin-related deaths. The legislation would allow first responders to use Naloxone, commonly called Narcon. The drug is an anti-opioid that reverses the effect of heroin overdose. Right now, paramedics can only administer it through an I-V. Senate President Bill Cole says he does not want drug users to get the wrong impression from the legislation.	2/3/15
Economy	Appalachian Power is asking regulators to approve a request that would increase your bills. The company wants to be reimbursed for past and continuing costs of fuel and purchased power. Customers would see an increase of four percent or more on their bills. Wheeling Power is also asking permission to do the same. If approved, the rates would kick in at the beginning of July.	3/3/15
Crime	A Fayette County man is in jail tonight, charged with operating a meth lab. Jeffrey Harper is also facing charges of purchasing or possessing a substance to make meth. Oak Hill police Chief Mike Whisman says officers were serving warrants in the area yesterday when they got a tip about a meth lab. Officers say they searched the area and were able to get a warrant for the house on Johnson Street. Inside the home they found Harper, along with a meth lab.	3/19/15
Education	Bluefield College is reducing its tuition by nearly 50 percent for prospective students in some areas of West Virginia and Virginia. President David Olive says starting this fall, the college will slash tuition rate to 12 thousand dollars for certain students. To be considered, the applicant must live within 45 miles of the college, live at home and qualify for the Federal Pell Grant. Olive says the college is doing what it can to remain accessible to students who can least afford a college education.	3/23/15

Economy	West Virginia is part of a new program looking to hire 10,000 veterans across the country. It's called operation opportunity initiative. Workforce and Hilton Hotels partnered together this summer to bring the program to the mountain state. The program helps veterans find jobs across the country and helps them with the expenses of traveling for interviews. Once approved, 100,000 points are awarded to each person. On average a one night stay at a Hilton affiliate would be around 30,000 points. The program also assists current military servicemen and women, national guard, reserve members and spouses.	1/12/15
Healthcare	A hospital investigation is underway in Beckley. Raleigh General Hospital is investigating whether heart procedures performed by a doctor were warranted. They are investigating cases where a patient's condition might not have justified the placement of a stent. This is involving Dr. D. Kenneth Glaser who reportedly no longer works there. The hospital is providing follow-up care to affected patients.	2/4/15
Economy	Many people flocked to the grocery stores in preparation of today's storm. We stopped in the Bigley Foodland in Charleston and saw people picking up what they may consider the essentials when a significant snow is in the forecast. One of the managers we spoke with says, he's never surprised by the rush of people that make their way into the store during these times of the year.	2/16/15
Crime	Police in Fayette County are still searching for a suspect who led them on a car chase that ended with shots being fired towards an officer. Dispatchers tell us the Smithers Police Officer attempted to stop a vehicle on Cannellton Hollow Road near Gauley Bridge Saturday night. The driver fled, wrecked the car, and ran off into the woods. Dispatchers say shots were fired, but the officer was not hit. Deputies from the Fayette County Sheriff's Department, Kanawha County Sheriff's Department, and State Police are helping with the search.	2/23/15
Healthcare/Political	A vote is scheduled for today in the state legislature after Governor Earl Ray Tomblin again vetoes a bill that would ban abortion 20 weeks after conception. He cited constitutionality concerns as the reason. But lawmakers only need a simple majority to overturn a policy veto. The GOP-led legislature passed the measure overwhelmingly. The bill does provide some exemptions, but not for rape or incest. The State Attorney General believes that any legal challenges will not defeat the bill.	3/4/15
Education	The Fayette County Board of Education holds a public meeting on the bond levy up for vote. It happened last night. Board members wanted to hear from the community about the proposed levy. It'll raise almost forty million dollars in funding. That money will go to multiple projects including new buildings for Mount Hope Elementary and Collins Middle.	3/18/15

He's charged with one count of hazing and one count of conspiracy to commit hazing. According to police, he's accused of giving Burch a bottle of liquor and carrying him back to the frat house after he was found unresponsive. State Troopers say the medical examiner confirmed they are human bones. Investigators say because of how the skeleton was found it could be a murder case. The annual event is held to recognize the mountain state's colleges and university's. It also highlights the available post-secondary opportunities. Political	The votes are in and the public has spoken. They want to see more money allocated for fire departments in Fayette County. 59 News spoke with the Oak Hill Fire Chief Tim Richardson, and he says the passing of the levy will help the fire department immensely, from keeping the trucks up and running to training his staff.	2/8/15
Education	What's a sign that a bill is generating a lot of debate? How about a senate committee meeting three times in one day. It's because of a bill that would allow charter schools in West Virginia. Public charter schools get state money, but don't have to follow the same rules as traditional schools. They have more flexibility for making school calendars, hiring, and firing staff and setting school agendas. Those for the bill say it allows schools to quickly adapt to its surrounding environment. Both of the state's teacher's unions oppose the bill.	2/17/15
Healthcare/Political	A bill banning abortions after 20-weeks is on its way to Governor Earl Ray Tomblin's desk. The bill just passed the Senate late this afternoon, with a 29 to 5 vote. It also passed in the House. The only exemptions in the bill are if a mother's life was in danger or the fetus was not medically viable. Today Senators tried to add exemptions for rape and incest and to change the deadline from 20 weeks to 22 weeks. Both were ultimately rejected. Governor Tomblin says he'll likely veto this bill if it's similar to last year's bill.	2/25/15
Education	The governor signs a bill into law that could potentially save many lives. Governor Earl Ray Tomblin signed Senate Bill 7. It makes CPR training part of the graduation requirements for all West Virginia high school students. West Virginia is the 21 <sup>st</sup> state to pass a CPR bill.	3/11/15
Education	College students looking to snare a summer job can now register for the Governor's Internship Program. As part of the program, students are placed in internships where they can get experience related to their academic interest. The internships are generally nine to 13 weeks. Pay depends upon the organization. The application deadline is July 8 <sup>th</sup> .	3/17/15

Before that night, the now 20-year-old Doan was a typical 10-year-old girl in a hardworking family of farmers in Pampa, Texas. They became the targets of an intruder who enjoyed killing just for the thrill of it. The immediate investigation yielded few clues. Doan, however, had a remarkable ability to recall the details of that traumatic night. Investigators would later learn that the gunman who killed Doan's family had killed before, hundreds of miles away in Missouri. A day before the Pampa shootings, Orlie McCool and his daughter-in-law Dawn were killed and the family pickup stolen. Levi King was later found behind the wheel of the stolen vehicle in El Paso, Texas. He also told law enforcement that there were four more bodies in Texas. King told law enforcement officers that the feeling he got from killing the McCools was better than any drug he had ever done. This was the lead needed to solve the Pampa murders. Robin Doan was willing to help by testifying about the night her family was gunned down while they slept. King took a plea deal in Missouri -- to avoid execution he agreed to two consecutive life sentences without the possibility of parole. In Texas, he also took a guilty plea, but the DA refused to take the death penalty off the table. Robin testified at the trial. There was one holdout for the death penalty; King received a life sentence. He will serve his time in Missouri. Robin Doan is satisfied. **On-screen text graphic:** Robin has decided to leave Pampa. Mintz, whose family had long-standing ties to the area, had married early in life, divorced and raised two daughters, Jessica Freeman and Andrea Little Gray, as well as becoming a respected businesswoman, realtor and mentor to young girls. Police investigation at the lodge found a crucial piece of evidence only the killer could have left, but questions remained: did Mintz know her killer or was it a random robbery that went bad? The investigation took the case in another direction when police found out that her husband, Travis McGraw, was secretly dating Mary Beth Fisher. His cell phone records revealed he was sending intimate text messages to Fisher. Fisher claims McGraw had told her he wasn't married, and the relationship, though intimate, was not sexual. Fisher found out the truth and gave him an ultimatum -- make up your mind by Sunday. Mintz was shot dead on Saturday. Travis McGraw willingly turned over his cache of guns to police. One of his guns matched the cartridge found at the scene and he was arrested for murder. Mintz's daughters emerged as powerful advocates for their mother, and prosecutors, after consulting with them, offered a plea deal to McGraw: second-degree murder with a sentence of 16-20 years. He accepted, but at the last moment changed his mind about pleading guilty. Three years after the murder the trial began. Further investigation revealed Musante's death was truly a suicide. This led to questions regarding the death of the pastor's second wife, Betty Schirmer, just three months earlier in an auto accident. Her death was determined to be suspicious and police suspected Schirmer. Questions then arose about the death of Schirmer's first wife, Jewel. The cause of her death, from a fall, was initially classified as undetermined, but was now ruled a homicide. A.B. Schirmer was arrested and charged with the murder of his second wife, Betty. At trial, A.B. Schirmer was found guilty of murder. Cindy Musante continues to stand by him. Original on-screen text graphic: Schirmer is awaiting trial for the murder of his first wife, Jewel. Sam's mother, Cindy told the court she believes "one hundred per cent" in Schirmer's innocence. **Epilogue (for the 01/17/15 rebroadcast):** a year and a half after his conviction for the murder of his second wife, Betty, A.B. Schirmer struck an unexpected deal with prosecutors. He pled no contest to the charge that he murdered his first wife, Jewel, saying he only took the plea to spare his family the trauma of going through another murder trial. Schirmer was sentenced to twenty to forty years in prison, the maximum allowed, on top of his life sentence. 01/17/15 **48 HOURS: "Murder in Pinyon Pines" (10:00-11:00p)** - a report on the investigation into the triple murders and the long quest for justice for Vicki Friedli, her boyfriend Jon Hayward, and Vicki's daughter Becky Friedli. In 2006, in Pinyon Pines, California, Friedli and her boyfriend were shot dead and their house set on fire. Outside the home, investigators found the charred remains of Becky Friedli, in a wheelbarrow. She was burned so badly, they could not determine how she died. Retired policeman Ron Friedli, Vicki's ex-husband and Becky's father, had a theory about what happened: Becky was deathly afraid of fire and he suspected she knew her killer. Police searched for clues but the case went cold. Years later, Luis Bolanos, a private investigator and a former colleague of Ron's, asked if he could get involved; he said he could get the case back in the news. He did just that. Seven years after the murders, police arrested Becky's ex-boyfriend Robert Pape and his best friend Christian Smith and charged them with murder. Their families say they are innocent. But an unexpected courtroom twist turned the case upside down. The District Attorney said there was an "issue" in the grand jury proceedings against Pape, and dropped the charges against them both. However, it may not be completely over; the investigation continues. **On-screen text graphic:** A new DA was sworn in last week. He says he will review the case "with an open mind". 01/24/15 **48 HOURS: "Kiss of Death and the Google Exec"** - an investigation into the 2013 drug-related death of Google executive Forrest Hayes and an investigation of Alix Tichelman, the woman charged with killing him, whose ex-boyfriend also died of a lethal overdose. Hayes, a successful, wealthy, married Santa Cruz, California technology genius was found dead from a heroin overdose aboard his 46-foot yacht. The yacht had been outfitted with a sophisticated security system, which eventually led investigators to Alix Tichelman, a young woman with whom he had a secret liaison aboard the yacht. Hayes and Tichelman met on an online dating service known for connecting wealthy men with women looking to be spoiled. The video footage recorded Tichelman injecting Hayes, cleaning up the scene and stepping over him to leave. At issue is whether Tichelman knew Hayes was in distress when she left, as police maintain, or if his death was accidental, as public defenders representing Tichelman claim. Tichelman led a troubled life which included eating disorders, drugs, and specialized schools. Investigators learned that just months before Hayes' death, Tichelman's then-boyfriend, Dean Riopelle, an Atlanta night club owner, also died from a heroin overdose. After an elaborate sting, Tichelman was arrested for the death of Forrest Hayes. Riopelle's death, originally classified as accidental, is being given a second look by Georgia authorities. **On-screen text graphic:** Alix Tichelman pleaded not guilty to manslaughter in the death of Forrest Hayes, and pleaded not guilty to prostitution and drug charges. Tichelman's next court appearance is on February 23, 2015. If convicted of manslaughter, Tichelman could face a maximum of fifteen years in prison. 01/31/15 **48 HOURS: "The Millionaire, The Model & The Hit-Man"** - an investigation into the relationship between Dino Guglielmelli, a millionaire health supplement distributor/ wannabe rock star, his model wife, Monica Olsen, his business partner/presumed hitman Richard Fuhrmann, and the \$80,000 "hit" Guglielmelli ordered on his wife. In 2008, Olsen, a model-turned-housewife, wanted to re-start her career, Guglielmelli was not happy. He became very controlling, dating other women and eventually filing for divorce. He tried various schemes to discredit his wife. In 2012, when he couldn't get his way in the divorce, he confided his problems to business associate/friend Richard Fuhrmann, asking him to "take care" of his wife; Fuhrmann told Guglielmelli that he would take the job. Instead of murdering Olsen, he went to the authorities in Los Angeles, California, and agreed to wear a wire. In October 2013, Fuhrmann got Guglielmelli to repeat that he would pay \$80,000 to have Olsen killed. To the authorities, it was a clear-cut case of murder for hire; Guglielmelli was arrested. Guglielmelli, in a telephone interview from jail, claims he is the victim; he was conned by Richard Fuhrmann. Authorities agree that Fuhrmann is a con man, but the conspiracy to kill Olsen was very real. In a surprise move, they offered Guglielmelli a plea deal: plead guilty to attempted murder in the second degree and serve only nine years in jail. He accepted. In a telephone interview from prison, Guglielmelli discusses his decision. Olsen is proceeding with the divorce and worries about the future. Fuhrmann fears what will happen when Guglielmelli is released from prison. **On-screen text graphic:** Because Dino took a plea deal he cannot appeal his conviction.
